Tyler Countians At Austin Meeting



Four Tyler Countians were among the three dozen leaders of the Deep East Texas Development Association who met with Texas State Highway Engineer Dewitt Greer Thursday of last week to discuss and make recommendations concerning access roads and other transportation facilities for the

McGee Bend Reservoir and the Toledo Bend Reservoir.

The McGee Bend and Toledo Dam Projects encompass the entire seven-county area which make up the Deep East Texas Development Association. The counties are Tyler, Newton, Nacogdoches, Shelby, San August-

tine, Sabine and Angelina.

The basic request made to Mr. Greer by the delegation was that a composite study, which was begun three years ago for the McGee Bend Reservoir, be up-dated to include the entire area and both projects. It was further made clear to Mr. Greer

that the East Texans desire to work together rather than have each county only being concerned about its individual needs.

The delegation was led by J. E. Reese of Nacogdoches, the Association's president, and by Senator Dies.

SPORTS BEACON FALLOUT SHELTER for six people

This week we will take a look at the Southwest Conference race. Each time during the past few years the names Texas and Arkansas were at the forefront of such thoughts. Certainly this year is no different. Texas, well fortified with 28 lettermen, has the cream of the crop: guard, George Brucks; at fullback, Ernie Koy; tailback, Tommy Ford, and not the least, Tackle Scott Appleton. Appleton must be considered the SW Conference's best All-American possibility.

The Arkansas Razorbacks are not willing to go down without a fight. They return 27 lettermen led by Ends Jim John and Jerry Lamb, Ronny Cavness will be a top hand at center, a position well stocked in the SWC. Billy Gray will have the honor of replacing Billy Moore at quarterback.

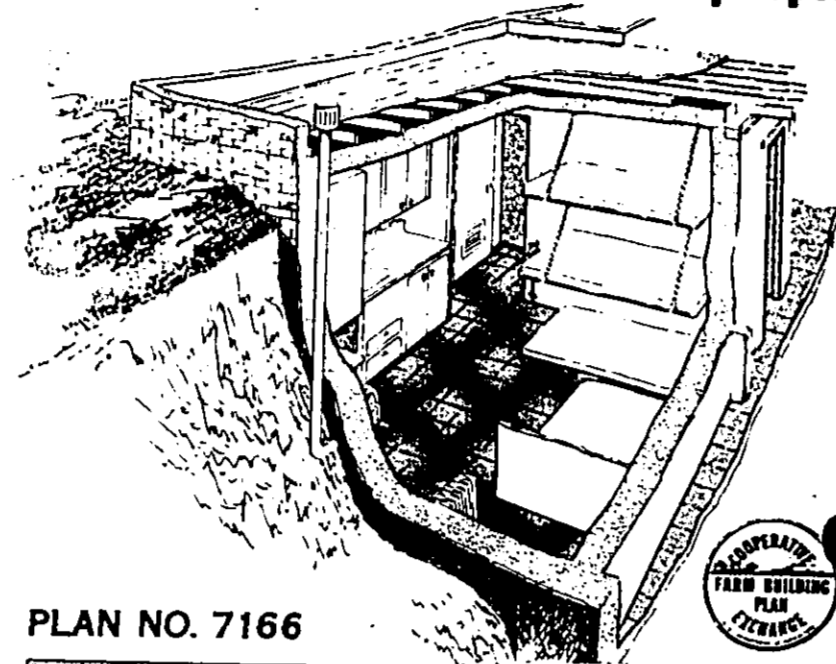
The Porkers will not be as explosive as 1962 but will have beef—that is, pork in the line. TCU returns 28 lettermen and may challenge seriously. The Frogs have a fine veteran line and the top fullback in the SW Conference in Tommy Crutcher. The main problems are replacing Sonny Gibbs and the team's lack of speed.

The Rice Owls may be heard from before the season ends. The Owls have 16 lettermen led by its big center, Malcolm Walker, and the soph sensation, Gene Walker. However, Walter McReynolds has no help at the quarterback spot and line speed is rather slow.

