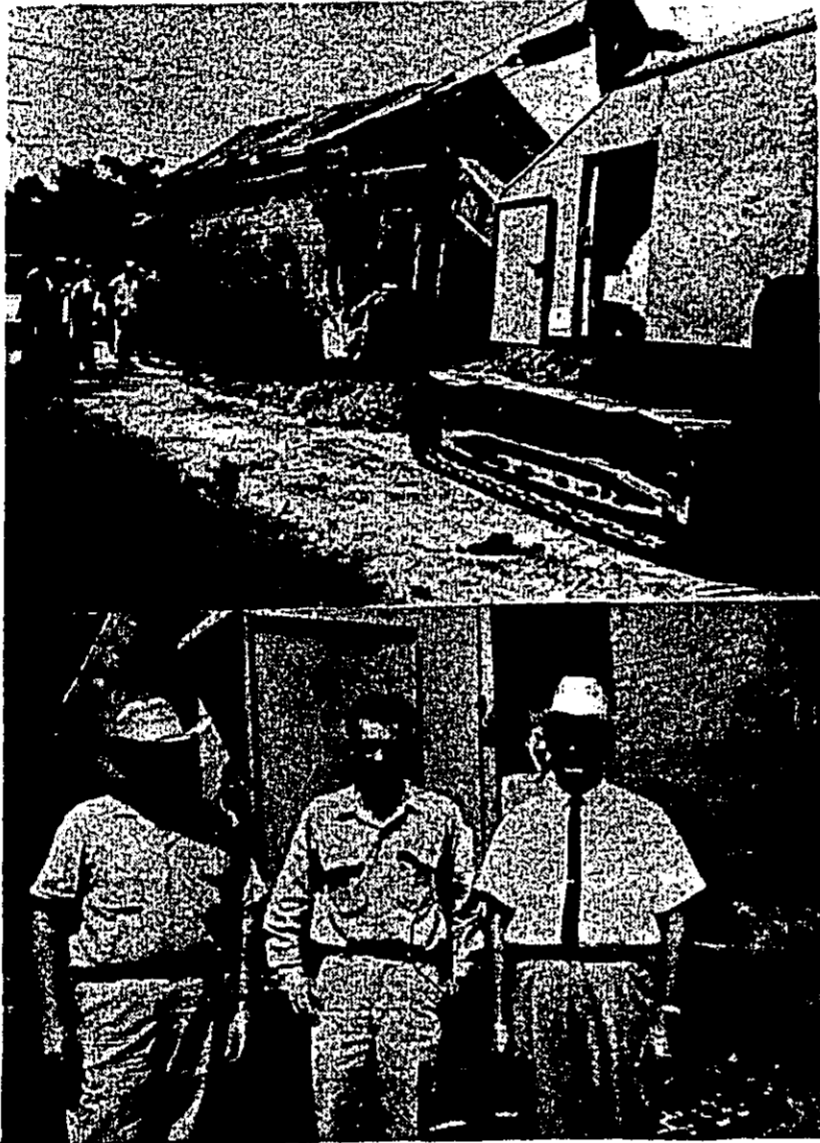

## EAGLES MEET KOUNTZE LIONS HERE FRIDAY

Kirby High School's Eagles will debut before a hometown crowd Friday night with the Kountze Lions as opponents. This will be the first game of

the season for Kountze and the Lions could be an improvement over last year's squad, which the Eagles defeated.

Coach E. S. Golson's boys have put on some weight, with Al Ben Williams at tackle weighing in at 280, Ronnie Chessher at 212 and Lawrence Gordey at 198.

If these three tackles aren't a weighty enough problem for the Eagles, there's Jackson Vanderburg at center listed at 184, a guard who alternates at tackle weighing 183 and a 175 pound end. The latter two are Marvin Myers and Olen Overstreet.

In the backfield, the Lions are perhaps on a par, scale-wise, with the Eagles.

Randy Martin, quarterback, is listed at 150, the same as Frank Risinger, the Eagles QB.

Game time is 8 p. m. at Eagle Field.

### EAGLES DEFEAT NEWTON, 8-0

Woodville Eagles successfully opened their 1963 season Friday by flying by the Newton Eagles by the score of 8-0. Again defense was the key for victory as the teams seemed to be evenly matched.

