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Exception to this is the fee for state representation, which is set by the state and for state officials.

Other expenses are for ballot boxes and for the printing of precinct and county maps.

After the primary election, the county clerk will have the duty of the voter.

### Power Feature 25% Complete

Construction of an \$11,000,000 hydro-electric generator powerhouse at Rayburn Dam was 25% complete this week.

With a 200-ton Manitowoc track crane, the world's largest, placing most of the 135,000 cubic yards of concrete on the Paul Hardeman, Inc., job, completion of the power generating features and final closure of the dam is scheduled for about one year from now.

The powerhouse, seated in a hole 120 feet deep,

will house two turbines and two generators slated to produce 121,640,000 kilowatt hours of power on a production schedule of six hours per day.

The big crane hoists buckets of concrete from trucks to placement positions in the powerhouse. The concrete is mixed in a plant visible in part in the upper right of the picture which accompanies this story.

A total of 2,000,000 cubic yards of dirt was removed from the powerhouse excavation. Into it

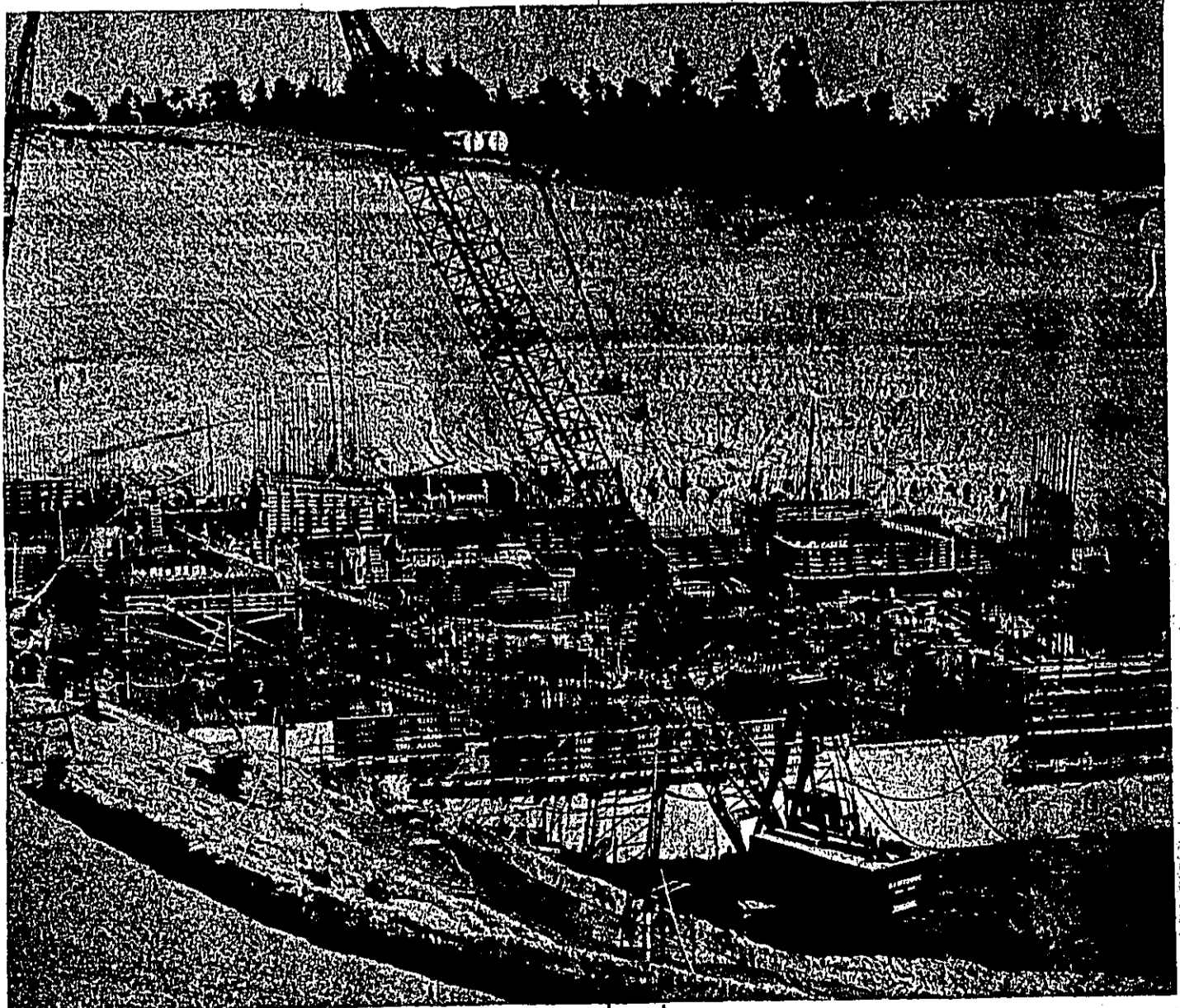

