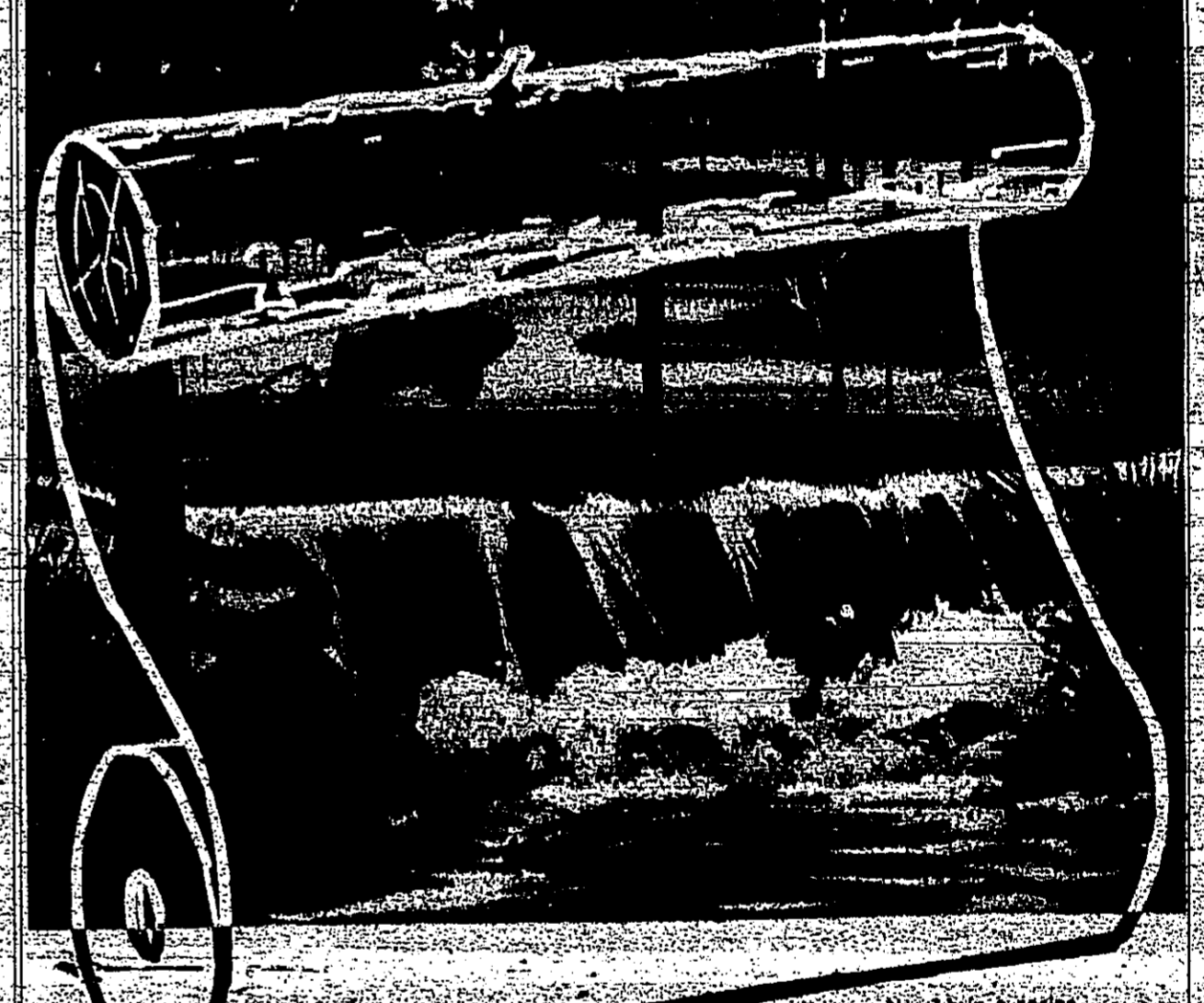

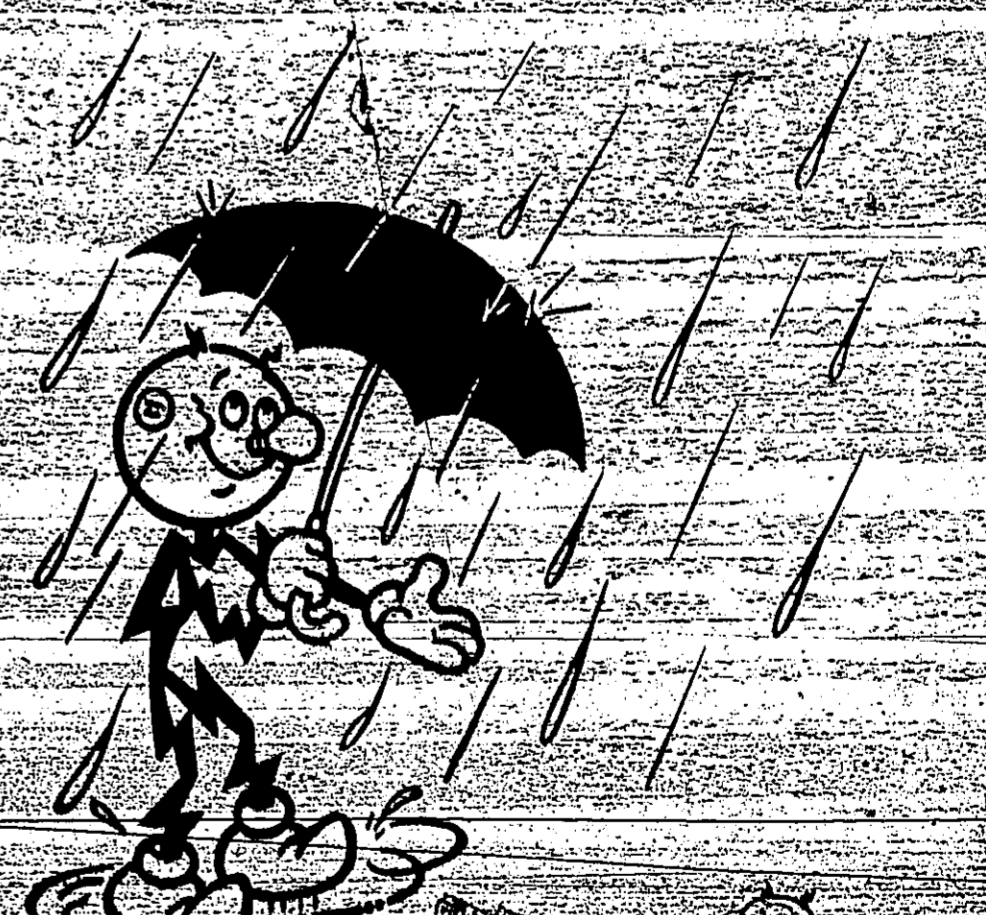

## Bond Election For School Set

A \$250,000 school bond election was called for February 22 by the Woodville school board at its meeting Monday night.

The funds are needed to construct an elementary building at the Scott school and to add several classrooms at the Woodville white school.

The recent evaluation of the Woodville schools by a committee of 60 educators pinpointed the Scott elementary building as the school district's most urgent need. Additional classrooms at the white school to care for the growing enrollment, while not as urgent as the Scott building at the present time, are already needed and could become critically necessary soon to maintain an accredited program.

The election will be held in the Woodville elementary school building.

## Court Buys Auto And Truck

Tyler County Commissioners Court in its regular meeting Monday opened bids on a car for the sheriff's department and a truck for precinct two.

The bid of Tyler County Motor Company was low on the car and Howard Motor Company had the low bid on the truck.

Tyler County Motor Company submitted a bid of \$1978.81 for the sheriff's car, this representing the net cost after trade-in of the old car.

Other bids were from Ogden Chevrolet Co., \$2246.00; Howard Motor Co., \$2214.10; A & M Motor Co. for a Plymouth, \$2384.90, and A & M Motor Co. on a Pontiac, \$2604.77.

