

Still Need Poll Tax Receipt

You still need a poll tax receipt to be able to vote in Texas, A. L. (Pete) Thornton, Tyler County tax assessor-collector, reminds county voters.

Voters over the state Saturday rejected a proposed amendment which would have done away with the requirement to have a poll tax receipt in order to vote.

Mr. Thornton announced that he has established seven poll tax sub-stations over the county for the convenience of persons who live in the various communities. Poll taxes are still \$1.75. Those over 60 do not need to get an exemption certificate in Tyler

County.

Mr. Thornton said that persons becoming 21 years of age and entitled to their first free vote must come to the court house to pick up their exemption certificates.

Sub-stations where poll taxes may be purchased are:

Doucette: International Paper Company office.

Colmesneil: Dean's General Merchandise.

Rockland: Dean's Grocery.

Chester: J. L. Veal Store.

Warren: School tax office.

Fred: Jenkins Grocery.

Spurger: Spurger Mercantile.

County Voters Favor Keeping Poll Tax

Tyler County voters went on record nearly 3 to 1 against the repeal of the poll tax as a requirement for voting in Saturday's special election.

Only 179 voted for repeal of the poll tax while 480 cast ballots against repeal.

Proposition Two, the amendment of the welfare and assistance statutes, carried in Tyler County, 355 to 270.

Proposition Three, to allow the County of Jefferson to establish

a retirement and disability fund for appointive officers and employees, was defeated in voting in the county, 202 to 267.

Proposition Four, to allow the issuance of \$150 million in bonds for the veterans land program, carried in Tyler County by only six votes, 298 to 292.

Proposition Two is the only one of the amendments which carried across the state. The repeal of the poll tax requirement to vote was rejected decisively.

Amanda Haralson of Colmesneil and Leonard Wardlaw III of Woodville were among the 33 4-H Club members who received the Gold Star award at the 10th annual District 9 Gold Star Banquet in Hotel Fredonia in Nacogdoches Tuesday night.

The 4-H Gold Star award is the highest award given on a county basis to a 4-H boy or girl. It is given each year by the Texas A & M University to only one boy and one girl in 4-H Club work in each county. It must be earned by successful demonstrations in agriculture and home economics and on leadership activities.

The underdog Oilers drew first blood in the first quarter when quarterback John Flowers slipped, around left end for a 25-yard touchdown run. The Oilers tried right end for the two pointer, but were stopped short.

After nine minutes of stalemate, Warrior halfback Gene Pate caught an errant Oiler pass on the West Hardin 30 and ran for the tying touchdown. The running attempt for the conversion failed and the score was 6-6.

Late in the second quarter, the Oilers, behind the linebusting of Larry Nobles, sustained a 55-yard drive with Billy Tomlinson going over for the touchdown from the two. The Oilers tried the left end for the two-pointer, but a gain were stopped short. The half-time ended with the Oilers leading by 12-6.

In the final period, the Warriors finally managed to sustain a 55-yard drive with Glenn Phillips going over from the five. The Oiler line stopped the two pointer, with only 124 left on the clock.

Warren kicked off and the Oilers returned to the midstripe. After two plays, the ball was on the Warrior 32 with only 58 seconds left in the game. This set the stage for Oiler quarterback John Flowers, who sent his right halfback toward the sidelines and then slicing back over the middle. The combination worked beautifully for the clincher. BARBERS HILL -25 COLMESNEIL -6

Barbers Hill clinched the District 25A Championship at Colmesneil Friday night with a 24-6 victory over Colmesneil. The Eagles ended the season with a 4-0 district worksheet and an overall mark of 8-2.

Although the rain kept the battle on the ground most of the night, both teams managed to score through the air lanes. The Bulldogs' only marker came with 16 seconds left in the first quarter on a 29 yard aerial from Bobby Crain to Ronnie Allen.

Barbers Hill was already on the scoreboard with seven points when Colmesneil scored and the Eagles were never behind. The first touchdown came when Bill Kilgore cut through the line on a six-yard run and Joe Ainsworth kicked the extra point.

Colmesneil held the Eagles twice within its 10-yard line in the fourth quarter, but the third time Barbers Hill got close, the Eagles went in.

