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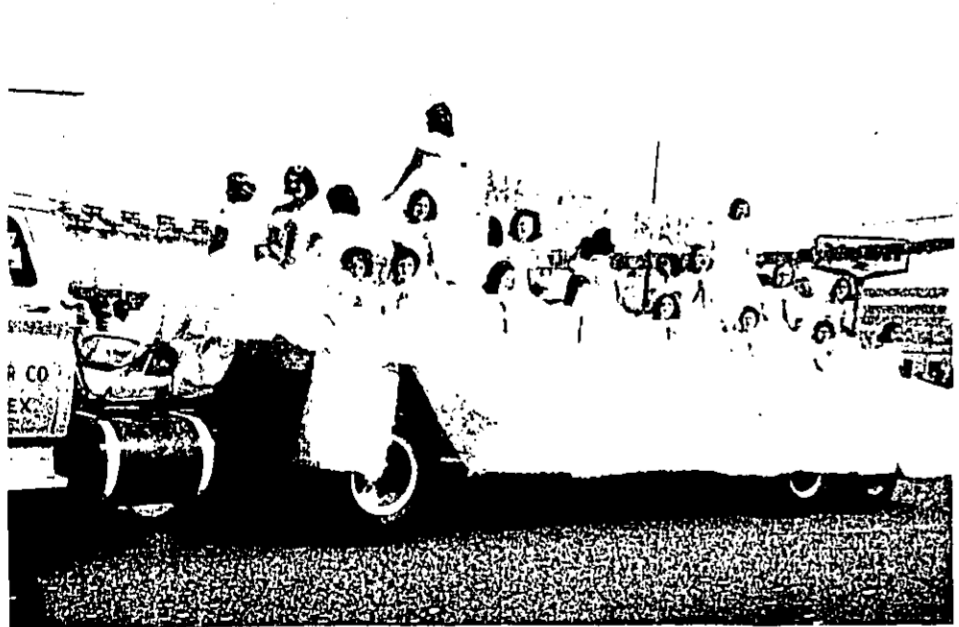
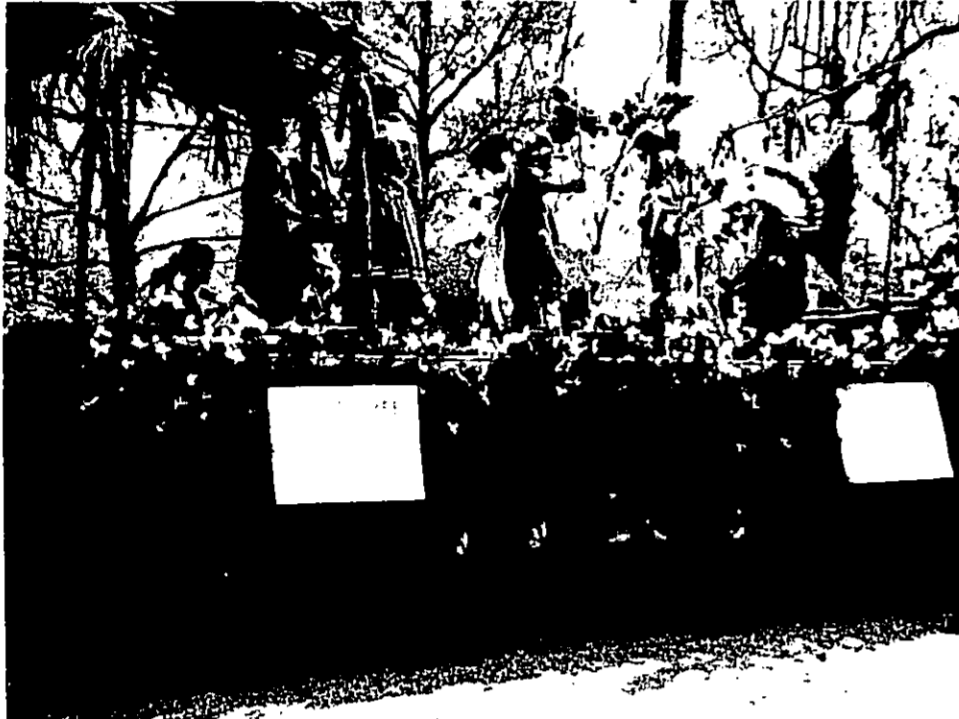
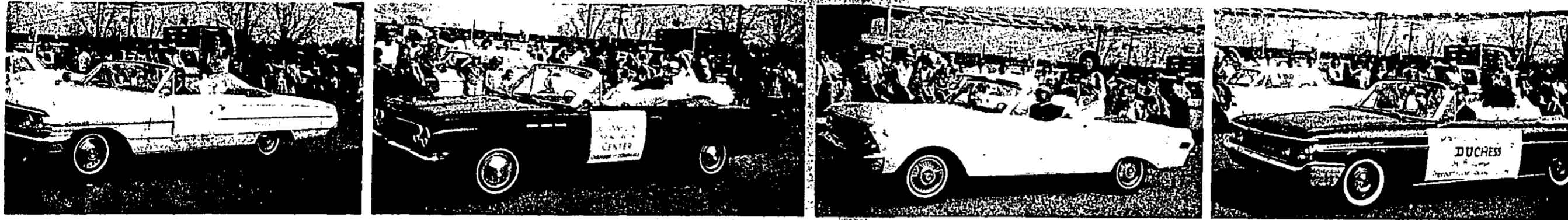

