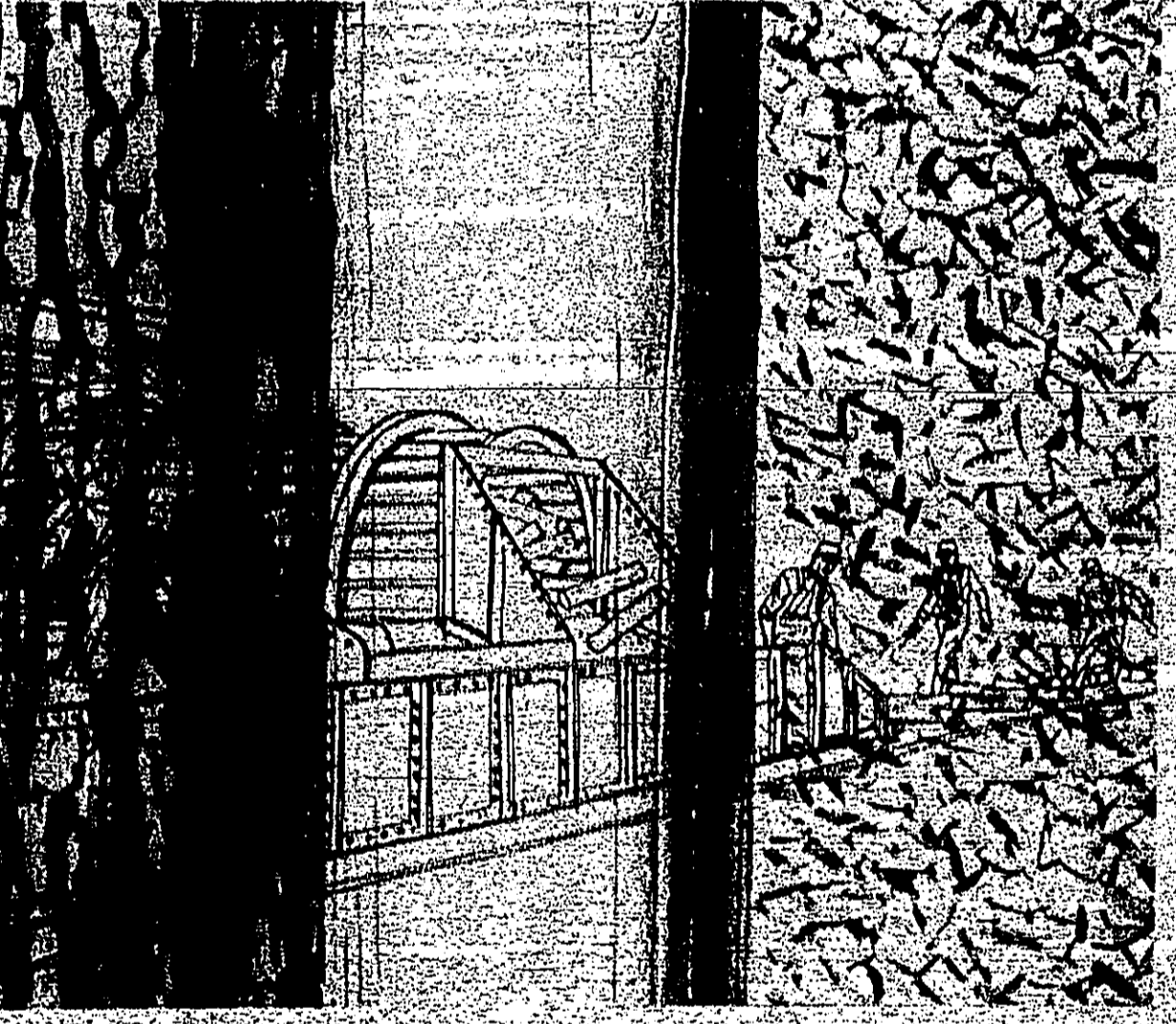

The woodyard... where papermaking begins

At the Southland plant, the paper-making process begins at the woodyard. There, four-foot sticks of pulpwood are prepared for the two pulp mills.

