The post office department has been directed to reduce its overall costs of operation in line with President Johnson's economy drive, and this will result in some minor curtailments of service in the local post office, according to Postmaster H. M. Durham.

class mail will continue to be handled with the same priority; but that some other services of the office will be impaired.

The directive ordered a reduction in number of temporary employees, a cut in work hours of substitutes and a reduction in general operating expenses without impairing essential postal services, Mr. Durham said.

Mr. Durham said that in the Woodville post office the following adjustments in service are necessary:

There will be no money order service on Saturday either in the post office or on the rural route. It will be necessary to purchase money orders Monday through Friday.

Only one clerk will be available for window duty on Saturday. This clerk will handle parcel post, general delivery and stamp sales. Better service can be provided all patrons if full use of the stamp vending machine in the lobby of the post office.

There will be no box rent collections, meter settings, trust fund deposits, claims and inquiries nor general information furnished on Saturdays. There will be no after hours services provided.

Only the essential service of receipt and dispatch of first class and air mail will be provided on Sundays.

"Your cooperation in reaching these objectives and directives will be greatly appreciated by your local post office management and personnel," Mr. Durham said.

Candidates Try To Stir Voters As Primary Nears

Texas voters, including those in Tyler County, have less than ten days to pick their choices in the first Democratic primary which will be held May 2.

So far, the voters in Tyler County have not become too excited about the primary. Up to Tuesday at 10 a. m., only a handful—37 to be exact—had

voted absentee. Either nearly all voters will be in the county and will vote in person or those who will be out of their precinct May 2 do not care enough about the outcome to bother to vote absentee.

Political observers say that this is one of the quietest political campaigns they have seen

in the county, and reports from over the state indicates a general voter apathy in most of the 254 counties.

In Tyler County, six offices have contests. They are sheriff, tax assessor-collector, commissioners in precincts one and three, and constable in precinct two and three.

In addition, there are contests in the district attorney's race, and in District 7 State Representative race.

In county offices, the sheriff's race has two candidates—Grady Ray, the incumbent, and W. C. (Dub) Crews, Jr. of Colmesneil.

Another county-wide office in which there is opposition to the incumbent is tax assessor-collector. In this race are A. L. (Pete) Thornton, the incumbent V. D. (Ted) Tidwell and Herbert Dean.

For commissioner in precinct one are Howard Riley, the incumbent, who is being opposed by Carl Shepherd and Joe Best.

The only race with any heat so far is in precinct three commissioners race where four candidates are vying for this position.

The incumbent, H. A. Crews, is opposed by C. Edd Cruse, Ray M. Bendy and Leon Fowler.

Other races for which there are more than one candidate are for precinct two constable with Cecil Barnes opposed by Jeff Lamb, and in precinct three where Constable Ralph Marshall is being opposed by Harley Crews.

RAISING TOMATOES IN GREENHOUSE IN COUNTY

Mr. and Mrs. Bob Morris, who live about six miles out of the Woodville City limits on the Chester highway, have a project started which may signal the start of greenhouse growing of tomatoes, and perhaps other vegetables, in the area.

Morris is growing tomatoes in a plastic greenhouse for the off-season market. He has sold tomatoes at his home for three weeks or so, and the crop has just now reached its peak.

Morris, employed at Air Control, is running the greenhouse as a spare-time peoject while learning the intricities of raising tomatoes in a greenhouse, a project that's beset with varied problems.

Morris started the tomatoes in flats, and transferred them to the greenhouse in mid-October. One of the first problems was unexpected—the fertilizer had not been mixed deep enough and the plants didn't progress.

Actually, the plants this first year were transplanted into the greenhouse a month late. They should go into the house about the middle of September, Bob says, to really come on the market at the right time.

Even so, he is ahead of south



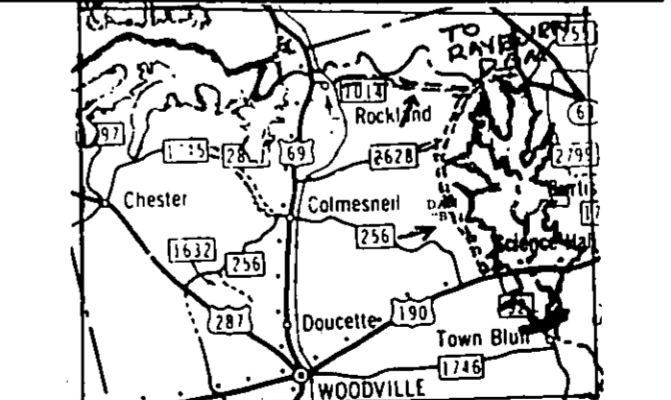
Texas tomatoes. He sells most of his tomatoes at the house to local customers who prefer to drive out after them because of their superior flavor.