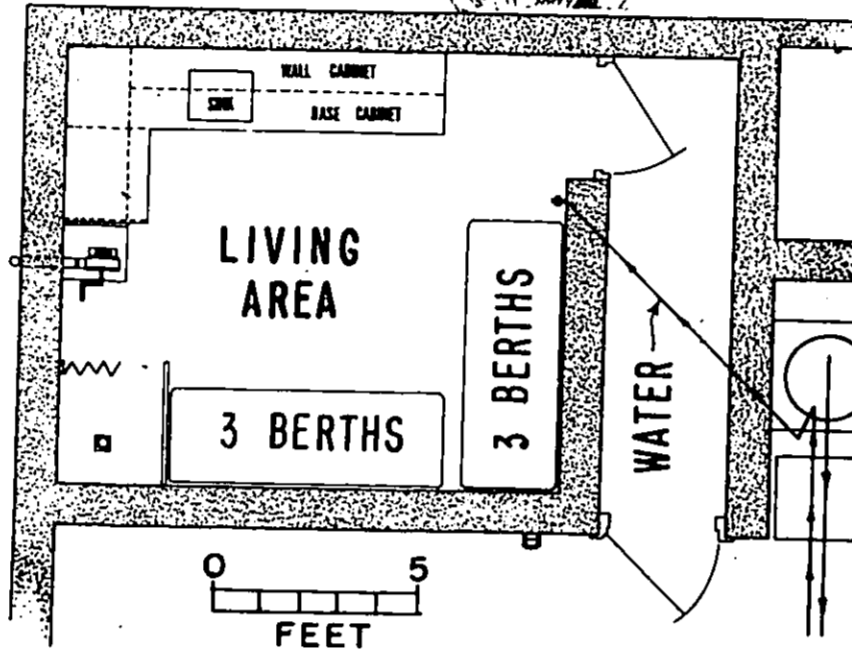
The Baylor Bears with 22 lettermen have an air arm to match anyone in the nation and speed to burn. Don Truell was the number one passer in the nation and has such targets as the fleet Lawrence Elkins and End James Rust. That good old Baylor line needs plugging and the Bears need a consistent ground game to go with their passing.

The Texas Aggies are looking forward with optimism as 23 lettermen will answer Coach Henry Folberg's call. Big Ray Kulaba will lead the way. Kulaba is a qualified pro prospect. Elsewhere the Aggies are in fair shape. Jim Linnstader will attempt to solve the quarterback problem.

SMU returns 19 lettermen and a team that certainly does not lack enthusiasm. However, it also lacks size and depth. These are needed to challenge in the SWC. Top hand should be Don Campbell, a fine field general. Rebuild is the word for Texas Tech Raiders. They return 20 lettermen and the top end in the conference in David Parks. They also possess some fine young backs, who have break-away speed. A young green line will hinder them along with no established quarterback.



PLAN NO. 7166



Building a new home? If you are, and have been thinking of including a fallout shelter, here is a multi-purpose plan from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This six-person shelter, Plan No. 7166, can also be used as an amateur or professional dark room as well as for storage. Permanent storage shelves can be installed along the wall where the bunks are shown instead of using the fold-up frames illustrated. In case of emergency, the shelves could be used as bunks.

A protection factor of 180 is obtained by casting an 8 inch thick concrete ceiling and placing the shelter in a corner of a basement that has earth up to the ceiling on most of the shelter. This factor can be increased to as much as 330 by casting a 12-inch barrier of concrete overhead. The entire basement does not have to be below grade to make the shelter effective.

Air intake to the shelter comes through louvers in the entrance doors. An exhaust blower can be used to forcibly draw air through the louvers into the shelter.

An emergency water outlet is provided in the shelter to use the water in the water heater. The tank may be vented without leaving the shelter. If a tempering tank is also placed in the supply line to the water heater, the water in the system may be enough to supply the family's emergency needs.

Working drawings for Plan No. 7166 may be obtained free of charge from your county extension office.

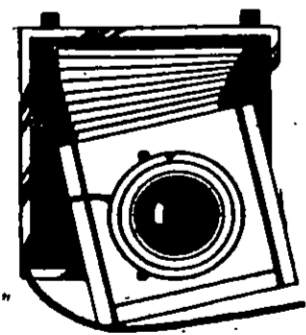

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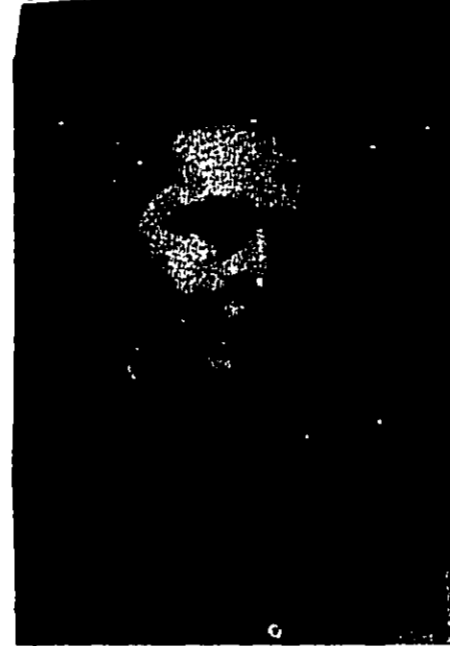
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NEW WOODVILLE TEACHERS—

