Home Demonstration Agent's Column

BROILING SIMPLIFIES SERVING DELICIOUS FOODS

Homemakers searching for simple-to-prepare but highly delicious foods should make more use of the broilers on their kitchen ranges. The broiler performs culinary magic merely by applying heat to quality foods--meat, poultry, fish, and even fruits and vegetables.

In an era when figure streamlining is the goal of many but achieved by few, the kitchen range broiler can be a friend of the overweight. This is true because much of the fat in broiled meats and poultry drips off into the pan beneath the broiler grill.

Broiled foods are time-savers as it isn't necessary to spend a lot of time preparing fancy sauces and thick gravies for them. A little seasoning at the table is usually all that's needed. Some people also like a dab of butter on a steak, or a whisper of garlic.

LET'S BROIL A FEAST

Steak cuts best suited for broiling include porterhouse, club, T-bone, sirloin, and rib. The tenderloin portion of a porterhouse steak is sometimes removed and prepared as filet mignon.

Round steak is not as tender as those mentioned above, but it is more economical. For broiling, select eye or top round in either prime, choice, or good grades. The lower grades of top round and the bottom round in any grade are fine for such dishes as swiss steak.

While hamburger isn't in the same class with porterhouse steak, it outranks many other food items as an American favorite--especially when broiled under LP-gas flames or infra-red heat.

Steaks should not be less than an inch thick and preferably an inch and a half or two inches

thick. A thick steak is not extravagant since it is more juicy and delicious than a thin piece of meat, and it yields more portions.

If steaks must be frozen because of storage or keeping problems, they should be allowed to return to room temperature before broiling. Excess fat may be trimmed, but leave about one-eighth inch around the edge. The edges should be slashed every inch to prevent curling while broiling.

HOW LONG TO BROIL?

Since the advent of vastly improved kitchen range controls, broiling has achieved new dimensions for speed and excellence. It's best to follow the manufacturer's instructions for range operation.

Remember too that every piece of meat is different. It's a good idea to watch the progress of foods while they are broiling. A homemaker can test a steak for doneness by cutting a small gash close to the bone and noting the color of the meat.

SUGGESTION FOR USING THE BROILER

1. Follow the manufacturer's instructions for your particular range as to temperature setting rack position, and cooking time. For steaks, you may want to vary the cooking time to suit personal taste.

2. Do not put water in the drip pan unless this is indicated by the manufacturer.

3. Do not use aluminum foil on the broiler grid except for fish, fruits, vegetables, and sandwiches.

4. Use the broiling equipment supplied by the manufacturer of your automatic range, rather than other racks, pans, etc.

5. After using, remove any fat from the broiler pan and wipe with a paper towel. Allow the pan to cool before washing. For easier cleaning, sprinkle the grid with soap powder or detergent while it is warm and cover with a damp cloth or paper towel.

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

FALLOUT SHELTERS NEEDED BY EVERYONE

Since massive shielding is the only known protection from gamma radiation, everyone needs some type of shelter from radioactive fallout. This shelter need not be expensive or fancy, but it should be carefully planned to protect the family.

The simplest and least expensive shelter is one included in the home when it is constructed. It can serve a dual purpose as an extra bedroom, utility or recreation room, photographic darkroom, or other facility. Underground shelters can also be built near the home. The cost, size, location, amount of protection, and ventilation are some factors to consider when building a shelter.

If a fallout shelter cannot be constructed, a suitable area in the home should be located and steps taken to make it as safe as possible. The safest places in homes are usually basements, hallways, large closets or rooms with no windows.

In addition, nearly every community has buildings that offer some protection. The safest part of a multi-story structure is in the center of the middle floor. The government is designating certain areas of large buildings as shelters and stocking them with survival supplies.

Though different type structures provide varying amounts of protection from fallout, it is important to know how much protection is needed. If the dose level is high, an underground shelter will be needed for adequate protection. But above all remember that any shelter is better than none. Even tunnels, mines, caves, and culverts would provide some emergency protection.

U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare Social Security Administration Question & Answer Column

Q. I will be age 62 this fall and will apply for social security benefits. I was told that my benefit would be reduced by taking it at age 62. Will the reduced benefit remain the same for life or will I get my full benefit at age 65?

