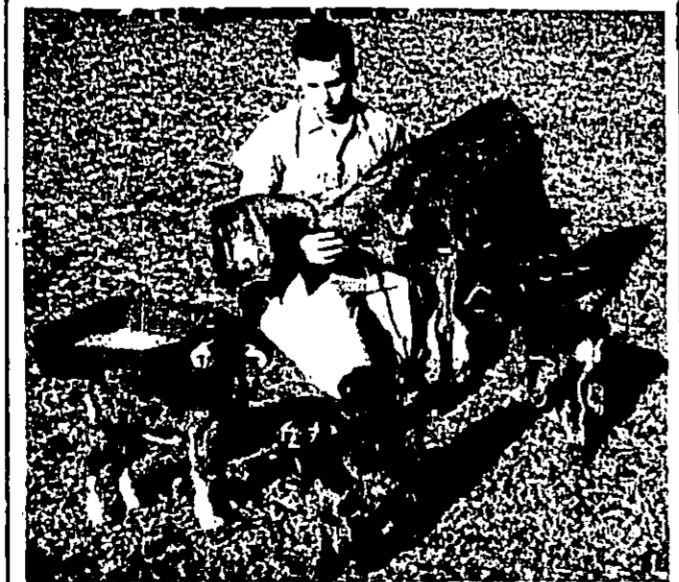

Production of nonfat dry milk for human food during 1963 totaled 2.1 billion pounds, down 4 percent from the record high level of 1962 but 20 percent above the 1957-61 annual average, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Cook potatoes in their skins to preserve most of the vitamins. Paring before cooking results in loss of food value, particularly Vitamin C. When you boil potatoes, use as little water and as short a cooking time as possible, say extension foods and nutrition specialists.

Peanuts are a nutritious food, important for B Vitamins. They are exceptionally high in niacin, and their high fat content makes them a good source of food energy. Among vegetables foods, peanuts rate high in the quality of protein they furnish and may be used as an alternate for meat, eggs and cheese.

In the future, food should be even more of a bargain than it is today, says the USDA. The proportion of disposable income going for food has declined from a post-war high of 27 percent at the present time.

President Johnson, in his recent message to Congress, announced plans to name a special commission to come up with recommendations about treatment of heart disease, cancer and stroke. He announced that the commission would be expected to complete its study by the end of the year and submit recommendations for action.

There are many important problems for future research on food fats. The human requirement for fat and for specific fatty acids remains to be determined, Dr. Grace Goldsmith, professor of medicine at Tulane University School of Medicine, said in a recent address before the National Dairy Council at Miami Beach, Fla.

Enrichment of flour and cereal adds about one-third more thiamine, one-fifth more iron and niacin, and one-tenth more riboflavin to the Nation's diet than would be available if these foods were not enriched.

Drying garments properly saves time. Heavy fabrics like corduroys and denims should be taken from the dryer while slightly damp. Shake them briskly, shape them and hang to finish drying by air.

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

Acreage-marketing guides for 1964 crop summer and fall vegetables for fresh use, summer melons, sweetpotatoes and vegetables for commercial processing have been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The guides, issued by the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, call for a 1 percent reduction in total planted acreages of summer melons and summer and fall vegetables for fresh market. Sweetpotato growers were advised to plant acreages equal to 1963. A reduction of 2 percent in total acreage of vegetables for commercial processing was also recommended.

The guides call for a reduction of 8 percent in the acreage of early-summer crop potatoes in Texas and an average reduction of 7 percent for the 11 states that produce such potatoes. The suggested acreage for Texas was set at 10,800 acres.

The acreage-marketing guides call for a reduction of 10 percent in the important fall potato crop and a like reduction for the late summer potato crop.

In announcing the voluntary planting guides, USDA points out that potato production in past years generally has exceeded market needs, which have been increasing slowly. Surpluses have been the rule and, as a result, potato farmers' income has been depressed.

