# NATIONAL BANK IS TURNED DOWN

Organizers of the proposed First National Bank of Woodville were notified Monday by William B. Camp, deputy controller of the Currency, that the application for the bank has been disapproved. The decision was conveyed to the group through a letter to James H. Dillon, of Houston, attorney for the organizers. Application for the bank was filed February 17 by a group of Tyler County men. Application showed that the proposed bank

would have capital stock of \$200,000, surplus of \$200,000 and undivided profits of \$100,000. Stock in the proposed bank was offered to the public in the county, and was over-subscribed in a short while. One of the organizers of the proposed bank said that until information is received as to the grounds for the disapproval, the group will have no comment on the action.

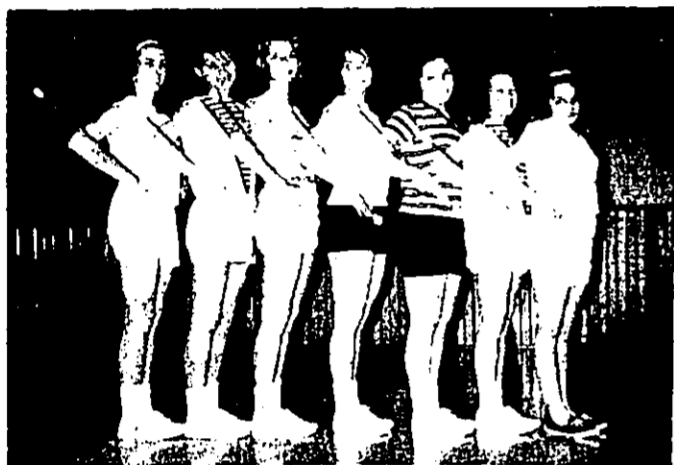

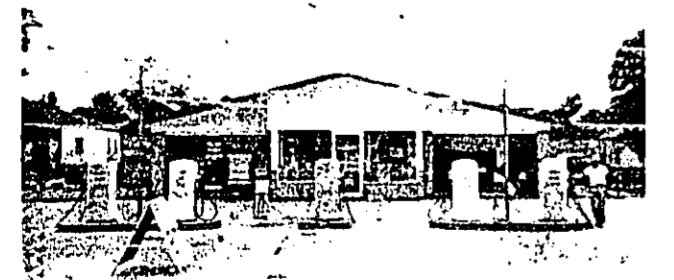

Tyler County voters turned out in record numbers Saturday in the first Democratic primary and settled all but one local race—that of county commissioner in precinct one. In the other contested races, tax assessor-collector and the precinct two commissioner, the

voters selected a Democratic nominee without a run-off. In the sheriff's race, where the incumbent had only one opponent, Sheriff Grady Ray won handily over W. C. Crews, Jr., by a 2326 to 540 unofficial tally. A. L. (Pete) Thornton, county tax assessor-collector, polled a

majority over V. D. Tidwell and Herbert Dean. Thornton had a total of 1607 to Dean's 704 and Tidwell's 554.

Incumbent Commissioner for precinct one, Howard L. Riley, was forced into a run-off with Joe L. Best. Voting in this race was Best 581, Riley 517 and 307 for Carl Shepherd, third man in the race.

In precinct two, Leon Fowler scraped the ballot plate almost clean, leaving poor pickings for his three opponents. H. A. Crews, the incumbent, came in second with 94 votes, C. Edd Cruse had 73, and Ray M. Bondy 61. The rest of them belonged to Fowler, all 509 of them.

The county favored John Connally for governor, Preston Smith for lieutenant governor, Ralph Yarborough for U. S. Senator, Joe Pool for Congressman-at-large, and Jerry Sadler for the general land office commissioner.

Also Jesse Owens for Railroad Commissioner, Sears McGee for the Supreme Court, and James F. Parker for the 9th Judicial district of the Court of Civil Appeals. Congressman Jack Brooks received 2851 votes. Write-ins in this race were Mrs. J. R. Willis, 13; Smokey Stover four and Pat Brown, 1.

## TRIMBLE AND MILLER IN REPRESENTATIVE RUN-OFF

Grady Trimble of Jasper and J. E. Miller, Jr., of Burkeville are the two high candidates in the field of seven on the ballot for State Representative, District 7, and will face each other in the run-off primary on June 7. Unofficial returns Monday showed that Trimble lead the race with 3426 votes. Miller was second with 2508.

Over 13,000 votes were cast in the four-county race. Other candidates and their unofficial tally Monday were H. Fletcher Weaver 2301; Ruth Gillespie 1666; Joe "Bill" Kelley 1331; Claude B. Graves 1194 and D. B. Ferrell 906.

## REPUBLICANS SET COUNTY CONVENTION SATURDAY

The Republican County Convention will be held Saturday night at the school recreation hall. Time for the meeting is 7:00 p. m.

In the primary election Saturday, the Republicans polled a total of 45 votes in their boxes at Woodville and Warren. Jack Risinger was elected Republican county chairman. He was unopposed and will succeed Dr. R. E. Swearingen.

The Republicans had no candidates for county offices, and only one state office had opposition in the Republican primary. That was in the race for United States Senator, with four candidates. Jack Cox polled a majority of the votes in Tyler County with 36. George Bush received 14, and Robert Morris one vote. No vote was recorded for the fourth candidate, Dr. Milton V. Davis of Dallas.

Cox and Bush will face each other in the only state run-off in the second Republican primary on June 6. Dr. John Greco received 16 write-in votes for U. S. Representative, Second Congressional District. In the presidential preference vote, county Republicans gave Sen. Barry Goldwater most of their votes. He tallied 36, while Nelson Rockefeller and Sen. Margaret Chase Smith received one each.

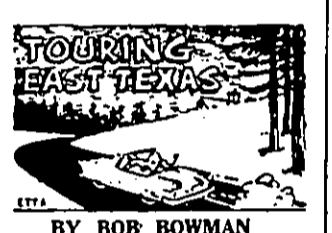
**Band To Give Spring Concert**

**TOURING EAST TEXAS**  
BY BOB BOWMAN  
EAST TEXAS - newest and most unusual tourist attraction is Heritage Garden, lying just west of Woodville on U. S. Highway 190.

Rare photographs, historical documents, maps and pictorial records of Texas' past—from pioneer days through the Roaring Twenties—are preserved in ceramic.

There also is a 98-year-old restored log cabin known to East Texans as "the Tolar Kitchen." It has been outfitted with hundreds of pioneer relics. Admission to the Garden is 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

A ROTTING log structure, once a major stopover for frontier travelers, is on its way toward becoming a principal tourist attraction in Houston County.

Crockett Community Council is relocating and restoring the old Rice Stagecoach Inn, located northeast of Crockett on Texas Hwy. 21.

When the project is completed, the inn will be operated in much the same fashion that Salado Inn, near Salado, is done.

Only one other stagecoach inn, Halfway House near Chireno, is left in East Texas.

JAMES H. Barfield, 67, who operates a Lufkin blacksmith shop, may be the last maker of wooden wagon wheels in East Texas.

He quit a good railroad job 22 years ago to join his father in the blacksmith business. Many of the tools in his shop came from Martin Wagon Co., a pioneer Lufkin industry that specialized in eight-wheel log wagons.
