## HOME BUILDING IN COUNTY REACHES PEAK DURING '63

### 28 NEW HOMES IN CITY; TOTAL CONSTRUCTION IN WOODVILLE OVER \$1,172,000

The nation's home-building industry had its second best year in history, and Woodville and Tyler County may have surpassed that of the country in new homes built according to population percentages.

The new house count in the nation in 1963 was almost 1,500,000 units, a gain of 10 percent.

In Woodville alone, 28 building permits for homes were issued by the city. Since Woodville's city limits are close in, this does not include the many homes built in Cheswood, Miramonte Lane at Pine Grove subdivisions, nor the other new homes adjacent to the city limits for which building permits are not required.

The value of the new homes inside the city limits, according to the applications for building permits, was \$9,200. In addition, \$5,551 in permits for repairs were issued by the city.

Commercial building permits in Woodville reached a peak in 1963 with a total of \$800,000—aided by the \$200,000 permit for Woodville Community Inn. Other commercial permits were for the Swearingen-Garner Clinic, Tyler County Hospital's new wings and the new sanctuary of the First Christian Church.

Total of 11 building permits issued by the city in 1963 reached a whopping \$1,172,000.

As large as this total is for a town of 2,000 population, it does not include the new sawmill of Woodville Lumber Company or the new addition at Air Control Window Corporation plant.

Previously filing for places on the ballot are Clyde E. Smith Jr. for re-election as county attorney; Ralph R. Marshall for constable, precinct three; D. B. Ferrell of Burt for state representative, district 7;

Carl Shepherd, Howard Riley and Joe L. Best, all for precinct 1 commissioner; and Leon Fowler for precinct three commissioner. Deadline for filing for office is February 3.

The check represents excess donations received during last year's Sabin oral polio vaccine clinics held here. Contributions of 25 cents from each person taking the vaccine at the two clinics were asked, although not required, and many persons contributed as much as \$1.

The financial committee appointed by the doctors was asked to handle the fund and any excess over the cost of the vaccine would be donated to some worthy cause.

Since the doctors, nurses, pharmacists and others who helped in the clinics gave their time to the project, the only cost was for the vaccine. And since the public was generous in donations, a surplus was realized.

After the building program at Tyler County Hospital started, it was decided to use this surplus in purchasing needed items for the hospital.

