Tigers Champions In Little League

The Tigers and Yankees went into a play-off game Tuesday night for the 1963 Little League crown — and in a thriller the Tigers edged the Yankees by a 6 to 5 score.

The Tigers, winners of the first half of the season, had to come from behind to cop the championship. They were trailing 5 to 4 until the fifth inning, but drove across two runs in the bottom of the fifth. They managed to hold the Yanks in the top of the sixth for the victory.

It had been a struggle all the way through the second half of the season for the two teams. The Tigers had won the first half of the season handily, but were battled all the way in the second half by the Yankees.

Monday night the two teams met to play a make-up game that had been rained out. The Tigers could have been champions without a play-off if they had won.

Managers of the Tigers for this season are A. J. Cortez and W. S. Nichols. Yankee managers are Frank Richardson and T. J. Hensarling.

Appropriately enough, Yankee team sweetheart Karen Gilchrist was runner-up.

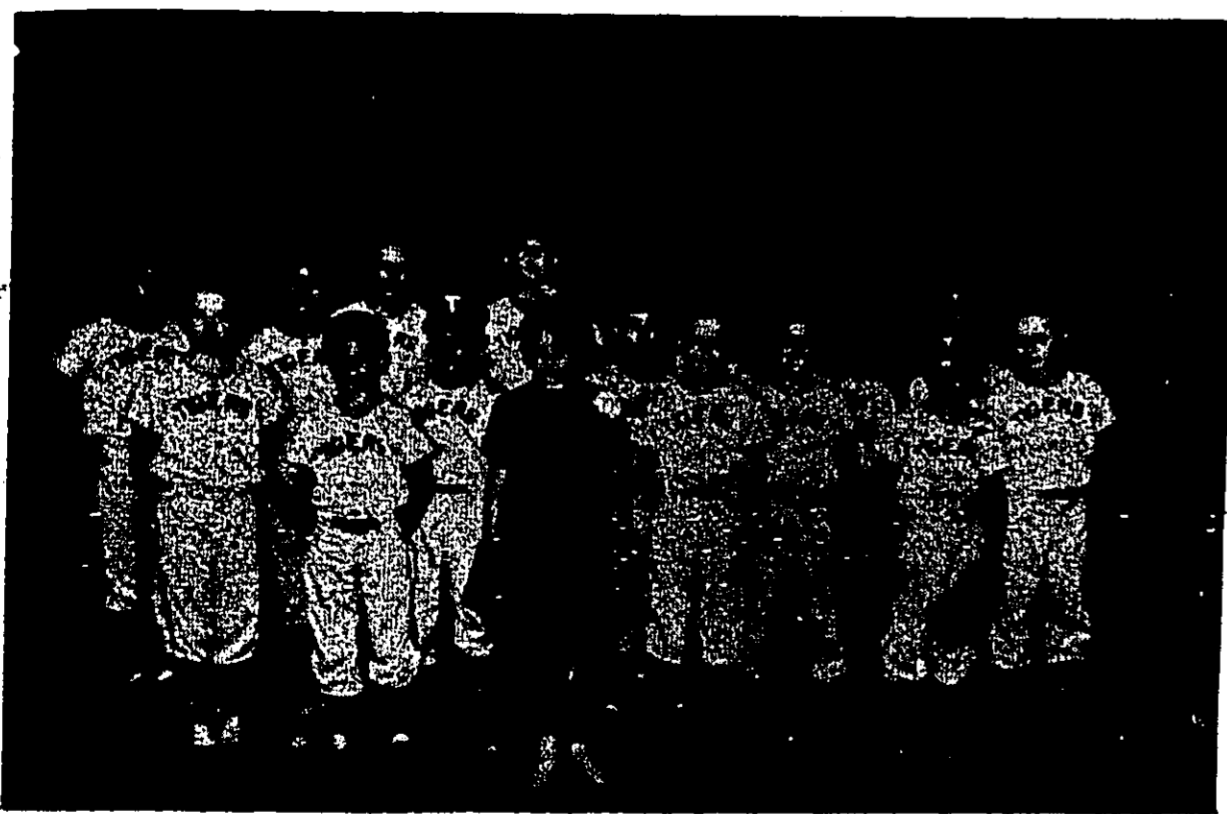
Vicki was escorted by Jeff Fortenberry at the crowning ceremonies. She will receive a baseball jacket.