The 1964 Tyler County Dogwood Festival has come and gone, and on this page are a few scenes of the parade, amphitheatre and, of course, the king and queen.

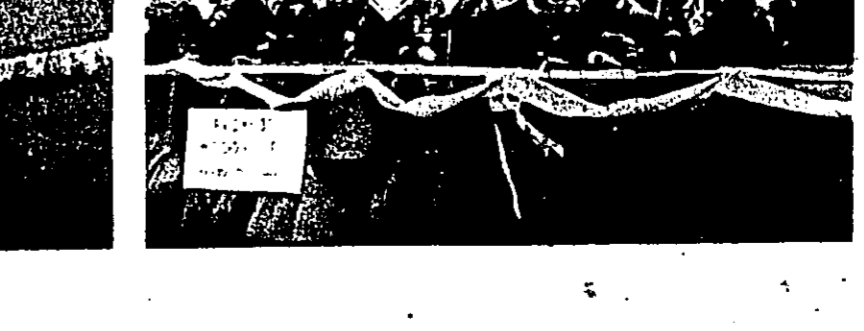
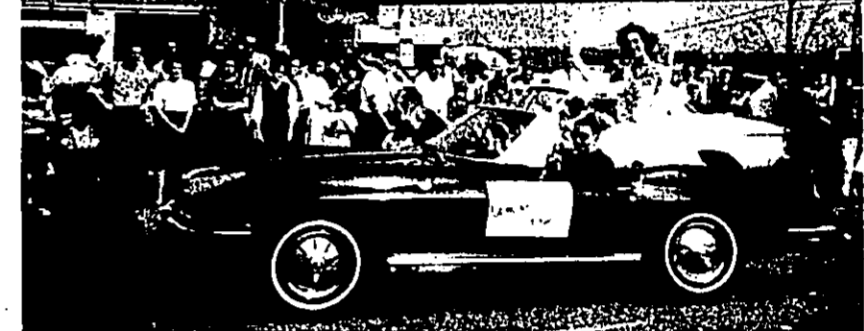

Conducted by Harriet Carr of the National Live Stock and Meat Board, Chicago, the meat cookery demonstration is designed to teach meal planners the most up-to-date techniques in the care, storage, preparation and serving of meat, the main menu ingredients.

"Today's homemaker selects her groceries from an assortment of some 8,000 items, so it is important that her choice of meat be correct if she is to buy accessory foods for a well-balanced, nutritious and economic meal to place on the family dinner table," notes Miss Carr. "The smart homemaker can save money and keep variety in her menus by keeping abreast of the latest cooking techniques for the new and different kinds and cuts of meat that are now available."

Meat cookery methods, including broiling, roasting, braising, and cooking in liquid, will be demonstrated during Harriet Carr's presentation. She will present such easy and practical, yet intriguing recipes as Pot-Roast a la Dill, Sunrise Lamb Chops, Smoked Pork Shoulder Butt--Apricot Glaze, and Cheese Hashburgers, all of which have been carefully tested in the Meat Board's kitchen laboratory.

To add to the value of the program, educational literature on meat--"PORTRAITS IN FOOD" recipe books containing recipes prepared at the meeting and other practical meat information--will be distributed to those in attendance.

Nationally recognized as an authority on foods, Miss Carr is well qualified through experience and training to bring her audience first-hand information on meat. She has a college degree in home economics and since graduation has worked in the food field.

Behind the Meat Board's meat cookery demonstration stands nearly 40 years experience in solving food problems and demonstrating food techniques for the food industry, institutions, restaurants and homemakers.

