## Lions First Club In State To Sponsor Tile

### 4-H Club Members Win Blue Ribbons

Twelve Tyler County 4-H Club girls submitted their project record books for judging in District 9 of the Extension Service in July.

Judged in competition with members from the 22 counties in the district, five of the record books won blue ribbons, five won red ribbons and one white ribbon.

The blue ribbon winners were Laurann Jordan in Nutrition Education; Gayla Jordan in Public Speaking; Charlene Hicks in the Junior Division of Public Speaking; Elaine Brandin in Leadership; and Jill Ogden in Achievement.

The first three winners are all Spurger 4-H Club members. Miss Brandin is from Woodville and Miss Ogden from Colmesneil.

The red ribbon winners were Thelma Lamb, Sherry Lamb, Candice Fortenberry and Charlotte Belt, all entering project records in Food. All are from Colmesneil.

Karen Collier of Spurger won a red ribbon in her Clothing project record.

The white ribbon winner in records was Donna Scott of Spurger. Donna also entered the District 4-H Club Dress Revue held August 1 in Hotel Fredonia and won a red ribbon for her costume.

Amanda Haralson of Colmesneil also submitted her Favorite Food Record. This is to be judged in the state competition in September at College Station. Amanda won a blue ribbon in June at 4-H Round-Up and became eligible to submit her record in State to determine a National winner in Food.

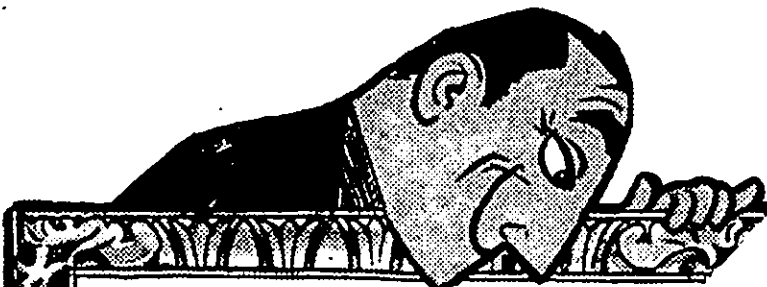

## FIRE DEPARTMENT NEEDS YOUR HELP

How much is a Fire Department worth to a community of 2,000 people?

How much does your local Fire Department save you on insurance premiums each year? Based on an \$8,000 home in the city limits of Woodville, the owner saves \$97.00 each year on insurance rates due to an efficient fire department.

Your local Volunteer Fire Department is sometimes overlooked until you need them. Your Fire Department needs YOU now!

Several months ago a used truck was purchased by the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department for the purpose of making a rural fire fighting unit. Several members of the Fire Department went on a search for a water tank to be installed on the truck. One was finally located and now the truck is equipped with a tank. What good is a truck and tank without a pump?

Efforts have been made to raise funds to fully equip this unit, but finances have fallen short, and before this unit can serve you it must be completed.

This truck, when completed, will serve as a tanker truck to supply water to the main truck where a fire plug is unavailable. When equipped with the pump it will also be used to fight grass fires.

The men in the Volunteer Fire Department are dedicated men. They receive a grand total of \$24.00 each year, provided they attend all 24 fire drills held during that time. They receive no compensation for reporting to and helping to fight fires.

If the fire siren sounds at 3 a.m. on a bitter night, the members respond. They answer some 100 calls each year in Tyler County.

These members are now asking your help. They want to complete the job started several months ago—the completion of the rural fire fighting unit. A pump, lights and siren are needed and it is estimated that \$1,000 is needed to finish the job.

Contributions are urgently needed to complete this fire fighting unit. To do so, contact any member or mail directly to the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department, Woodville, Texas.

