Eagles Go to Bridge City; 3 Play at Home

Tyler County's football teams came out of last weekend's grid fracas with a .250 average—winning one out of four games.

Colmesneil's Bulldogs pleased a homecoming crowd by walloping the Hemphill Hornets, 20-8.

Warren opened District 25-A play with Hardin, and were edged 14-12.

Chester's Yellow Jackets went down before New Caney, 16 to 2.

Woodville's hard-luck Eagles, plagued by injuries to key men all season, took a 16 to 0 loss at Sour Lake.

This week the Eagles will go to Bridge City, which has a 2-2 record for the season. Bridge City plays in 9-AAA with Silsbee, Vidor, Nederland, Orange and Jasper. However, with the Eagles in better shape as far as injuries go, it should be a good game.

The Eagles open district competition against Crockett the following week, and the coaching staff is keeping its collective fingers crossed. With no further injuries, the Eagles should open with a district win.

Colmesneil plays New Caney in the Bulldog stadium Friday. New Caney defeated Chester 16 to 2 last week and the Bulldogs should remain in the winning column this week.

Chester will play at home with Splendora furnishing the opposition.

At Warren, the Warriors will be trying to slow down Hull-Daisetta, winner of five in season play and boasting of scoring 196 points to its opponents 6.

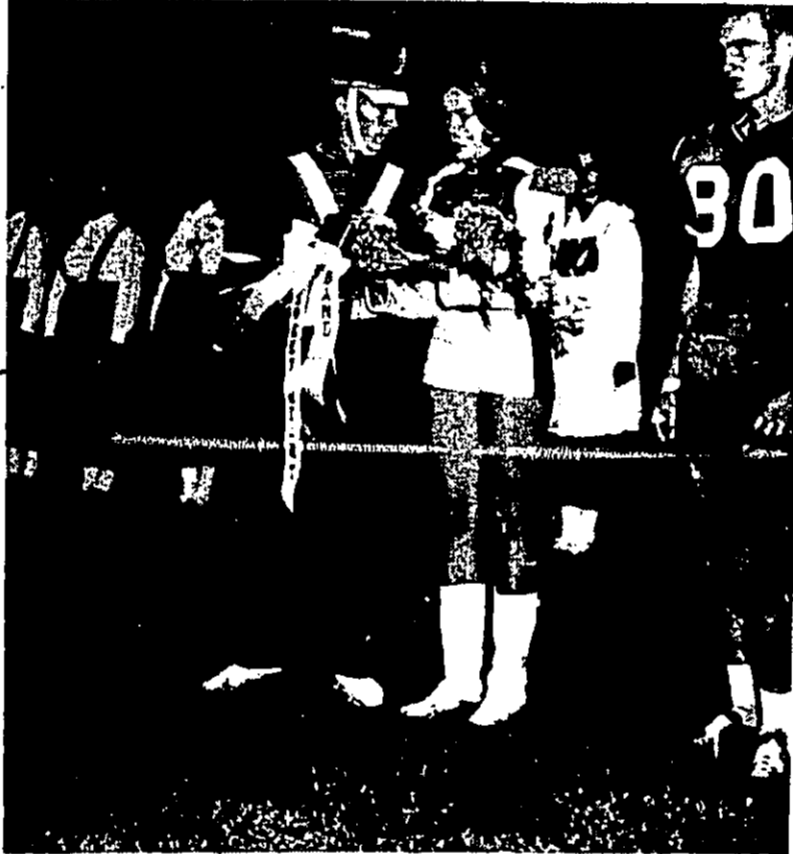
Cakes by the piece with coffee will be served until "sold out" the group said.