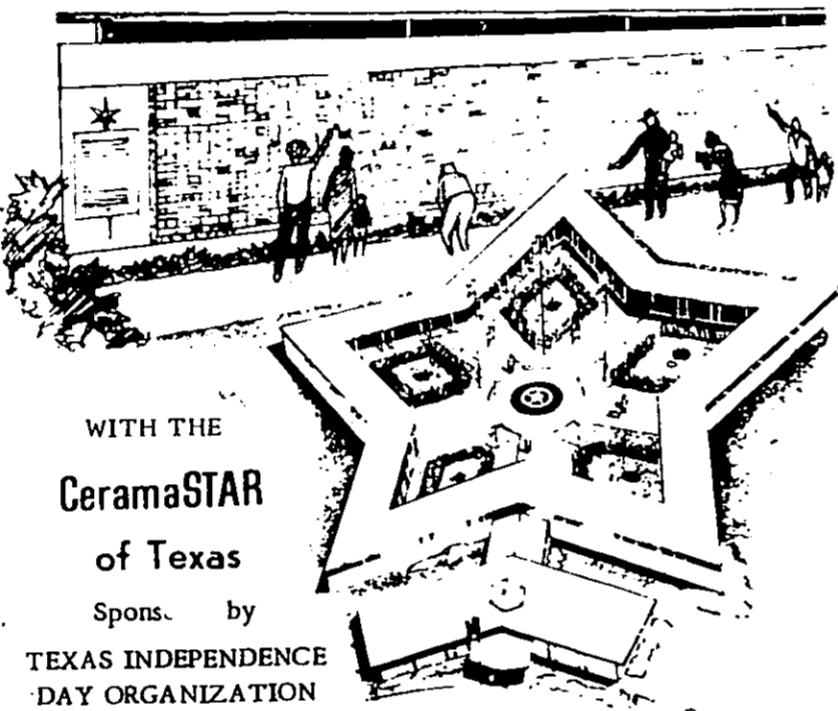
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This record made by you now will be important and appreciated by your future descendants. One line in the Builders' Wall will be sufficient for listing the names of an average family of five or six. A Builders' Wall line consists of 90 letters (count punctuation and spaces as letters). Your copy will be type set and prepared by us.

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The Builders' Wall will be an actual wall of 7000 tiles. It will make up the two outside wings of the CeramaStar on either side of the entrance. This wall will pay lasting tribute to the people of Texas whose sponsorship is providing the funds to build this Texas shrine. In time, the wall itself will become an interesting part of Texas history. As contributions are being made, donors' names are being placed on public display at Washington-on-the-Brazos state park. Each month, new names will be added.

Each of the 7000 tiles will bear the copy furnished by its sponsor. LINES in the Builders' Wall will be placed on a band of special tiles running horizontally in the wall at eye level for easy reading. LINES will be listed under the names of the towns in which their donors live or specify.

If you are subscribing for a TILE, use your space as you wish. Whatever you put will be duplicated exactly, actual size and in one color--whether it is one large signature, an emblem or letterhead, multiple signatures (such as everybody in the family) or a memorial. Just be sure to use black or dark ink. We can not duplicate light colored inks. Leave a quarter-inch margin around your copy so that if you are taking a 4 1/4 x 4 1/4 TILE, confine your copy to 4 inches square. On a 4 1/4 x 8 1/2 TILE, confine your copy to 4 x 8 1/4 inches.

If you are subscribing for a LINE in the Builders' Wall, you may still write anything you wish. Just remember to confine your copy to 90 spaces or letters. Either print your copy or use a typewriter to avoid any errors on our part in misreading what you have written. Your LINE will not be in your handwriting. It will be set in type and prepared for placing on the tiles by us.

What you put in the Builders' Wall will be there for posterity to read for hundreds of years. You might want to record a family reunion--a wedding anniversary--the names of your family--a memorial to someone dear, living or dead.

With your help, we are going to build this giant CeramaSTAR shrine, five acres in size, at Washington-on-the-Brazos and which will tell the story of Texas in ceramic paintings. Not only this picture story of our state, but also the names of those who had a part in building it will be in evidence for a thousand years or more at this historic place.
