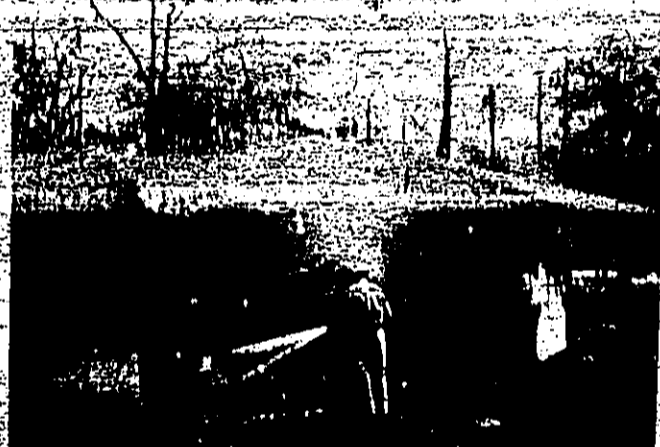

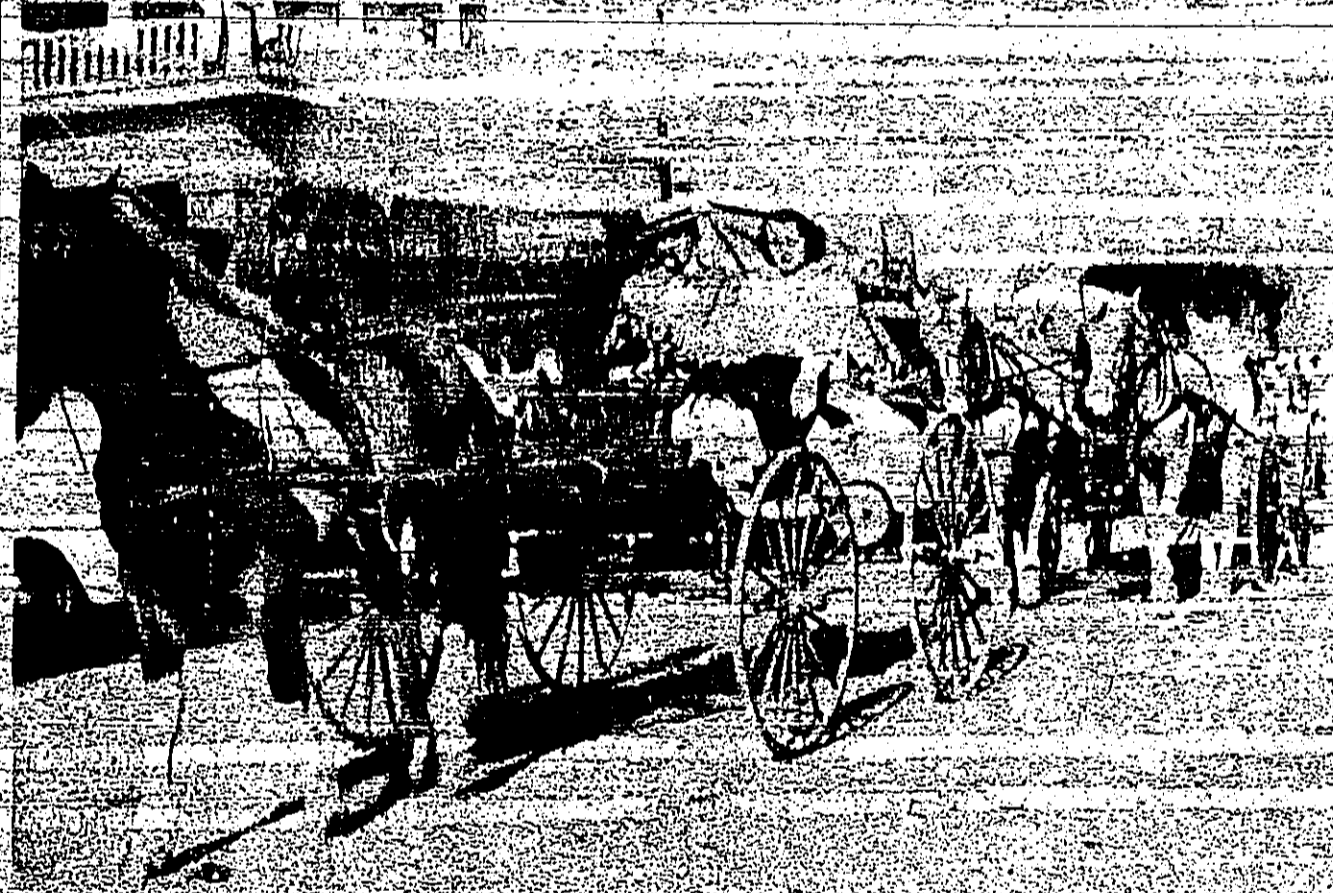

The library will have a special schedule during the festival. It will offer various books and resources for the community.