Howard Motor Company's low bid on the truck was \$2503.82 for an 8 cylinder Chevrolet. Other bids on 8 cylinder trucks were Ogden Chevrolet \$2750; Tyler County Motor Co., \$2698.80 and A & M Motor Co., \$2692.15.

Eldon Easley, administrator of Tyler County Hospital, appeared before the commissioners for authorization of minor expenditures on the hospital building. He reported that Temple Associates were nearing completion of the hospital additions and that final inspection will be made in two or three weeks.

Mr. Easley also said that the hospital had received \$3599.70 in donations and that \$2400 more had been designated but not yet received. He pointed out that the hospital can receive matching funds up to \$5000 on these donations.

County Judge Jeff Mooney told the commissioners that he had received a price of \$2858 for repainting the masonry and painting

and waterproofing the exterior of the courthouse. Leaks and cracks are causing considerable damage to the building, he said.

The commissioners voted to advertise for bids on the repairs. All commissioners were present for the meeting.

## City Council Hires Night Patrolman

The city council at its regular meeting Monday night voted to employ a night patrolman and to have the city's engineers make a survey of the water system to determine the needs and estimated cost to give the city an adequate water supply and efficient distribution system.

Aaron Dean, presently employ-

ed at J. O. Best Service Station, was employed as the new night patrolman to replace B. J. Vardeman, who has been appointed as a deputy sheriff. Mr. Dean formerly was employed by Farmers Feed for several years.

Raymond Cowart, who has been filling in as night patrolman following Mr. Vardeman's resigna-

tion, had also applied for the position.

The council also heard a report that contractors on the construction of the city sewer system are near the end of the job. Rhodes construction Company was expected to finish laying pipe on Tuesday and would only have its cleanup and replacing of damaged streets to finish its part of the construction.

Navajo Construction Company, with a larger part of the contract, also was nearing completion on the project.

The council found itself in the unusual position of having money left over from the sewer project. Of the \$286,000 available from the bond issue and matching Accelerated Public Works grant, the city still has not sold \$40,000 in bonds and will have about \$20,000 left from those sold.

Discussion Monday night centered around using this money to start improvements on the city water system.

However, Councilman Gordon Anderson pointed out that it will take around \$200,000 to improve the water system, and that the city has not sold \$40,000 in bonds and will have about \$20,000 left from those sold.

Anderson said that the water system needed to be improved, since it was inadequate and was jeopardizing the city fire insurance rates. Greatly needed is a 150,000 gallon storage tank and another deep well to meet the emergency requirements of the fire underwriters.

City Secretary Roli Brockman said a good many complaints are being made about the "muddy" condition of the water.

Mayor E. W. Gassiot said that the city could probably get the Accelerated Public Works grant of matching funds on the water system.

The council voted to ask the city's engineers, Charles R. Halle, for an estimate on the cost of a survey on the city water works.

The council also set the date for the city election for April 7. Filing deadline for candidates is March 7.

The terms of Mayor Gassiot, Jim Freeman and Gordon Anderson expire this year.

## H. A. CREWS TO SEEK SECOND TERMS AS COMMISSIONER

H. A. Crews, who is serving his first elective term as commissioner of precinct three, has announced that he will be a candidate for re-election to a second term.

Mr. Crews has spent a lifetime in precinct three and is known personally by most of the voters in the precinct. He has owned and operated his own business and this experience enables him to efficiently and economically handle the business of his district and assist the other commissioners in carrying on the business of the county.

Mr. Crews said that his only promise is to faithfully perform the duties of his office in a most efficient and economical manner for the benefit of all the people of the precinct.

## Demos Set Fees For Office

A budget of \$3583.00 for conducting the two Democratic primary elections was adopted at a meeting of the Tyler County Democratic Executive Committee at a meeting Monday afternoon.

Morris Clemmons, chairman, stated that this would be divided proportionally among the candidates to amount to 3.1 per cent of their annual salary.

Assessed the largest fees are the county offices and county commissioners. Based on an annual salary of \$8,750.00, their fees come to \$209.25 each. This includes the seekers of the office of County Attorney (1) Sheriff (2) Tax Assessor and Collector (3) and Commissioner of Precinct One (3) and of Precinct Three (5).

