Poll Tax Deadline Is Jan. 31

Poll tax payments in Tyler County are slow and will have to pick up considerably to avoid a last-minute rush, A. L. (Pete) Thornton, county tax assessor-collector, said this week. Deadline for payment of the poll tax is January 31. Poll taxes must be paid by all who wish to vote in the presidential, state and local elections in 1964 except those over 60 and those who will become 21 years of age in 1964. Over-60 voters do not need an exemption certificate. Besides the elections for county and district offices, voters will cast ballots for president and vice president of the United States, governor and lieutenant governor, attorney general, congressman, three associate justices of the Supreme Court, railroad commissioner, comptroller of public accounts, state treasurer, commissioner of the general land office, and commissioner of agriculture, and one of the state's U. S. Senators will be elected.

Tyler County voters will elect a sheriff, county attorney, tax assessor-collector and commissioners in precincts one and three. A state representative for this district will also be elected. The first primary will be held May 2 and the second primary on June 6. The general election is on November 3. Deadline for filing for office is February 3. With all these officials to be elected, voters will get their money's worth with the \$1.75 spent for a poll tax.

LIBRARY TO MOVE CHRISTMAS WEEK—Tyler County Memorial Library, now in a small building just west of Tyler County Hospital on Bluff Street, will move during the coming week to the Allan Shivers Library and Museum which has been completed just east of the school grounds on Charlton street. The library will be closed from Monday, Dec. 23, until Jan. 2, when it will be open in the Shivers Library, which is pictured above. Books may be returned to the old library through Saturday of this week and to the new library beginning Jan. 2.

RICHARD ELECTED PRESIDENT OF GULF STATES UTILITIES CO.

Glenn E. Richard, treasurer of Gulf States Utilities Company, was elected president and a director of the company at a meeting of the board of Directors held Monday at the Company's general offices in Beaumont. The announcement came from J. J. Morrison, chairman of the Board of Directors. Mr. Richard, a native of Jennings, Louisiana, went to work for Gulf States as a clerk in the Jennings office in 1926 and in 1928 moved to the Lake Charles office of the company where he was general clerk and later, statistician. He was transferred to Beaumont in 1931 and assigned to the Tax and Auditing Department. In 1939 he was appointed tax accountant and in 1943 was promoted to staff accountant. In 1947 he was appointed an assistant treasurer and was elected treasurer of the company in February, 1956. He is a member of the board of directors of United Appeals and the Family and Children's Bureau and is active in the Chamber of Commerce.

County Teams Make Good Showing In Kountze Tourney

Tyler County teams fared well in the boys' division of the Kountze Invitational Basketball Tournament. The Spurger Pirates went to the finals and lost a championship game to Kountze by a 50 to 47 count. Earl Wayne Odom was high point man for Spurger with 25, and was selected on the All-Tournament team. He scored a total of 79 points for three games. Enroute to the finals, Spurger edged the Woodville Eagles by a 56-51 score in the semi-finals and Warren by a 49-41 margin. The Warren Warriors took the

consolation title by defeating Evadale 51-35 as Roy Moore dropped in 25 tallies. Warren lost in the opening round to Spurger in a hard-fought game and drew a bye in the consolation semi-finals. George Pate was named All-Tournament. He was high scorer in the Spurger game and played an outstanding floor game. The Kirby Eagles drew a bye in the first round and lost to Spurger and Central Catholic of Beaumont. The Eagles displayed a smooth, well-balanced five but it was not in the cards for them to win.

ASCS HOLDS DISTRICT 16 MEET HERE

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices of District 16 met at the Community Inn in Woodville Wednesday and Thursday of last week in a two day conference to discuss and plan for the administration and carrying out of the 1964 Feed Grain Program, and also the 1964 Agricultural Conservation Program.

District 16 is composed of Brazos, Grimes, Walker, Montgomery, San Jacinto, Liberty, Polk, Trinity, Tyler, Hardin, Jefferson, Orange, Newton and Jasper counties. In attendance at this meeting were the office manager, one office clerk and one county committeeman from each of the 14 county District. T. E. Whiteley, farmer fieldman from College Station, conducted the meetings. With him were the following: J. B. Best, county manager, Woodville, Texas, member of the State ASCS Committee, also attending. The first day of the conference was devoted to discussions of the Emergency Feed Program for those counties who have been declared in the drought area, and to the 1964 Feed Grain Program. In this respect, Tyler County was not declared a disaster area due to the recent drought and is not eligible for this emergency feed program, according to R. Everton Kennerly, Manager of the local ASCS office.