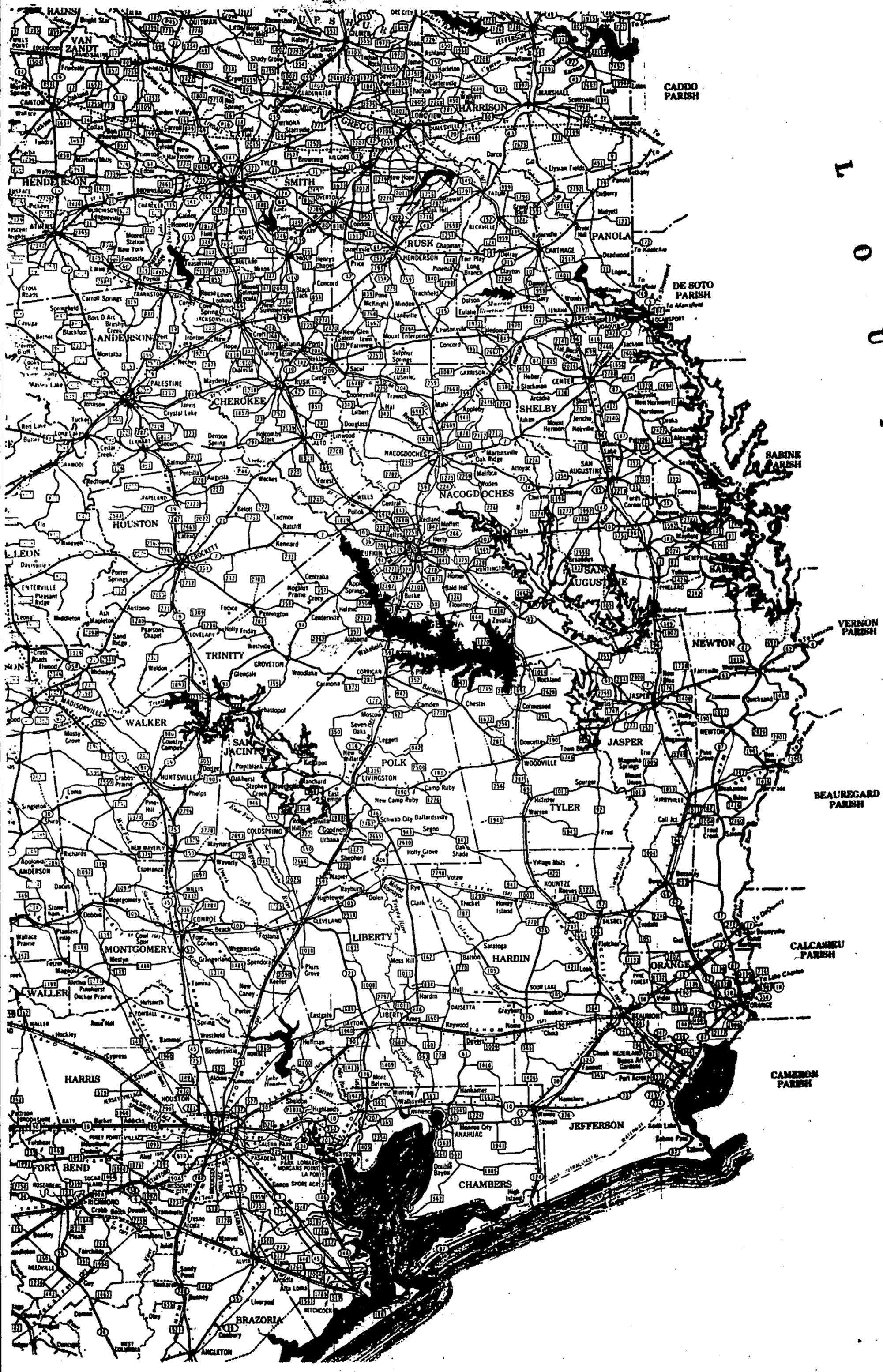

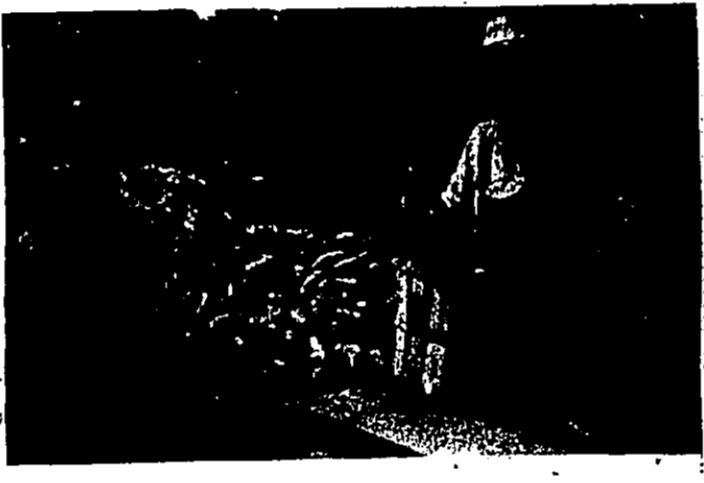

**COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN**

Highly successful eradication measures, cold weather and the need to conserve funds have prompted screwworm eradication officials to cut the production of sterile screwworm flies by 50 percent.

An average of 50 million flies per week will be reared in the weeks ahead; production had been hovering near the 140 million per week mark during the fall. Eradication workers are confident this number will be sufficient to adequately treat those areas of Texas where the native screwworms can survive the cold temperature.

The sterile flies, which are released by airplanes over screwworm infested territory, mate with native, fertile flies, but no offspring are produced. Nearly 6 million sterile flies were reared and sexually sterilized at the huge "fly factory" near Mission last year.

Eradication officials stated that the decrease in fly production, as well as a cut-back in personnel of near 175 employees, was made possible by a significant reduction in the number of screwworm infestations in the past month. At the time that the decision was made to hold back production, several weeks had elapsed with no cases being reported in any of the five states in the eradication area. Authorities also said that it is important to conserve funds now to insure that money is available to initiate emergency measures that may become necessary later in the season.

**BAD NEWS FOR COTTON BOLLWORMS**

Two of the country's most destructive insects, the cotton bollworm and the cabbage looper, have been successfully controlled by mass-produced insect viruses that are harmless to man.

Both insects are well known pests in Texas, and just ask any cotton producer about their resistance to chemicals.

Tests conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service, indicate that early season spray applications of virus will artificially induce epidemics and control the insects before they can damage crops.

Work is now under way to determine timing rates and frequency of application of the viruses.

Studies indicate only a small amount of insect virus material is needed for effective control. The scientists believe a man probably could hold enough powdered concentrate on the nail of his small finger to treat five acres. They also believe the viruses can be produced at prices farmers can afford. But, artificially produced viruses for insect control are still experimental materials and none are available for use by the public.