Fee assessment for district judge is 3.1 percent of half of his annual salary of \$12,000, or \$186. For district attorney, with two in the race, each assessed on half of annual salary of \$7,500 or \$116.25. Two counties in the 88th District.

Justice of the Peace, precinct one, based on three year average salary of \$4,200 and assessment of \$130.20.

U. S. Representative, or one ninth (counties served) of annual salary of \$22,500.00 come to \$86.80.

All other offices were assessed \$10.00.

Saturday, February 15, is the final day of paying these assessments to the County Democratic Chairman. Major cost of conducting the primary elections is salaries paid for clerical help. This was estimated to come to \$2,136.00. Other expenses are the printing of ballots and supplies, delivery and return of boxes, poll lists, committee meeting expense, absentee voting.

Several other items of Texas heritage interest have been donated to the Garden.

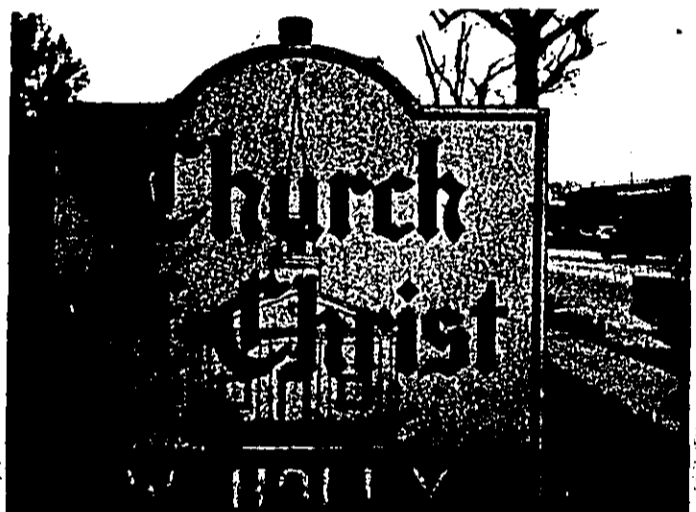

### PROTECTION FROM RADIOACTIVE FALLOUT

A nuclear bomb is a fearful and devastating weapon. However, should our nation be attacked with this weapon, the greatest danger and our greatest need for protection, would be from radioactive fallout.

Protection from nuclear fallout entails three general principles. They are distance, time, and shielding. The principle of distance is simply that the greater the distance from the source of radiation, the greater the protection. When this distance is doubled the intensity of the radiation is reduced to 1/4 and with three times the distance it is reduced to 1/9th.

Time is another important principle in protection from fallout. Radioactivity from a nuclear weapon begins to lose its energy soon after the explosion through the process known as radioactive decay. A formula, important in determining decay, is that with a seven-fold increase in time there is a ten-fold decrease in dose rate. For example, if one hour after a blast the radiation intensity measures 1,000 roentgens per hour, it will decay to 100 roentgens per hour in seven hours. In 49 hours it will decrease to 10 roentgens per hour, and in 343 hours, or about two weeks, it will decay to 1 roentgen. Thus it would be safe to leave shelter after two weeks.

Shielding is the third principle of protection from radiation. Dense, heavy material is needed to stop gamma radiation but any material placed between people and the radiation offers some protection. All these materials offer about the same amount of protection. Three feet of earth, 24 inches of concrete, 2 inches of lead, and 80 inches of wood, give excellent protection.

Shielding is really the only effective method of protection from radiation, and everyone should have some type of fallout shelter. These shelters will be discussed in future articles on civil defense.

### SIMPLE REMEDIES OFTEN SOLVE LAUNDRY PROBLEMS

A new homemaker remarked to her neighbor: "It's easy to do the laundry, but poor results are biggest problems." It's true that modern automatic home laundry equipment makes a breeze of washdays. And now detailed laundry instructions are even printed on soap and detergent boxes. So what causes poor laundry results such as graying and yellowing of clothes, incomplete removal of stain and soil, and others?