Growing tomatoes in a greenhouse is exacting. Temperature must be right—nighttime temperature should be kept in the 60 to 75 degree range.

Greenhouse varieties used by Morris are Michigan-Ohio and manapal. These are for greenhouse growing only.

And by the way, if you smoke stay out of the greenhouse—the plants are subject to a disease carried by tobacco, tobacco mosaic.

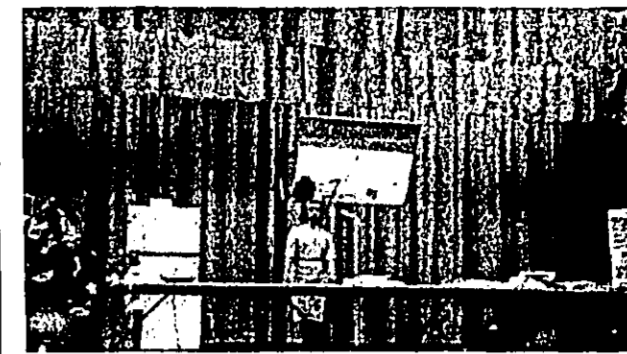
Samford said it is surprising to figure how many less deer this one needless killing of a doe and two fawn will amount to in a five year period.

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Long Leaf Soil District Notes

From The Roving Reporter of The Long Leaf SCD

A. L. "Pete" Thornton reported that the spillway or dam on his farm pond showed no signs of washing or eroding following the two big rains recently experienced. This farm pond was constructed last June with the dam and spill way fertilized and seeded to bermuda grass in preparation for future rains. The U. S. Soil Conservation Service technicians provided engineering assistance. Mr. Thornton also stated, "The pond is full of water and holding like a jug. A fence was built to provide livestock water from the pond but at the same time provide protection to the grassed dam and spillway. A number of acres is also being cleared of trees and brush in order to provide more pasture. A soil test is being

followed by Mr. Thornton in order to eliminate as much guess work as possible as to fertilizer requirements for all the grassland on this farm.

C. Lee Dismukes has recently completed two stockwater ponds on his farm near Bethany community. Vetch and Oats were planted for livestock and deer. About seventeen acres of Coastal Bermuda grass has been sprigged which makes a total of fifty acres improved pasture land on this farm. Fertilizer is to be applied as suggested by a soil analysis report from the Soil Testing Laboratory at Stephen F. Austin State College. Brush and weeds are being controlled by mowing and by chemical means.

A survey shows that since February 1, 1964, 53 farms in the Long Leaf SCD has either planted or is in process of planting Coastal Bermuda grass. The sprigging contractors are working harder than they ever worked trying to plant as much grass as possible by June or before the dryer or hotter weather

comes. The weather has been in most cases, unusually good for this operation. Packing with a roller following the sprigging machine has proven most successful in getting a good stand of grass. CONTINUED CAUTION to Coastal Bermuda farmers is urged to apply proper amounts and mixtures of fertilizer if they want to keep their plants up.

Miss Jan Die presented the Long Leaf Soil Conservation District of a most appropriate display of cuttings from 61 different species of trees from this area. These cuttings are about seven inches in length, are labeled and are placed on a mounting board representing a tree. This display may be seen in the Soil Conservation Service Office in the J. B. Best Building. We are most grateful Miss Jan, for this nice gift that can and is being shared with others.

