BETTY BLOHM ATTENDS BAPTIST MEET

Miss Betty Blohm, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Blohm, is on a tour of Europe following her attendance at the Baptist Youth World Conference in Beirut, Lebanon, July 15-21.

Miss Blohm left Dallas July 6 for New York, and on July 7 she flew by Jet plane to Amsterdam, Holland, where she spent two days.

On July 10 she took a Jet to Cairo, Egypt, for a tour of that city and environs. Then on to Jerusalem in the Kingdom of Jordan, where she and her group stayed in a hotel in the heart of the walled portion of the Old City.

While in Jerusalem, the group was driven to Bethlehem, place of the birth of Jesus, and saw the Church of the Nativity and Shepherds' Field and Fields of Boaz. They also visited Jericho, where they saw Elisha's Spring, the Mount of Temptation and the traditional spot on the River Jordan where John baptized Jesus.

The Jerusalem tour included many other landmarks mentioned in the Bible.

Following her attendance at the Sixth Baptist Youth World Conference at Beirut, Miss Blohm with her group were to motor to Damascus, Syria, from which city they were to cross into the Israel part of Jerusalem on July 23. The group will go to Tel Aviv, Haifa, Nazareth and the sea of Galilee.

Miss Blohm will tour Greece, Italy, Switzerland, Germany, France and England before returning to Amsterdam on August 12 to take a Jet to New York.

Builders' Wall Ideal For Future Records

Local interest in the CeramaStar of Texas, which will be built at Washington State Park, is evidenced by the many requests about the Builders' Wall received by Clyde E. Gray, who designed the CeramaStar, and who will erect a section of the Builders' Wall at his studio on the Livingston highway as the names for it are received.

The names will also be displayed at the Washington State Park, according to John Ethridge of Houston, president of Texas Independence Day Organization, sponsors of the CeramaStar.

The Builders' Wall will be in two 100 foot sections at the entrance to the CeramaStar. The wall will have the names, emblems, signatures, etc., of donors on ceramic tile. It will be possible to record family names, birthdates, or any special event for future generations. Since it will be fired into ceramic tile, it will be a permanent record which will be of interest historically and genealogically to future generations.

The CeramaStar, whose walls will be 14 feet high and each arm of a star point 100 feet in length, will be of polished red

Texas granite, as will the museum building located in front of the star. The paintings which will tell the history and heritage of Texas will be executed in ceramic underglaze by Mr. Gray, who developed the method of painting on tile with pure mineral oxides which resemble oil paintings and water colors, but which are fired in underglaze to make them color-fast for centuries—or forever.

A special studio will be built here in Woodville where the paintings will all be executed. Mr. Gray, who designed the CeramaStar, will complete the paintings here while the buildings are being constructed, and will have them on display at the special studio here.

The financing of the project will be handled by contributions from foundations, businesses, civic organizations, memorials and individuals interested in the preservation of the history of Texas and whose names will be placed in the Builders' Wall.

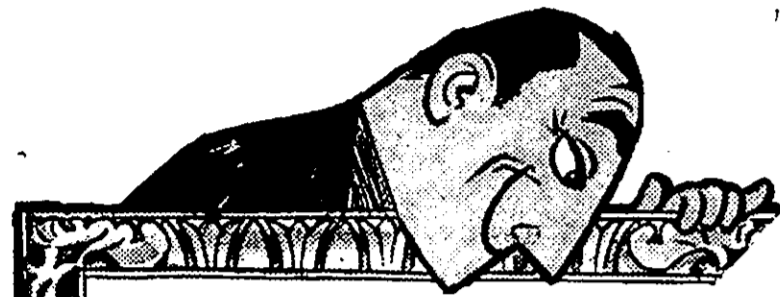

FIRE DEPARTMENT NEEDS YOUR HELP

How much is a Fire Department worth to a community of 2,000 people?

How much does your local Fire Department save you on insurance premiums each year? Based on an \$8,000 home in the city limits of Woodville, the owner saves \$97.00 each year on insurance rates due to an efficient fire department.

Your local Volunteer Fire Department is sometimes overlooked until you need them. Your Fire Department needs YOU now! Several months ago a used truck was purchased by the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department for the purpose of making a rural fire fighting unit. Several members of the Fire Department went on a search for a water tank to be installed on the truck. One was finally located and now the truck is equipped with a tank. What good is a truck and tank without a pump?

Efforts have been made to raise funds to fully equip this unit, but finances have fallen short, and before this unit can serve you it must be completed.

This truck, when completed, will serve as a tanker truck to supply water to the main truck where a fire plug is unavailable. When equipped with the pump it will also be used to fight grass fires.