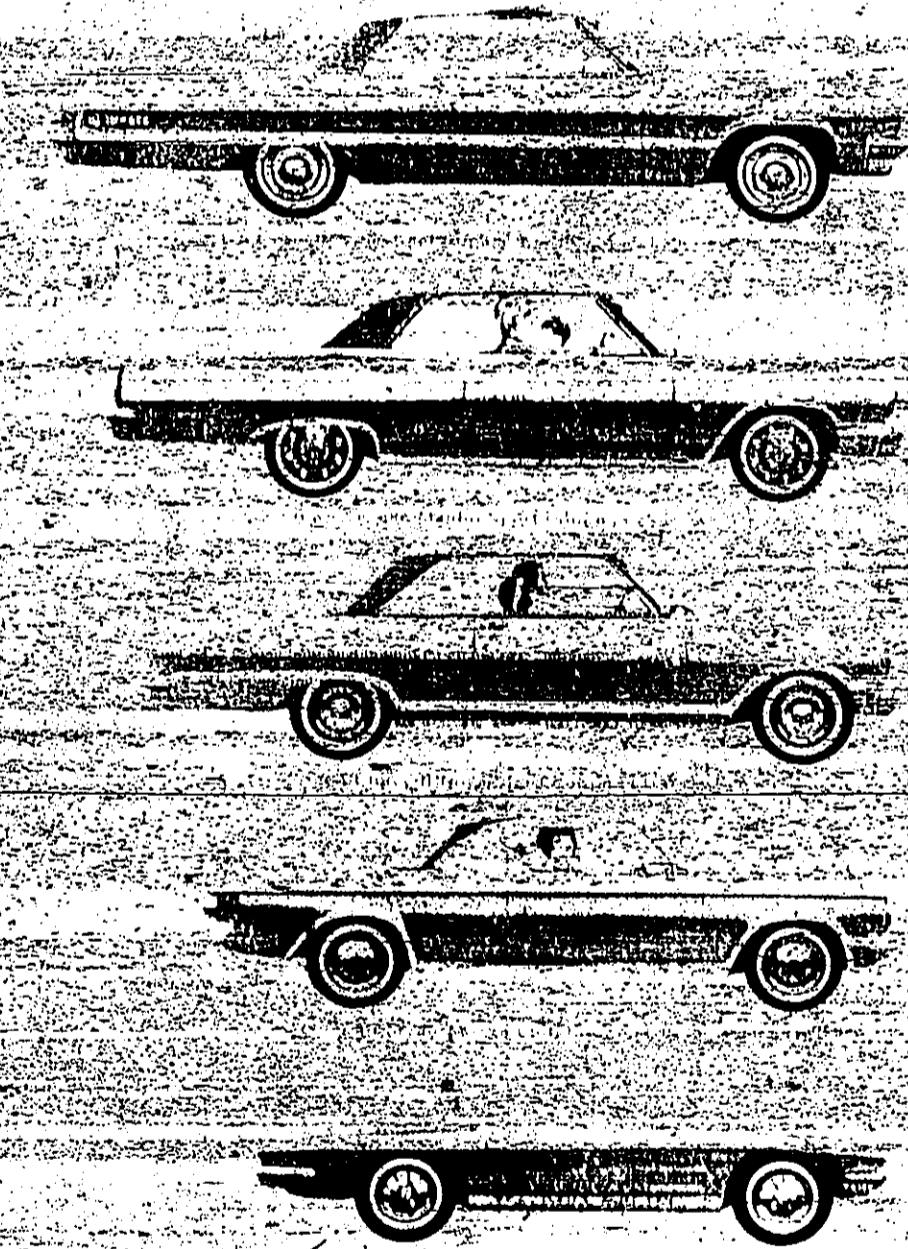

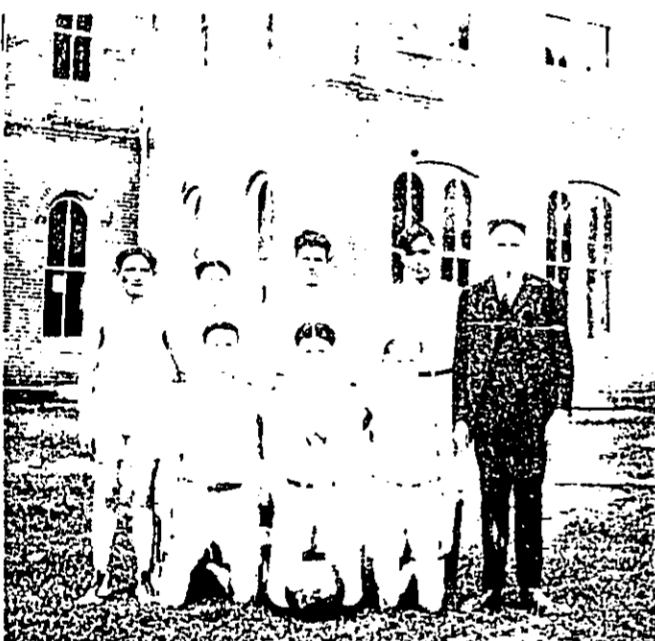

W. E. Simmons, district engineer, said that Mr. Norwood will be in charge of all operations connected with electrical maintenance of traffic signals, centerstripping, special crews and special equipment operating out of district headquarters, and for maintenance of buildings and highway equipment.

Mr. Norwood is a past president of the Woodville Lions Club, and is an active member of the First Baptist Church.

In June 1963 Mr. Norwood received a National Award of commendation for outstanding work in highway landscaping in the Woodville area. The award was presented at a meeting of the Men's Garden Club of Greater Beaumont by C. B. Gilman, president of the Southwest Region of Men's Garden Clubs of America.

Mr. McGown has been with the highway department since 1954, and was formerly stationed at Newton. He was transferred to Anahuac in 1960. He is married and has two children.

The flower bedecked amphitheatre will be the scene Saturday night for the colorful coronation ceremonies when a queen will be revealed from the Tyler County princesses and crowned by Lt. Gov. Preston Smith.

The five finalists from whom the queen will be chosen will ride in an elaborate float in the parade Saturday afternoon. One of them has already been chosen for queen of the 1964 festival, but her identity is a well-kept secret until the coronation. The King's Men made the choice in final judging on Tuesday night.

Following the coronation, the pageant will be presented on the huge stage at the amphitheatre, where festival workers have built replicas of the governor's mansion in Austin and the Allan Shivers Library and Museum which has just been completed in Woodville. From here will be portrayed events in the life of Allan Shivers and a tribute to his wife, Marialice, and the Shivers family.