TIMBER TIPS

The forest in East Texas will soon reach its fall coloration peak, according to Ernest M. Long, Assistant Forester for the Texas Forest Service at Woodville.

During the fall the leaves of our hardwoods change color and drop to the forest floor. Though it is commonly supposed that the frost is the cause of the color change, but such is not the case. Many leaves have changed color before we have frost.

The reasons for the color change of leaves are, in essence, a completion of an assigned job. The leaves manufacture food for the tree all during the spring and hot summer months, but with the fall season and the approach of cold weather the tree prepares to become inactive, or dormant, for the winter. With the cessation of plant growth there is no need for the food which the leaves are preparing. The available food in the leaves is transferred to the tree. Remaining in the leaves are chemical substances which are highly refractive and sugars which were not completely removed into the tree. The refractive substances give the leaves a yellow coloring; however, the sugars combine with other substances and give a reddish color which varies from the current brilliant red of the red maples to the less flamboyantly colored oaks and dogwood.

A scenic drive to observe this beauty may be witnessed on highway 59 between Livingston and Corrigan and on highway 80 between Woodville and Livingston.

The beauty of the forest during this period is highlighted by the brilliant reds of the red maple, dogwood, sumac, Chinese tallow, the golden colored sycamore and sweet gum. While the bald cypress adds color to the bottomlands with its reddish-brown foliage. An afternoon spent observing these wonders of nature will be a treat for the entire family.

Recently, he had been operating a motel in Meridian.

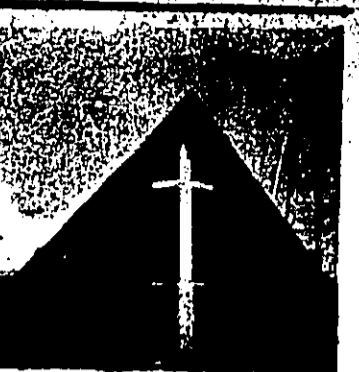

There is no substitute for a good newspaper in the field of community welfare, Allison Sanders of The Houston Chronicle told a conference of newsmen and architects in Austin.

Sanders and Ben F. McDonald, Corp's Christi attorney, spoke during the closing session of a conference on the press and the growth of cities at the University of Texas. Sanders is an editorial writer and author of the "In Houston" column. He also is a former city editor of The Chronicle.

"The most effective way a newspaper can marshal the political and economic forces of its community is by promoting lively public discussion—discussion based on facts assembled and put into proper perspective through editorial comment by the paper," Sanders said.

"In that field of community welfare there is no substitute for a good newspaper, and a community without such a newspaper is in a bad state indeed," the newsmen added.

Sanders said the good newspaper "has resources for getting information which are superior to those of the average citizen or group of citizens."

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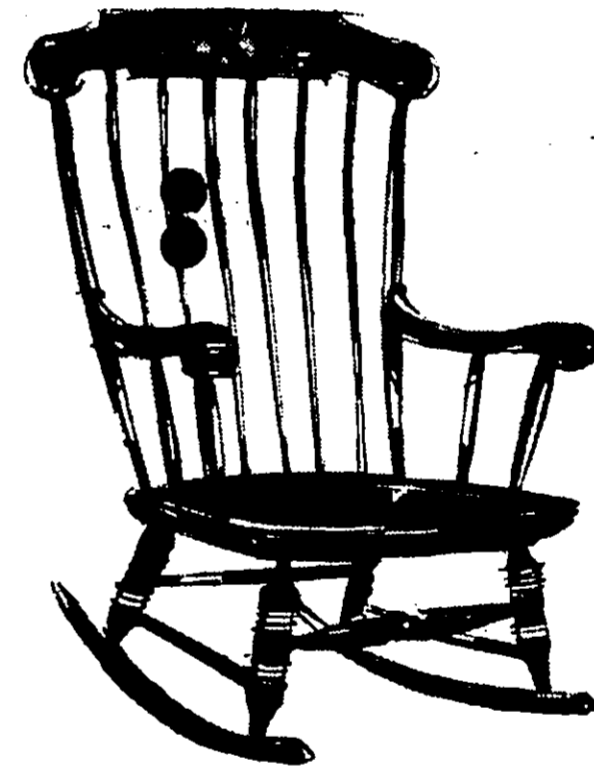
