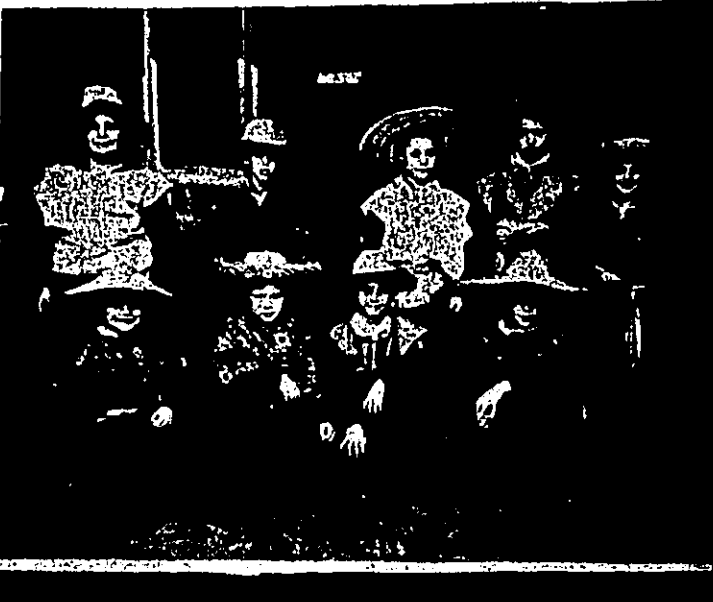

The games will be played at Kirby High Gym on February 22.

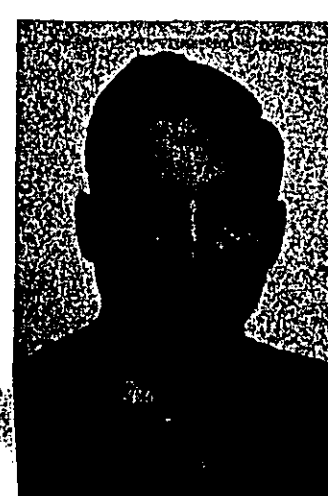
McGuire To Speak At Rotary Club

DEADLINE IS FRIDAY

Tyler County voters are reminded that a poll tax receipt is still needed in order to vote for state, county and precinct officers.

The amendment banning the poll tax as a requirement to vote applies only to federal offices such as president and vice president, U. S. Senator, and Congressman.

A poll tax receipt will enable a voter to cast a ballot for all offices, including U. S. candidates.

Voters without a poll tax receipt will be able to register to vote for federal candidates in a special registration period to be announced. They won't be qualified to vote for governor or other state officers, district offices, and county and precinct offices.

Too, a voter will need poll tax to vote in any state, county or local special election which may be called.

So—in order to be able to vote in all elections, a Texas voter still needs a poll tax receipt.

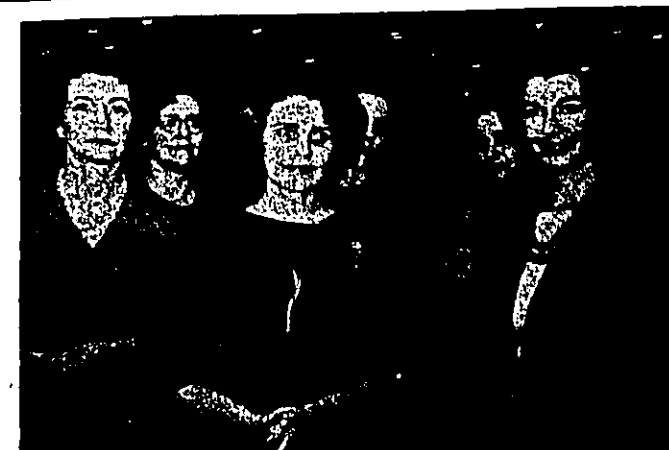
METHODIST RALLY SLATED IN BEAUMONT FEBRUARY 16

Rules Listed For Choosing Queen

Qualifications for queen and the method in which she is selected by the King's Men is shown by the official rules which are:

I. Each unmarried girl who is a member of a senior class of a Tyler County high school is eligible to be queen of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival. Any school not having at least three qualified seniors may make up the deficit from the junior class. Those junior girls may again run for queen their senior year providing they were not elected queen the previous year and meet the qualifications as seniors.