Although the old Shivers home place is only five miles west of Woodville, Allan Shivers parents had moved to Lufkin for a short time and it was there that he was born in 1907. However, Judge and Mrs. Robert Shivers soon moved back to Woodville and it was here that Allan received most of his secondary school education.

However, it was not destined that he finish high school here. Judge Shivers moved to Port Arthur before Allan completed his high school education.

But Woodville continued to find a fond place in his memories, and it was here that he returned to take the oath of office when he succeeded the late Beauford Jester as governor of Texas.

During his tenure as governor—he served 7-1/2 years, longer than any other man—he and Mrs. Shivers, with their family, often spent weekends at Magnolia Hills. And Mrs. Shivers and the children for several years would spend the summer months here while Gov. Shivers stayed at Austin during the week, and retreated from state cares to Woodville on as many summer weekends as possible.

Recently the Allan Shivers Library and Museum were completed as a gift from Marialice Shivers in honor of her husband, and dedicated to the Woodville Independent School District.

The library is open, but the museum hasn't been opened as yet. Both the library and museum, however, will hold open house this weekend. A formal opening will be held later.

NUTRITION EDUCATION FOR FIRST GRADES

In 1962, Tyler County Food and Nutrition Sub-Committee of Community, recommended that nutrition education be started in first grades of Tyler County Schools.

The long-range objective of this study was to help in establishing lasting good health habits.