**Home Demonstration Agent's Column**

**CHECK YOUR FAMILY'S FOOD HABITS TO AVOID NUTRITION SHORT-CHANGING . . .**

If your food bill is staggering, if your teenagers eat you out of house and home, take heart; you have plenty of company.

Of course, no conscientious homemaker begrudges what she spends to keep her family well fed, but there's one unfortunate aspect. The cash you leave behind at the supermarket and the sheer stomach capacity of your youngsters are not sound yardsticks for judging whether your household is truly well nourished. Unfortunately, many persons because of personal likes and dislikes, or the hectic pace of modern living, simply don't eat the right kinds of food in the right quantities at the right times—no matter what foods you buy.

In the booklet, "Food Needs of Teen-agers," Frances Cook, Extension Nutritionist, University of California, College of Agriculture, says, "Between the ages of 12 and 20 poor nutrition reaches a peak. The period between 13 and 15 is the most critical. Boys, perhaps because of the amounts of food they eat, have better diets than girls. However, even the boys don't get enough calcium, iron and vitamin C."

A recent study of the eating habits of children in the 7, 9, 10, and 12th grades in Greensboro, N. C., schools, disclosed that on one particular day, 83% ate no leafy green or yellow vegetables, and 59% ate no vitamin C rich food, although 88% had one or more servings of other fruits and vegetables.

If your children or other members of your family are guilty of nutritional sins, it's time for positive actions. Here's how you can tell if they're being short changed nutritionally or not.

Adults and children alike should have specific amounts of the four basic foods every day:  
Milk—for vitamin A and D and to supply calcium for good bone and teeth development;  
Meat—for protein, iron, the A and B vitamins;

Vegetables and Fruits—especially citrus fruit, tomatoes, green leafy vegetables which are important sources of Vitamin C, a vitamin the body must replenish daily;

Whole Grain Breads and Cereals—to supply thiamine, niacin, riboflavin, and iron.  
To check up on whether your family really is getting enough of these essential nutrients, chart the amounts of "basic foods" each person needs every day and the amount actually consumed. Here is what each member of the family should eat every day before you check him off:

Milk—Teen-agers and pregnant women, 4 cups; younger children, 3 to 4 cups; adults, 2 cups; nursing mothers, six cups.  
Meat, eggs, poultry and fish—two or more servings, (dry beans, peas, and nuts may be substituted from time to time in this food group).

Fruits and Vegetables—Four or more servings, including dark-green leafy or deep yellow vegetables, citrus fruits, tomatoes and raw cabbage.  
Cereals—Four or more servings of whole grain or enriched cereal, or enriched bread.

If there are any blank spaces, somebody has missed out on a certain amount of essential vitamins, minerals, proteins, or other nutrients.

**Gulf States to Install Turbo-Generator At Sabine Power Station**

The Warren Parent-Teacher Association will meet Monday afternoon (Jan. 13) at 3:30 p. m. in the high school library. An order for a turbo-generator with a capacity of 410,000 kilowatts has been placed with General Electric Co. by the Gulf States Electric Co. The station is scheduled for completion late in 1956, will provide employment for approximately 30 craftsmen.

Addition of the 410,000 kilowatt unit at the Sabine station will bring the Gulf States system's generating capability to 2,591,000 kilowatts, more than triple the total 10 years ago. The generation will be one of the biggest ever installed in the Southwest.

"The demand for electric power in the area served by Gulf States has increased at a phenomenal pace during the last decade," Morrison said. "In the area we serve, average residential use is about 20 per cent above the national average and studies indicate the demand will continue to grow in the residential, commercial and industrial fields."

"This new unit, completion in the near future of a new 220,000 kilowatt unit at our Willow Glen station near Baton Rouge, along with agreements for power interchange over new extra high voltage transmission lines linking our system with the Tennessee Valley Authority facilities, will keep our system ahead of actual needs of new and expanding industries which require large blocks of power and of commercial and residential users," he said.
