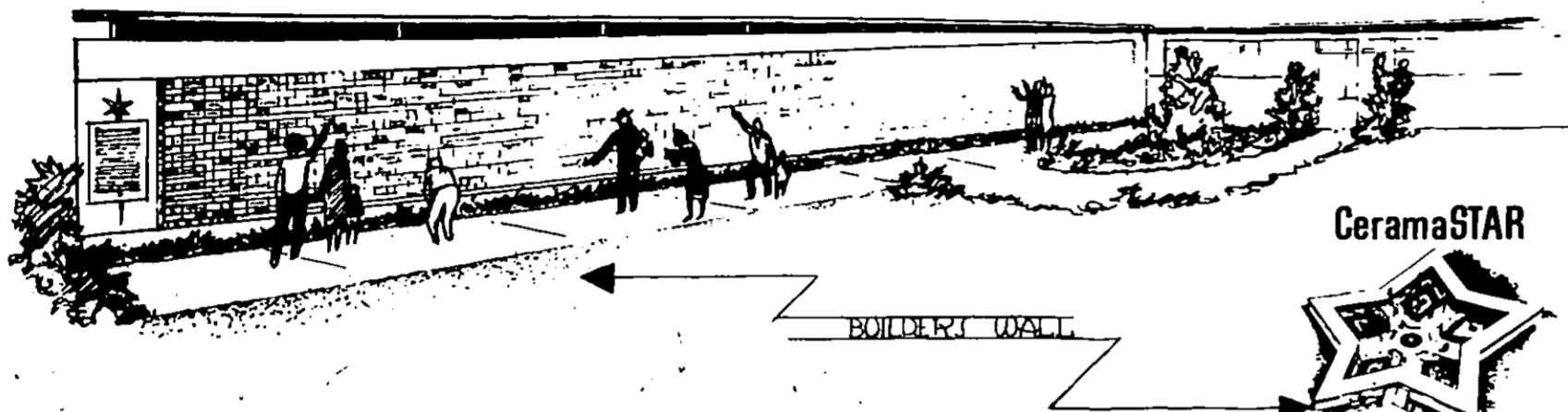

## FUND DRIVE FOR CERAMASTAR BEGINS



### GRAY TO BUILD NEW STUDIO FOR PROJECT

Clyde E. Gray, whose ceramic tile paintings are familiar to most of the people of Woodville and Tyler County, will soon start on a mammoth project, the CeramaStar, which when completed will depict in ceramic tile murals the early history of Texas.

On display at Citizens State Bank is a scale model of the CeramaStar and a mock-up of a section of a Builders' Wall, the method which has been selected to finance the construction of this proposed Texas shrine at Washington-on-the-Brazos State Park near Brenham.

