THIS WEEK'S WILDLIFE

DOVES ARE EASY TO MISS!
A dove hunter gets as much fun from missing a dove as from hitting one... that is, until it gets to be a habit.

After a hunt there is much laughing and shaking of heads at the easy shots that were completely missed. Let's take a look at some of the typical shots, and we might justify some misses.

Doves are fast and look fast, but maybe not so fast that a swinging shotgun needs to be very far in front of a flying bird. A waterhole shot, coming straight in, merely needs the gun muzzle swinging past until the bird is covered. That is the instant to pull. Don't squeeze the trigger, pull it. Squeeze a rifle but pull a shotgun.

A bird coming in from over your shoulder, from behind you, needs only the muzzle of the gun swung up—repeat up—until the bird appears to be just above the muzzle and pull fast. If you swing down on this bird he will be covered by the barrel, and be gone from range before your mind can tell your trigger finger what to do.

For that crossing shot, pull from behind the bird, swing the gun at the speed of the bird, pass him and pull, and keep the barrel swinging at the same speed. This is "follow through" and just as necessary as the shotgun shell itself.

Try the above, and increase your bag and decrease your loss from cripples.

TEXAS BROILERS

During the week ending August 17, 1963, a total of 2,374,000 broiler chicks were placed in Texas according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. These placements were 4 percent below a week ago but above last year at this time by 2 percent.

Eggs set numbered 3,093,000 2 percent above the previous week and 9 percent above the corresponding week of 1962. Broiler chicks hatched totaled 2,398,000, down 6 percent from the week before and compared with this period last year an increase of 2 percent.

Broiler chicks shipped out of State totaled 71,000 while 83,000 were reported received from surrounding states. Finished broiler prices averaged 13.6 cents per pound, an increase of 0.2 cent from the preceding week.

SLOW DRIVERS FACE FINES

The new state speed law effective Friday provides penalties for driving too slow as well as driving too fast. Public Safety Director Homer Garrison Jr. noted Thursday.

The new daytime speed limit for passenger cars is 70 miles an hour on highways zoned for that speed, and 65 at night. This is an increase of 10 miles an hour over the old rate.

Garrison said that driving so slow as to hamper traffic is just as much a violation as speeding under the new law.

The old law required an officer to warn a slow driver who was impeding traffic that he should get off the road. If he refused, the policeman then could file a charge against him.

The new law eliminated the warning requirement. "Under the new statute, as we interpret it, whenever a driver is driving slower than the normal and reasonable movement of traffic and thereby impeding that traffic, he will be committing a violation for which he may be charged in court," Garrison said.

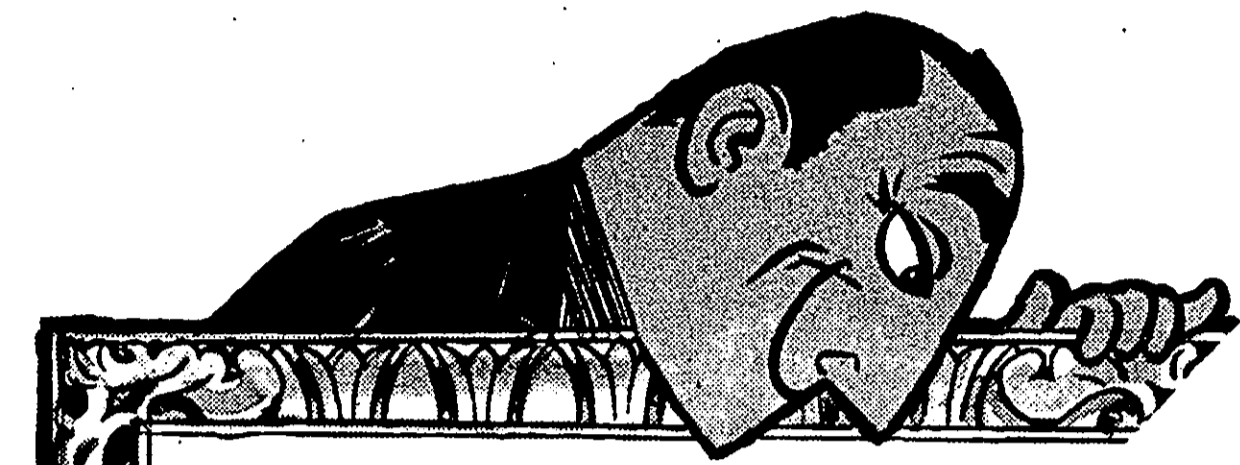

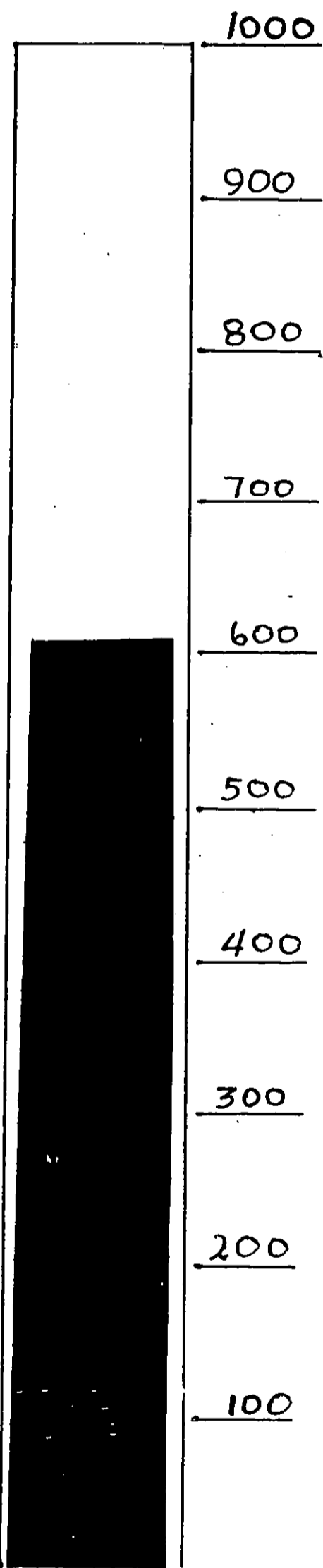