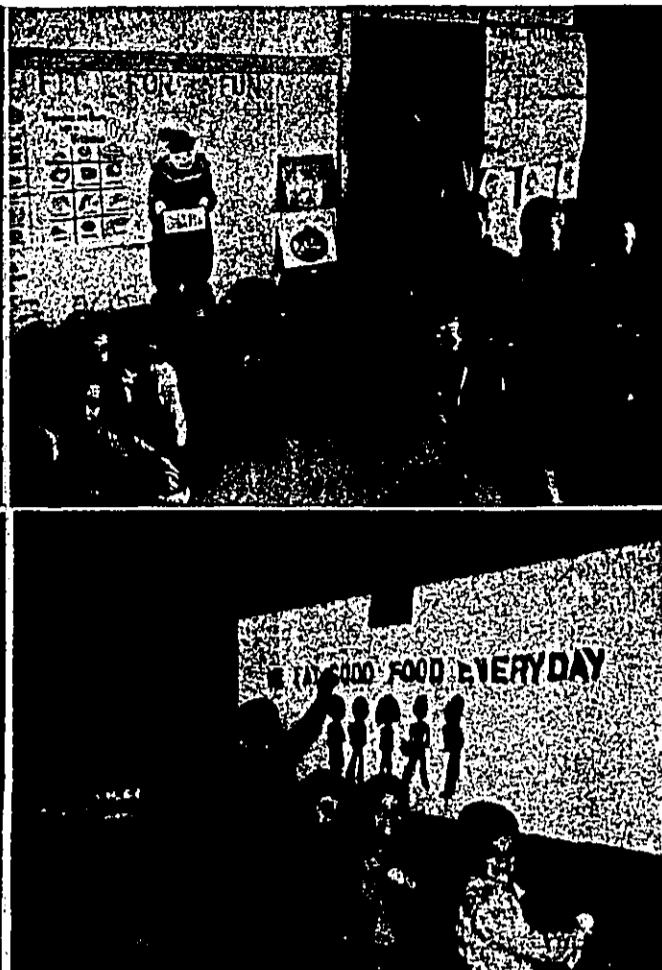
Woodville school is in the second year of nutrition education under the leadership of four first grade teachers and James Shields, principal.

Adventures In Homemaking

Three Layered Custard Pie

First layer:
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 tablespoons flour
Mix the brown sugar and flour together and pat into an unbaked pie crust.

Second layer:
2 cups milk
4 egg yolks
1/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 teaspoon salt

Beat these custard ingredients together and pour into pie shell on top of the brown sugar layer. Bake in hot oven of 425 degrees and reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake for 30 minutes.

The brown sugar does not mix with the custard but forms a delicious maple-flavored layer. It also keeps the custard from soaking into the pastry as a custard pie has a tendency to do.

Third layer:
4 egg whites
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sugar

As the pie is almost ready to take from the oven, make the meringue. Beat the egg whites and salt until frothy. Beat in the sugar one tablespoon at a time. Beat until the meringue is stiff and glossy. Add the flavoring. Swirl the meringue lightly on the pie, sealing to the edge of the crust. Bake in 350 degree oven for 15 to 18 minutes or until deliciously browned.

This is the only recipe that I can recall having been published in Time magazine. It is recommended as a nutritious, elegant dessert for Easter time.

Giving one an equal feeling of elegance is the story of Jackie Kennedy as told by Mimi Rhea in her book, "I was Jacqueline Kennedy's Dressmaker." From it one reads an enchanting story and at the same time learns the essentials of good design in choosing, buying or making clothes.

Simplicity seems to be the key note for the well-dressed woman. Jackie never overdressed for work. Let lovely materials from their own ornamentation. Select dresses with a stamp of individuality. Ties of self material on blouses or suits give a casual air and softness to the chin line.

And folks in East Texas can appreciate the beginning sentence of one chapter: "Spring has come again—dogwood blossoms and all—the most memorable spring I had known."