The Feed Grain Program has been in effect since 1961 and eligible Tyler County farmers have participated in this program each year. Because of extreme surplus of feed grains (corn, barley, or grains sorghums) the USDA has asked producers to reduce or retire from production these particular grains and put the land to a conserving use on a year to year basis for which such producers receive payments according to their farm bases and annual yield. In 1964 the program will again be in effect with the sign-up period being in the early Spring.

The ACP program for 1964 was discussed on the second day with LeRoy Fillyaw, office manager of Newton County and Johnny Stocton, office manager from Orange County, leading the discussions. Through the ACP program farmers and ranches may receive cost-share assistance from the USDA to carry out needed conservation work on their land that would or could not be carried out to the extent needed without such assistance. Question regarding these or any other programs administered through the local Tyler County ASCS office of the USDA will be gladly answered by any clerk in such office. The staff consists of Mrs. Juanita Rotan, chief clerk; Mrs. Lorena Johnson, ACP and wool clerk; Lorin A. Murdock, assistance performance supervisor, and R. Everton Kennerly, office manager, with Aaron B. Durham, Chairman of the County Committee, with office located in the J. B. Best Building

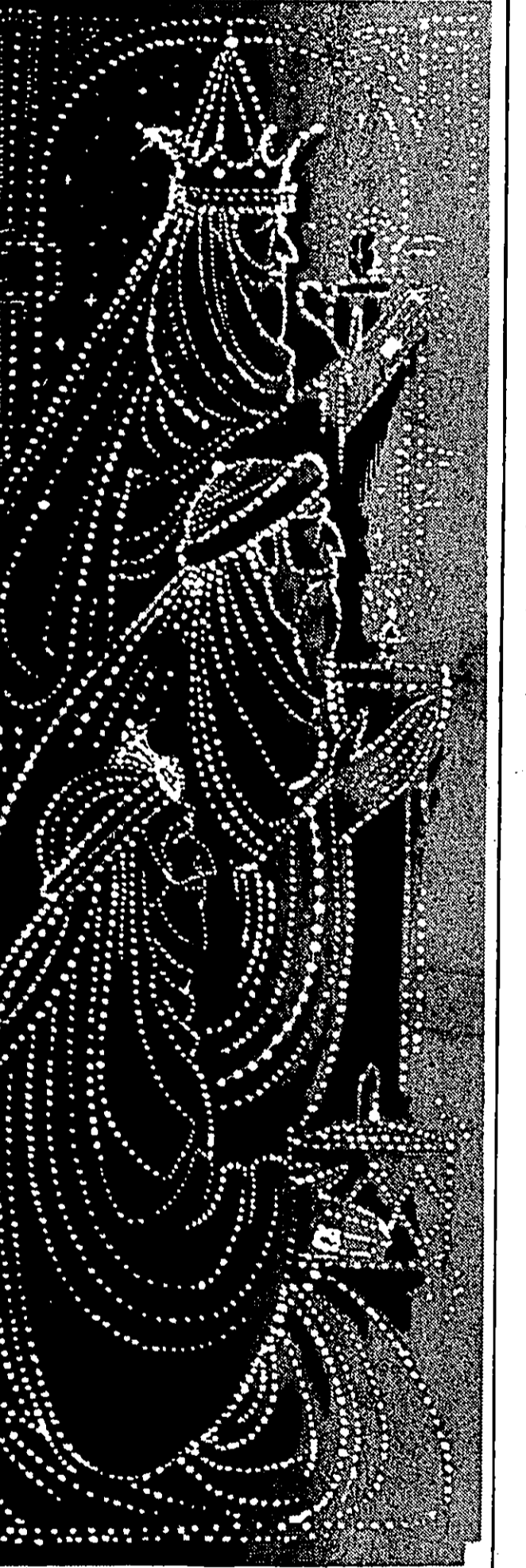

COMPUTER ASSISTS GSU IN PLANT OVERHAUL

The unerring computer has come of age in the electric utility industry.

The supplier of electricity in this area, Gulf States Utilities Company, has put the "mechanical brain" to test at its newest generating plant--Sabine Power Station at Bridge City, Texas--and, so far, it has passed with flying colors.