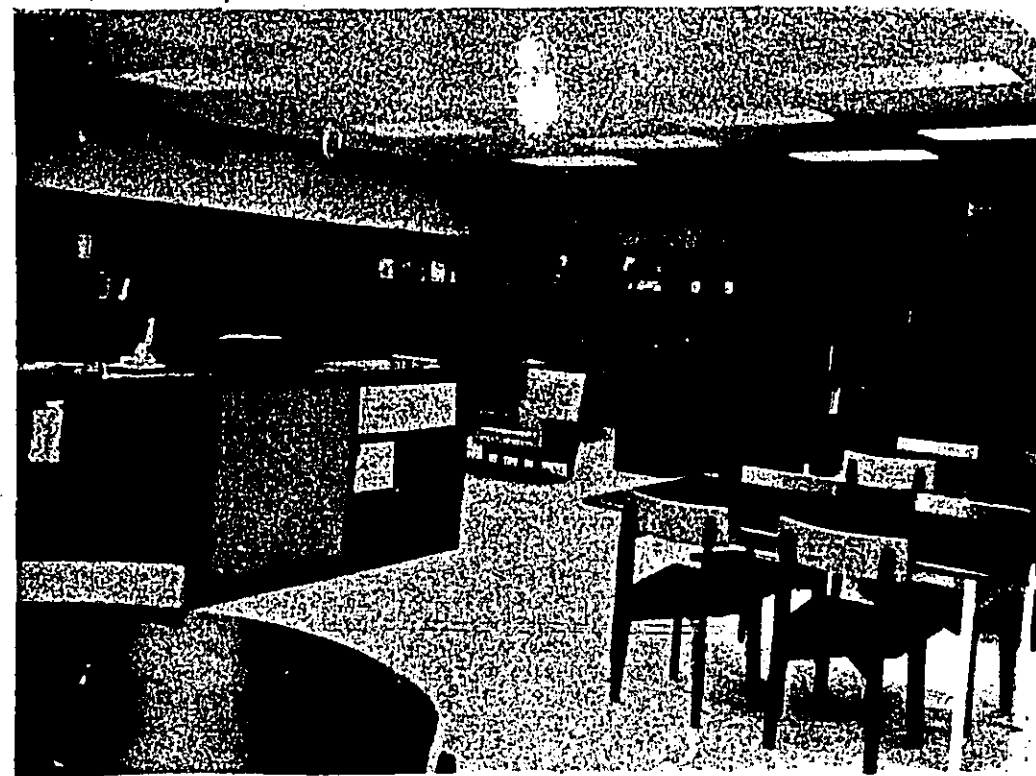

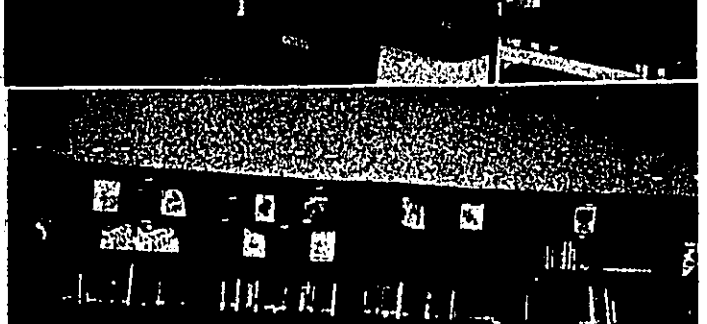
Noel Lane has been hired by the school board to be the custodian in the new building. Mr. Lane has been a marine engineer and lives in Hilllater.

The couple was married in Tyler County on Jan. 16, 1904.

