# EAGLES JOURNEY TO MADISONVILLE FRIDAY; WARREN, COLMESNEIL IN HOME GAMES

The Kirby High School Eagles go to Madisonville Friday night favored to take their second district win over the Mustangs.

Madisonville lost its District 22-AA opener last Friday, taking a 44 to 0 drubbing from Livingston.

Madisonville's season record is all on the minus side. They have lost seven straight this season—scoring only six points and allowing 267 to be scored against them.

Livingston and Woodville now stand atop District 22-AA with 1 win against no losses. Cleveland will play its first district game. Friday night against Livingston. The Lions are favored to win, but should Cleveland rise up and slap them down, Woodville has a chance to ride the top of the District 22-AA standings with 2 wins provided the Eagles defeat Madisonville as expected.

While Woodville is away from home, there are two games in the county Friday night. Colmesneil is host to Coldsprings in a District 26-B contest. The Bulldogs won their first district game last Friday against Evadale, 22 to 6. The Bulldogs are favored to take their second win Friday, but the Coldsprings eleven is capable of pulling off an upset if the Bulldogs should relax a bit.

In the other District 26-B tilt scheduled Friday, Evadale goes to Barbers Hill to meet the powerhouse of the district who move into Class A next season.

Barbers Hill is also 1-0 in the district, having crushed Chester last week, 48 to 6.

The Warren Warriors will try to get their first District 25-A victory Friday night against Tarkinton. Tarkington has a 1-1 record in the district, and Warren 0-3.