First, the bark is removed by tumbling the logs against each other in a revolving drum. (The bark is used for boiler fuel.)

Next, the logs are sorted. As they leave the debarking drums on a wide rubber belt, the logs of better grade are selected and sent by conveyor to the groundwood pulp mill.

The other logs, as they move by conveyor to the chemical pulp mill, pass

through the chipper building where rotating knives reduce the logs to chips about the size of a postage stamp. (Chips bought from sawmills are unloaded at this building and added to the chips made by Southland.)

The function of the woodyard, then, is to receive pulpwood, remove the bark, send some of the logs to the groundwood pulp mill, and send the others in chip form to the chemical pulp mill. The next two ads in this series will tell how pulp is made.

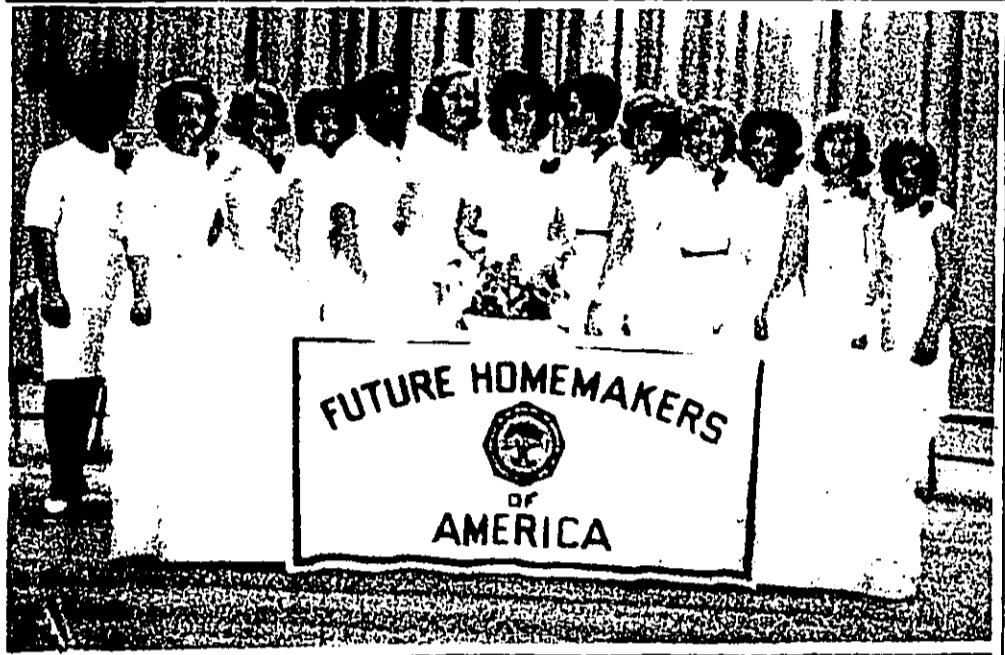

NEW FM ROAD PROJECTS APPROVED IN COUNTY

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$167,800 for construction of new Farm to Market Road mileage in Tyler County as part of the 1964 FM Road program, announced District Engineer W. E. Simmons of Beaumont.

The projects in this county include additional finances for work on FM 2803 from FM 256 at Colmesnell northwest approximately 3.5 miles. Estimated cost is \$20,000.

The other project is from FM 2863 3.5 miles northwest of FM 256, 5.9 miles west to end of FM 1745. This project will cost an estimated \$147,000.

Woodville Housing Authority has been granted a \$685,369 loan to build 56 units of low-income housing, according to telegrams received by Gilbert Wright, chairman, from Congressman Jack Brooks and Senator Ralph Yarborough. Sixteen of the units will be designated for senior citizens and will be built in a suitable location for elderly persons. The other 40 units will be built on two separate locations for low income persons. Rental of the units when built will be based on the wages or income of the renter. The Woodville Housing Au-

thority was created last year to enable Woodville to secure the low-rental units which are financed over a period of 40 years and are designed to repay the loan with interest in this time. Felton Stanley, secretary of Woodville Housing Authority, said that definite sites are under consideration and now that funds are available plans will be accelerated to get the units under construction.

