TAX NOTICES TO BE MAILED BY NOV. 15

Tax statements will be mailed in the middle of November this year because of the late date in settling final valuations, according to A. L. (Pete) Thornton, tax assessor-collector for the county.

Mr. Thornton said that the final evaluation was held up until September 23 by a timber company, and that his office could not complete the tax roll and mail statements until final tax evaluations were set.

He said his office will make an effort to get the statements in the mail by November 15.

Mr. Thornton said that poll tax sales will begin Monday. However, an amendment will be voted upon in the November 9 special election to abolish the poll tax. If this amendment carries, the poll tax of \$1.75 will be abolished and only a 25 cent fee for registration charged.

Mr. Thornton said that anyone buying a poll tax before November 9 is warned that should the poll tax be abolished, the \$1.75 poll tax cannot be refunded and the 25 cent registration fee will still have to be paid.

In the other county game, the Chester Yellow Jackets were in the game all the way, but went down before Splendora 24-14.

This Friday Warren plays at East Chambers, Chester at Barbers Hill and Colmesneil at Eadsdale. All are district contests.

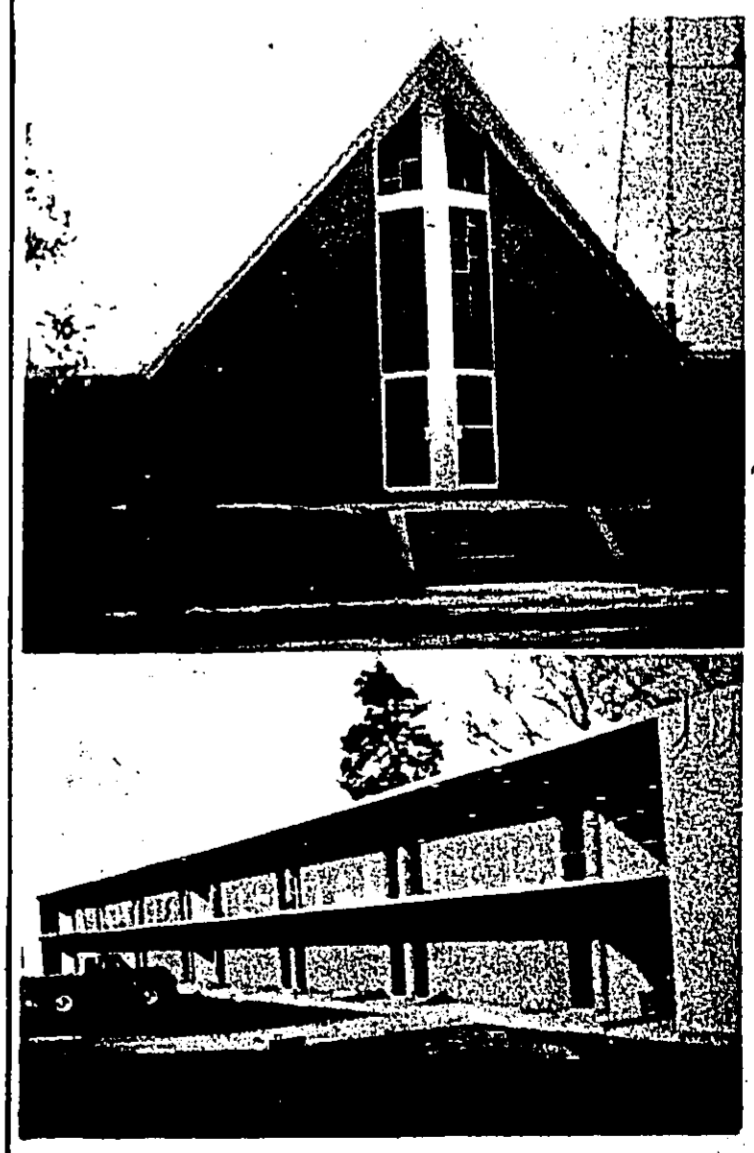

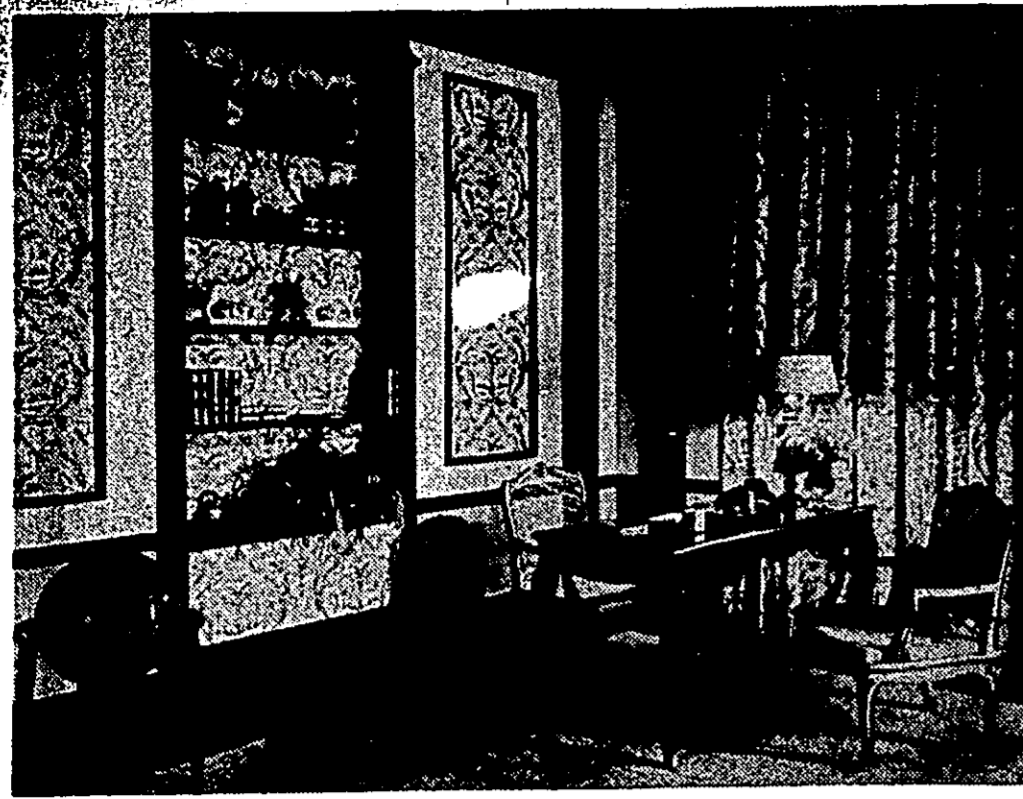

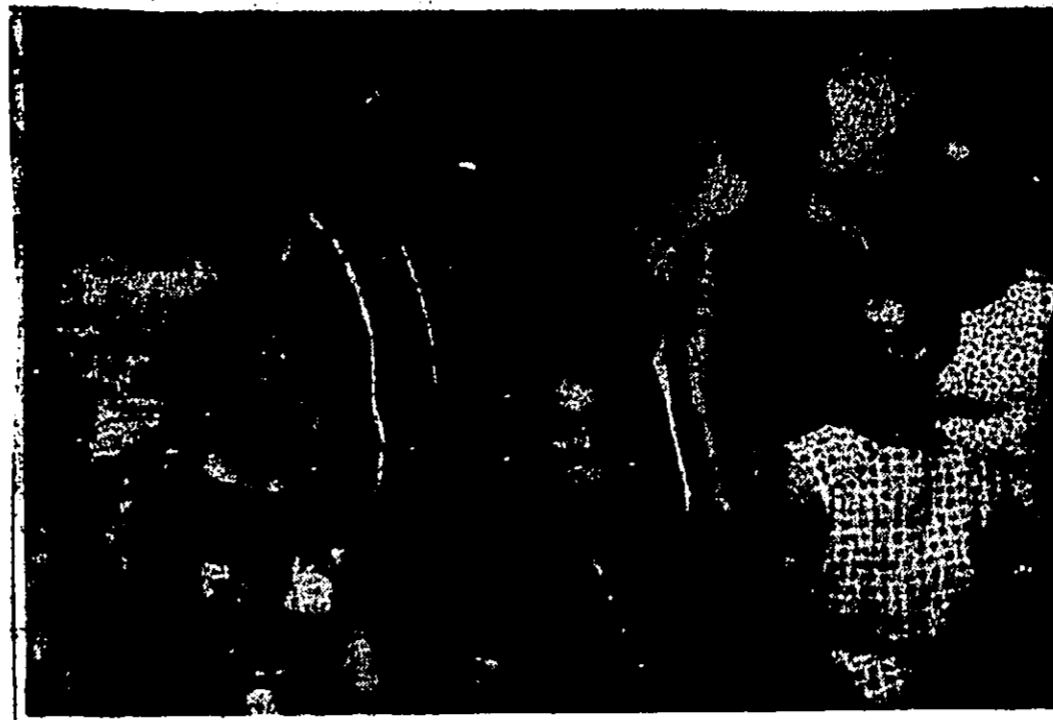
