ELBERT WOODROME TO TAKE PART IN LANGUAGE INSTITUTE AT HOUSTON

Elbert W. Woodrome, son of Dave Woodrome of Woodville and teacher of Spanish in the High School in Nederland, has been invited to participate in a seven-week Language Institute June 4-July 22 at Texas Southern University in Houston. Mr. Woodrome is one of 50 teachers selected from almost 100 applicants who applied from all over the United States. He is a graduate of Kirby High School.

The Institute will emphasize "total immersion" in the language with formal classes in conversation and composition, civilization, and linguistics. A course in modern teaching techniques supplemented by demonstration classes, will provide additional training for the participating Secondary School Teachers. Participants will live in University residences. Native speakers of French and Spanish will live with them to insure that ONLY the foreign language is spoken.

Absentee Voting Closes June 2

Absentee voting for the Democratic and Republican primary run-off elections began Wednesday and will continue through June 2.

County Clerk Tom Sawyer pointed out that the law allows only a short period for voting absentee in the second or run-off primaries, and urged everyone who is going to cast an absentee ballot to do so immediately.

In the Democratic run-off in Tyler County, only three offices are on the ballot, all others having been settled in the first primary.

One state-wide run-off, one

district and one precinct race are on the county ballot.

The only local race is in the precinct one contest for commissioner, in which Joe I. Best and Howard L. Riley, the incumbent, are the candidates.

In the state-wide race, Joe Pool of Dallas County and Robert W. Baker of Harris County are in the run-off for Congressman at Large.

The district race is for Representative, District 7, which is contested by Grady Trimble of Jasper County and J. E. Miller, Jr. of Newton County.

On the Republican run-off ballot is only one race in which Jack Cox and George Bush are vying for the Republican nomination for United States Senator. The winner will oppose the incumbent Democrat, Ralph W. Yarborough, in the November general election.

OLD DEED PLACES FORT TERAN ON TYLER COUNTY SIDE OF NECHES RIVER

A deed filed September 16, 1846, in Book A, Page 1, of the Deed Records of Tyler County definitely locates Fort Teran on the Tyler County side of the Neches River.

The deed reads as follows: Samuel T. Belt To Frost Thorn, Deed of Conveyance for land. Filed in my office for record on the 16th September A. D. 1846. The Republic of Texas [

County of Nacogdoches.] Know all men by these presents that I Samuel T. Belt of the County of Liberty in said Republic for and in consideration of the sum of Thirty one hundred Dollars to me in hand paid by Frost Thorn of said County of Nacogdoches, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged

have this day granted, bargained, sold and released and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell, and release unto said Thorn a certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in said County of Liberty, containing Twenty seven hundred and five acres more or less, being a part of the head right of said Belt situated on the west bank of the Neches River including the old Camp station or fort known and called by the name of Teran.

To have and to hold the said land and bargained premises to the said Frost Thorn his heirs and assigns forever, and the said Samuel T. Belt does hereby for himself, his heirs, executors and administrators covenant to warrant and forever defend the title of the above bargained land and premises to the said Thorn and his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, against the claims of all persons whatever.

Given under my hand and seal by way of seal on this fifth day of July in the year of our lord Eighteen hundred and forty five.

NOTICE OF ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF TYLER

TO ALL QUALIFIED PROPERTY TAXPAYING VOTERS OF TYLER COUNTY, TEXAS:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 20th day of June, 1964, throughout TYLER COUNTY, TEXAS, on the proposition and at the places more particularly set forth in the ORDER calling the election passed by the Commissioners' Court of Tyler County, Texas, on May 11, 1964, and which election order is made a part of this Notice and is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

ELECTION ORDER THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF TYLER

On this the 11th day of May, 1964, the Commissioners' Court of Tyler County, Texas, convened in regular session at a Regular Term thereof, at the regular meeting place in the Courthouse in Woodville, Texas, with all members of the Court present, to-wit:

- J. R. Mooney, County Judge, 111. Riley, Commissioner Precinct No. 1, H. H. Powell, Commissioner Precinct No. 2, H. A. Crews, Commissioner Precinct No. 3, French C. Hicks, Commissioner Precinct No. 4, Tom Sawyer, County Clerk, when, among other proceedings had, were the following:

Commissioner Riley introduced an order and made a motion that it be passed. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Crews. The motion, carrying with it the passage of the order, prevailed by the following vote: AYES: Commissioners Riley, Powell, Crews and Hicks. NOES: None.