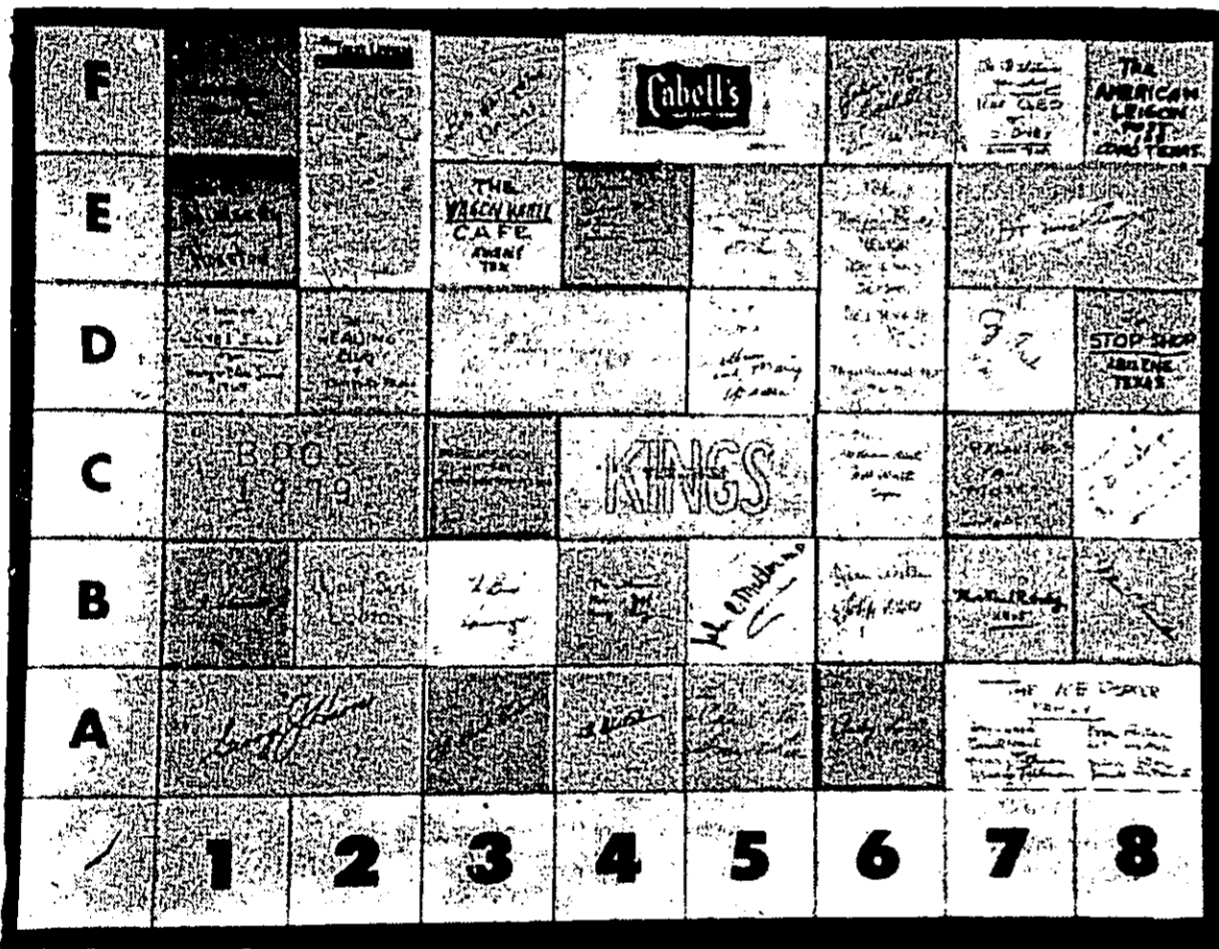
The Texas Independence Day Organization, a non-profit organization chartered by the state to supervise activities at the park, is conducting the campaign to raise the money needed for building this outstanding shrine, which will be the only such attraction of its kind in the world. Jim Ethridge of Houston is president of TIDO.

The CeramaStar, whose walls will be 14 feet high and each arm of a star point 100 feet in length, will be of polished red Texas granite, as will the museum building located in front of the star. The paintings which will tell the history and heritage of Texas will be executed in ceramic underglaze by Mr. Gray, who developed the method of painting on tile with pure mineral oxides which resemble oil paintings and water colors, but which are fired in underglaze to make them color-fast for centuries—or forever.

A special studio will be built here in Woodville where the paintings will all be executed. Mr. Gray, who designed the CeramaStar, will complete the paintings here while the buildings are being constructed, and will have them on display at the special studio here.

The financing of the project will be handled by contributions from foundations, businesses, civic organizations, memorials and individuals interested in the preservation of the history of Texas and whose names will be placed in the Builders' Wall.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT NEEDS YOUR HELP

How much is a Fire Department worth to a community of 2,000 people?

How much does your local Fire Department save you on insurance premiums each year? Based on an \$8,000 home in the city limits of Woodville, the owner saves \$97.00 each year on insurance rates due to an efficient fire department.

Your local Volunteer Fire Department is sometimes overlooked until you need them. Your Fire Department needs YOU now!

Several months ago a used truck was purchased by the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department for the purpose of making a rural fire fighting unit. Several members of the Fire Department went on a search for a water tank to be installed on the truck. One was finally located and now the truck is equipped with a tank. What good is a truck and tank without a pump?