An objective of the guides is

to aid farmers in crop planning, to bring about a balance in supply, and to improve the market structure.

Shades trees and summer-flowering ornamental shrubs should be pruned during the winter months when the temperature is above freezing. Pruning should follow careful thought and include repair of injuries, dead wood removal, and controlling the size and shape of the plants.

INCLUDE WATER SUPPLY IN FALLOUT SHELTER

A safe adequate supply of water is even more important than food in case of a nuclear attack. We can survive several days without food, but only a short while without water. For each family member, store at least 1/2 gallon of water per day or 7 gallons for 2 weeks for drinking purposes. Some liquid needs can be met by fruit juices and soft drinks. Water for bathing, brushing teeth and dishwashing should be of the same quality and quantity. Plastic and glass jugs with tight fitting covers or stoppers are good storage containers, but must be protected from blast. Water for emergency use should be changed every 3 months as undesirable taste and odors may develop.

Stored water should be purified by one of the following methods: boiling 3-10 minutes, addition of household bleach, 2% tincture of iodine or water purification tablets. These are methods to kill bacteria only; not radioactive particles.

When it is safe to leave the shelter, contents of the water heater, water softener, toilet tanks, or melted ice cubes should be sources of safe water.

Following a nuclear attack water from unprotected sources such as streams, lakes, ponds, uncovered wells, springs, and cisterns may be dangerously contaminated with radioactive fallout. Such water would not be safe for people of livestock to drink, and it should not be used until civil defense, public health, or other monitoring services have found it to be within safe limits of radioactive contamination. Most of the contamination would be in the form of suspended materials (dust) but some would be dissolved in water. These materials would be diluted in ponds and lakes and slowly would settle and be absorbed by clay and mud on the bottom. Water from these sources should be used only in an extreme emergency.

Water from covered wells, underground wells, covered cisterns, and storage houses would be safe, unless radioactive fallout had contaminated the supply in some way. Remember-use water known to be safe first, check on contamination of other water before drinking, and use water you are unsure of only in an extreme emergency.

