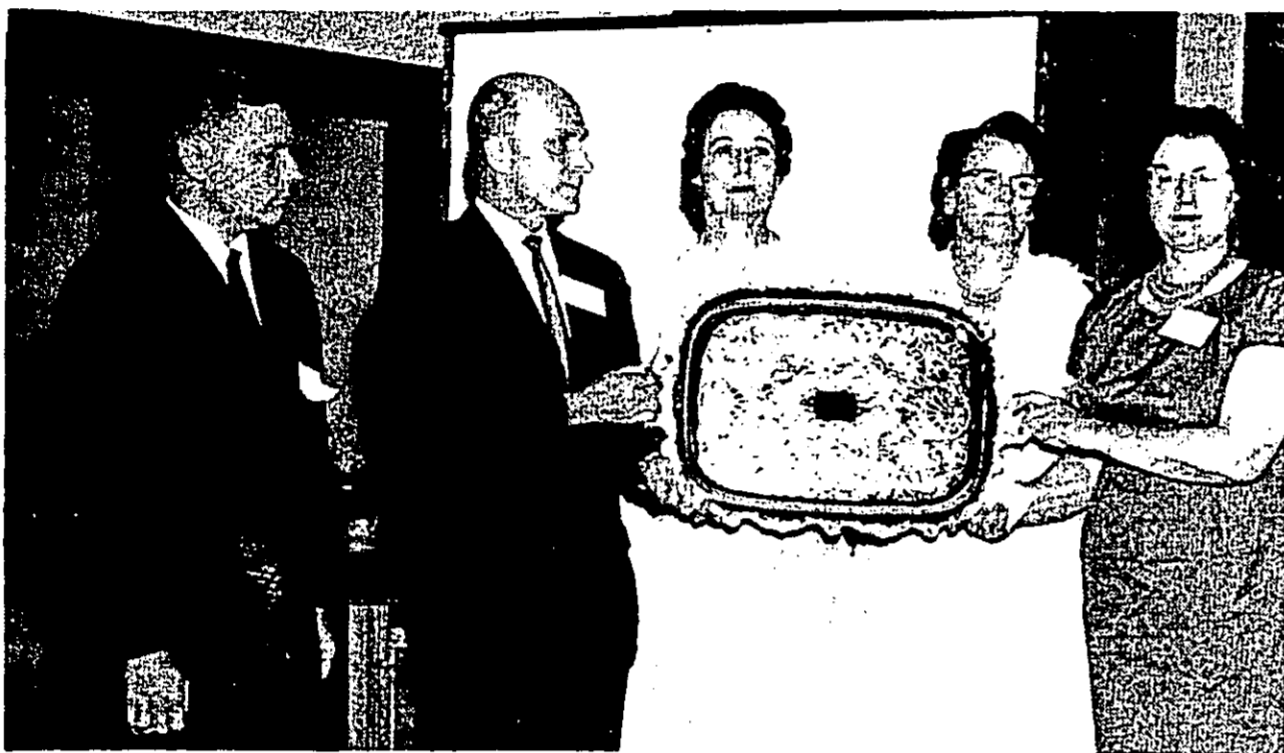

Evaluations Hiked To 14.5 Million To Ease County's Financial Straits

HOSPITAL, OTHER SPENDING CALLS FOR MORE FUNDS

If members of the Tyler County commissioners court look rather harried right now, it's because they are caught in a bind between insufficient funds and unhappy taxpayers.

The insufficient funds dilemma comes partly from a contract let December 31 for additions and improvements to the Tyler County Hospital for \$131,000 to be matched by the same sum under a Hill-Burton state and federal grant.

The unhappy taxpayers enter the picture when the commissioners, looking for funds to pay the county's part of the \$261,000 project, found that county evaluations will have to be raised from last year's 12.8 million to a new high of 14.5 million.

The county's tax rate is already as high as it can be under state statutes—80 cents per \$100 evaluation. This left the court with no alternative except the raising of property evaluations, County Judge Jeff Mooney said.