Efforts have been made to raise funds to fully equip this unit, but finances have fallen short, and before this unit can serve you it must be completed.

This truck, when completed, will serve as a tanker truck to supply water to the main truck where a fire plug is unavailable. When equipped with the pump it will also be used to fight grass fires.

The men in the Volunteer Fire Department are dedicated men. They receive a grand total of \$24.00 each year, provided they attend all 24 fire drills held during that time. They receive no compensation for reporting to and helping to fight fires.

If the fire siren sounds at 3 a.m. on a bitter night, the members respond. They answer some 100 calls each year in Tyler County.

These members are now asking your help. They want to complete the job started several months ago—the completion of the rural fire fighting unit. A pump, lights and siren are needed and it is estimated that \$1,000 is needed to finish the job.

The wall will cover the two front exterior wings of the CeramaStar. It will be composed of the actual signatures, emblems, memorial designs, and printed names of donors fired into ceramic tiles. A tile may bear one signature or many. It can be made "in memory of," "in honor of" someone by his descendants and list the names of the families; it can be the actual writing of grandchildren; it can be a business letterhead or a birth announcement one might wish to put up for posterity.

This wall, Ethridge said, will in future years become a very interesting chapter of Texas history. He added that TIDO is especially anxious in having in the Builders' Wall the names of representatives of historical families and pioneers and recommendations that a space reservation be made as soon as possible because of the limited area which in turn limits the number of tiles to be included in the wall.

The sizes of the tiles will be 4-1/4 by 4-1/4 inches, representing \$100 donations, and 4-1/4 by 8-1/2 inches, representing \$200 donations. After being processed at the studio here by Gray, they will be pre-assembled into a Builders' Wall here, which will be on public display at the studio until the CeramaStar construction is completed.

When the final Builders' Wall is assembled at the state park, the names will be catalogued for a souvenir directory, listing the sponsors alphabetically and giving the location of their tiles on the wall. Ethridge said it is estimated that in the first year of the CeramaStar's operation, a million copies of the directory will be in the hands of the public because of the wide-

AUSTIN—One word seems to fit into the title of the Hardin-Polk-Tyler Library System—"growing." For the past three months congratulatory messages have been sent from State Library to patrons of the Multi-County Library for setting circulation records; now the final tabulation has been made for the month of June—and sure enough—another record.

Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director and librarian, Texas State Library, remarked: "I have already used most of the words of praise, but we do sincerely congratulate the people of Hardin, Tyler counties for their record breaking use of the system."

"June's circulation record of 11,351 is a challenge to Texans to support and use their local libraries," he said.

Mrs. Jack C. (Ruth) White, librarian for the library system, also reported 451 children of the area were participating in the world's largest reading club, the Texas Reading Club, co-sponsored by libraries of Hardin, Polk and Tyler Counties and State Library.