Other members of the Woodville Housing Authority besides Mr. Wright are J. Wood Fain, Morris Clemmons, Jr., Frank I. Robinson and Fred Platt.

Two To Attend Nuclear Symposium

Charles Blanks, Jr., and James M. Hays, a student and teacher, respectively, at Kirby High School, have been selected through careful screening to attend the fourth annual Texas Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas June 7-10. It was announced from Austin this week. Blanks, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Blanks, Sr., of Woodville, and Hays will attend the symposium under the sponsorship of Gulf States Utilities Company, according to Frank Robinson, Gulf States local superintendent.

The four-day symposium is jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. The Foundation is made up of Gulf States and nine other investor-owned electric utilities in Texas.

Blanks and Mr. Hays will join some 500 selected high school science students and teachers from across the state at the Austin conference, which annually features several of the world's leading nuclear scientists as lecturers.

"The Foundation, which is co-sponsoring with the General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation the world's largest privately-financed research effort in the field of controlled nuclear fusion, is also seeking through its sponsorship of science symposiums to contribute to scientific education and understanding in Texas," Mr. Robinson said.

"The meeting seek to bring to science students and teachers of Texas lectures on nuclear physics and related topics by outstanding scientists and to provide the students with an opportunity to obtain answers to their questions on scientific careers and college curricula."

Blanks, whose father is a superintendent at Air Control Corporation, is a junior at Kirby High School. An A-average student, he plans to continue his education at the University of Texas following graduation. He will study to become an electronics engineer.

The 16-year old Woodville youth was vice president of his freshman class and he won several awards in science while in junior high. More recently, he won the district debate contest. Blanks plays football, basket-

Tyler County Commissioners' Court at its meeting Monday passed an order for an election to be held June 20 on the creation of the Tyler County Hospital District. The commissioners had indicated that when the improve-

ments and additions to the Tyler County Hospital were completed, they would call an election on the creation of the district which was authorized by the Legislature in the 1963 session. The hospital district must be

approved by a majority of the taxpaying voters of Tyler County. It will have taxing authority, with the rate set at not over 75 cents per \$100 valuation.

County Judge Jeff R. Mooney has explained that the county has only one alternative to the hospital district - another increase in property valuation. Mr. Mooney said that Tyler County's tax rate is now at the peak allowed under Texas law. Without the hospital district, the county will have to raise property valuations by several million dollars in order to retire the hospital indebtedness.

The county's property valuation is now around \$14,000,000. Mooney says that the advantage of a hospital district lies in the difference in county tax division with the state, which gets 42 cents per \$100 valuation of county taxes. The state will not share any of the taxes of the hospital district. The tax rate of the district is expected to be around 25 cents per \$100 valuation.

This alone will save county tax payers thousands of dollars over the present arrangement, since the county is obligated to retire the hospital bonds one way or another, Mooney said.

FULLERTON REUNION SUNDAY MAY 17

Literally hundreds of people are planning to attend the Fullerton reunion of former residents of "Old Fullerton", Rustville and Cravens, saw mill towns of long ago, to be held in the Fullerton Recreation Park on Sunday, June 7.

The reunion association was formed in 1960, and more than a thousand people returned for the first reunion and almost as many for the following years.

Located in the Kisatchie National Forest, near Leesville and DeRidder, La., the Fullerton Recreation Park is becoming a showplace in Vernon Parish. The U. S. Forest Service has improved the park area in every respect and last year the roads leading there have been paved and black-topped. There are winding gravelled trails, new pump and water system, drinking fountains, rest rooms, bathhouse, swimming facilities and a good place to fish. Concrete tables and barbecue pits are scattered around among the trees.