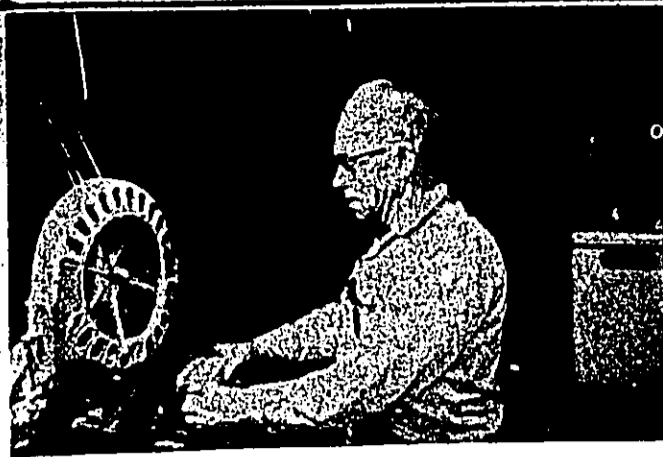

Bracken died Friday at the Tyler County Hospital after being rushed there when he was stricken with a heart attack at his camp home on the Neches River near Dam B.

He was a native of Cushing and had lived in Woodville for the past 28 years. For a time he operated a hardware store, but most of the time was an electrical contractor. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Woodville, was a charter member of the Woodville Lions Club, and for many years was

active in Scouting.

He was a longtime participant in the activities of the Tyler County Dogwood Festival. During the early years, he helped build the stage sets. Later he served as designer and supervisor for the stage.

For many years he cut the paper to make the blossoms used to decorate the amphitheater where the coronation is held. This year alone he cut approximately 175,000, and during the 21 years of the festival he cut hundreds of thousands of blossoms.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Sue Collier Bracken; one son W. L. (Billy) Bracken of Kountze; one sister, Mrs. Mildred Stephens of Kountze; and two granddaughters, Sharon Kay and Donna Fay Bracken, both of Kountze.

Leo Singleton Woodville Rites Saturday

Funeral services for Leo C. Singleton, 69, were held at 3 p. m. Saturday in the chapel of the First Baptist Church, Woodville.

Dr. Billy Simmons, pastor officiated. Burial was in Mount Pisgah Cemetery under direction of Edwards Funeral Home.

He was a native of Camp, La., had lived 54 years in Beaumont and in Woodville since retirement.

Singleton had been with Gulf States Utilities Co., and Eastern Texas Electric and had operated Neches Electric Co., and Neches Record Shop before his retirement.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Woodville. He was a World War I veteran. Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Addie French Singleton, Woodville; one son, Leo C. Singleton Jr. Orange; three daughters, Mrs. C. L. Royston and Mrs. E. W. Huff, of Beaumont; and Mrs. G. R. Fendren, Woodville; four sisters, Mrs. M. A. Daley, Extension, La., Mrs. D. M. Melton, Shreveport, Mrs. C. O. Wright, St. Louis, Mo., and Mrs. T. H. Baker, Port Arthur, 16 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Fort Teran Story

After the Law of April 6, 1830 was inflicted upon the people of Spanish territory of Texas, small forts were established at strategic points of East Texas to enforce this law and, particularly to prevent the coming of Americans into this area. One of these forts was Teran, named for T. Mier y Teran, a violent Centralist of Mexico who in 1830 was made commander of the eastern internal provinces, and whose idea it was to build the forts. R. B. Blake of Nacogdoches, authority on history of East Texas, locates the fort as below and across the Neches from the mouth of Shawness Creek, which places it in Tyler County. Work on the fort, he says, was begun in October, 1831 by the commander, Colonel Ellis P. Bean and completed in 1832. A small garrison was stationed there from 1832 to 1834; however, a few straggling soldiers remained there until the following year when it was abandoned permanently.

Homer S. Thrall in his Texas History published in 1879, as well as other early historians, verify Mr. Blake's location of Fort Teran and early maps show it to be at the intersection of the old Nacogdoches and Liberty Road and the Coughatta Trace which crossed the Sabine at Burr's ferry and guided the Coughatta Alabama Indians, as well as adventurous Americans, into Texas. From the fort this road extended westward through the county on or near places which later came into exist-

ence near the old Fann place, through the lane directly in front of the Hayes place, at the foot of the hill upon which was the William Mann home, across Billum Creek to the old Davis place and across the Trinity by way of the Indian (Peachtree) Village and Moscow. A later road leading from Nacogdoches through Mount Hope and south to Liberty intersected the Coughatta Trace, thus affording a connecting link with Anahuac, San Felipe and other points to the south.