The reason the commissioners let the contract for the hospital improvements on the last day of 1962 (Dec. 31) was to be at a deadline on getting the matching funds, according to Howard Riley, precinct one commissioner. Time warrants were issued to pay for the improvements.

However, the commissioners made no provision at that time to raise additional revenue for retirement of the warrants, according to Judge Mooney.

H. A. Crews, precinct three commissioner, says that since the county is already operating on a tight budget the only way to meet the additional expense

is to raise evaluations. County bonded indebtedness was at the limit under the old evaluation.

Judge Mooney said that as soon as the hospital improvements are completed, the county can issue refunding bonds to retire the indebtedness. Then if voters approve the creation of a hospital district, the hospital district will assume the bonded indebtedness.

In the meantime, however, the commissioners must make provisions to pay the indebtedness by raising evaluations, Mooney pointed out. He said that most taxpayers see the necessity for higher evaluations when the problem is explained to them.

Judge Mooney and other members of the commissioners court favor the creation of a hospital district. A bill authorizing the creation of a Tyler County Hospital district was passed by the last legislature. It must be voted upon by county residents to become effective, and this election will be called after completion of the improvements and issuance of refunding bonds.

The advantage of a hospital district, Judge Mooney said, is that the separate tax set aside for the district will all go to the district and can be used to retire the hospital indebtedness. On the other hand, if collected through the county on increased evaluation 42 cents of the 80 cents per \$100 evaluation will go to the state.

Meanwhile, back at the court house, the commissioners court is sitting as a board of equalization. Taxpayers have been notified to appear in regard to the increased evaluations.

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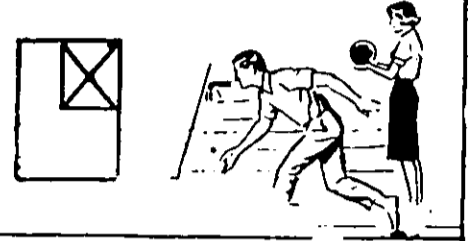

HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT'S COLUMN

Have you made plans for the future management and conservation of your estate?

Some families may receive less than the full benefit of their life's work simply because they fail to spend a few hours in planning for the future management and conservation of the estate which they worked so hard to acquire.

Each person needs to keep an inventory of assets and liabilities up-to-date and keep a record of all settlement costs. For the benefit of persons who may have the responsibility of making the settlement, make a list of your dependents and how you want the property division made. Do you want each dependent to share alike or do some dependents have greater needs than others?

You can provide life insurance to pay the settlement costs and make future income adequate for family members.

You can use gifts and trusts to reduce transfer costs. Gather all facts together and plan a conference with your attorney. Let him help you draw up your will to provide the future management of your estate.

For an economical estate settlement, much thought should be given to persons who are to witness the signing of the will and to those who will serve as executor and trustee.

Families often have difficulty in deciding just how much money to spend for a home.

A guide to help families decide how much they can afford to spend for a home has been compiled by the American Bankers Association.

The publication says that low and middle-income families generally pay no more than 2 1/2 times their annual income, before taxes. Families with higher incomes generally pay a lower ratio, according to research done by the Bankers Association.

The booklet also points out that this is only a rule-of-thumb and if a family takes only this guide into consideration, they may have a rough financial road ahead.

"Your banker probably has a copy of the guide. If not, ask him to get one for you from the American Bankers Association."

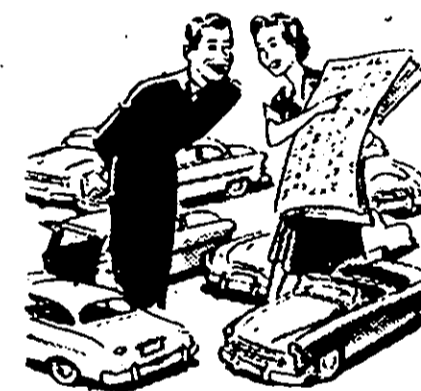
