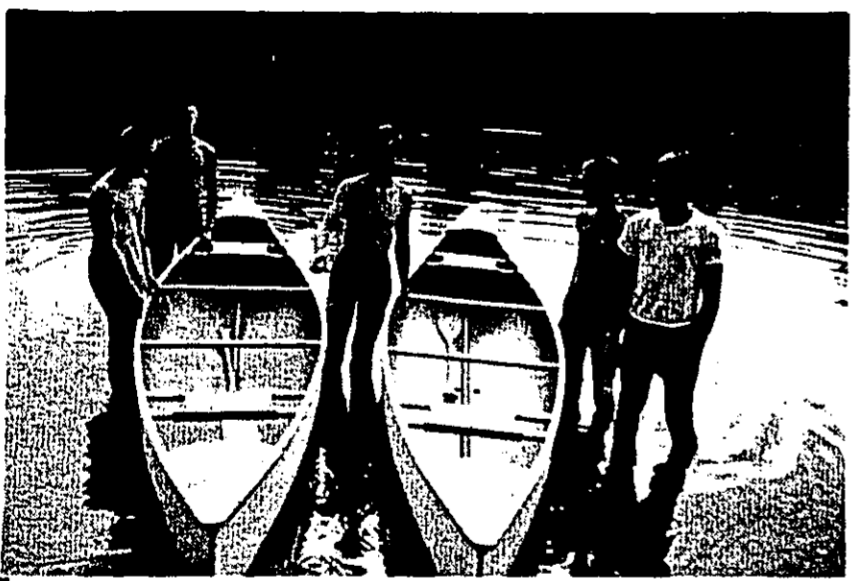

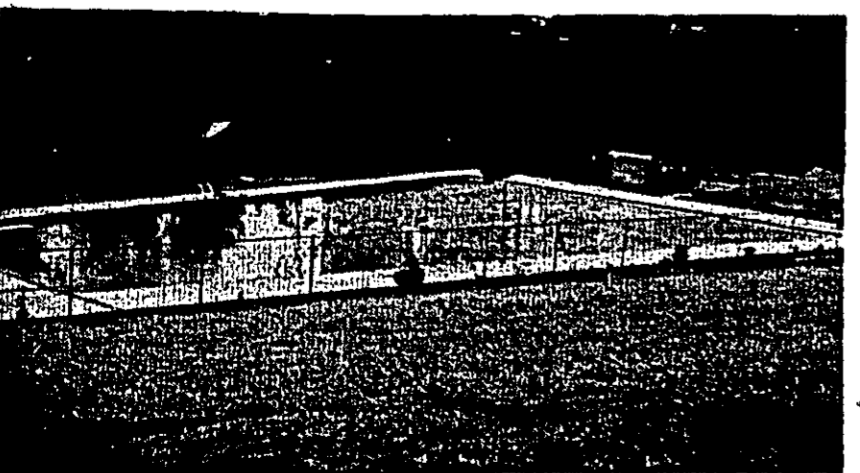

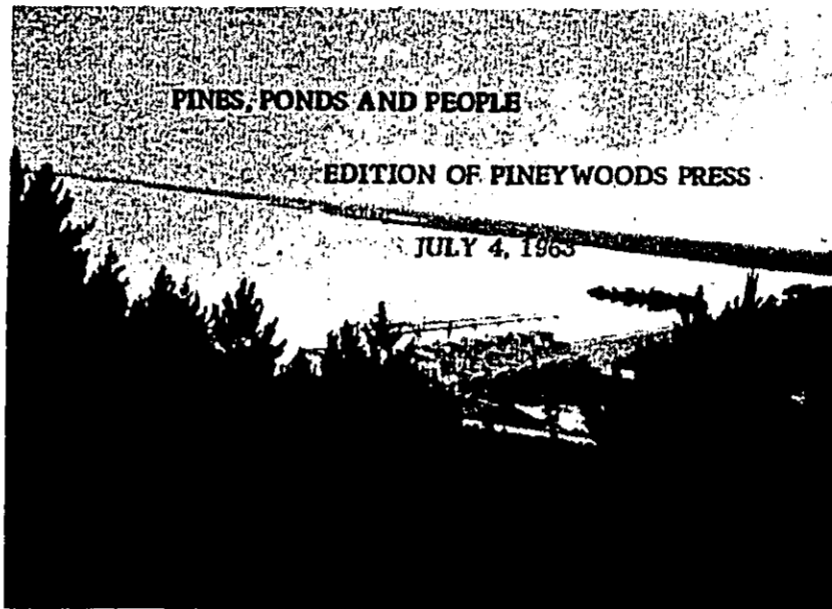

HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT'S COLUMN

Don't cry over spilled milk--ink--grease--or gravy. Do something about it fast, for speed is the key to effective stain removal.

All you need for a start are lemon juice, butter, salt, vinegar, and milk. Although this may sound like a grocery list, it is just a few of the household items which through the years have proven helpful in removing spots from clothing.

Has dad just come out of the work shop with shirt and trousers stained with rust? If so, just hold the spotted portions of the garment in boiling milk. This simple rust removing treatment is just as effective today as it was 80 years ago.