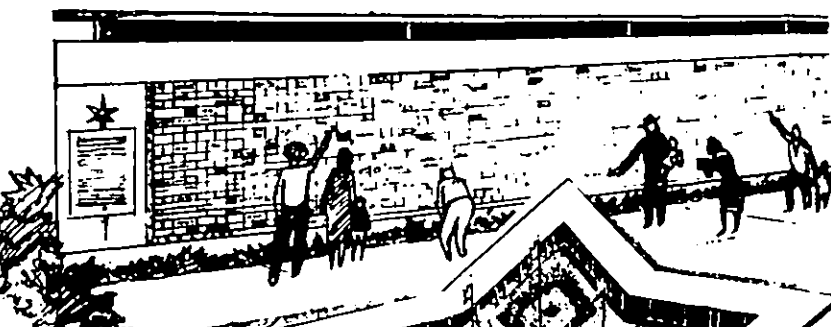

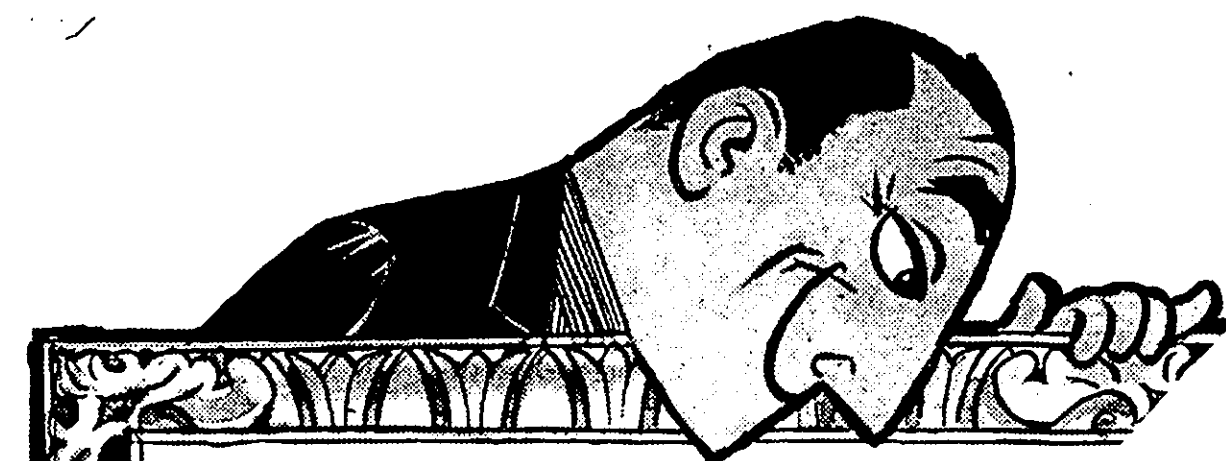
A beautiful floral piece of white and gold mums graced the center of the table, and artistic place cards added a pleasing touch.

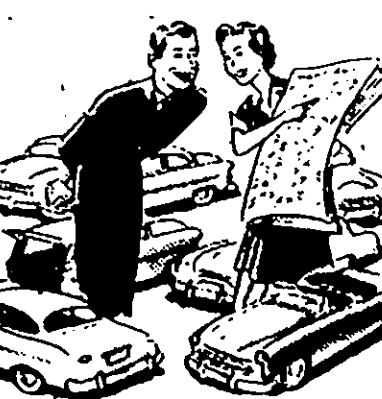

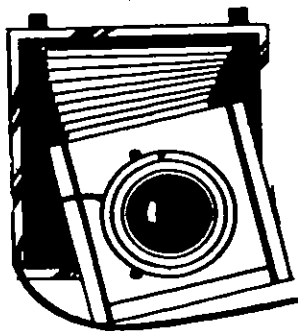
We think that Paul Hornung's suspension will play a big part in this title race. Neither Tom Moore nor Elijah Pitts block well enough to make the big-back system pay off.

We will concede that both are elusive runners and good receivers. But the Packers will miss the arm and blocking of Hornung.

This week, the high school all-star game will be played in Houston. The South with the state's top back in San Benito's Jim Helms will pit its powerful offense against a rock-ribbed defense led by Dumas' Kelly Baker. It will be interesting to observe. This corner picks no favorite.