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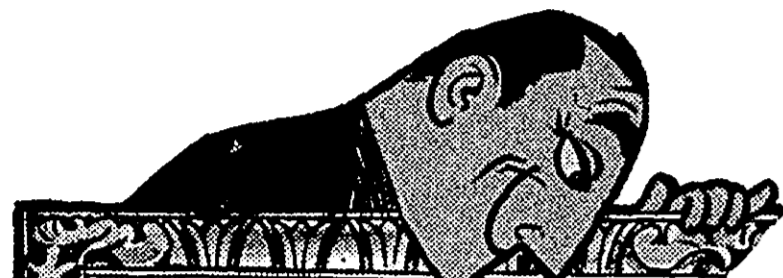

FIRE DEPARTMENT NEEDS YOUR HELP

How much is a Fire Department worth to a community of 2,000 people?

How much does your local Fire Department save you on insurance premiums each year? Based on an \$8,000 home in the city limits of Woodville, the owner saves \$97.00 each year on insurance rates due to an efficient fire department.

Your local Volunteer Fire Department is sometimes overlooked until you need them. Your Fire Department needs YOU now! Several months ago a used truck was purchased by the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department for the purpose of making a rural fire fighting unit. Several members of the Fire Department went on a search for a water tank to be installed on the truck. One was finally located and now the truck is equipped with a tank. What good is a truck and tank without a pump?

Efforts have been made to raise funds to fully equip this unit, but finances have fallen short, and before this unit can serve you it must be completed.

This truck, when completed, will serve as a tanker truck to supply water to the main truck where a fire plug is unavailable. When equipped with the pump it will also be used to fight grass fires.

The men in the Volunteer Fire Department are dedicated men. They receive a grand total of \$24.00 each year, provided they attend all 24 fire drills held during that time. They receive no compensation for reporting to and helping to fight fires.

If the fire siren sounds at 3 a.m. on a bitter night, the members respond. They answer some 100 calls each year in Tyler County.

These members are now asking your help. They want to complete the job started several months ago—the completion of the rural fire fighting unit. A pump, lights and siren are needed and it is estimated that \$1,000 is needed to finish the job.

Contributions are urgently needed to complete this fire fighting unit. To do so, contact any member or mail directly to the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department, Woodville, Texas. Would you make a contribution to save YOUR house?

The Bookmobile, pictured above with driver Tom Cox and librarian Ruth White, is completing its third year of operation in this area.

The bookmobile began operating this year through the organization of the Hardin-Polk-Tyler Multi-County Library System. It travels on a schedule whereby it visits 38 communities and libraries in the three-county area every two weeks.

It began its operation in 1959 as a free demonstration of library services by the Texas State Library in a four-county area—Hardin, Polk, Tyler and Jasper Counties. This lasted for more than two years.

When the Multi-County System was organized to continue the bookmobile operation this year, Jasper County did not participate.

The bookmobile demonstration was brought to the area at the invitation of the commissioners of the four counties following a survey of the

library facilities in the counties by a committee of the Friends of the Tyler County Library. This group is still active in supporting the bookmobile and Tyler County Library.

Headquarters for the bookmobile is here at the Tyler County Library. Mrs. White and Mr. Cox, besides having a full schedule of checking books in and out on the bookmobile, also assist in the processing of new books at the library as well as helping keep the books in order on the library shelves. On the bookmobile, too, they must keep the books in order on the shelves, which sometimes isn't easy with the large number being checked in and out. In June readers in the three-county area checked out 11,361 volumes.

Over 400 books have been added to the shelves since February.

PLAN NO. 7152



Looking for lots of room to live in? This three-bedroom house may have the answer to your problems. Plan No. 7152 from the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Cooperative Building Plan Exchange incorporates the Beltsville "Energy-Saving Kitchen" Design No. 2. The family room with dining space is a continuation of the kitchen area and contains a fireplace and built-in office. Sliding glass doors open onto a terrace located within sight of both the kitchen and family room. Nearness to the kitchen makes the terrace an ideal outdoor dining area. The living-dining room can be used as one large room or divided by an accordion-type partition. The front hallway connects the family room, living room and back hallway. A rear entrance from the yard and carport opens to a bath, work clothes closet, and heater room as well as to the front entrance hall. The workroom, between the kitchen and the family bathroom, has space for laundry equipment, a freezer and storage of canned goods. A door leads directly to the drying yard and garden area. House design No. 7152 features plenty of storage space including one or two large closets in each bedroom, a linen closet at the end of the hall near the bedrooms, and a towel closet accessible from both the family bathroom and the workroom. Copies of plan No. 7152 are available at no charge from the county agriculture agent's office in Woodville.