The local Eagles lit up the scoreboard in the first quarter when Ronny Walley received a high snap from center. When he retrieved the ball, he was in his own end zone—and was smothered by a Woodville Eagle.

For better than half the game it seemed that this two points would be sufficient, as it proved to be. Neither team could mount an offense as the opposing defense was equal to the occasion.

With only 4 minutes remaining on the clock Frank Risinger dropped back to pass. After surveying the situation and deciding that no one was open, Frank streamed down the middle of the field for 55 yards and the game's only touchdown.

At this point Newton was down but not out and mounted a drive that carried to the 15 yard line of the Kirby High Eagles. Here it sputtered and died as an Eagle intercepted a pass and put the game on ice.

**WARRIORS EDGE BULLDOGS**  
Quarterback J. T. Williford of the Warren Warriors plunged two yards for the game's only score as Warren scraped by Colmesneil's battling Bulldogs in the Warren stadium Friday night, 6 to 0.

The accent was on defense as the Warriors and the Bulldogs fought for better than three quarters on almost even terms.

In the first half the Bulldogs held the statistical edge with six first downs and 148 yards in total offense. The second half was a different story, the Warriors stiffening their defense to hold the Bulldogs to one down and 17 yards net gain.

Emerson was the top ground-gainer for the Bulldogs with a sparkling total of 100 yards for the night. Among his total were two fine runs of 33 and 50 yards.

For the Warriors, Glenn Phillips was top hand with a total of 71 yards for the night. Most of his yardage came the hard way, off tackle or around end. Crain hit on six of 11 pass attempts and Roy Williams was on the receiving end of all six completions.

Williford attempted four passes and Glenn Phillips was on the receiving end of the only completion.

Both teams looked very well on defense as most of the night was spent between the 20 yard lines.

Punting was outstanding. Colmesneil punted three times for a 40 yard average. The Warriors punted five times for a 39 yard average.