A. If you do not return to work, your benefit payment will always remain the same. If you should return to work and your social security payment is stop-

ped because of your work, your benefit will be automatically raised to higher amount at age 65.

Q. Is it true that a disabled worker may now qualify for monthly disability benefits regardless of his age?

A. Yes. A monthly disability payment may be paid to severely disabled worker regardless of his age. However, he must have worked on a job covered by the social security law for at least five years within the ten-year period immediately before becoming disabled.

Q. How can I find out if I have received credit for all my work under social security?

A. We have a free postcard form you can send in to check your record. The post card is pre-addressed. All you have to do is fill in the blanks and sign it. You will get a statement of your earnings about two weeks after you send in the card. If you want to know how many quarters of coverage you have, write "Please show quarters of coverage" on the post card form you send in.

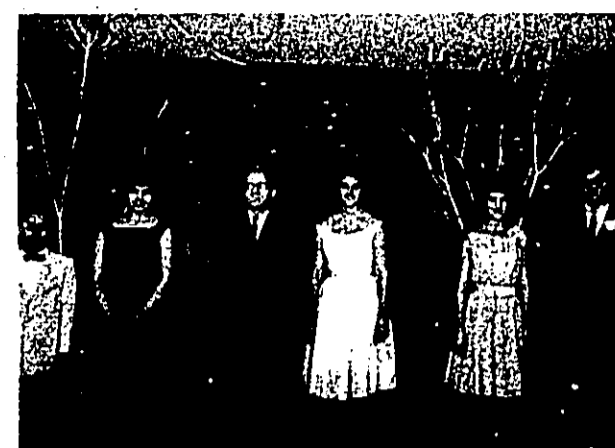

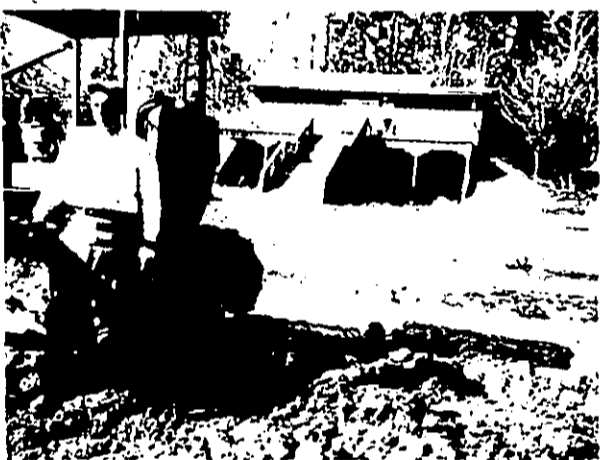

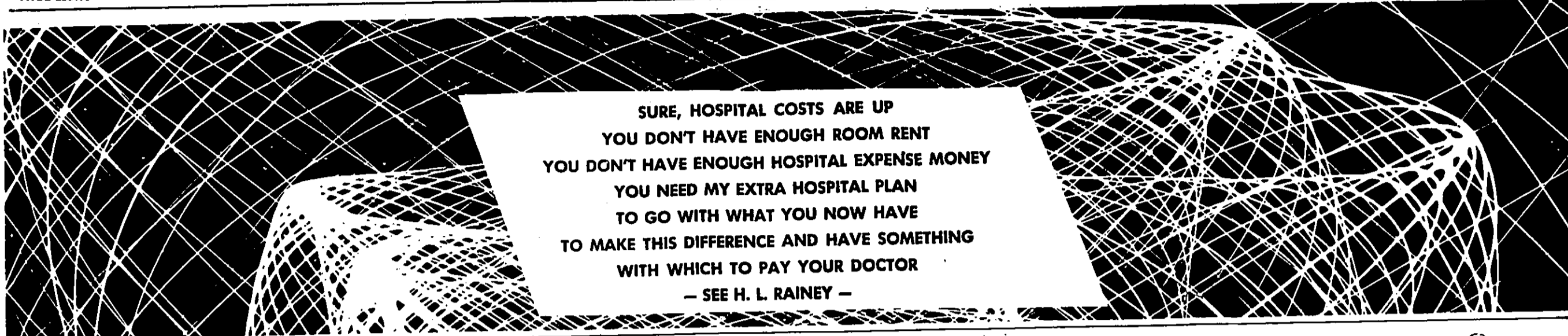