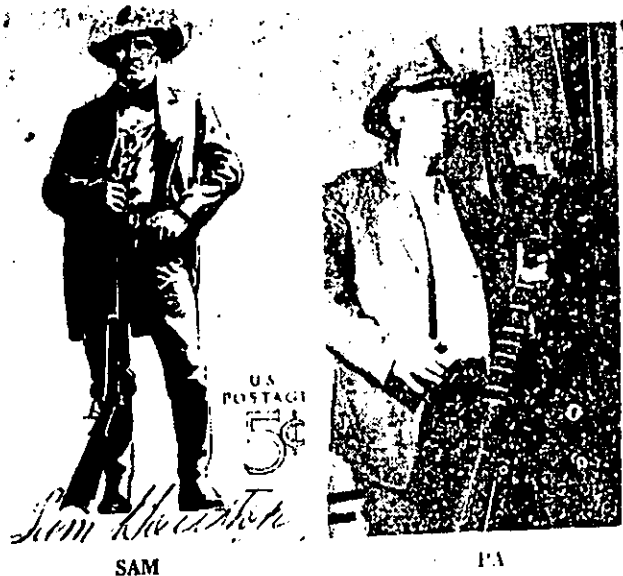

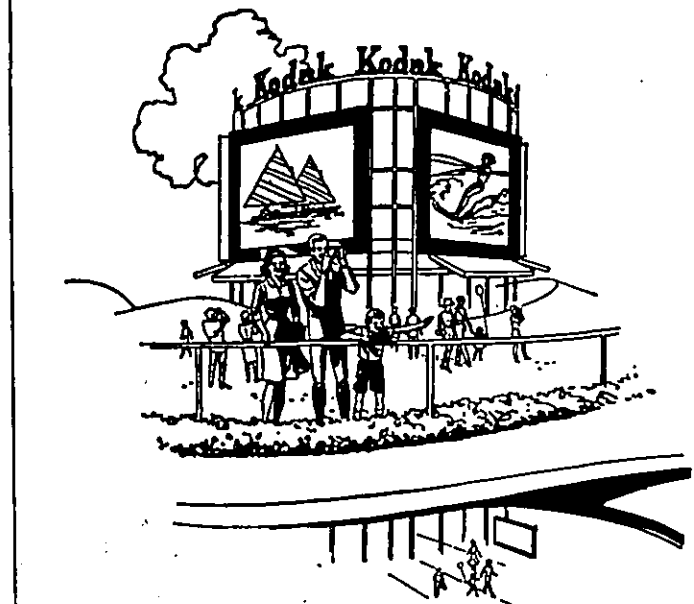

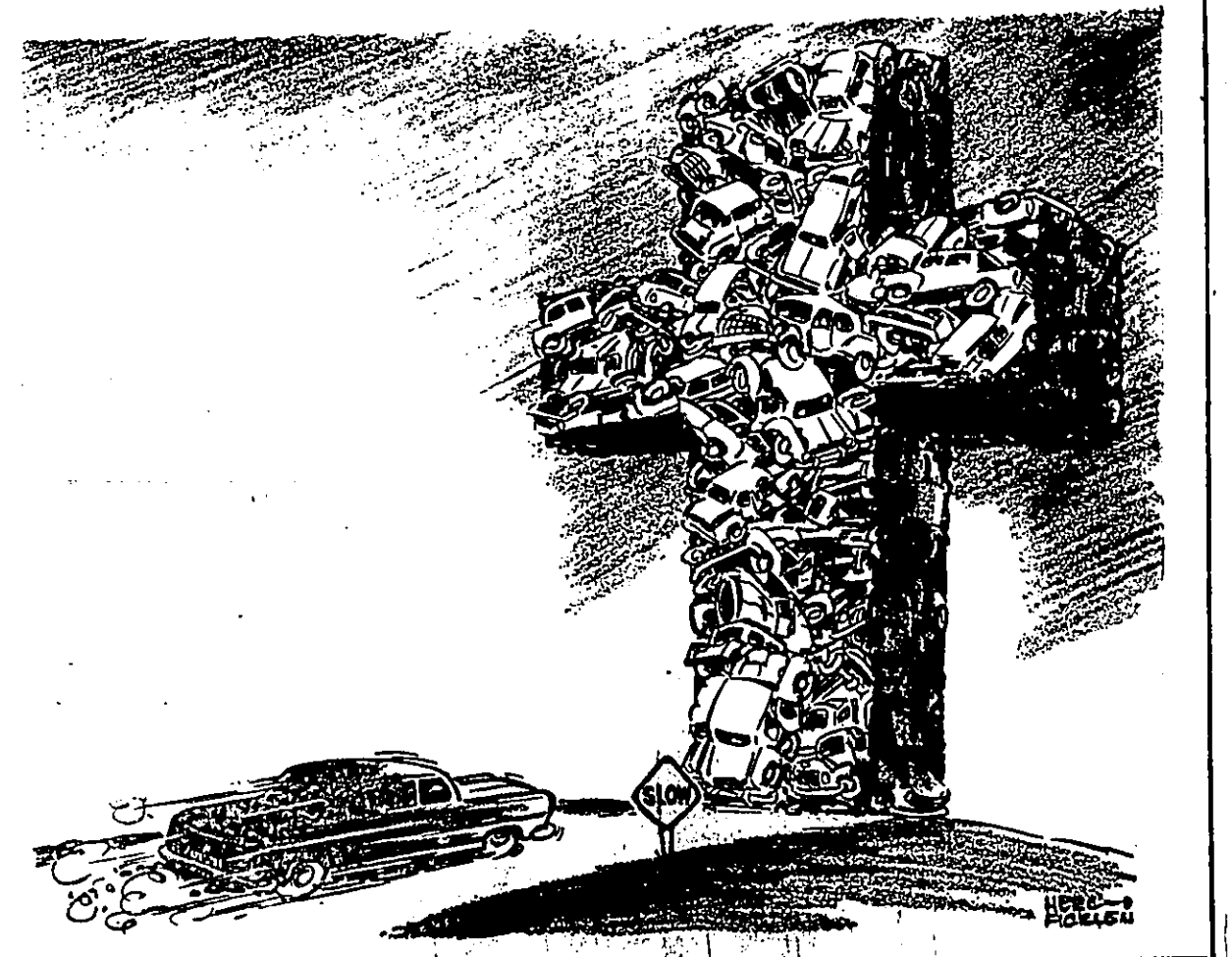

Tree Quacks Hit by A&M Specialist

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (Sp.)—Questionable tree doctors, who not only take citizens for tremendous amounts of money but may harm trees, are being reported from across the state, says Wendell Home, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The youthful farmers and ranchers and their companion organization, Young Homemakers of Texas, will stage joint conventions Friday and Saturday in Austin.