The County Judge announced that the order had been finally passed. The order is as follows: WHEREAS, the Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session in 1943 enacted Chapter 110 (Article 4494c-10, V. A. T. S.) authorizing the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of a Hospital District to be known as TYLER COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT and to be coextensive with the boundaries of Tyler County, Texas; and WHEREAS, said Act provided that said Hospital District would not be created unless and until an election is duly held in the County for such purpose; and WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Tyler County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of Tyler County and its inhabitants that the question of the creation of such Hospital District be submitted to a vote of the qualified property taxpaying electors of said County;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF TYLER COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held throughout Tyler County, Texas, on the 20th day of June, 1964, which date is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION SHALL there be created a Hospital District coextensive with the boundaries of Tyler County, Texas, with the authority to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75¢) on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property therein and assume all outstanding bonds heretofore issued by Tyler County for Hospital purposes?

That the polling places, Presiding Judges, and Alternate Presiding Judges for said election shall be as follows: Precinct Number, Voting Place Judges: 1. Courthouse, Woodville; W. H. Risinger, presiding judge; Felton Stanley, alternate presiding judge.

SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS (75¢) ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLAR VALUATION; AND PROVIDING FOR THE ASSUMPTION BY SUCH DISTRICT OF ALL OUTSTANDING BONDS HERETOFORE ISSUED BY TYLER COUNTY FOR HOSPITAL PURPOSES.

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

The said election shall be held under the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas and only qualified property taxpaying voters of Tyler County, Texas, shall be allowed to vote.

A copy of this order signed by the County Judge of Tyler County, Texas, and attested by the County Clerk of said county shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The County Judge is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be posted up at the County Courthouse door and in each election precinct at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of the election.

The County Judge is further authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be published in some newspaper of general circulation published within said County, on the same day in each of three (3) successive weeks, the date of the first publication to be not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date set for said election.

EARLY HISTORY OF COLMESNEIL

Part II of the History of Colmesneil

In addition to the hotels of Ogden mentioned above, there were three prosperous hotels which began operation in what was known as the lower town. The J. E. Riely home, or the old Meadows home, was originally the Douglas Hotel. Mr. Douglas was immaculate and outstanding in appearance and was an excellent leader in church work. To the rear of this hotel was a little store operated by a man who called himself Cheap John. He was a talented musician and would draw the crowd by playing his accordion. Then he would auction off his wares.

The Fortenberry Hotel was the smaller two-story part of the old East Texas Hotel still standing next to the road. In 1888 Mrs. Minnie Sturrock, as she recalls with her grand-mother, Mrs. Mary Enloe, had lunch at this hotel and waited for the train that would take her to Woodville for a visit with her uncle, George Enloe, sheriff of the county. Other early proprietors were the Gormans, who were Mrs. Marty's family, and the McDonalds, and later, the Wobdalls, Perry Manns and the Matthews.

The Collier Hotel was built on the site where Marlin Fortenberry's home now stands and the name was later changed to the Commercial Hotel. The Widow Leggett ran this hotel for years, and married Dave Russell, a large man connected with the T. H. Neyland business. Jim Miller bought the hotel and sold it to John Mann, Sr. and later Isaac Hayes and Tom Abbott had their turns as proprietors.

During the days of Ogden's prosperity, two churches near the old Masonic Hall seemed to have been well attended. To the west of this building was a Catholic Church and on a little clay hill to the rear, and very near the old Shillings home, was a Methodist church. The Baptist church had its birth under a brush arbor on the branch in what is now Pat Gleaves' pasture, to the left of Lake Tejas road. Bro. Arnold Rhodes did the preaching and he was said to have been a great exhorter and one to stir the hearts of his listeners to the point of overflowing. The first church building was a long structure built on the side of the hill where the Katy church now stands.

