## Rat Eradication Drive to Begin Here In October

A countywide rat eradication campaign is being conducted by the Tyler County Extension Service, according to Clinton R. Currie, county farm agent.

Rat-bait is available through stations throughout the county. Orders for the bait must be left at one of the stations before October 5 and the rat bait can be picked up at the same station the week of Oct. 14-19.

The bait is three pounds for \$1.00. The bait is not harmful to pets.

Mr. Currie said that the rat population can be controlled with an extensive sanitation program and the use of anticoagulant baits. Rats are one of the most destructive and dangerous pests to have around the farm, Mr. Currie pointed out. They contaminate stored grain, exposed food and feed, will kill poultry and young livestock, and can start fires.

Diseases such as leptospirosis, contagious abortion, trichinosis, distemper, atrophic rhinitis, typhus, plague, food poisoning and rat-bite fever are carried from place to place by these pests.

Once the rats have been eliminated by strict sanitation and use of rat-bait extensively, a small number of permanent baits and continued sanitation will help prevent reinfestation.

### HURRICANE CINDY BRINGS GOOD RAINS TO COUNTY

Hurricane Cindy was good to Tyler County.

The storm brought floods and damages from water in millions of dollars to Beaumont, Port Arthur, Orange and other coastal cities.

But in Tyler County the only effect of the hurricane was a good ground soaking from four to eight inches of rain.

Wednesday morning the rain gauge at the Texas Forest Service here measured 4.51 inches. At Warren the gauge read 8 inches, and 8 inches had been measured at Fred.

This compares with from 20 to 27 inches along the coast.

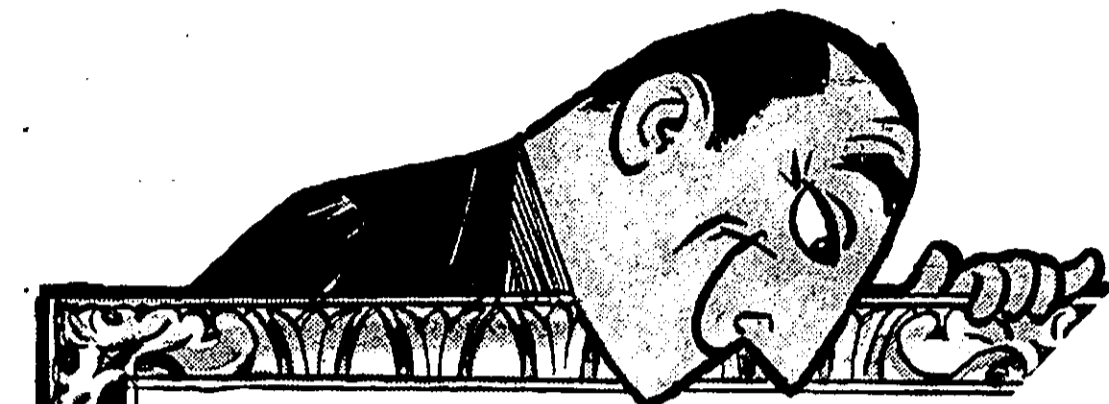

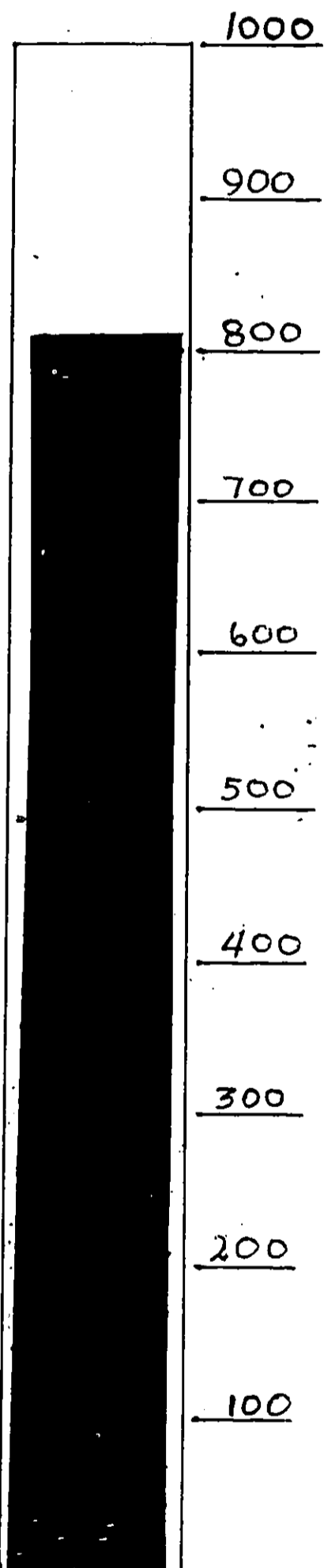

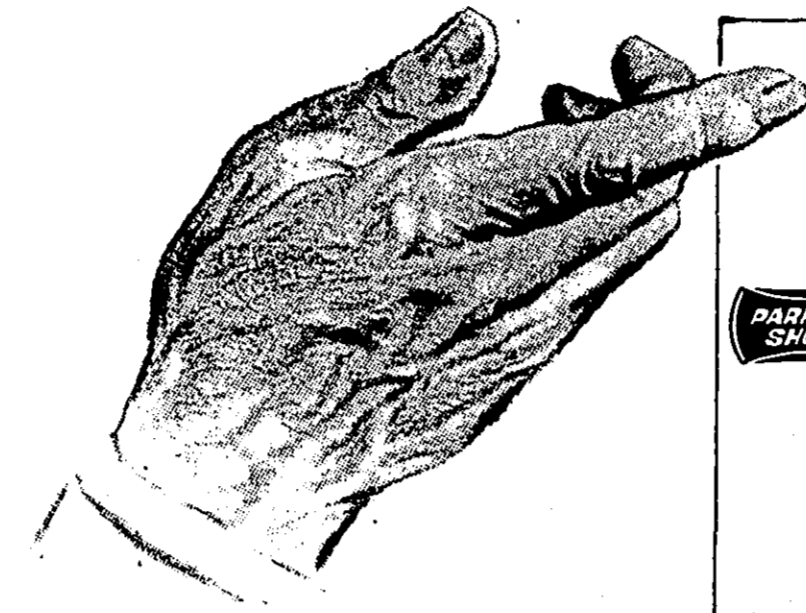