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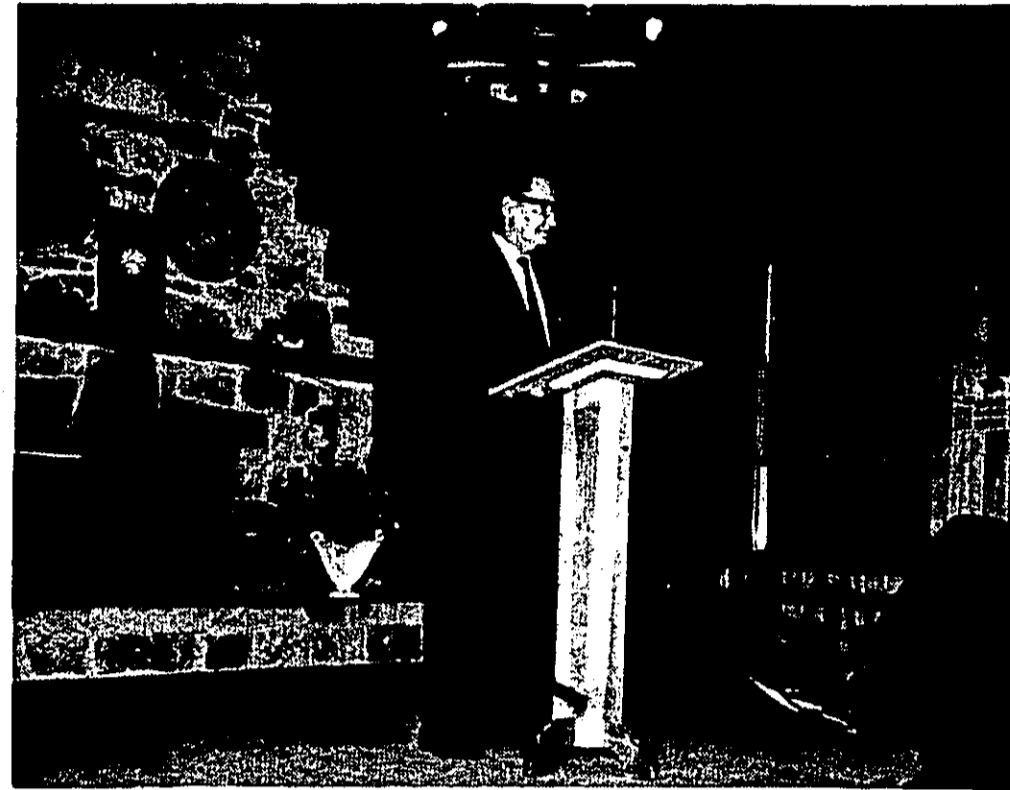
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