The occasion was the first inspection and overhaul of Sabine Station's new No. 1 turbine, plus some additional work on auxiliary equipment.

How can the computer assist in this?

The answer is simple. The job

is being done by the computer via the scientific Critical Path Method (CPM), a time and cost-saving system inaugurated by the Navy to accelerate its Polaris Missile program.

In brief, CPM entails planning and scheduling of each component job of each unit of equipment involved in the inspection-overhaul.

Gulf States' employment of the computer on this job is a "first" in the electric power industry.

CPM, acclaimed by experts as the most exciting management tool to evolve in recent memory, is deceptively simple, explains John A. Reich, GSU's production manager.

"Events that take place to meet a target date are tied together sequentially by the estimated times it take to move from one event to another," Reich said. "Progress or the lack thereof, which affects the program, is computed by electronic data processing and then made graphically available for all to see and act upon."

By using the computer, GSU management finds a "load" lifted from its shoulders since the error-proof "mechanical brain" has taken over about 80 per cent of the decision making surrounding power plant maintenance.

The "nerve center" of the GSU project is in the Sabine Station auditorium, where the giant arrow diagram is located on one entire wall. Each job is mapped on the diagram and programmed by the computer.

The process is continually updated to reflect change, trouble, potential trouble and achievement. The approach is repeated until the project is completed--on time.

If the scientific approach is suc-

cessful--and there's every indication it will be--the same system of power station maintenance will probably be used extensively elsewhere around the nation. The electric utility industry has an eye peeled on GSU's experiment with the computer and CPM.

There has already been a steady stream of visitors to the project site. They're coming to get a first-hand look at the scientific approach in action, explains Mr. Reich.