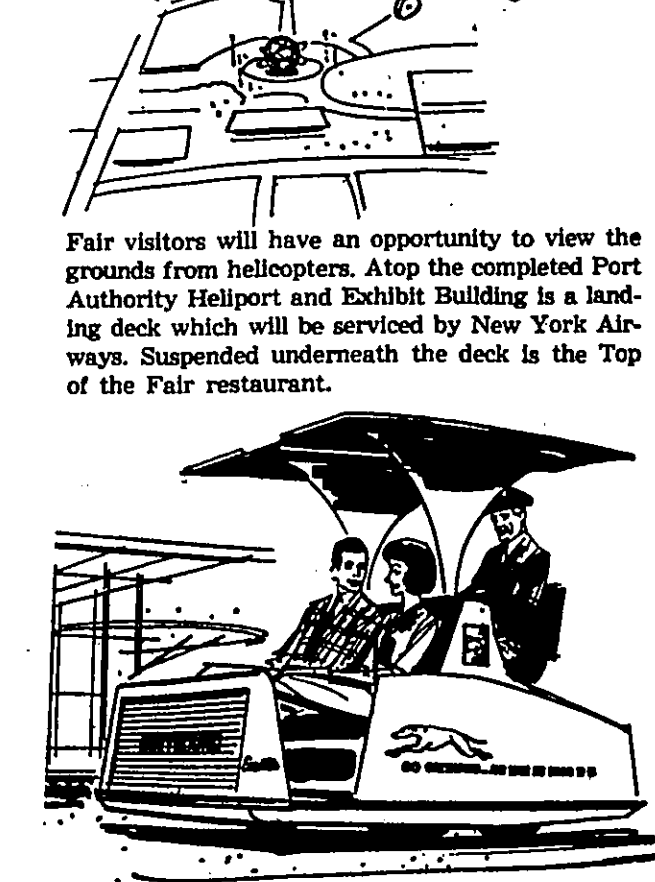
Unfortunately these so-called tree doctors also give reputable silviculturists a bad name, says the specialist. These operators usually claim that they have secret formulas that will cure ailing trees of all problems. He may drive nails into the tree or spread some "revitalizer" around them.

Several Texas electric cooperative officials will speak at a luncheon they will host for the young farmers and homemakers Friday.

Home recommends that an unbiased authority, such as the local county agricultural agent, be consulted to diagnose the tree's ailment before bargaining with people that make such claims.

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**Deep East Texas Group Confers With Parks Director in Austin**

The Deep East Texas Development Association made its third major trip in December on behalf of the 8-county area it represents. The East Texans journeyed to Austin to confer with Weldon Watson, the director of the Texas State Parks & Wildlife Commission regarding recreational facilities planned for the new State Park at Dam B.

The group was briefed by Mr. Watson on the time schedule for construction for this park and was shown scaled maps and sketches of proposed facilities. Also addressing the group was Will Odom, who is the present chairman of the commission. Mr. Odom assured those present that the money appropriated for the park during the recent session of the Legislature would be totally used during the next two years and that recommendations would be submitted to the next Legislature for further expansion of the facility.

The East Texans were led by State Senator Martin Dies, Jr. of Lufkin, author of the legislation in the Senate which made the park possible, and Representatives Sam Collins of Newton and Charles Wilson of Lufkin, who sponsored the bill in the House of Representatives. These three East Texas lawmakers have been active both in the Legislature and in the association on behalf of all East Texas development.