The pretty and prosperous saw mill town of Fullerton cost \$3,500,000.00. It was the largest yellow pine saw mill west of the Mississippi, and old timers say the second largest in the world at that time. The mill "cut out" in 1927.

In 1906, Mr. S. H. Fullerton, organizer of the great lumber concern, organized the Gulf Lumber Company, purchasing the Wright-Blodgett tract of virgin timber in Bernon Parish at a cost of \$6,000,000.00. From these pines, whose clean yellow boards built homes for thousands, Mr. Fullerton became a multi-millionaire. (160,000 acres included in above tract of land)

The mill consumed 420,000 logs each year, or about 210,000 trees annually. This means, quickly multiplied, that 4,200,000 trees have gone through the Fullerton mill. Figuring rapidly, it was estimated at that time that the value of the mill's output since its cradle days was \$60,000,000.00.

The Fullerton payroll was \$900,000.00 per year, distributed to 650 employees who in turn supported 3500 people. There were approximately 5,000 people living in and around Fullerton at the time the mill finished its run.

The people went to the ends of the earth... and since our first reunion in 1960, they have returned from the states of Wash. Ill., Calif., Oregon, Ark., New Mexico, Louisiana, Texas, Florida, Alabama, Okla., Dist. of Columbia, Mississippi, and Arizona. We have heard from others half way around the world.

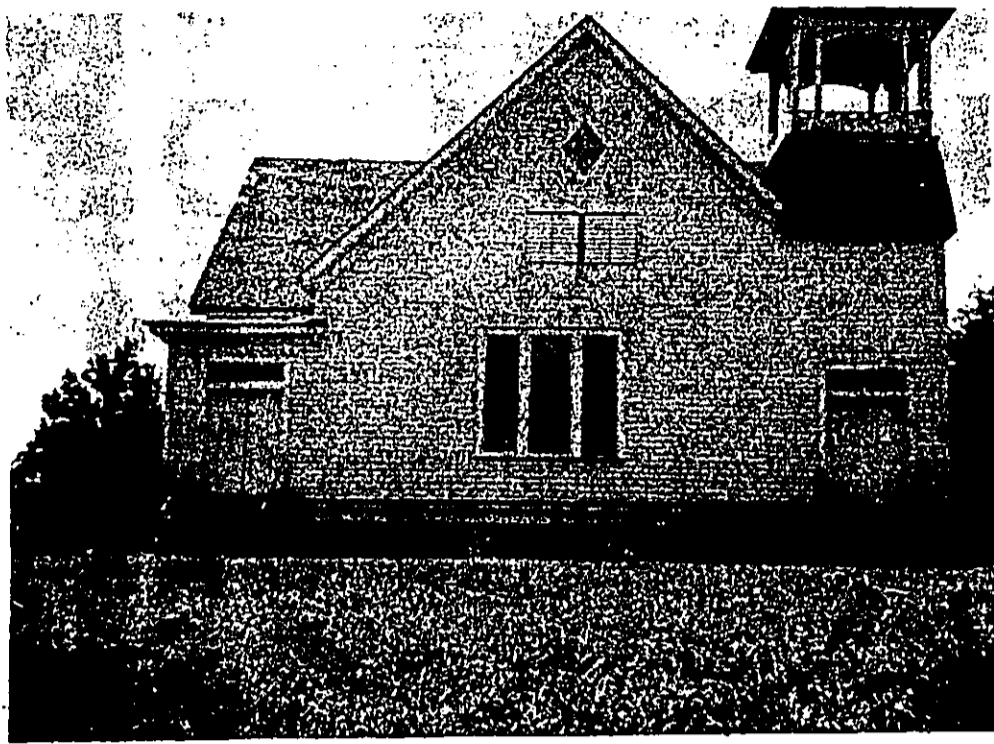

Commissioner Riley introduced an order and made a motion that it be passed. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Crews. The motion, carrying with it the passage of the order, prevailed by the following vote: AYES: Commissioners Riley, Powell, Crews and Hicks. NOES: None.