II. The method for selection of the queen shall be as follows:

(1) A committee of 30 judges shall be appointed by the Operating Committee of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival. The selection of judges shall be such that each high school community shall be represented on this committee, of 30 judges.

(2) Candidates shall register their names by February 21 at the office of the local school superintendent. These names shall be submitted by the school superintendents to Stanley L. Lindsey, Box 687, Woodville, Texas, by February 26.

(3) The preliminary judging shall be held Tuesday, March 3, and at that time the number of contestants shall be reduced to 10. This judging shall be held in the Woodville Community Inn at 7:00 p. m. Each contestant shall be dressed in street clothes for this occasion and the appearance of each contestant shall be limited to 5 minutes.

(4) The second phase of the elimination shall be held Tuesday, March 10, at the Woodville Community Inn at 7:00 p. m. and the number of candidates shall be reduced at this time to 5, one from each high school community in Tyler County. Each candidate shall have a maximum of 5 minutes to appear before the judges.

(5) Final selection for the queen of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival will be held on Tuesday, March 24, at 7:30 p. m. at the Woodville Community Inn. For this final judging, each of the 5 contestants shall be dressed in evening dresses that have met the approval of the Coronation Committee. Each of the 5 finalists will participate in the Dogwood Festival, one as queen, one as princess from Tyler County, and the other three as princesses from their respective towns. The final selection of the queen on March 24 will remain a secret until the night of the Dogwood Festival.

III. Contestants shall be judged on the basis of poise, beauty, and personality. In each judging phase, judges will vote by secret written ballot. In the final judging on March 24, five of these judges will be appointed to count the ballots and one of these 5 judges shall be from each of the high school communities of Tyler County.

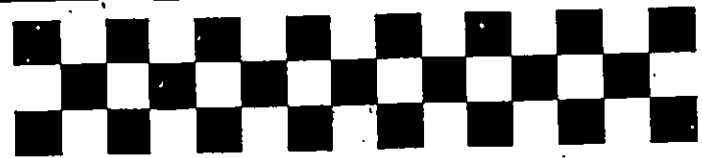

Home Demonstration Agent's Column

SAY CHEESE

Are you a label reader? If so, you've probably noticed the many different terms appearing on a label reader? If so, you've probably noticed the different terms applied to cheese and cheese products. According to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, these terms are your clue to how the cheese is made and what's in it. Here's how you can identify them:

Natural Cheese—Cheese in the original sense of the word Cheddar, Swiss, Moonster Edam, and so forth—Made by curdling or aging to develop flavor.

Pasteurized process cheese—A blend or combination of natural cheese, which has been blended by heating and melting.

Pasteurized process cheese food—A product prepared in much the same way as process cheese except that it contains less cheese and has non-fat dry milk or whey solids and water added. It may also contain pimento, fruits, vegetables or meat.

Pasteurized process cheese spread—A product containing more water than cheese food. Its milk fat content is also lower, and very often flavoring materials are added.

Club Cheese—A blend or mixture of natural cheeses which has been thoroughly mixed without heating. Flavoring ingredients and spices may also be added.

"EAT WHAT YOU CAN, AND WHAT YOU CAN'T, CAN"

If you produce your own meat or poultry, or even if you just have a hunting man in the fam-

ily, you may find that the canning season isn't over. Beef, veal, mutton, lamb, pork, poultry, and game meat may be safely canned at home by following directions in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's publication on "Home Canning of Meat."

Can only meat from healthy animals in top condition, slaughtered and handled in a sanitary way, the bulletin warns. Chill the fresh meat at once to 400 F. or lower and keep it chilled until canning time, or can it as soon as the body heat leaves it. If the meat is to be kept more than a few days, freeze it and hold at 00F. or lower.

For safe canning, meat must be heated in a steam-pressure canner. This is the only practical way to get and maintain the high temperature necessary to kill dangerous bacteria. It is not safe to can meat in a boiling-water bath, an oven, a steamer without pressure, or an open kettle.

Meat may be cooked before packing in cans or jars or it may be packed raw and cooked by heating the filled containers in boiling water before they are sealed for steam-pressure processing.

Poultry may be packed raw in quart jars and processed in the pressure canner with no previous cooking.