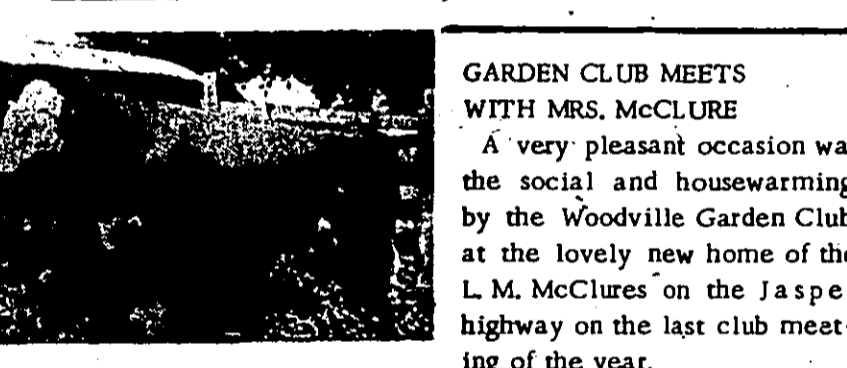

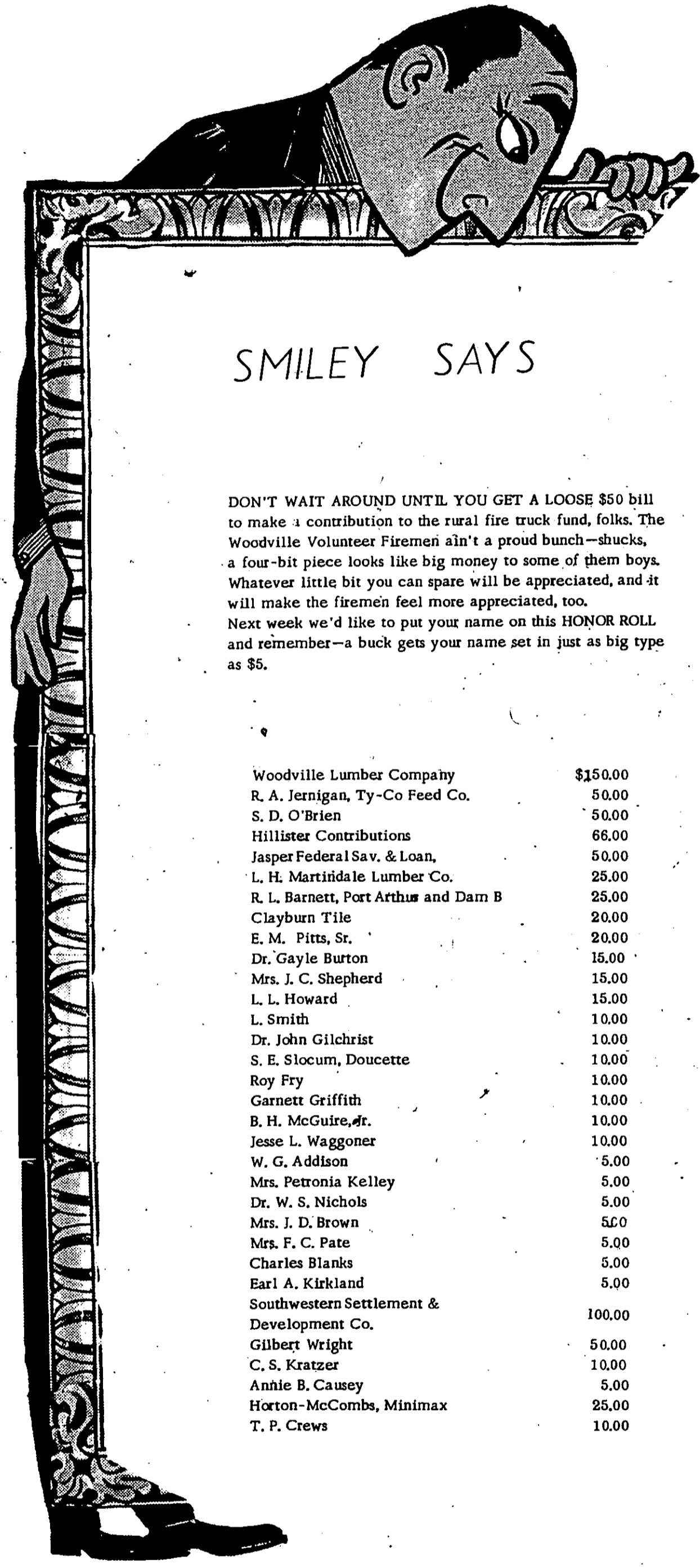

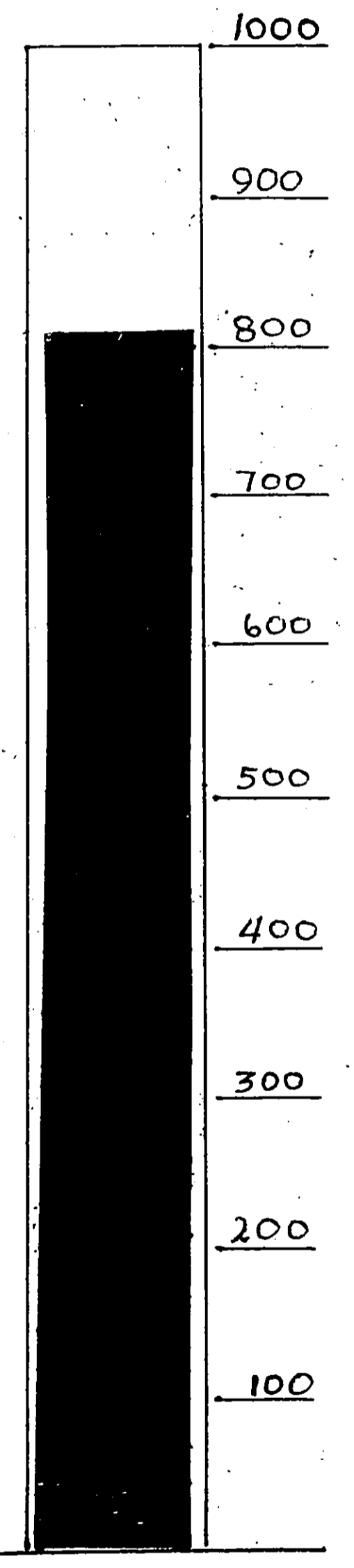
