Booming Tourist Plan Described For East Texas

Jacksonville — East Texans were told Monday they can bring \$350 million to their region by 1970 by developing a "positive plan" for tourist trade. The prediction was made during a conference in which the East Texas Chamber of Commerce explained its new tourist development department to 150 businessmen and community leaders.

"The future of tourism is wide open in East Texas," said Howard W. Roeser of Wimsboro, manager of the new chamber department. "With a positive plan of attack, East Texas can realize its tremendous potential as a bright, new, booming vacationland for millions."

"Traditions, Peculiarities" Roeser said one of the region's biggest tourist assets is "the traditions and peculiarities of East Texas."

"In these times when most of our national life is cut out of the same cloth, these differences are becoming precious," he said.

The former newspaper editor, who helped launch Wimsboro's successful autumn trails, called on community leaders to "look at what you have to offer and publicize and to educate those who come into contact with tourists."

Three Categories He said tourist offerings generally fall into three categories:

- Natural attractions, including lakes, rivers and forests.
• Man-made offerings, including pioneer churches, old homes and other buildings, and new reservoirs.
• Special events, including rodeos, horse shows, boat exhibitions and band concerts.

Charles F. Hawn of Athens, former Texas highway commissioner and chairman of the chamber's new tourist committee, said East Texans need to sell an "East Texas vacationland image to the world."

Special Events He said the chamber's new department will help promote special events for tourists and encourage communities in a 72-county area to develop natural and man-made attractions.

Fred Pool of Longview, the chamber's executive secretary and manager, said East Texas has the potential of becoming a nationally-known vacationland because of its abundance of lakes.

He said the chamber will publish in 1964 for the first time.

Local workers point out that the good thing about this fund is that Salvation Army committee people living in many communities over the county such as Spurger, Warren, Hillister, Colmesneil and Chester, as well as Woodville, can act immediately on a case. Then the store in that community is sent a check to pay for the goods by the treasurer, Robert A. Mann.

The committee realizes that the present fund campaign will have to carry over into September for the sake of county schools which always take an active part, but even at that the drive no doubt will be completed by September 15.

PARENTS REMINDED OF FIRST GRADE ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS AT SCHOOL

School officials have again urged parents to obtain the requirements for registering their children in the first grade.

Each pupil must present a birth certificate which may be obtained from either the county clerk or from the State Registrar, Austin, Texas for a fee of \$1.50. Hospital certificates are not acceptable.

Each pupil is also required to have a certificate of immunization for smallpox, the diphtheria-whopping cough-tetanus series, and the polio series (either Salk or Sabin oral).

Officials point out that the smallpox injection usually requires two to three weeks to fully "take" and that it is to the pupil's advantage—physically and otherwise—to have this completed before the start school term.

These injections may be obtained from the family physician or at the Health Unit at the county courthouse.

CECIL OGDENS ATTEND CHEVROLET CONVENTION

Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Ogden of Colmesneil have returned from Detroit where they attended a convention of dealers and dealer executives of the Chevrolet Division of General Motors. Approximately 7000 Chevrolet dealers and executives attended this convention, the largest of its kind ever held in the auto industry.

While in Detroit, the dealers previewed the new lines of Chevrolet cars and trucks for 1964 to be introduced early this fall.

Arriving in Detroit at the rate of about 1,400 a day, the dealer guests were welcomed by top Chevrolet officials including Semon E. Knudsen, a General Motors vice president and general manager of the division, and Larry Averill, general sales manager.

As a highlight of the convention programs, dealers were treated to an advance look at the new car and truck models in a gala stage revue the equal of a Broadway musical comedy production.

A further feature was a display of the new vehicles and other specially designed engineering and auto show exhibits which filled the mammoth two acre area of Detroit's Cobo Hall exposition center. An evening banquet with General Motors executives followed.

In addition to being the largest and most elaborate of its kind in industry history, the convention marked the first time since 1936 that a dealer had been invited to Detroit for such an event by Chevrolet.

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STREET REPAIR MOVES AHEAD

The streets in Woodville are now having extensive work done on them. The existing black top streets are being retopped by the application of a seal coat according to Rois Brockman, city secretary.