The men in the Volunteer Fire Department are dedicated men. They receive a grand total of \$24.00 each year, provided they attend all 24 fire drills held during that time. They receive no compensation for reporting to and helping to fight fires.

If the fire siren sounds at 3 a.m. on a bitter night, the members respond. They answer some 100 calls each year in Tyler County.

These members are now asking your help. They want to complete the job started several months ago—the completion of the rural fire fighting unit. A pump, lights and siren are needed and it is estimated that \$1,000 is needed to finish the job.

Contributions are urgently needed to complete this fire fighting unit. To do so, contact any member or mail directly to the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department, Woodville, Texas.

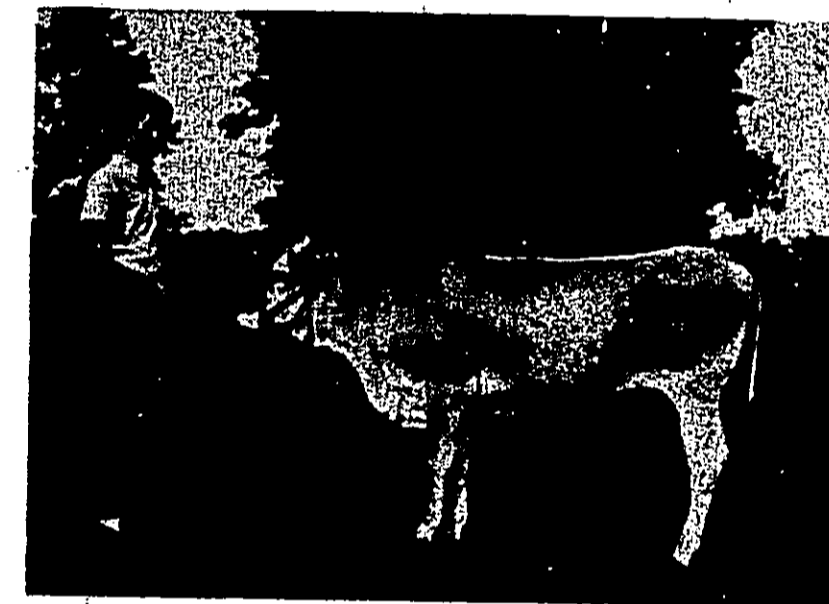

Music for the revival is being directed by William Grimes and Mrs. Carroll Tucker. Many visitors have attended and everyone is cordially invited.

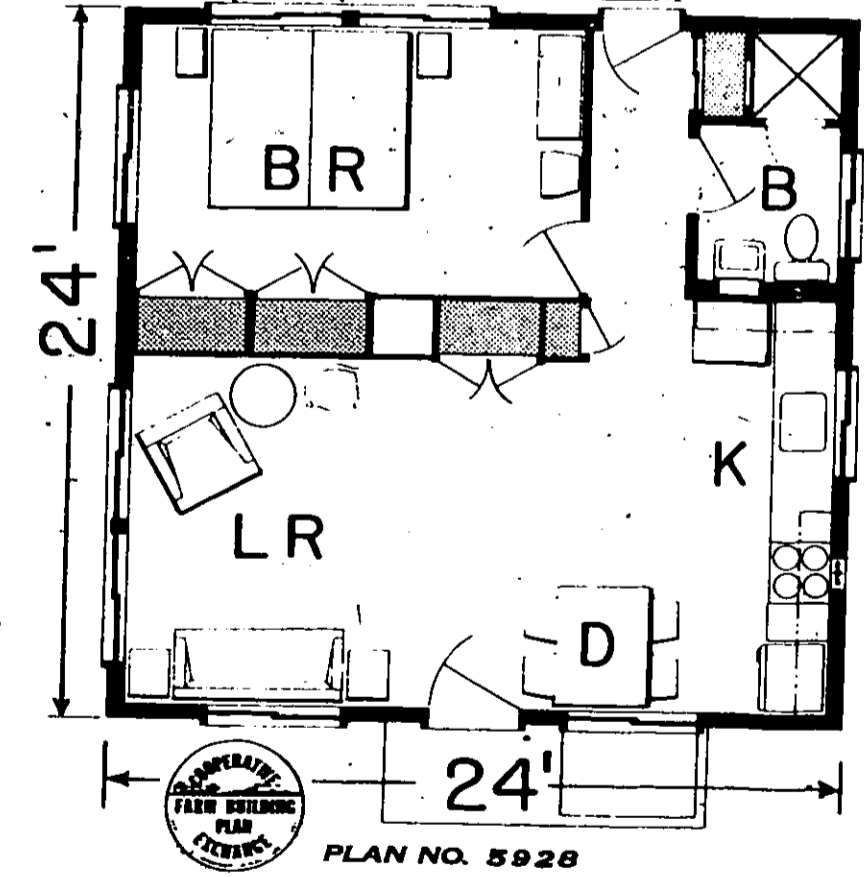
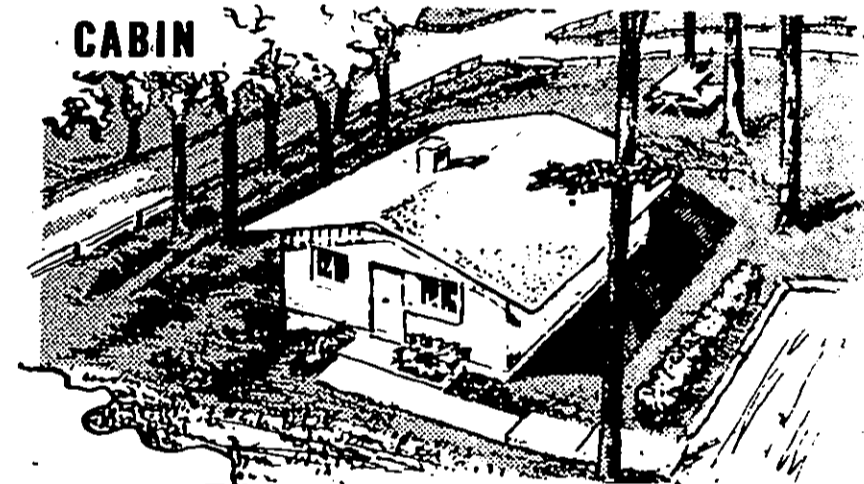
CABIN FOR LAKE

