Eagles Meet Little Cypress Here Friday

This week the Woodville Eagles play Little Cypress on the home field while Warren, Colmesneil and Chester are on the road.

Chester travels to Lovelady, the Colmesneil Bulldogs go to Splendora, and Warren goes to Kountze Saturday night to help the Lions celebrate homecoming.

The Little Cypress Bears have two victories under their belt. In Hamshire-Fannett Friday night, the Bears rapped the Longhorns by 26 to 6. Little Cypress also is victorious over Bridge City of District 9-AAA.

Last week was a bad one for the Tyler County teams. Woodville went down before San Augustine by 18 to 8, Hemphill swamped Chester 57 to 8, Hardin managed a last-minute 6 to 0 win over the Colmesneil Bulldogs, and Warren lost 22-16 to Buna before a good homecoming crowd.

This week will be homecoming for Woodville. Crowning ceremonies at halftime will feature the band forming a huge crown on the football field.

After this, the Eagles cranked up a drive paced by the running of Greer and Risinger. With steady gains and occasional pass from Risinger, the Eagles counted on a 6 yard pass to Bill Weatherford.

The second half was a defensive struggle. The Wolves counted once more on a 10 yard keeper by quarterback Price. The Eagles drove several times only to be stopped by an ill timed penalty or fumble.