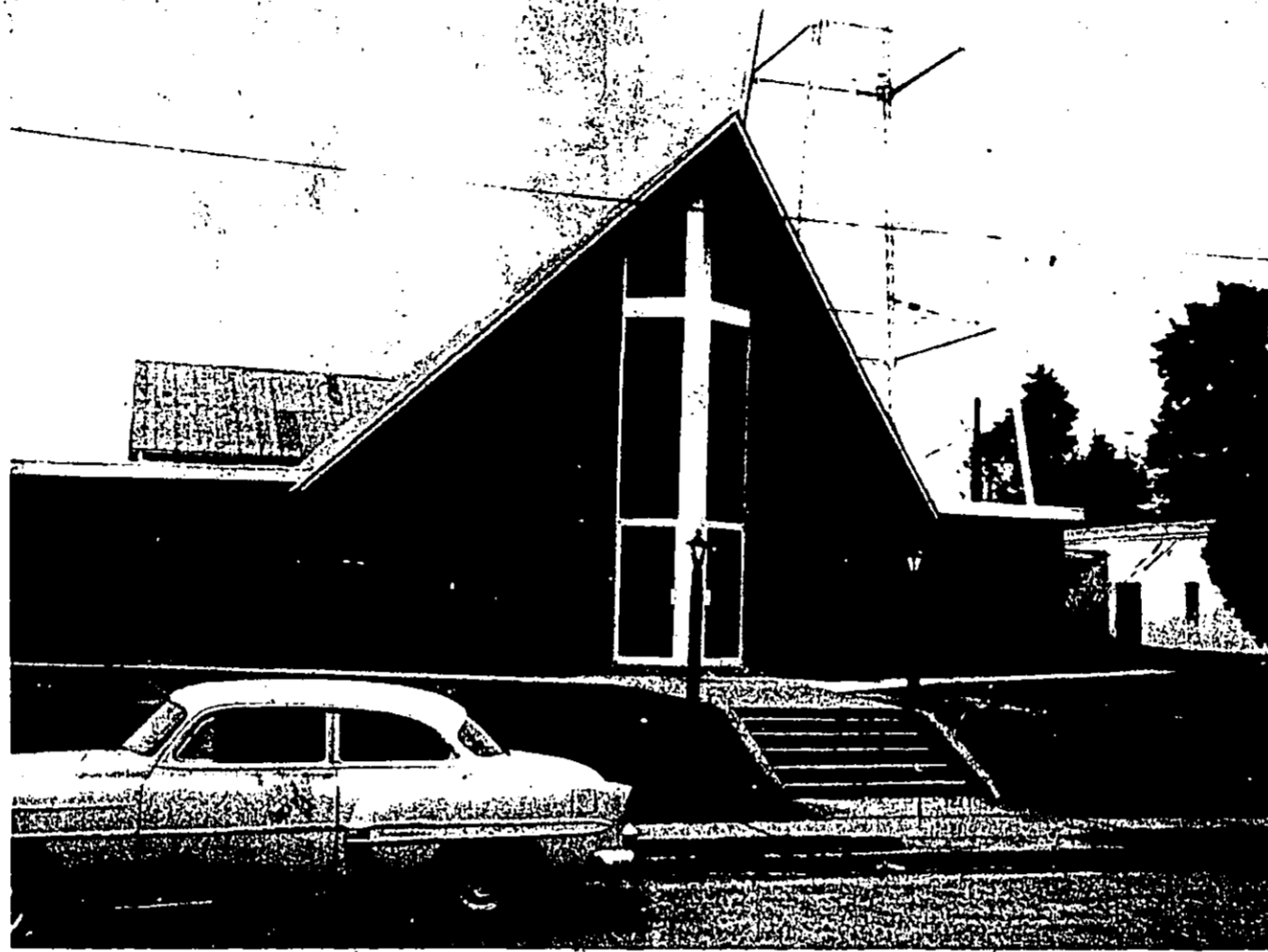

SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS GO TO MANY STILL WORKING

Last year more than 2,500 persons made application for retirement benefits through the Lufkin social security office, according to L. R. James, district manager. "But this doesn't mean," he explained, "that all these persons have stopped working. Many are continuing to work in regular jobs, in part-time jobs, or in new jobs."

"It's quite possible," James said, "to work and receive social security payments are made regardless of earnings. But the individual must still file an application—benefits are not paid automatically."

"This is one of the reasons the social security people have been promoting the idea of 'Inquire Before You Retire'. In fact, James pointed out, social security has prepared a free booklet to explain the details of retirement and social security. The name of the booklet is, 'If You Work While You Get Social Security Payments.' It tells how social security works, why you don't have to retire completely to get payments, the earnings limits, the age limits, and other important facts. The Lufkin office has a supply of these booklets and anyone may get one by writing or calling. There is no charge for this valuable booklet.

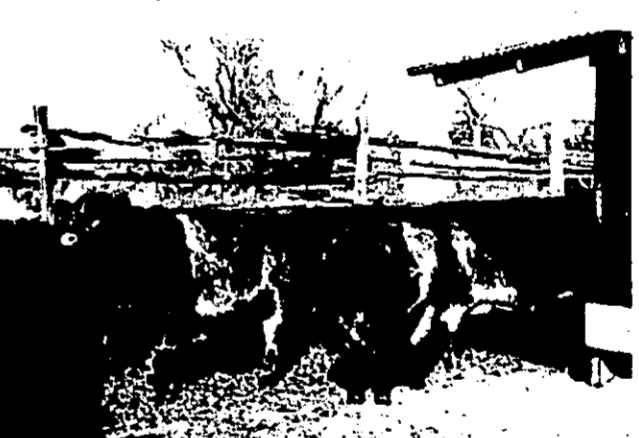