The County Judge announced that the order had been finally passed. The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, the Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session in 1963 enacted Chapter 110 (Article 1454a-10, V. A. T. S.) authorizing the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of a Hospital District to be known as TYLER COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT and to be coextensive with the boundaries of Tyler County, Texas; and

WHEREAS, said Act provided that said Hospital District would not be created unless and until an election is duly held in the County for such purpose; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Tyler County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of Tyler County and its inhabitants that the question of the creation of such Hospital District be submitted to a vote of the qualified property taxpayers electors of said County:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF TYLER COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held throughout Tyler County, Texas, on the 20th day of June, 1964, which date is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION
SHALL there be created a Hospital District coextensive with the boundaries of Tyler County, Texas, with the authority to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75¢) on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property therein and assume all outstanding bonds heretofore issued by Tyler County for Hospital purposes?

OFFICIAL BALLOT FOR THE CREATION OF A HOSPITAL DISTRICT; PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF A TAX NOT TO EXCEED SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS (75¢) ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLAR VALUATION; AND PROVIDING FOR THE ASSUMPTION BY SUCH DISTRICT OF ALL OUTSTANDING BONDS HERETOFORE ISSUED BY TYLER COUNTY FOR HOSPITAL PURPOSES.

AGAINST THE CREATION OF A HOSPITAL DISTRICT; PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF A TAX NOT TO EXCEED SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS (75¢) ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLAR VALUATION; AND PROVIDING FOR THE ASSUMPTION BY SUCH DISTRICT OF ALL OUTSTANDING BONDS HERETOFORE ISSUED BY TYLER COUNTY FOR HOSPITAL PURPOSES.

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

The said election shall be held under the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas and only qualified property taxpayers voters of Tyler County, Texas, shall be allowed to vote.

A copy of this order signed by the County Judge of Tyler County, Texas, and attested by the County Clerk of said county shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The County Judge is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be posted up at the County Courthouse door and in each election precinct at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of the election.

The County Judge is further authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be published in some newspaper of general circulation published within said County, on the same day in each of three (3) successive weeks, the date of the first publication to be not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date set for said election.

CARRIERS TO DISTRIBUTE SURVEY CARDS

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to the survey," Mr. Barnes explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

The carrier assisting with the survey is Annie M. Seaman, Route 1.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crop, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry in making important business decisions," Mr. Barnes concludes.

COUNTY FARM AGENT'S NOTES
By CLINTON CURRIE

Tomato growers who have not used plastic mulch can prevent fruit rot on their tomatoes by staking or by placing newspapers under vines to prevent contact with the soil, reports C. R. Currie, County Agent.

Staking tomato plants sometimes produces larger, better quality fruit. It also keeps them cleaner and makes plants easier to spray. However, staked tomatoes are likely to have more cracking, blossom-end rot, and sunscald, Currie said.

Placing whole sections of newspapers under tomato vines is an easy way to prevent fruit rot. Currie suggests putting papers down after the vines are heavy enough to keep them from blowing away. Plastic drycleaner bags can be used the same way, he said.

When staking tomatoes, place sturdy, five-foot stakes about one foot in the ground. Set them about four inches from the plant and avoid cutting tomato roots when setting them. Use of soft cord or strips of old cloth will lessen injury to plants when tying them, Currie said.

A good method of tying plant to stakes is to loop the material around the main stem; then cross it between the stem and the stake to form a figure eight. Tie it back of the stake.

If pruning is necessary, Currie says to break off shoots that grow from the crotch formed by a leaf branch at the main stem. Break the shoots, rather than cutting them, because a knife may spread disease, Currie said.

THE MYTH OF OYSTER "R" MONTH

This may come as a shock to many Americans. The 'myth' or belief that oysters shouldn't be eaten in any month that doesn't have an "R" in its name is fiction, says Wallace Klusmann, wildlife specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A recent research report released by the U. S. Department of Interior's Bureau of Commercial Fisheries shows the 'myth' or belief has no scientific basis. In fact, May and June are cited as the best two months for dining on the mollusks.

