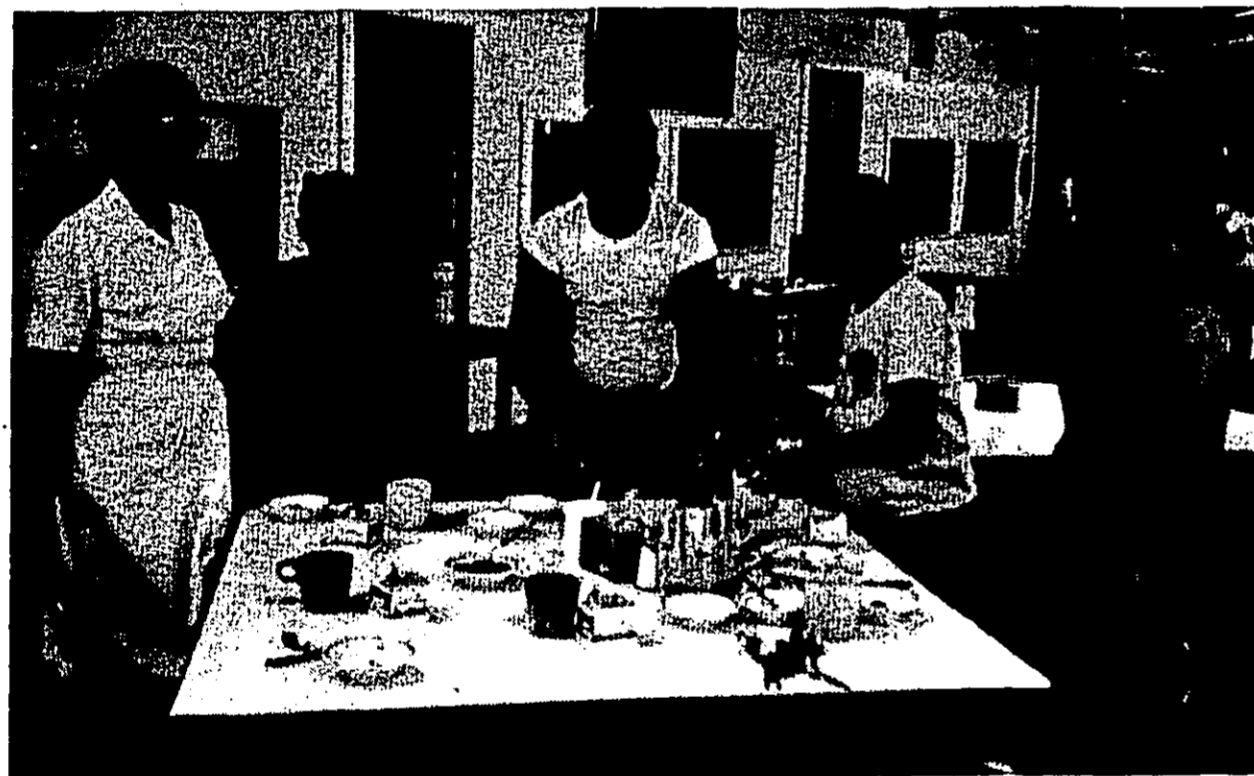

Postmasters Announce ZIP Code Numbers for Area Mail

Tyler County postmasters this week announced the five digit ZIP Code numbers which the post office department will use beginning July 1 to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of missent mail.

The ZIP Code number will be added to the address to enable the post office department to short-cut repeated address reading. With ZIP Code the clerk needs only to glance at the number to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined.

Since the address on mail may be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, the use of the ZIP Code number can cut up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery.

The ZIP Code number for Woodville is 75979, Postmaster H. M. Durham said, and everyone in Woodville will add the ZIP number after Woodville, Texas on their return addresses. In answering mail, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

The postmaster gave this as an example of the proper use of the ZIP Code:

H. M. Durham, Postmaster
U. S. Post Office
Woodville, Texas, 75979

T. A. Barnes, Chester postmaster, announced ZIP Code number for that office is 75936. Chester patrons should write their return addresses with that number, thus: John H. Doe
Box or Route No.
Chester, Texas, 75936.

The Colmesneil ZIP Code is 75938 and patrons of that office should use it after the town and state in return addresses:

Robert R. Roe
Box or RR No.
Colmesneil, Texas, 75938

There are many different forms of bowling. Ninepins, carreau, bowles, and curling are some similar games played in various countries of Europe.

Of all forms of bowling mentioned, ninepins was closest to our present form of bowling. It was extremely popular in the early United States until the game fell in the hands of gamblers and was outlawed by many states.

Here a new form entered called "Cocked Hat" which was played with three pins, but it never reached the same popularity level. Slowly the sport began to die until one day a pioneer, unknown to this day, added one pin and arranged the pins in a triangle.

The American Bowling Congress, and before it the National Bowling Association, did much to make rules and govern the sport as it is today.

The ABC, as bowlers know it, has eliminated gambling and added stature to the game until now the whole family attends for relaxation and recreation.

These are a few facts about bowling. Today more and more families are bowling and may we suggest you do the same. Lincoln Lanes is the local alley. It is owned and operated by Lynn and Oliver Williams, and offers such opportunities to you.

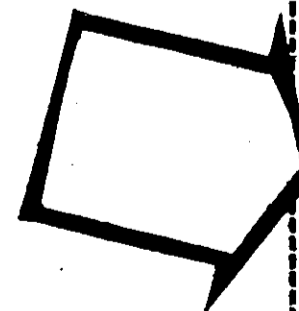
