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## DA, SHERIFF OPPONENTS FILE MONDAY

Two last-minute filings for places on the May 2 Democratic primary ballot put a candidate in the races for district attorney and sheriff.

Robert S. Coe of Kountze, a former district attorney, filed for the office held for the past four years by R. A. Richardson, also of Kountze.

In the race for sheriff of Tyler County are the incumbent, Grady Ray, and W. C. (Dub) Crews, Jr. of Colmesneil, who filed Monday afternoon.

One race in which there are plenty of candidates for voters to choose from is the District 7 State Representative position being vacated by Sam F. Collins of Newton, Seven candidates, including two from Tyler County, have entered this contest.

They are Ruth Gillespie and Joe "Bill" Kelley from Tyler County, D. B. Ferrell, Grady Trimble, Claude B. Graves, H. F. Weaver of Jasper County, and J. E. Miller, Jr. of Newton County.

Another race with a field of candidates is that for commissioner in precinct three. Five candidates have indicated a willingness to serve in this office by filing with Morris C. Clemmons, Jr., chairman of the county Democratic executive committee.

They are Leon Fowler, C. Edd Cruse, H. A. Crews, Ray Bandy and Thomas A. Hayes.

A three-way contest for the precinct one commissioner has been on the books for several weeks, and no last-minute filing changed it.

It is still Carl Shepherd, Joe L. Best and Howard L. Riley, the incumbent, in this race.

Another three-way race in which no one made a late filing is the one for county tax assessor and collector.

A. L. (Pete) Thornton, incumbent, is opposed by V. D. (Ted) Tidwell and Herbert Dean.

Clyde E. Smith, Jr., county attorney, is unopposed for re-election.

Cecil Barnes is the lone candidate for county surveyor.

J. H. Loggins, appointed precinct one justice of the peace a few months ago when P. R. Smith resigned because of ill health, is unopposed for a full term.

In precinct three, L. L. Parrish is unopposed for justice of the peace. In the constable's race in this precinct, Ralph Marshall is opposed by Harley Crews.

Filing for the other precinct constables without opposition were Jack Haynes in precinct one, Jeff Lamb in precinct 2, and C. B. Hicks in precinct 4. Precinct chairmen will also be elected in the primary.

## H. Fletcher Weaver Enters Race For State Representative, Dist. 7



H. Fletcher Weaver, of Kirbyville, Jasper County, formally announces his candidacy for State Representative District 7, comprising Jasper, Newton, Sabine and Tyler Counties.

Mr. Weaver is a native East Texas, 55 years old, married to Addie Williamson of Orange. He has one daughter and one grandson. He has lived in Jasper and Newton Counties most of his life.

He finished high school at Kirbyville High School. His first two years of college was in South Park Junior College (now Lamar Tech) finishing at the University of Texas.

He was a teacher and principal of Jasper Junior High School for 13 years prior to entering the service (Army) in 1942, as a Private. He retired from active Reserves, in March 1963, as a Lt. Colonel.

He has been active in community and county service since 1931. He has operated a business in Kirbyville for the last 14 years. He has served two terms as president of Chamber of Commerce, is a member of the Kirbyville Lions Club, and commander of the Club, and commander of the American Legion Post, 465. He is a Methodist and a teacher of the Beeler Bible Class.

Mr. Weaver says he is in this race to win, has a vital interest in seeing deep East Texas "come into her own", and will serve you honestly and well.

## Robert S. Coe Enters District Attorney Race

Robert S. Coe of Kountze has announced his candidacy for a second term as district attorney of the 88th judicial district of Hardin and Tyler counties. He was first elected district attorney in 1958 and served until 1961. He said he believes that his record as district attorney and his cooperation with law enforcement officers of Hardin and Tyler counties justify a second term.

Mr. Coe is 49 years old. He is married and he and Mrs. Coe own their own home in Kountze. A son John Coe, is a Houston attorney. A daughter, Larkin, is the wife of Dr. Allen Hooks of Kountze.

Mr. Coe is a native of Hardin county, a son of the late Judge Thomas B. Coe, who was chief justice of the 9th court of civil appeals, Beaumont, when he died in 1963. Previously Judge Coe was judge of the old 75th judicial district including Hardin, Tyler, Chambers and Liberty counties.

Robert S. Coe is a purple heart veteran of World War II. He was wounded twice, in the Normandy invasion and in the breakthrough in the Belgian Bulge. He was honorably discharged from the army in 1945 with a 40 per cent disability due to his wounds.

Mr. Coe said that while he was district attorney in his first term, he maintained a telephone at his home and drove his own car and was available to officers day or night in both Tyler and Hardin counties, and that he will continue to maintain these necessary requirements for district attorney.

He said that he will continue to cooperate with law enforcement officers of the district to the fullest extent in order to obtain fair and impartial and successful prosecution. "I have always emphasized that cooperation with peace officers and grand juries is vital and that is the reason I give them complete loyalty and assistance."

