

How water helps change pulpwood into paper

At Southland, much water is required to change wood into pulp, and pulp luto paper.

In the Groundwood Pulp Mill, a sonatant spray of water must be maintained upon the large grindstones which grind sticks of wood into a pulp. The water cools the grandstones and carries the pulp on to

the next operation. In the Chemical Pulp Mill, much water is used in "washing" the tiny fibers which remain after chipped wood has been cooked into a pulp.

In the Paper Mill, at Il more water is used to thin the pulp, preparing it for its Journey through the block-long papermaking machines

These operations at Southland making pulp and making paper, require about 20 million gallons of water a day.

This is a lat of water But it would take still more were it not for Bouthland's extensive re use equipment which permits the use of the same water over and over many times.

nciple in protection from fallout. Radioactivity from a nuclear weapon begins to lose its energy soon after the explosion through the process known as radioactive decay. A formula, important in determining decay, is that with a seven-fold increase in time there is a ten-fold decrease in dose rate. For example, if one hour after a blast the radiation intensity measures 1,000 roentgens per hour, it will decay to 100 roentgens per hour in seven hours. In 49 hours it will decrease to 10 roemgens per hour, and in 343 hours, or about two weeks, it will decay to 1 roemgen. Thus it

would be safe to leave shelter

after two weeks. Shielding is the third principle of protection from radiation. Deme, heavy material is needed to stop gamma radiation but any material placed between people and the radiation offers some protection. All these materials offer about the same amount of protection. Three feet of earth, 24 inches of concrete, 2 inches of lead, and 90 inches of wood, give excellent protection. Shielding is really the only offective method of protection from radiation, and everyone, should have some type of fallout shelter.

water in the washer tub. In fact, wash water temperature of 150 to 160 degrees F. is preferable for these items. Water temperature no higher than 90 to 105 degrees should be used for silks, woolens, certain synthetics and non-colorfast cottons.

If you automatic water heater isn't delivering hot water up to laundry standards, have your dealer check it. He is qualified to make necessary adjustments. If your family has increased in number, or if you have added a bathroom, or even an automatic dishwasher since you installed your heater it may no longer be the proper size for this heavier femand for hot water.

Frequently, an inadequate amount of detergent is the cause of vellowing of clothes, but it can also be caused by impurities in the water. Iron in the water is a well known offender.

Laundry experts say that graying and yellowing are not caused by too much detergent. However, washing action in front-loading machines and washer-dryer combinations can be hampered by excessive suds. That's why low sudsing detergents are recommended.

2. How can grayness be re-

Try conditioning gray-looking clothes in the washer. Do this by es should be washed in water of hot water and no soap or deterat least 140 degrees F. And that gent. However, add a double means the temperature of the measure of a good water con-

ditioner and run the clothes threough a full washing cycle. If nocessary, repeat this conditioning. When doing your regular laundry, graying of white clothes can be prevented by careful measuring of soap or detergent, and addition of a water conditioner to the first rinse. Temeinber too that clothes are whiter and brighter when washed in soft water, and they require less soap or detergent. Of course you must avoid the incorrect practices mentioned above to prevent graying.

3. On the farms and ranches, clothes stains frequently come from grease or from grass or other foliage. How can they be removed?

Grease stains respond to various reatments. You can give greasy clothes a five-minute washing in hot water and a full measure of detergent. Follow this prevash with a regular wash cycle, using . fresh water and detergent, Very greasy clothes require extra detergent. Grease can also be removed from clothes by adding household ammonia to the fresh water. Using 2/3 cup per 10 gallons of water. Some homemakers rub detergent into grease stains and then rinse in hot water, or you can sponge grease stains with household grease solvent.

Grass and foliage stains should be removed as promptly as possible. Applying detergent to the stain and rinsing is usually offective, you can sponge the stain with alcohol if the washable item is colorfast. Stubborn stains can be treated with a chlorine or sodium perborate bleach. Grass stains may also be removed by ipplying lemon juice, followed by exposure to the sun. After pretreatment, clothes should be washed in the regular manner.

When repairing a building constructed of wood and damaged by decay, first determine the source of moisture that caused the decay and, if possible, eliminate it.

This advice comes from Extension agricultural engineers at Texas A & M University, who explain that to decay, wood must ontain moisture. Decay, they d is actually caused by fungi hich grow and carry on their destructive life processes only when sufficient moisture is pre-

To prevent further damage, replace the decayed parts with wood that has been treated with a preservative, advise the engineers. Brushing, spraying or soaking wood with a preservative is a good practice if the wood is subjected to only an occasional wetting. Where the wood is subjected to constant moisture, the engineer recommend the use_of

FHA Texas Rural Loans Total \$74,526,000

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration made or insured \$741/2 million in loans to Texas farm and other rural families, during 1963, L. J. Cappleman, state director of the agency accounced in Temple today.

A total of 11,977 families used one or more of the agency's loan programs during the year. .

Farmers Home Administration operates a broad program of supplementary credit for rural development in Texas.

The agency makes loans for family farming operations, farm development, rural housing, community water systems, soil and water conservation and development, recreation enterprises, and other purposes. Loans are made only to borrowers

who cannot obtain credit from banks, Production Credit Associations, and other conventional

Mr. Cappleman reported that in 963 Farmers Home Administration supervised loan programs had two major results of importance to the economy of the state.

"Loans to family farmers enabled them to make a major contribution to the well being and progress of the state's agriculture during 1963, "he said, "Capital and management as-

sostamce supplied by Farmer Home Administration to its borrowers helped them develop and enlarge their farms, operate more efficiently, and build a sound farming business.

"In addition, Farmers Home Administration loan services for the broader rural community resulted in new homes and better rural neighborhoods in many parts of the state. These services of Farmers Home Administration were expanded in 1963. We believe they will continue to grow in line with increased emphasis of national and state leaders on rural and area development pro-

grams, "Mr. Cappleman said." Mr. Cappleman gave the following breakdown of FHA's loan programs in Texas for 1963. A total of \$35,000,000 went to 6,755 Texas farmers to pay for

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
