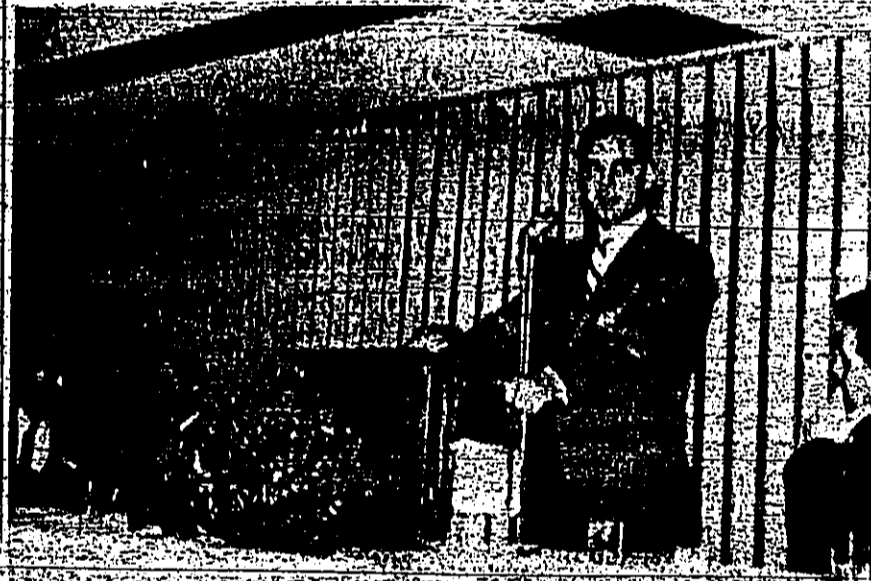

## ETTA Elects Stubblefield

Horace Stubblefield of Diboll was named president for 1964 of the East Texas Tourist Association at its second annual meeting at Woodville Community Inn here Friday.

Mr. Stubblefield is an executive of Temple Industries, Inc. of Diboll. He succeeds Leland Petty of Lufkin.

Johnny McLeod of Jasper and Bob Dunn of Nacogdoches were elected vice presidents. Belton Muller of Nacogdoches, executive secretary, was renamed to that position.

Speakers painted a rosy picture of tourism development in the 45 county area which the association seeks to serve. "The land of tall pines and big lakes can become a tourist mecca with proper development of resources," Carroll Swearingen of Point said.

Swearingen is director of the Lake Tawakoni reservoir near Dallas. A native of Tyler County, he is on the state water recreation study committee appointed by Gov. John Connally.

Swearingen said that no area in the United States has as many "God given" tourist attractions as the 45 county area.

Sixty to 80 percent of the recreational activities in Texas are water-oriented, he said.

"The giant lakes under construction or planned in East Texas can be tremendous tourist attractions," he declared.

Swearingen also said that the Sabine River will have barge traffic between Orange and Longview before canalization of the Trinity River is realized.

Another viewpoint was expressed by Frank Hildebrand of Austin, director of the new Texas Tourist Agency. He said that East Texas scenery will attract some tourists but that they won't stay unless there are developments that appeal to them. He said the nation's leading tourist attractions today are those which were man-made.

Mr. Hildebrand said that the Tourist Agency, authorized by the last legislature, is placing its first national advertising in the New York Times for April 5. Later ads will appear in the Chicago Tribune, Readers Digest, Redbook and Sunset magazines at a cost of \$57,500.

Luncheon speaker was Congressman Jack Brooks, who predicted that the Sam Rayburn reservoir will bring "future job opportunities, future industrial growth and future community improvement" when completed.

The five finalists for queen of the 1964 Tyler County Dogwood Festival were chosen by the King's Men Committee in judging held Tuesday night in the Magnolia Room of Woodville Community Inn.

The five finalists, one from each of the five senior high schools in the county, are Hazel Ellis of Chester, Roxane Turner of Colmesneil, Virginia Massey of Spurger, Elizabeth Gardner of Warren, and Linda Read of Woodville.

The next judging will be on Tuesday, March 24, at which time the queen will be chosen. However, her identity will remain a secret until the night of the festival.

Of the four runners-up, one will be chosen as princess of Tyler County and the other three will be princesses from their communities.

The first judging was held on March 3, when the eight semi-finalists were selected from 22 candidates from the five senior high schools in the county.

In this first elimination, two candidates are selected from each high school. However, this year Spurger and Chester each had only one entry, thus reducing the number in Tuesday's judging to eight candidates.

In the final judging, March 24, each of the contestants will be in evening dress which has met the approval of the coronation committee.

In the final voting, the written ballots will be counted by a committee of five of the King's Men—one from each of the high school communities.

Contestants in all three of the judging sessions are rated on poise, beauty and personality. The judges vote by secret written ballots each time.

## Coronation Is Many Splendored Part Of Dogwood Festival

Presentation of the royal crown and crowning of the 1964 queen will be the opening feature of the 1964 Tyler County Dogwood Festival program in the outdoor amphitheatre beginning at 7:00 p. m. on the night of March 28.

For the five princesses from Tyler County, from whom the queen is chosen, this will be a tense and exciting half hour.

In the beautifully decorated amphitheatre, with spotlights and music adding to the splendor of the occasion, the five princesses wait in the wings as 33 of their duchesses from the Southeast Texas area and their escorts are introduced and take places in the throne area.

The drama builds as the king's crownbearer, ring bearer and queen's crown bearer are spotlighted on the stage.

The crowd of 4000 is quiet, almost as tense as the princesses, as the climax of the coronation is reached.

And then, suddenly, it's over and a new queen is crowned. Entertainment follows for the queen's court and, of course, the spectators.

A pageant follows the coronation. This year's subject has not been announced by the program committee.

The five princesses for this year's festival were chosen in judging Tuesday night. They are Hazel Ellis of Chester, Roxane Turner of Colmesneil, Elizabeth Gardner of Warren, Virginia Massey of Spurger and Linda Read of Woodville.