Following the battle of New Orleans, which was fought in January, 1815 many boys who had a part in this battle came to Texas in search of further adventure. Among these were the Bowie boys, Levi Mann, Ben Milam and his good friend, Sam T. Belt. Pages of history record these men as exploring rivers, engaging in fights with Indians and Spaniards, as prisoners in Mexican dungeons and again enjoying the freedom of long tramps through the woods of East Texas. Ben Milam openly asserted himself against the cruel Mexican emperor, Turbide, which brought on much trouble for him. He once boasted that he had been in every prison between Mexico City and the Rio Grande, and we may be assured that in many of these frightful situations his friend, Sam Belt, was with him. On one of their wanderings in central or south Texas the two men were taken captive by an Indian chief. After some moments of bickering they bought their freedom by giving the chief a hundred silver dollars which the Indians placed on a blanket and tossed again and again into the air.

At about the time that Fort Teran was being evacuated, Sam Belt left his companion, returned to the Neches and located at the fort where he operated a ferry for some time. He had been granted a league of land here under the Mexican government which he sold to Frost Thorn of Nacogdoches July 7, 1845, the first deed recorded in the Tyler County Deeds Records. He married Helen Taylor, sister of President Zachary Taylor and to the wife of A. G. Parker of the Parker Survey on which most of the land around Sunny Dell Church is located. Sam and Helen Belt had several children: Mack, Elizabeth, Spicey, Ann, Argalus, Susan, and Truman. Sam Belt's grand-children who reside in Colmesneil recall incidents told by their father, Argalus. As the Texas Revolution grew and the fighting became more intense, it is said that the settlers around Teran and Bevil's Port made an attack on Fort Teran and forced the Mexican soldiers out of East Texas. It is also said that Santa Anna had rafts constructed at

this point with which to convey his troops across the Neches on their march to Nacogdoches during the Run-away Scrape. Had he won at San Jacinto, he would have found no rafts waiting at Teran, as the settlers had used them in making their way down the river to safety. During one of these times of danger, either at the evacuation of the Mexicans from the fort or at the fleeing from Santa Anna, Mrs. Belt buried her money, got into a skiff with her oldest child, Mack, and her husband and escaped to the mouth of the Angelina and up this river to Bevil's Port. After the trouble was over, her home was made of logs as was the store house and old fort, as was recalled by Argalus Belt, who was born only ten years after the Texas Revolution and was familiar with the family like around Fort Teran. Leaving the home on the Neches, the Belts moved to Belt's Creek west of Colmesneil on what is now Hurst Ranch and here Sam built a large two-story house of hewn logs and, retaining a natural love for the outdoors, he kept mounted panthers and rattle snakes in his home. In his fights with Indians and Mexicans, he had received a wound in his lower leg which hastened his death. Helen Belt lived in the home of her son, Argalus, for several years after the death of her husband.

Fort Teran later became known as Boone's Ferry. Here steamboats used to stop with materials from the States and ladies for miles around would come on horseback to buy their materials, pins and needles, and occasionally in the evening to attend a big "ball" on the deck of the boat.