Mr. Coe is a member of the Methodist church and a member of the official board. He said that he does not drink and quit smoking a year ago—"at least temporarily."

Mr. Coe emphasized that if elected he will not treat Tyler county as "the proverbial stepchild," but will work wholeheartedly with Tyler law enforcement officers and judges.

Mr. Dean is 49 years old, is married and has four children. He worked for Farmers Feed and Supply for 13 years as a salesman and broiler supervisor.

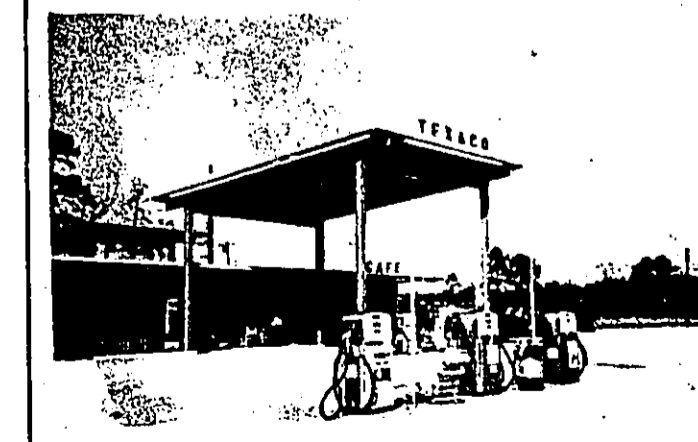

MOONEY EXPLAINS USE OF COUNTY WORKING MATERIAL

"the Capitol Tax Letter" published several letters concerning the use of county equipment on private property.

The attorney general has ruled in official opinions on occasions that it is illegal to use county road machinery on private property. All of these opinions spell out in very clear terms that the Commissioners Courts have no authority, whether with or without compensation, to use or permit to be used county-owned equipment upon private property, except for soil conservation work as provided for in Article 2372 C, Vernon's Civil Statutes.

Please do not ask your Commissioner to violate this law. An injunction may be filed against him for this violation, and he could go to jail for this contempt.

Commissioners Court met Thursday, January 23, and had a lengthy discussion concerning delinquent taxes.

These taxes must be paid. It seems we have no choice but to hire a tax attorney to make these collections.

Chocolate Drops

1 1/2 cups sugar 4 tablespoons cocoa 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup milk 2 1/2 cups quick cooking oatmeal 1 tablespoon butter 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup pecans

In a saucepan mix the sugar, cocoa, salt, and milk. Bring to a boil and boil hard one minute. Have ready the other ingredients mixed with the oatmeal and mix lightly into the chocolate sirup until blended. Drop onto waxed paper to cool.

Pecan halves make these no bake oatmeal cookies a delicious tidbit as good as fudge.

tiny". Most of W. H. Auden's "Selected Poetry" is involved with the world around him, with human insensitivity to suffering and injustice, with the problems of finding meaningful patterns in the mosaic of personal and social events.

Home Demonstration Agent's Column

More and more households have two incomes these days. Half the married women will be wage earners outside the home by 1970, according to research findings and projections.

Working wives require after-hours for shopping. Many stores are open from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m. now, and more will be remaining open later in the future, if present trends continue.

Families with working wives spend about 20 percent more on food, so store managers offer wider ranges of selection and better quality products. They are being audited by more luxury items and more processed, ready-prepared, pre-cooled

foods which have found favor with busy homemakers.

The food buyer, whether working away from home or not, is "boss" of the marketing system. Her food selections determine whether or not foods will continue to be offered at the going price, form and amount.

RESEARCH IMPROVED COTTON BATTING

A new process cotton batting is being watched with interest by industry representatives and manufacturers.

Two private batting manufacturers already are making the improved materials in pilot plants and reportedly are almost ready to move into full-scale production.

Construction involves spraying successive layers of cotton web with mixtures of latex and

resin, then curing the completed batt with heat. Some compounds used for finishing fabrics could not be used because of persistent odors. While the fabrics can be washed to remove the odors, the batting cannot be washed.

The government holds public service patents on the new process, and for this reason it is available to the industry. Results of the resin-latex treatment came after only two years of research and development. This was done by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the National Cotton Council, National Cotton Batting Institute and other related groups.

Researchers say the additional costs added by the treatment would be offset, since the new material has greater resiliency and allows the same amount of comfort as the old batting with the use of 20% less material. The batting was developed at the Council's Southern Regional Research Laboratory in New Orleans. The automobile industry has shown an interest in the new batting as an upholstery material that could improve car-seat quality. This new batting may also be good for upholstery materials.

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

Tyler County participants in the 1964 Feed Grain Program can receive advance payments on their diverted acres.

Under this voluntary program, producers receive payments for diverting corn, barley and grain sorghum acres to conservation uses. These payments are based on the farm's established normal yield and the county's total price support rate.