Lemon juice thickened with salt and powered starch also will remove rust stains. Just moisten the area with this mixture and dry the garment in the sun. Then rinse well and launder.

One annoying stain that most of us encounter--mildew--is summer than any other season--is mildew. Yet mildew, is effectively removed if the right strategy is used. For light mildew, it is usually sufficient to launder an article, then soak for five to 15 minutes in a solution of 1/4 cup dry chlorine bleach and 1 tablespoon detergent per quart of water. Then relaunder.

These directions apply for most white and colorfast cottons or combinations of synthetics with cotton. But remember... never use a chlorine-type bleach on silk, wool, resin treated cottons, or acetate. The milk and lemon juice methods will also remove mildew stains.

Butter is useful for removing tar stains. It changes tar into grease which can be removed with any commercial cleaning fluid.

A salt solution helps banish blood and meat juice stains. Soak the stain 15 to 30 minutes in a solution of 2 tablespoons salt per cup water. Rinse. If the spot remains, soak the stained areas in a solution of 1/4 cup dry chlorine bleach and 1 tablespoon detergent per quart of water. Repeat if necessary. Then launder.

All too often, a little one comes home after play, clothes covered with an appalling variety of mysterious spots and stains. Before setting to work with your spot-removing supplies, find out what those stains are! For a wrong treatment may set a stain for keeps.

First, test water or any chemical stain remover on a sample of cloth or on a hidden part of the garment (seam or hem) to be sure it will not change color. You may have to choose between the stain and a faded spot.

If the spot isn't greasy, try to remove it with cold water. It may be worth your while to take junior back to the scene of the crime to find out what is on the spot.

When baffled by a water stain--try vinegar. Soak the article in a solution of 1/4 cup vinegar per quart of water. Rinse and launder. This same solution--used as a rinse--helps keep dyes from running in pure silk fabrics which have been washed in a mild soap.

Those horrid ink stains have a habit of appearing on white shirts regularly, five schools days a week. If it is ball point ink, use a cleaning fluid, followed by an immediate laundering in warm suds. A weak solution of dry chlorine bleach, than a dousing of hot suds will remove stamping ink.

Regular writing ink will succumb to either glycerine or one of the soapless shampoos--if the stain is fresh and the material is washable. Rub lightly between the hands, rinse and apply glycerine again as long as any ink comes from the stain, rinse with clear water.

Successful stains removal starts with the selection of a method of stain removal that is suited to both stain and fabric. Remember this rule of thumb next time you are on the spot.

COUNTY AGRICULTURE AGENT'S COLUMN

The primary purpose of farm ponds is to provide adequate livestock water. The pond may also be used for irrigation, erosion control or recreational purposes.

Too many people think the job is completed when the last cubic yard of soil has been moved. Very little thought is given to the maintenance needed on ponds. Maintenance is necessary on all dams and spillways. The dams and spillways should be inspected after each storm and needed repairs made. Any eroded areas should be filled and sodded.

A trickle tube is often used to protect the spillway. The trickle tube protects the vegetated spillway against saturation for long periods of time. The trickle tube consists of a small pipe though the dam with a riser on the upper end. The crest of the riser is placed below the elevation

of the spillway. This keeps the spillway from getting saturated and permits grass to form a good heavy sod. Brush and trees should be controlled from the spillway and dam.

The above picture shows erosion on a pond built some time ago. The causes for this eroded condition is quite evident. The dam was not sodded properly after construction. A good grass sod on the dam and spillway will hold the soil in place. A little extra commercial fertilizer, barnyard manure, or broiler litter will insure an adequate cover. A flatter slope on this type of soil would also help prevent erosion.

Most farm ponds are constructed with a one foot drop every three feet on the front slope and a one foot drop every two feet for the back slope. A three to one slope on each slope makes a much better dam. As a result, the dam will have better compaction, be less likely to erode, and will be easier to get a grass sod established.

Before building your farm pond, check the advantages of a flatter back slope. The Soil Conservation Service technicians, working through your local Long Leaf Soil Conservation District, will be glad to answer your questions.

class of 1936. He accepted the pastorate at the First Baptist Church of Sterlington, Louisiana, and took work at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He then transferred to the Baptist seminary in New Orleans and in 1941 accepted the pastorate of the First Baptist Church of Jennings. He obtained his master of theology degree from New Orleans Seminary in 1942 and took his doctorate in theology in 1944, graduating magna cum laude. For three years, he was a fellow in the Department of Greek and New Testament.

In 1945, he went to Bossier City to become pastor of the First Baptist Church, where he led in the erection of a modern parsonage and one of the best educational buildings in the South.

In 1948, he accepted the position as head of the Department of Preaching at the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, where he has a record of distinguished service. He has served on the executive board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention, on the board of trustees of Acadia Academy and of Baton Rouge General Hospital, and on various denominational committees.

Dr. Guinn came to the presidency of Louisiana College on September 1, 1951. He and Mrs. Guinn have a daughter, Elaine, a 1961 graduate of Louisiana College now pursuing graduate studies at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth.