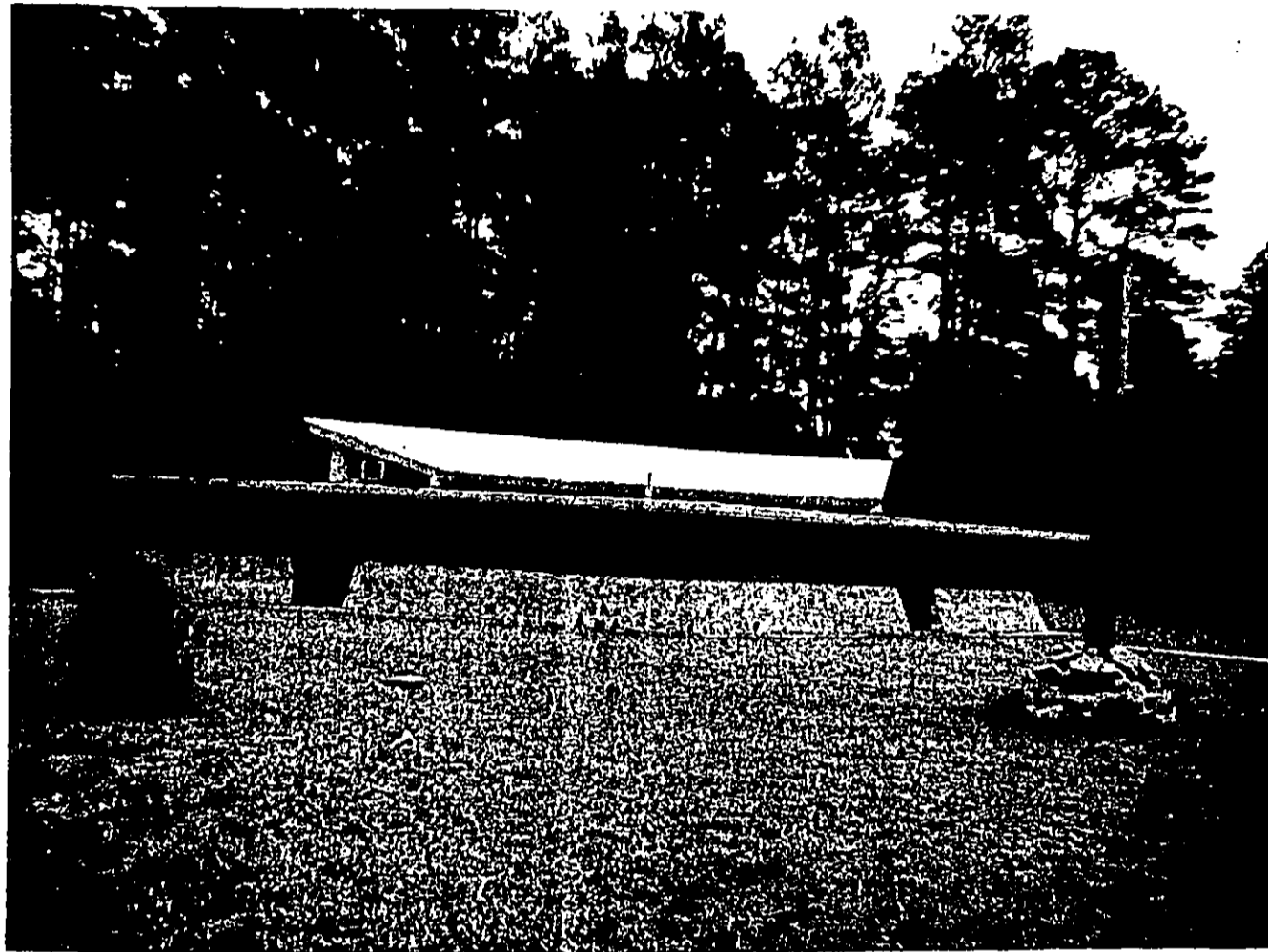

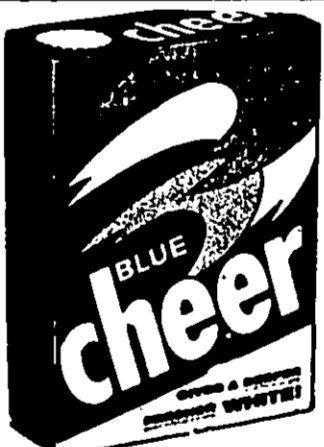

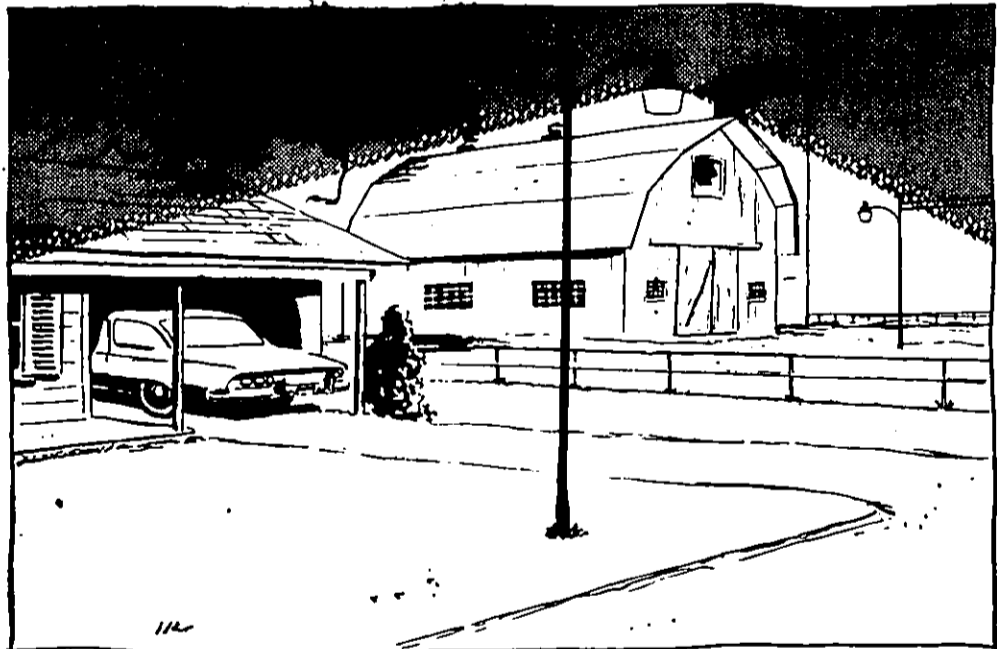

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

B. R. Young, Field Representative of the Lufkin Social Security Office, announces that he will be at the Department of Public Welfare Office in the Court House at Woodville at 1:00 p. m. each Monday during April, May, and June. He explained that his visits to Woodville are for the purpose of assisting Tyler County residents general information about social security benefits, furnishing general information about social security, and helping in other social security matters.

Young says that appointments will be made upon request by writing the Social Security Office, P. O. Box 808, Lufkin, Texas.

200 to 300 SOCIAL SECURITY INQUIRIES

Each week 200 to 300 East Texans ask questions of the Lufkin Social Security office. These inquiries are interested in a wide variety of subjects, according to L. R. James, District Manager, but more and more are asking, "How can I be sure my family and I get full credit for all the wages I've earned?" This is not only a frequent question, James said, but a very important one. "It's important," he explained, "because all social security benefit payments are based on a worker's past earnings. We're very proud of the accuracy of our records, but we need the worker's help to keep them accurate."

There are two ways a worker can help the Social Security Administration to keep his wage records accurate. First, he should make sure his employer has his name and social security number exactly as they are shown on his social security card. When an employer reports the wrong number or name for a worker, there's a good chance the worker won't get any social security credit for his work. It's impossible for social security records to show credit for wages when no number at all is reported.

