FESTIVAL PAGEANT TO PORTRAY SHIVERS CAREER

Former Governor Allan Shivers will be the subject of this year's pageant at the Tyler County Dogwood Festival on March 28.

The pageant, in seven episodes, will depict the highlights of the Shivers career from a local schoolboy, student at the University of Texas, state senator, lieutenant governor and governor.

In the final episode, Shivers and his family will appear on stage before a replica of the library and museum which Mrs. Shivers has built and given to Woodville and Tyler County in honor of her husband.

Shivers maintains his family's old home place, "Magnolia Hills," located about five miles west of Woodville off the Livingston Highway.

He also has a ranch, formerly owned by John Henry Kirby, which is located near Chester.

When he succeeded Beauford Jester as governor in 1949, Mr. Shivers was inaugurated at the remodeled home at Magnolia Hills before one of the largest crowds ever seen in the county.

Allan Shivers and the former Miss Marialice Shary of Mission were married in 1937.

Mr. and Mrs. Shivers have four children, John Shary, Allan Jr., Marialice Sue and Brian McGee. Of these, Brian is the only one at home during the school year. Marialice Sue is in her second year at Hockaday School in Dallas.

The pageant, which follows the coronation of the queen at the amphitheatre, will open with Episode I, "How Dear to My Heart," a salute to the trees of East Texas and a look at a typical school in East Texas.

Episode II, "The Eyes of Texas," swings the scene to Austin where Allan Shivers is a student. Episode III is a scene depicting the romance between young Senator Allan Shivers and Miss Marialice Shary, and in Episode IV the couple are in Mexico on their honeymoon.

In Episode V, Major Allan Shivers is shown returning from overseas duty with the American Military Government to the State Senate.

Episode VI, "A Man of Mark," spotlights the start of his three terms as governor to which he was elected.