Be sure that cans or jars are tightly sealed before storing them. Then before opening for use, check well for signs of spoilage—leakage, gas bubbles or bulging at can ends, lid, or rubber ring.

Ask for bulletin from your County Home Demonstration Agent.

TIMBER OWNERS CAN SAVE ON TAXES

Owners of small timber acreage frequently pay more federal income tax on their wood sales than the law requires, says Bill Smith, Extension forester at Texas A & M University.

The forester says that this happens because they don't realize that sales of timber and forest products can sometimes be reported as a capital gain rather than as an ordinary income. Anyone selling standing timber, owned by them more than six months prior to the beginning of the tax year, can treat it as a capital gain, Smith explains.

Tax savings are also possible by deducting an allowance for

depletion of the owner's investment in the harvested timber, according to Smith. A woodland owner can apply for allowance for depletion no matter what kind of timber sale he makes, or whether he reports his proceeds as ordinary income or capital gain, he adds.

Timber owners who did not make a sale of timber or timber products in 1963 can also save on their tax by deducting operating expenses such as labor costs, truck, tractor, chainsaws or other equipment hired by the owner, from gross income. Any of this equipment purchased in 1963 can be depreciated as a capital expenditure, says Smith. Also the costs of gasoline, oil, machine maintenance, materials and supplies, and fees paid to tax consultants or accountants are wholly deductible, he says.

Smith suggests that federal income tax schedule "D", "Gains and losses from sale or exchanges of property," be used when receipts are reported as a capital gain. A full discussion of forest tax reporting is given in Agricultural Handbook 52, "The Small Timber Owner and His Federal Income Tax," which can be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D.C., for 20 cents per copy.

Gulf States Helps in Nuclear Research

Gulf States Utilities Company has joined with 21 other investor-owned utilities to sponsor a new research program aimed at developing an advanced type of nuclear fuel which will reduce the cost of generating electric power from the atom, Glenn Richard, GSU president, has announced.

The research and development will be carried out in San Diego, Calif., by General Atomic Division of General Dynamics, which developed the High Temperature Gas-Cooled Reactor (HTGR) for commercial power generation and the graphite-matrix uranium and thorium fuel elements used in the system.

Gulf States has long been active in supporting work toward securing electricity from the atom at a more economical rate. Mr. Richard pointed out in announcing the company's participation in this new project.

GSU has already invested heavily in atomic research being carried out by Southwest Atomic Energy Associates, High Temperature Reactor Development Associates and Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

The local utility firm will join the other 21 companies in contributing \$2,000,000 to the new program over the next two years to develop new technology and techniques which will extend the efficiency and further reduce the costs of the graphite-body HTGR fuel.

The 22 participating companies are located in 14 states and the District of Columbia.

The new fuel program is an extension of the participation of a large segment of U. S. utility industry in the design and construction of the prototype HTGR atomic power station being built at Peach Bottom, Pennsylvania, on the system of the Philadelphia Electric Company.

Gulf States and the 21 other utilities comprising the new group are among the 63 member companies of High Temperature Reactor Development Associates which since late 1958 have been supporting the developmental construction of the 40,000-kilowatt HTGR plant at Peach Bottom.