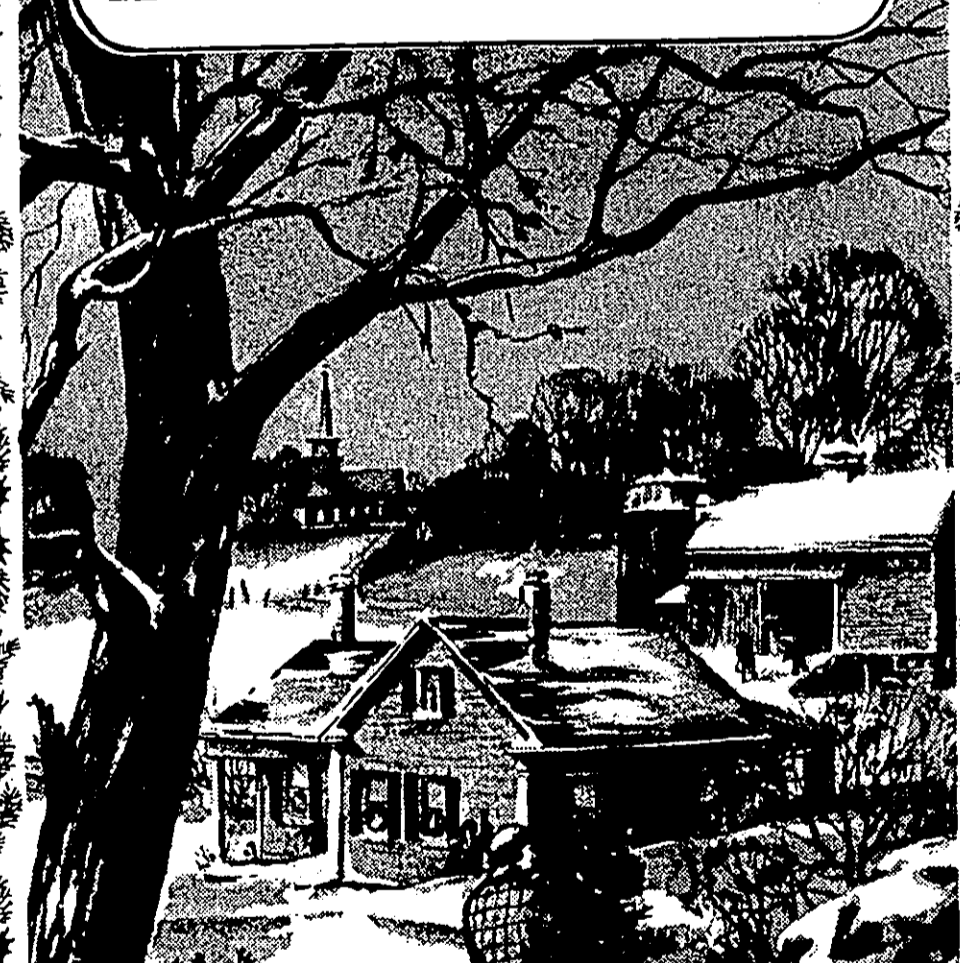

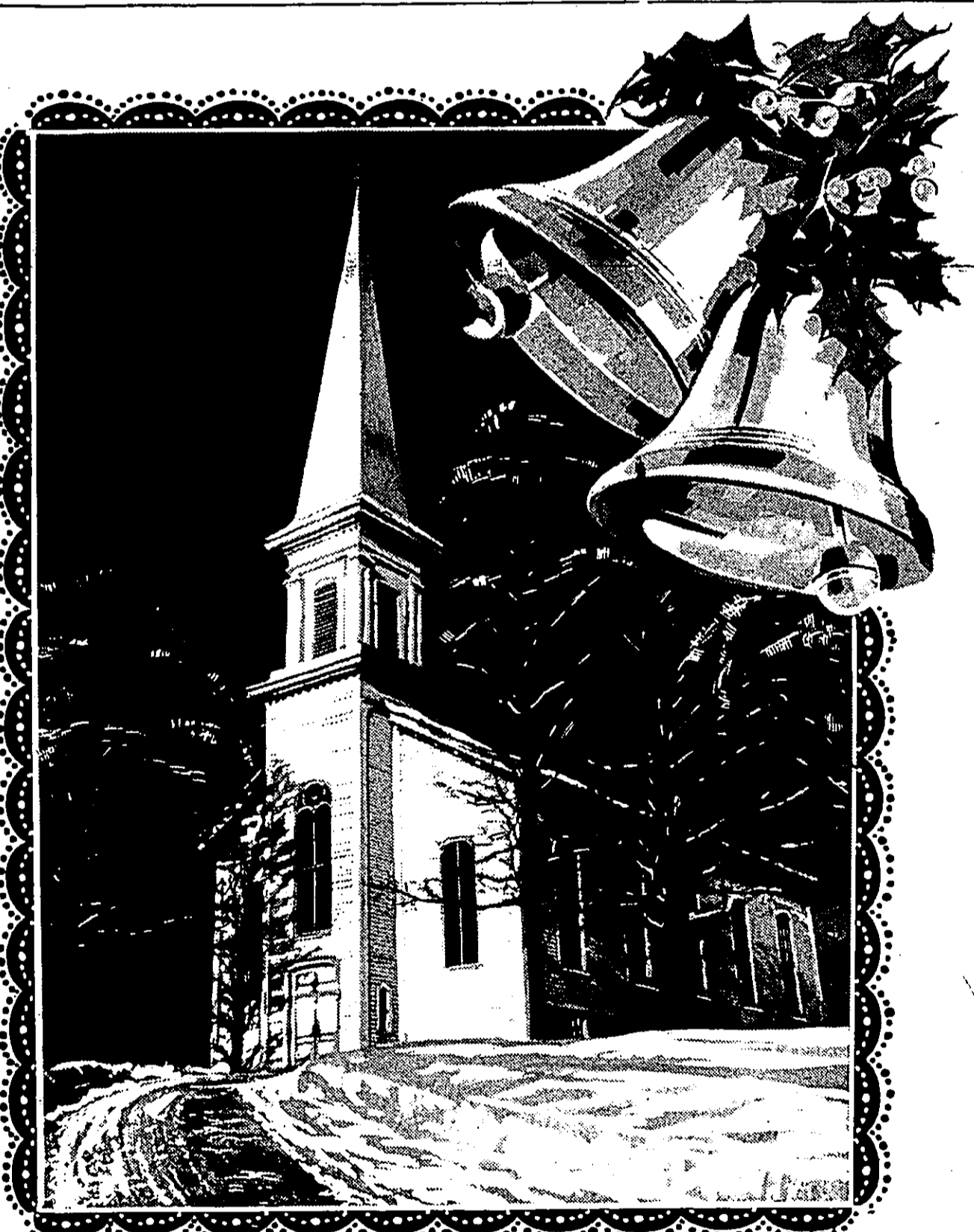