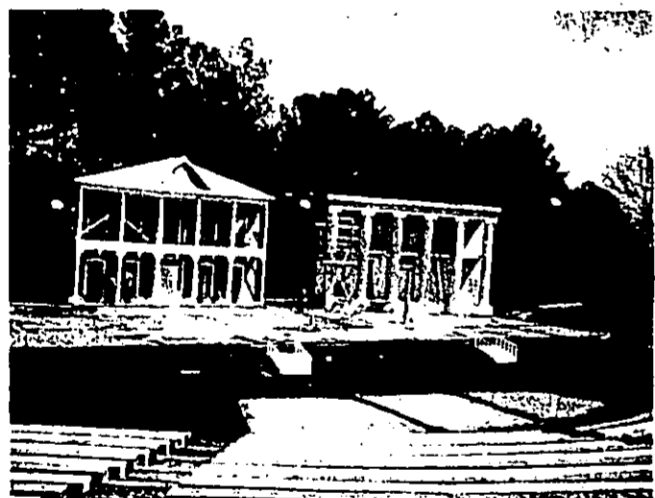

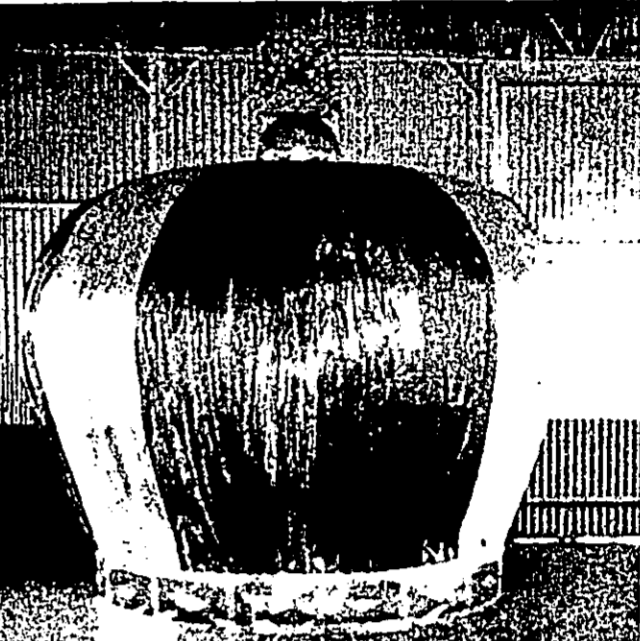

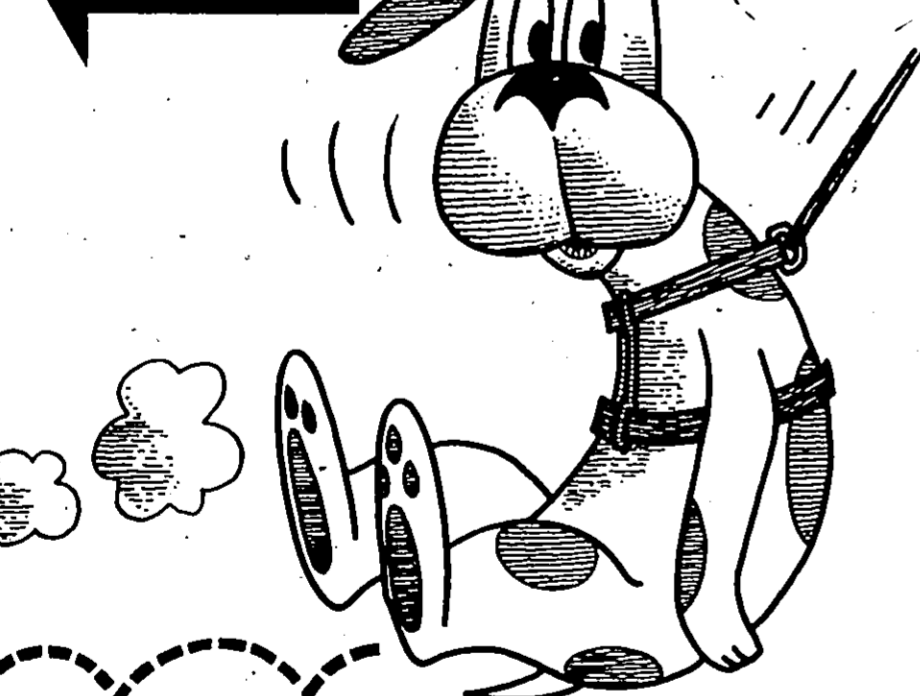

Members of the Chester Baptist Church enjoyed Steve Benthal holding morning and evening worship services last Sunday.

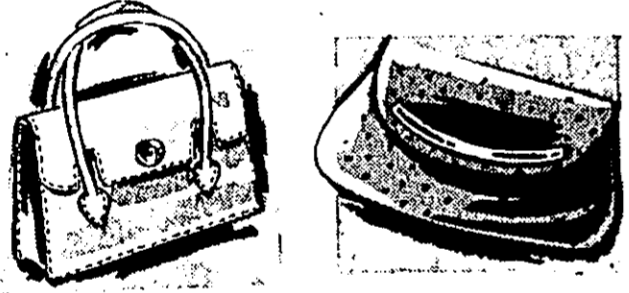

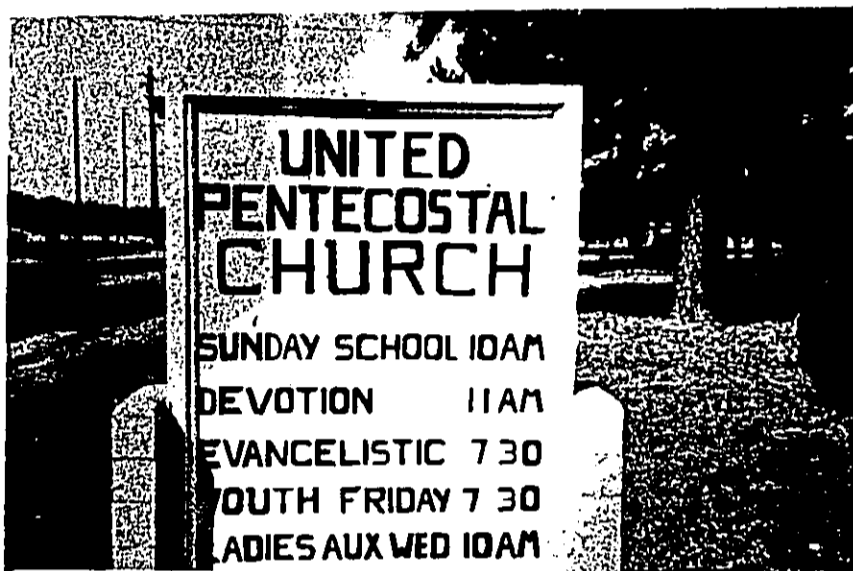

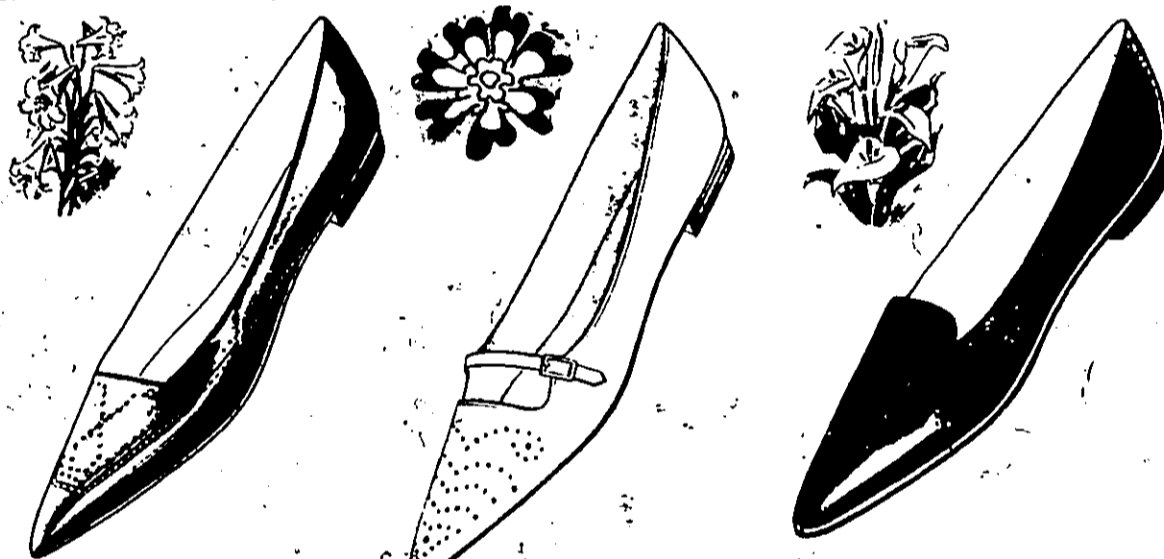