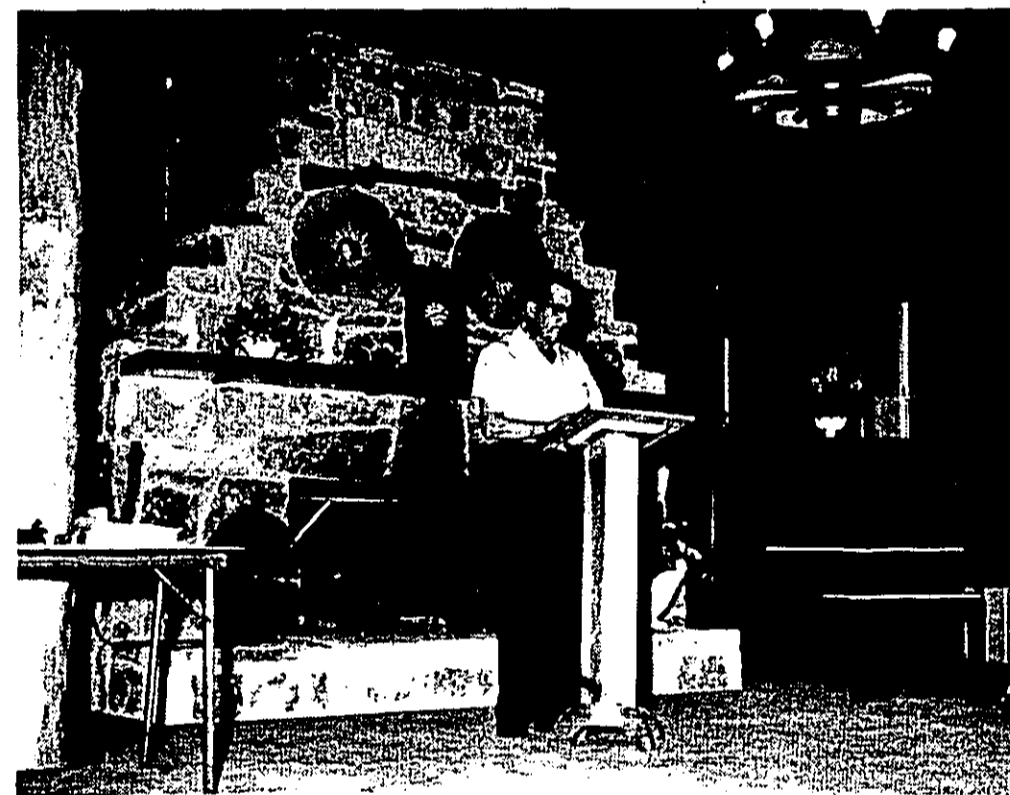
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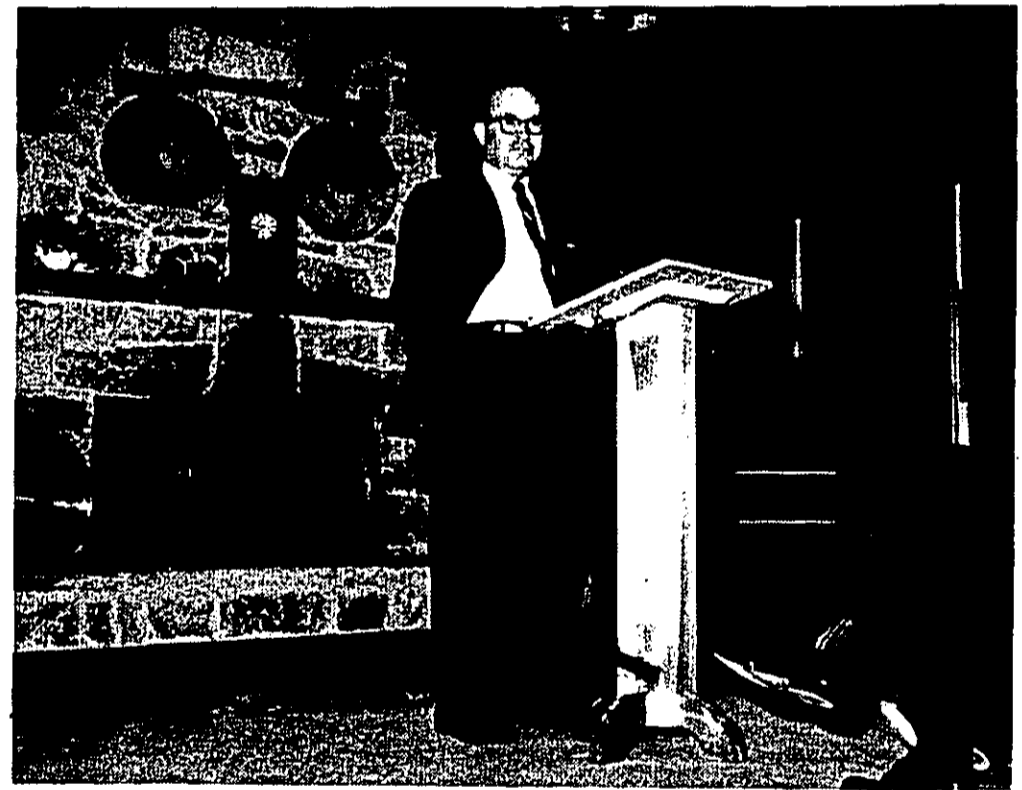