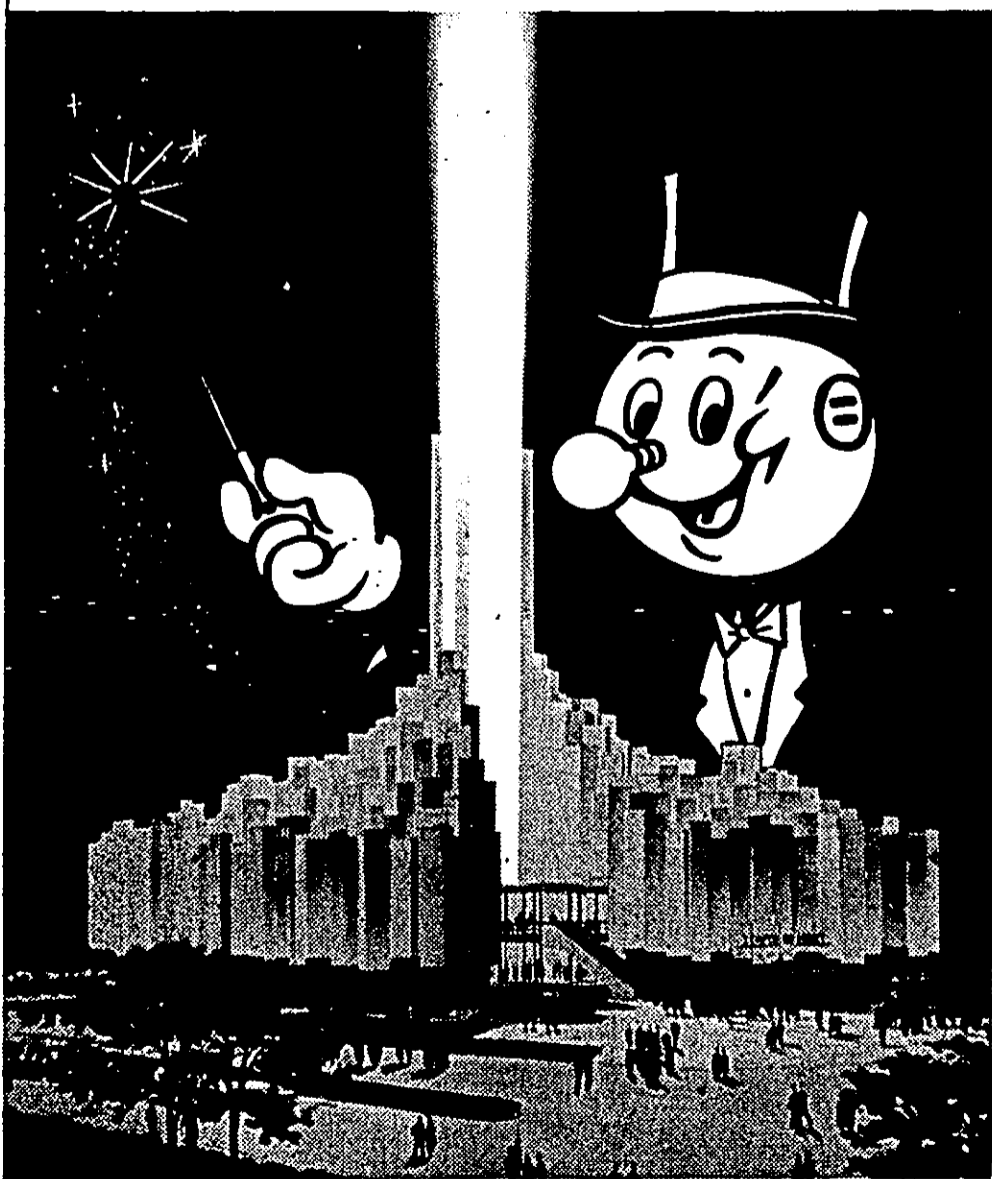

Adventures in Homemaking

Motorloaf Bread

4 cups wholewheat flour
w teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 to 1 cup nuts or raisins
2 cups buttermilk
1 egg
2 tablespoons salad oil
1/2 cup molasses

Sift flour before measuring. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Stir in nuts or raisins. Add other ingredients and stir just enough to dampen flour mixture. Put in greased bread pan. Bake in oven of 350 degrees for one hour. Let the bread stand in the pan for ten minutes before trying to take it out of the pan.

This recipe was found in a woman's magazine almost fifty years ago by my mother. Pictured on the page was mother in her chiffon scarf and duster. The children wore long black cotton stockings. Father had on a cap for touring and sat on the running board of the open-topped automobile.

In the early days of the automobile a roadside picnic was becoming the custom and sandwiches made from this bread was suggested by the editor.

Drive-ins were non-existent. Through the years the recipe has been used because the need for bouyant, good health is always vital. Knowing the chemical names of the B-vitamins have not diminished the food value of whole grain wheat. Making it is as simple as a mix. It is especially good spread with cream cheese. A pot of baked beans and a tossed salad help to make an outdoor meal. In recent years wholewheat flour has become so hard to find on grocer's shelves that one has come to consider it a delicacy. However, a discovery of 5-pound sacks of whole wheat flour was made at Hutto's grocery store in Warren. While the bread is baking there is time to pick up one of the books now on the best selling list--The Shoes of the Fisherman by West, The Venetian Affair by MacInnes, or A Day in the Life of President Kennedy by Bishop.