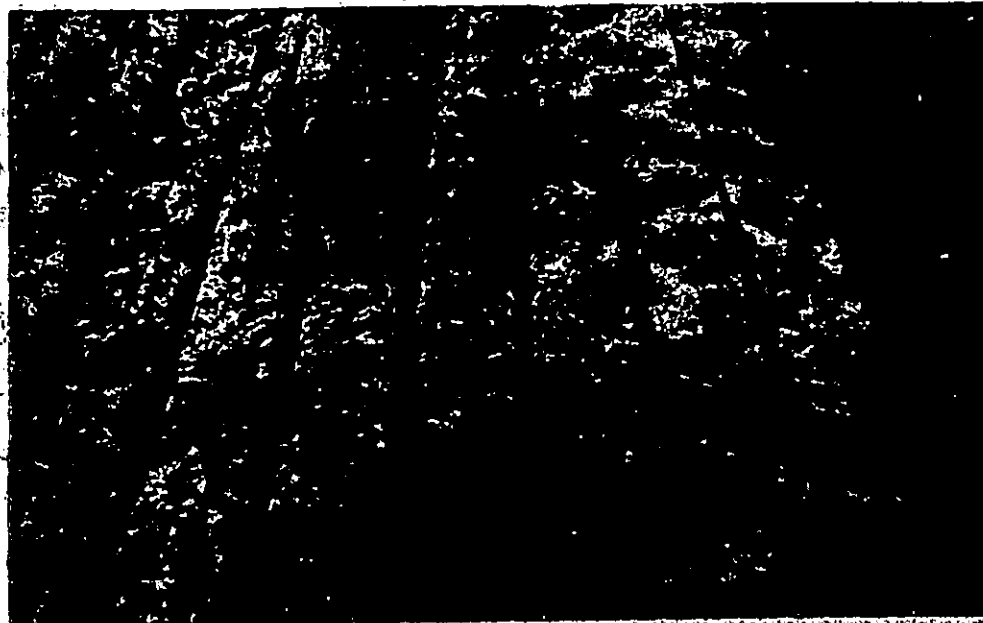

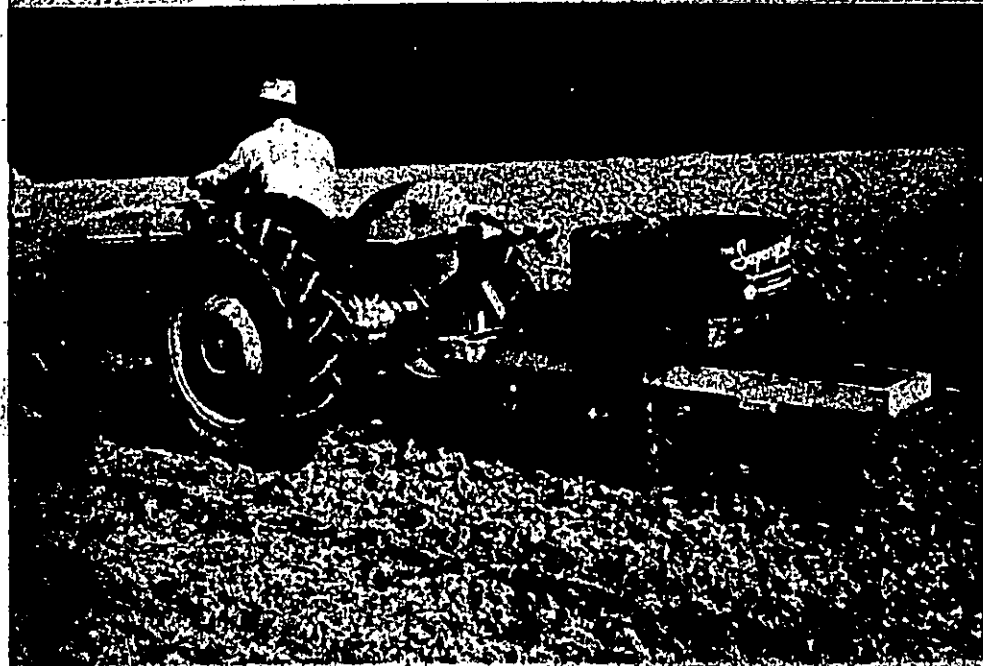

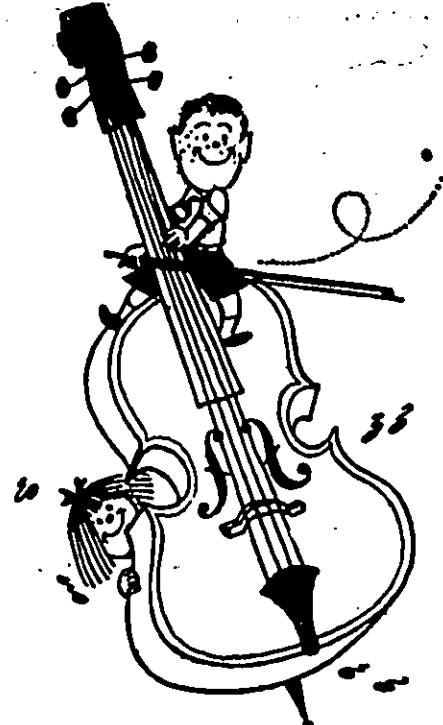