The second step a worker can take to help prevent errors is to check his record every three years. The social security office has free post card forms that a worker can use to request a copy of his social security record. If the worker spots an error in his record, the social security office will help straighten it out. The Lufkin social security office will send one of these free post card forms to any worker who wants one.

TEXAS FOREST SERVICE NEWS

Spring clean-up of refuse around farms or rural homes will likely mean that many East Texans will endanger human life and property by careless burning of trash, brush, or fields, according to R. A. "Bob" Comte, crew leader for the Texas Forest Service at the Woodville duty station.

Texas Forest Service records show that the month of March is the most dangerous month in the year for debris burning fires. With the coming of spring, Comte points out that a few simple precautions can be taken to prevent these fires from escaping.

First, for trash burning, use an enclosed burner with a cover so sparks cannot escape.

Second, when burning brush in clearing operations, the piles should be kept small and the material added to the fire a little at the time.

Clean an area to bare soil for about six feet around the material and all piles should be encircled with a 8-10 foot wide plowed or disked firebreak.

Starting the fire should be delayed until the late afternoon when the air is quiet and cool.

Most important someone should remain with the fire until it is dead out.

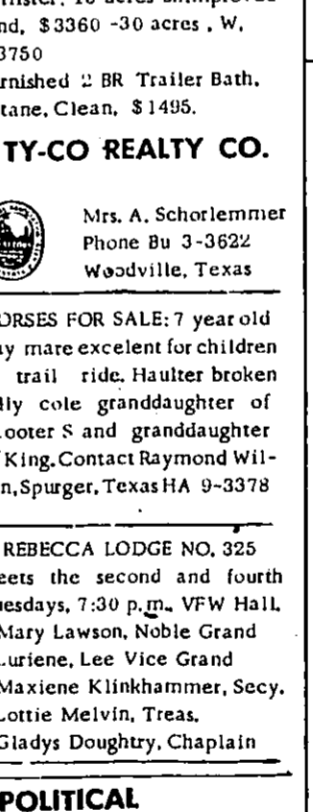