So far 9,000 running feet have been retopped and approximately 3,000 more feet will be given the seal coat before the work is completed.

Matthews Brothers of Jasper have the contract for the work which is worth approximately \$8,000.

Around the new Community Inn, the streets are being widened and special work is being done there to help in the preparations of the opening of a new motel in early October.

Mayor E. W. Gosslett says that this is the first time in several years that the city has retopped the streets completely. Next year, he said, the city hopes to build some new streets.

Word was received here early Friday morning that Frank Fain of Livingston died of a heart attack Friday morning.

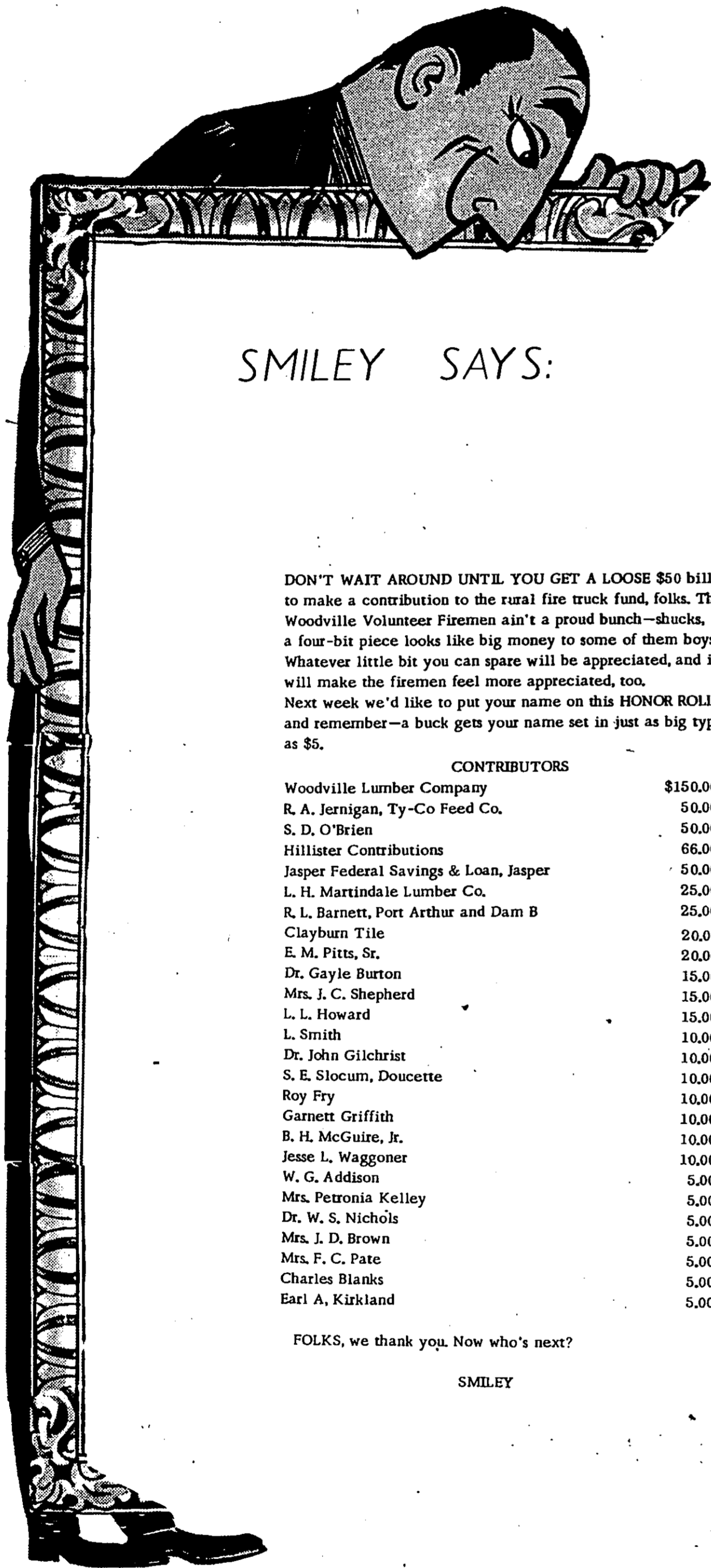