Need a small house or vacation cabin in the country or on the shore of your favorite lake?

This one, designed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, is of frame construction, 24 feet square and easily expandable to three bedrooms.

You can construct the exterior walls, then finish the inside or add on at your convenience. The wall between the living area and the bedroom is a movable storage wall. The bedroom partitions may be removed or rearranged with a minimum of refinishing.

Although the working drawings show concrete foundation walls and slab, you may find it



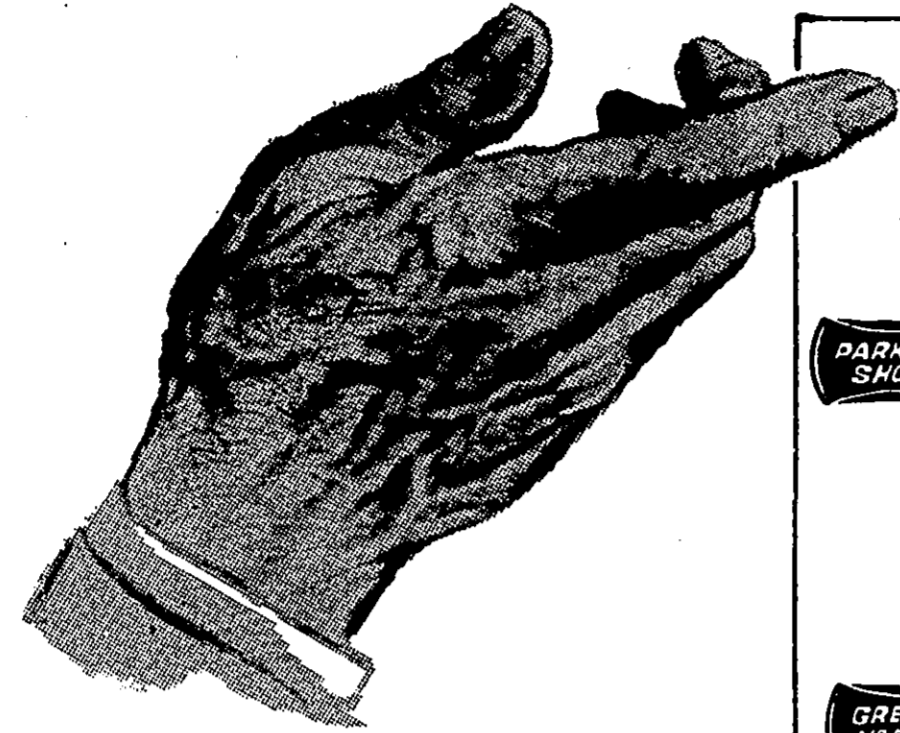
more economical to use a wooden floor and masonry, concrete or creosoted pole piers if your site is steeply sloping. Heating for the cabin depends of the season use intended. The plan is well adapted for either hot air or electrical heat.

This cabin may also be used as low-cost living quarters while a family constructs a permanent home. Later it may be converted to a garage. If this is your plan, build the exterior walls with a lintel over

the future garage door so the wall can be removed without requiring special support. For a copy of this Plan No. 5928, contact your county agricultural agent, Clinton Currie, at the court house.