Oysters are fatter and taste better in the spring because they are storing glycogen -- an animal starch -- in preparation for the summer spawning season, says Klusmann. During the summer and early fall, oysters become thinner, their nectar watery and their flavor declines, he explains.

The oyster industry would benefit, according to the report, if the peak of the oyster harvest was changed from fall to late spring. It was pointed out that oyster mortality is usually heaviest in summer with losses ranging from 25 to 50 percent. An earlier harvest could therefore result in the harvest of more bushels of oysters from a given area.

But, the specialist said, the Bureau doesn't expect any sudden change in harvest tradition until more people ask for oysters on the menu in "Ray, Rune, Jury and August."

Home Demonstration Agent's Column
BY MAURINE MOONEY

To retain the goodness of fresh meat, it must be packaged in moisture-proof-vapor-proof paper or containers and frozen quickly at 0 degrees Fahrenheit or lower.

However, do not freeze beef, pork or chicken in quantity in home freezers. Allow one cubic foot of freezer space for each 3 to 4 pounds of warm food during a 24 hour period.

Cold air dries, and if meat is not packaged properly, it turns a grayish color and becomes hard and dry. This is called "freezer burn". Since meats must be used as soon as thawed, package them in sizes to suit the family needs. Common butcher paper, household aluminum foil and household wax paper will not prevent moisture from evaporating from frozen meat.

The "drug store wrap" is the most efficient and popular method of wrapping frozen foods, and is performed by placing the meat in the center of the paper. Takehold of opposite sides of paper and fold down tightly to meat, so as to drive out the air. Then fold in the two ends, pressing air out and make wrap as tight as possible.

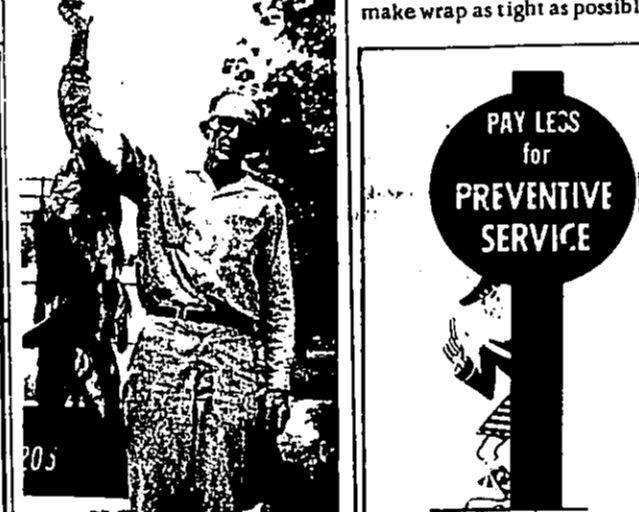

FIRE DEPARTMENT ASKS YOUR COOPERATION Each year the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department answers some 100 calls for help. These calls vary in nature, and occur at all hours of the day or night.

In fire fighting the best weapon is time. To take advantage of this a Fire Department must move and move fast, because once a fire starts it waits on no one.

The local fire truck before leaving makes the courthouse square, not for a hot rod race or a red light and siren serenade, but to pick up members of the department who catch the truck on its way to the fire.

During this course the truck usually picks up from ten to 30 cars ranging from some firemen to the hot rodder, sightseer or even the well wisher. These cars usually act as police escorts ahead of the truck or stack up behind the truck in some cases to, "just follow."

Once the truck reaches the fire it is usually a task to position the truck at the right place because his escort has already parked and left his car to see "what is going on." After several cars are moved the truck driver is able to get into position; after a considerable time loss.

After the truck has depleted its water supply (out side the city limits) he must leave the fire for a refill, and upon his return, yes, you guessed it, someone had blocked his path again.

These things can be prevented and your local fire department urges all citizens going to a fire to please use good judgement. Don't follow directly behind a fire truck and always park at least 200 yards from the fire. Leave the firemen room to perform their duties.

Please, don't let your careless act be responsible for the loss of someone's home or possible their life!