FIRST GRADERS LEARN VALUE OF PROPER NUTRITION

The first three grades in the Woodville School found out last year in a Special Nutrition Study that there are many treasures in good food. They also learned that we depend on these treasures to keep us growing and going.

Mrs. Virginia Lee, Mrs. Velma Sumrall and Mrs. Malee Tucker, first-grade teachers, tried to impress on their students that good food habits throughout life can offer rewarding results.

Although Americans are better nourished than ever before in history, there are still large numbers of nutritional problems which need to be solved.

"The solution to these problems can come only if every one chooses the amount and kinds of food to provide the body with the essential nutrients necessary for good health."

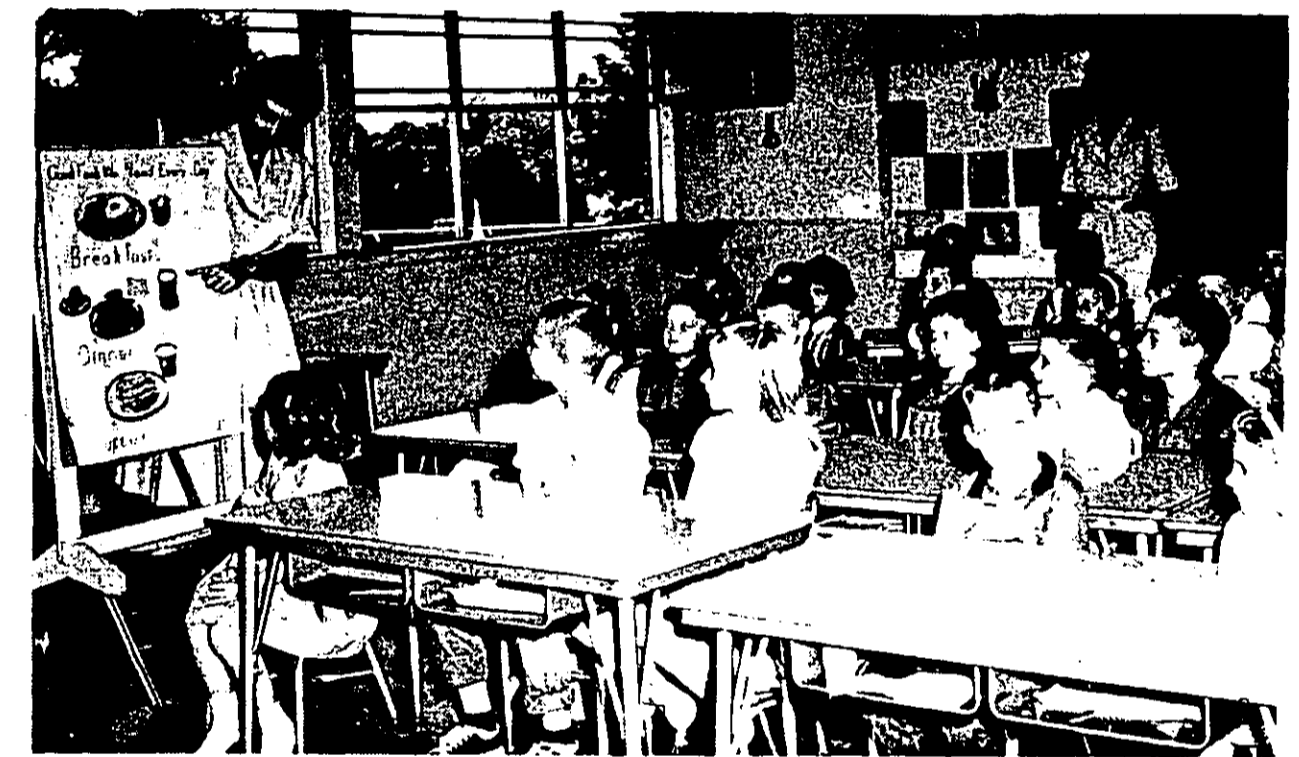
Some of the nutritional problems include poor eating habits, overweight adults, poorly nourished teenagers, too many dental caries, fad diets, diets low in Vitamin A, Vitamin C, calcium and iron.

There are four food groups listed in the Food For Fitness Guide. Each provides necessary nutrients for good health and well being. The groups are milk, vegetable - fruit, meat, bread-cereal.

The recognition of these problems prompted the Tyler County Program Building Foods Committee to seek the cooperation of Woodville School in offering Nutrition Education to First Grades. It was hoped that some good food habits could be established with these young children.

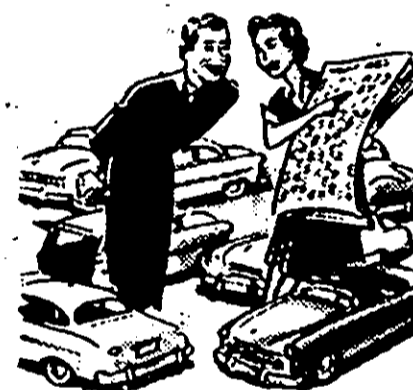