Let's look at some of the most common laundry problems and their solutions:

1. What causes clothes to become gray and yellow?

Graying is most frequently caused by incomplete removal of soil, or what is commonly called "dirtbackwash." The latter means that soil removed from clothes is redeposited while clothes are swirling around in the wash water. Factors contributing to graying are not enough detergent, overloading the washer, improper sorting before washing, and too low water temperature.

You're asking for trouble if you wash dark non-colorfast items with lighter clothes, or wash an oil-soiled item with other clothes in water that isn't hot enough. White and light colorfast clothes should be washed in water of at least 140 degrees F. And that means the temperature of the

water in the washer tub. In fact, wash water temperature of 150 to 180 degrees F. is preferable for these items. Water temperature no higher than 90 to 108 degrees should be used for silks, woolsens, certain synthetics and non-colorfast cottons.

If you automatic water heater isn't delivering hot water up to laundry standards, have your dealer check it. He is qualified to make necessary adjustments. If your family has increased in number, or if you have added a bathroom, or even an automatic dishwasher since you installed your heater it may no longer be the proper size for this heavier demand for hot water.

Frequently, an inadequate amount of detergent is the cause of yellowing of clothes, but it can also be caused by impurities in the water. Iron in the water is a well known offender.

Laundry experts say that graying and yellowing are not caused by too much detergent. However, washing action in front-loading machines and washer-dryer combinations can be hampered by excessive suds. That's why low sudsing detergents are recommended.

2. How can grayness be removed?

Try conditioning gray-looking clothes in the washer. Do this by hot water and no soap or detergent. However, add a double measure of a good water con-

ditioner and run the clothes through a full washing cycle. If necessary, repeat this conditioning. When doing your regular laundry, graying of white clothes can be prevented by careful measuring of soap or detergent, and addition of a water conditioner to the first rinse. Remember too that clothes are whiter and brighter when washed in soft water, and they require less soap or detergent. Of course you must avoid the incorrect practices mentioned above to prevent graying.

3. On the farms and ranches, clothes stains frequently come from grease or from grass or other foliage. How can they be removed?

Grease stains respond to various treatments. You can give greasy clothes a five-minute washing in hot water and a full measure of detergent. Follow this prewash with a regular wash cycle, using fresh water and detergent. Very greasy clothes require extra detergent. Grease can also be removed from clothes by adding household ammonia to the fresh water. Using 2/3 cup per 10 gallons of water. Some homemakers rub detergent into grease stains and then, rinse in hot water, or you can sponge grease stains with a household grease solvent.

Grass and foliage stains should be removed as promptly as possible. Applying detergent to the stain and rinsing is usually effective, you can sponge the stain with alcohol if the washable item is colorfast. Stubborn stains can be treated with a chlorine or sodium perborate bleach. Grass stains may also be removed by applying lemon juice, followed by exposure to the sun. After pretreatment, clothes should be washed in the regular manner.

FHA Texas Rural Loans Total \$74,526,000

The U. S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration made or insured \$74 1/2 million in loans to Texas farm and other rural families during 1963.

A total of 11,977 families used one or more of the agency's loan programs during the year.

Farmers Home Administration operates a broad program of supplementary credit for rural development in Texas.

Loans are made only to borrowers who cannot obtain credit from banks, Production Credit Associations, and other conventional lenders.

Mr. Cappelman reported that in 1963 Farmers Home Administration supervised loan programs had two major results of importance to the economy of the state.

"Loans to family farmers enabled them to make a major contribution to the well being and progress of the state's agriculture during 1963," he said.

"Capital and management assistance supplied by Farmers Home Administration to its borrowers helped them develop and enlarge their farms, operate more efficiently, and build a sound farming business.

In addition, Farmers Home Administration loan services for the broader rural community resulted in new homes and better rural neighborhoods in many parts of the state.

Emergency loans amounting to an estimated \$18,000,000 were made to 3,785 farmers to assist in maintaining normal farming operations following the various emergencies in different sections of Texas such as drought, excessive rains, storms or tornadoes, insect damage, etc.

Rural housing loans estimated at \$6,000,000 were made to 871 farmers and other rural residents.

Water development and soil conservation loans totaled an estimated \$5,300,000. Most of these funds were used to install 36 rural community water systems.