Producers can get up to one-half of this payment when they sign up for the program at the county ASCS office. Final division payment for taking feed grain acreage out of production will be about September 1. Producers have a choice of receiving payment as a certificate that can be redeemed in grain or as a sight draft cashable at any bank.

Sign-up time for this year's program is set for February 10 through March 27. It is suggested that the feed grain producers check with the Tyler County ASCS office for more details about the program.

Between 1947 and the spring of 1962 farmland values in the U. S. rose 83 per cent.

The value of farmland increased a third after 1953 while the net income of farmers changed very little. Thus farm real estate prices increased to about 10 times net income per acre by 1959, as compared to six times the net income per acre in 1950-54.

HORSES ARE WHERE THE PEOPLE ARE

The horses of Texas are moving from the ranges and farms to the cities, says Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Today horses are found predominantly where the people of the state are concentrated, he says.

The specialist points out that while horse numbers in Texas and the U. S. as a whole, show a decline, the ones that remain are being concentrated in certain areas. With the exception of the large cattle ranches which use horses for working cattle, the primary concentration of horses is near the metropolitan areas of the state. The counties with the largest numbers are: Kleberg, Harris, Tarrant, Washington, and Brazoria.

The specialist says that riding stables, 4-H Horse Clubs and just owning a horse, have become popular with the city dwellers of the state.

Texas' love for horses has made them worth \$1 million dollars, and amount larger than the farm value of hogs, or goats or even mohair production, says Uvacek.

Dr. John Larsen, Extension Horticulturist and Vegetable Specialist, from Texas A. & M. University, will be the guest speaker at a Truck Farmers Meeting, Thursday, February 6, at 7:00 p. m. This meeting will be held at the Tyler County Court House. All truck farmers and home gardeners are invited to attend this meeting.

Mr. Tom Bowers, Pasture Specialist, with the Texas Education Agency, located at Texas A. & M. University, will conduct a pasture school, February 10, 11, 12, and 13, at 7:00 p. m. each night in the Vocational Agricultural Classroom of the Woodville School. Mr. Bowers, served as Assistant County Agricultural Agent in Cherokee County and County Agricultural Agent in Leon County for about 10 years before going with the Texas Education Agency in 1962.

The Tyler County Young Farmers organization is sponsoring the pasture school. All farmers are invited to attend.

RADIOACTIVE FALLOUT ITS DANGERS AND EFFECTS.

When a nuclear weapon explodes on the surface of the earth, thousands of tons of dirt and debris are lifted into the mushroom cloud. This material mixes with radioactive elements produced during the explosion and forms radioactive fallout. This dust-like material is carried by the winds and can contaminate thousands of square miles downwind. The first particles of fallout usually require from 30 to 45 minutes to reach the

ground and almost all has fallen within 24 hours. Two types of radiation are produced by the elements in fallout--Gamma Rays and Beta Particles.

Gamma rays are like X-rays and can penetrate deep into most materials including our body. When they do, they destroy our damage living cells. If enough cells are injured, that is fit the radiation count is high enough, people or animals sicken, perhaps die, depending on the amount of radiation received. Gamma rays, however, do not damage or make food and water radioactive when passing through it.

Beta particles, the other hazard, can be stopped by the thickness of clothing. However, if these particles come in direct contact with bare areas of the body, severe burns

will result. The major concern is to keep this type of radiation out of your body. For this reason, contaminated food and water, that is food and water with beta particles on or in it, should not be consumed.

Nuclear radiation is measured in terms of roentgens. Since a total dose of 200 roentgens over a 36 hour period would make most people ill and a dose of 450 roentgens will result in many deaths, it is apparent that avoidance of high intensity radiation is imperative.

How to protect ourselves from radiation will follow in this series.

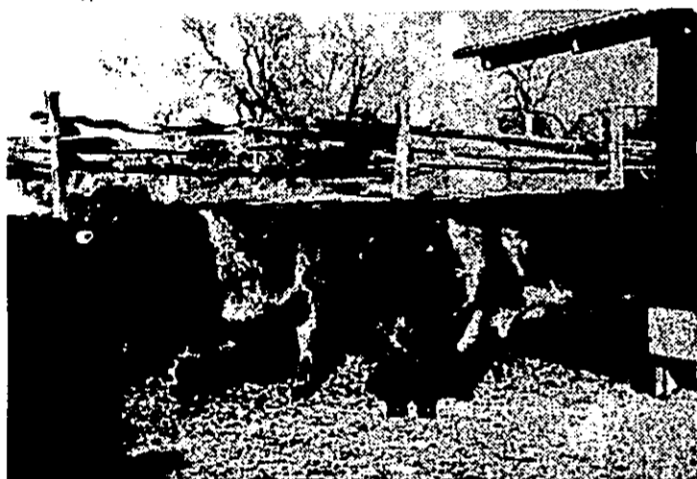