The delegation also included from Angelina county, H. J. Shands, Jr., Horace Stubblefield, Jr. and Arthur Bresie. Jasper county was represented by O. R. Crawford, David Henderson, Harold Havard, Johnnie McLeod and L. B. Reynolds, County Judge. Creech attended on behalf of Shelby county and D. N. Beasley, vice president of the association, represented San Augustine.

Thus far this year, the association has assisted state and federal agencies in all phases of planning for the two big reservoirs (Toledo Bend and Sam Rayburn) and has co-ordinated efforts of citizens in the local areas on these projects. In September, the association obtained a commitment from the State Highway Department to re-study the entire highway and road projection for the area and has been active with the Corps of Engineers in determining the amount of clearing to be done in the Lake Rayburn reservoir.

At last week's meeting, Mr. Beasley told Mr. Watson and Mr. Odom of the group's desire to be of service, both to the state and to the East Texas area and was assured by Mr. Watson that the East Texans would be called on many times during the immediate future for its assistance.

Funeral services for Martin Ramer, 85, a retired teacher of near Spurger, were held at 2 p. m. Sunday, December 22 in the Ramer residence.

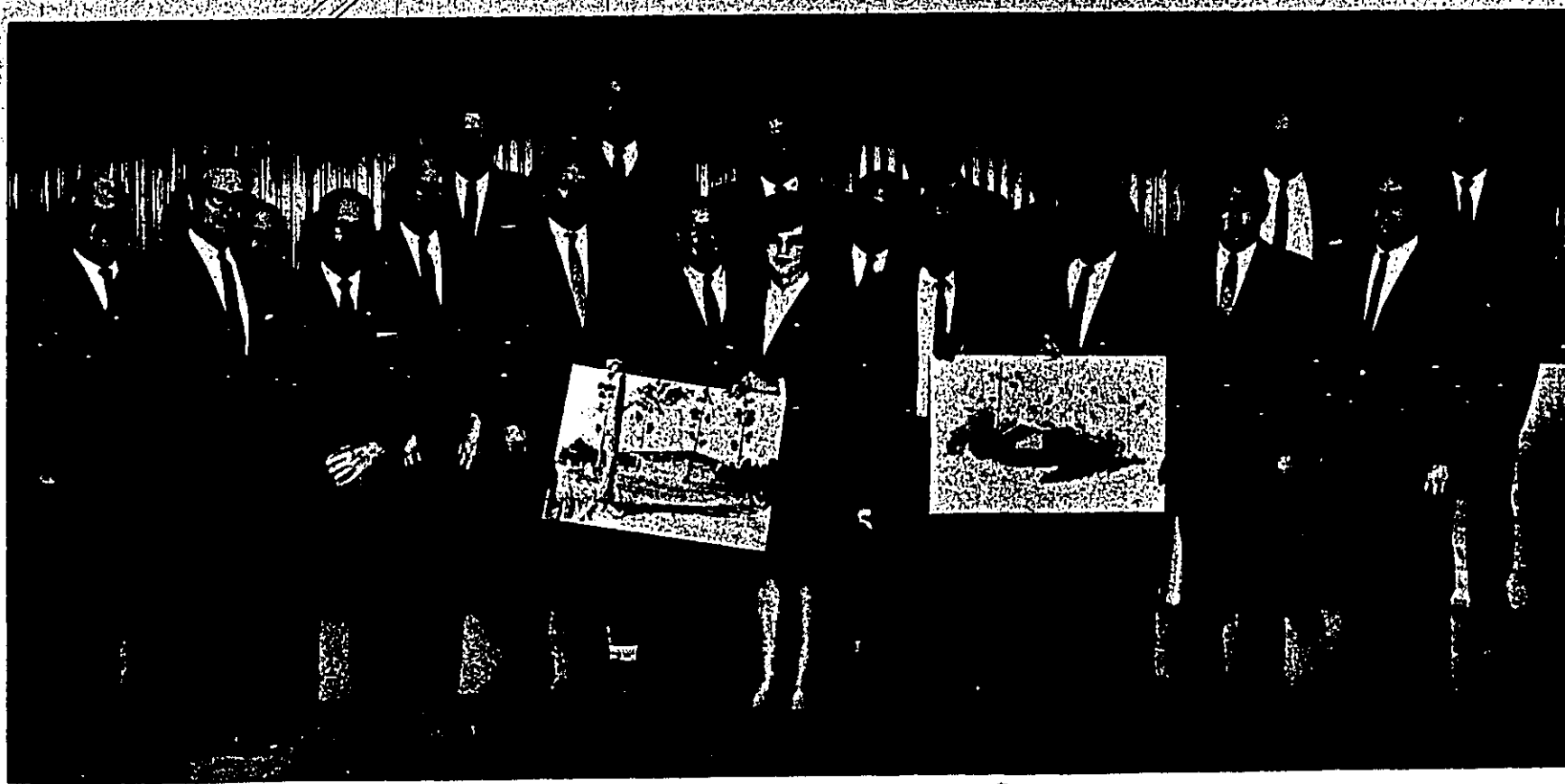

No cattleman feeds scrap iron to his cows on purpose, but it is amazing how many do it accidentally.

A tiny piece of wire or a broken nail can cost a cattleman a cow. Since cows don't chew their food thoroughly, they often swallow nails, screws, pieces of wire,

pins or other bits of metal along with their ration.

These sharp objects usually wind up in the second stomach, the honeycomb, often referred to as the "hardware bucket." They can work their way into the wall of the stomach and cause painful injury, or even into the heart and kill the animal.

A continuous campaign should be waged to pick up all small objects that cows might swallow. Don't mend stanchions with wire and if nails are lost while repairing something around the barn, find them before you go onto the next job.

Be sure to account for all baiting wire from hay and straw used in the cow barn. Also outlaw the steel brush around the feed department.

As a final precaution, offer the hired hand a few words of advice about care with small metal objects and set a good example.