In addition, the Board sponsors scientific studies on food and nutrition. 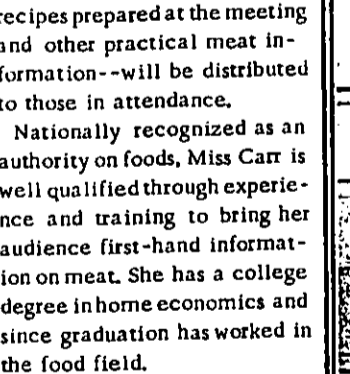

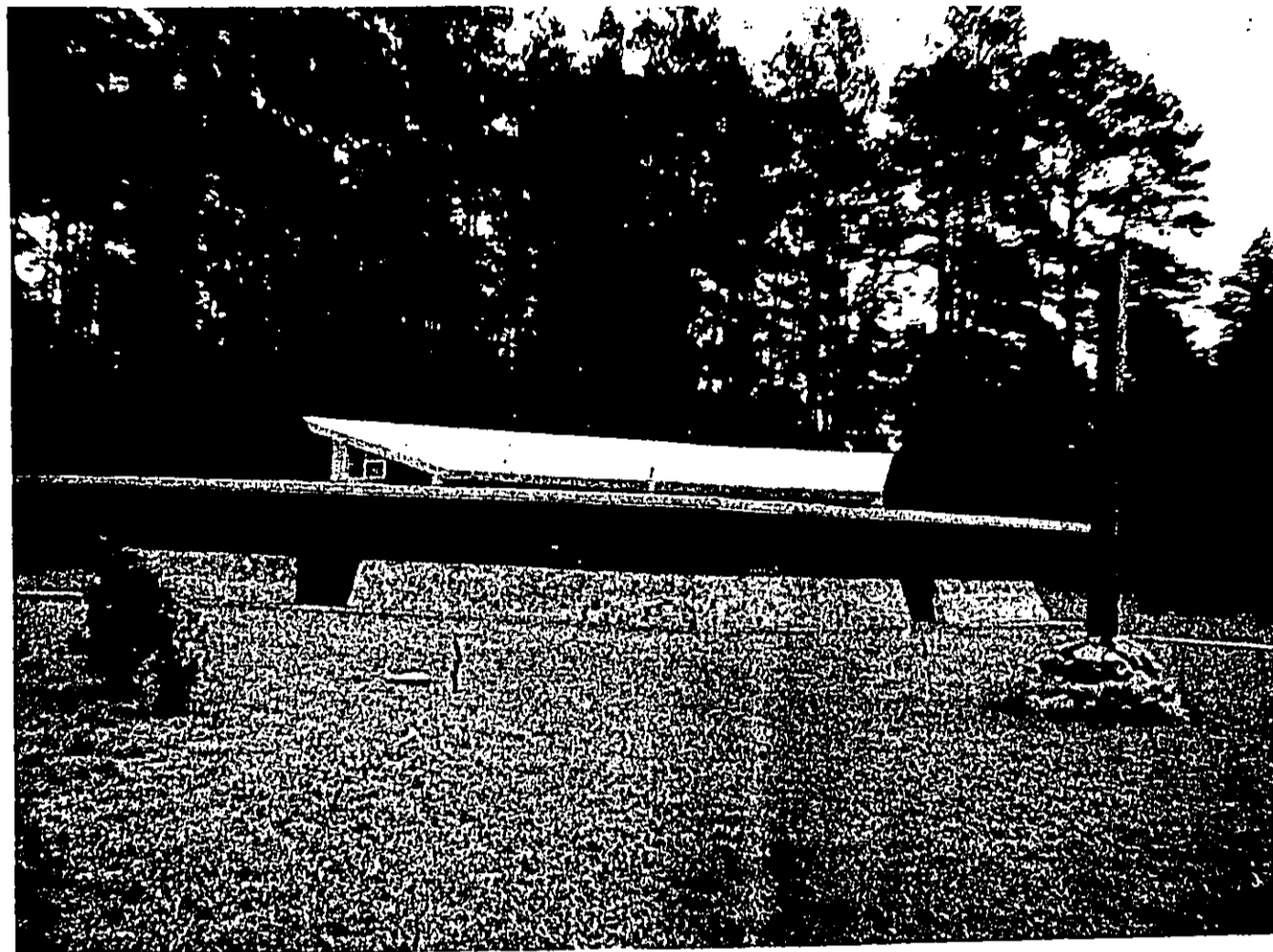

EXAM SLATED FOR RURAL MAIL CARRIER AT WARREN

An examination for rural carrier for the post office at Chester will be open for acceptance of applications until April 21, the U. S. Civil Service Commission announced in Washington today.

Applicants must take a written test for this position. They must have resided within the delivery of the post office for at least one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary limited appointments of one year.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, creed, color, or national origin.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being conducted. Application forms must be filed with U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415 and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.