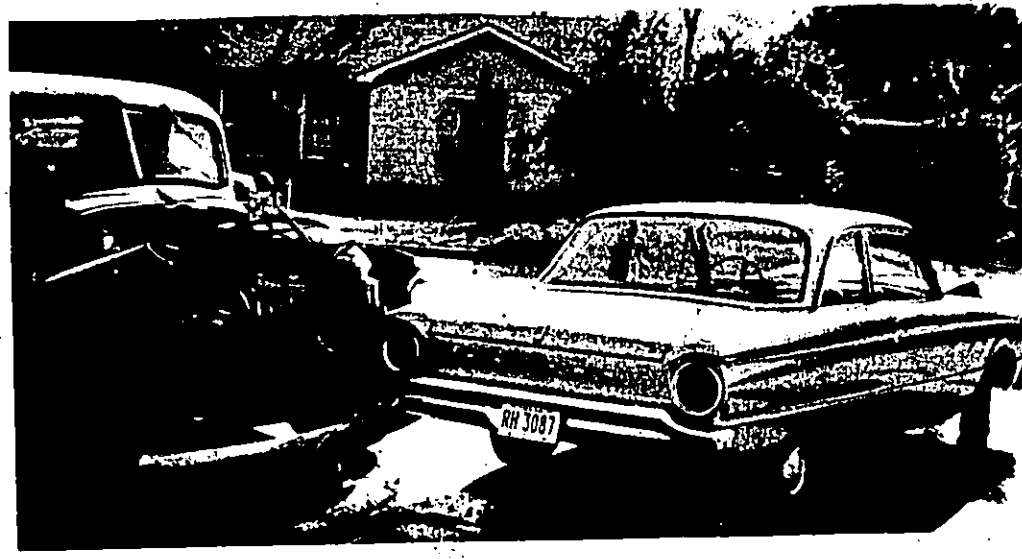

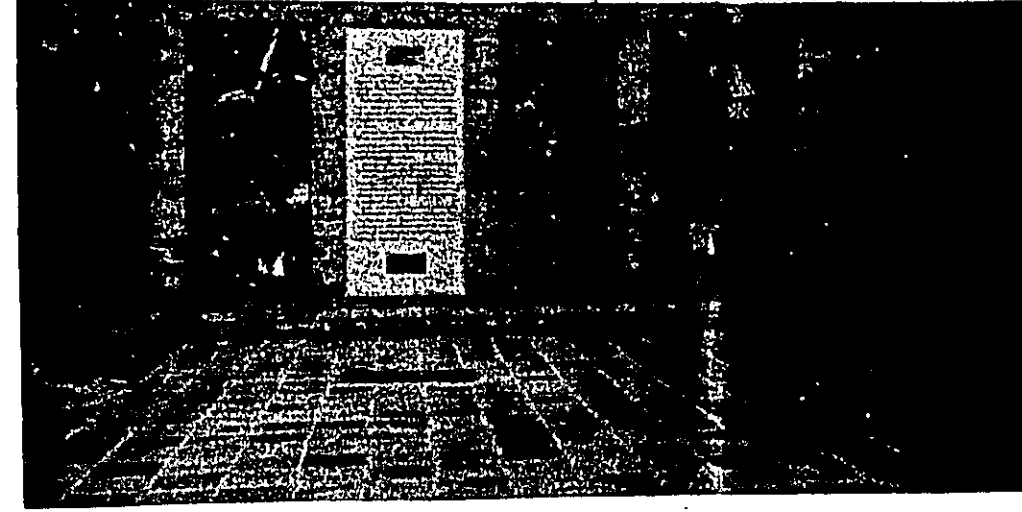

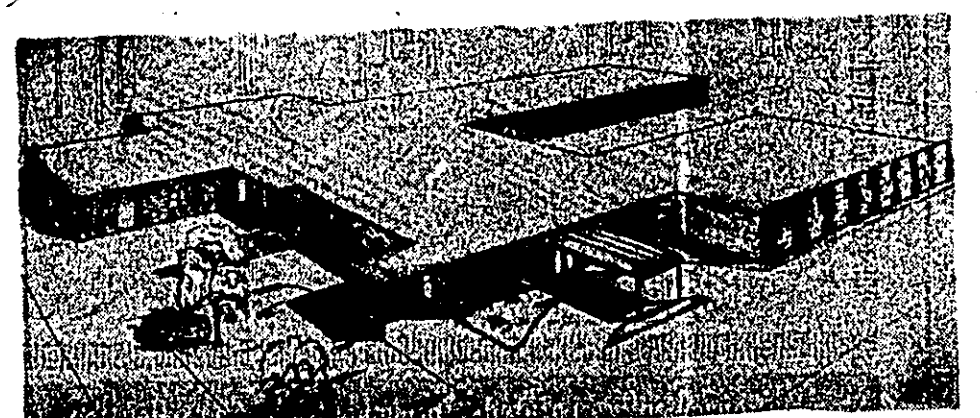

### New Jasper Hospital Ends 14-Year Dream

Jasper—A dream of 14 years will come true for Dr. Joe W. Dickerson Tuesday with groundbreaking ceremonies for the new Hardy-Hancock Hospital. Howard W. Smith (D., Va.), chairman of the House Rules Committee, will be principal speaker.

Dr. Dickerson and Dr. William S. Sanders bought the hospital in 1949 and began planning a new community hospital. Dr. Sanders was killed in 1956, and work did not begin on the new hospital until, December, 1963. The new building, with plans drawn by Erwin Olson of Beaumont, will cost more than \$500,000. It will be between Highway 74 and Jasper Youth Baseball Park. The hospital will hold 48 beds.

in 21,500 square feet. Besides a recovery room, labor room, operating room, delivery room, nursery, laboratory, X-ray rooms, there will be a minor disease area, pulmonary disease station, physical therapy area and hospitality rooms for visitors. Electronic equipment will include a remote electrocardiographic telemetry station, thermometers, laboratory equipment and an audio-visual nurse call system. Near the hospital will be a doctors' professional building with 32 examination rooms. Doctors will run a rotating duty roster. The hospital will be open to all doctors in good standing with the Jasper-New-County Medical Society.

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