Here Bro. Jeff Rhodes, Bro. Arnold's son, was one of the principal preachers. He was also very powerful and an excellent orator. The rear end of the building was several feet off the ground, so when a storm came in 1902, the house was wrecked. The pastor then was Bro. John Martin. Month after month he was shepherd of his little flock in visiting the ill and feeding the attendants on the gospel, accepting no money for his services while the good women of the church raised funds for the erection of a smaller building. Mrs. Mollie Shillings, Virginia Sturrock, Ella

Meadows, Tibitha Mann and others worked tirelessly at the task while the men did the building. To announce services, Bro. Martin's brother-in-law, S. H. Meadows, would climb the hill from his store and ring the bell. This bell has recently been placed on a steel tower to the rear of the new church where it still calls folks to services on Sunday morning. Near the old Baptist church was also erected a Methodist church and the people of the town attended either church which could provide a minister for the sermon.

Other early Baptist churches in this vicinity were Sand Hill, Mount Zion, Bethany, Egypt Ebenezer, Mount Carmel and Jar, Sunny Dell which was organized in 1893. Each of these churches had three services on one weekend out of each month and one revival each summer after crops were laid by. This was called a protracted meeting and considered the big event of the year.

There were other ministers besides those mentioned above. Bro. Sam Mann, father of Dr. D. A. Mann of Beaumont, Bro. Mann was a kind and loving old man who had a very emphatic manner of delivery, punctuating every sentence with a shake of his head and a wag of his beard. Old Bro. Kimmey had long black hair and beard and a wicker, shaking, quivering voice that seemed to make the rafters in the old church buildings vibrate, and old Bro. Masterson, tall and stately and with long beard, a charming manner and a Godly appearance, resembled a pat patriarch from the pages of the Old Testament. Bro. Blackshear had short white beard that encircled his face like a rounded frame, and Bro. Hensarling had a bald head around which his glasses were tied with a string. He also had a long beard and came on horseback from old Concord in Angelina County. When he preached and Bro. Pascall Lawrence led the singing from the old Scared Harp, the walls almost burst from the overflowing of the spirit and there was much weeping and shouting among the members of the congregation.

Schools The first school building designated as such was on a hill near the cemetery and to the south of the old Collier home. This was a two-story wooden structure with three rooms and was considered an excellent school for its day. Among the first teachers in this building were Wyatt Kirkwood and Mrs. Nettie Nell who lived near the building with her husband and first child. Those who followed were a Mr. Collins, Clara Hignett and Sallie Scott. In 1893 the building burned and classes were then conducted in churches, the Masonic Hall and other available space. Tom Mann, for

many years an attorney at Woodville, Wiley Martin, who was for many years superintendent of the Kirbyville schools, and Miss Vierra Griffin were among those who taught in the Masonic Hall. Later another wooden building was erected in the oak grove to the rear of Mrs. Lizette Riley's home. Among the several teachers who taught here was Miss Willie Neel, daughter of Mrs. Nettie Neel, who was teacher of the primary grades for many years. This was replaced by a brick building between this site and the Masonic Hall, and when consolidation came, the present school was built on the opposite side of town beyond the Texas and New Orleans Railroad track. Today old Colmesneil, with its shady lawns and board walks, is quietly retreating into past history. A new Colmesneil is fast pushing up the slope and across the track toward the school and new churches, but the lovely old homes of the past, with their cherished memories, are still the town's richest treasures.

Nephews served as pallbearers. He had lived in the Steels Grove Community 97 years. He had engaged in farming and ranching until he retired. He was a Methodist.

Surviving are three daughters, Miss Fannie Flowers, Mrs. Vada Barclay and Miss Sallie Flowers of Colmesneil; four grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

by CLINTON R. CURRIE

Gardeners who are having trouble with blossom-end-rot on tomatoes can curb the problem here in Tyler County with a small application of calcium chloride.

Blossom-end-rot appears as dark, sunken, leathery spots on the blossom-end of green tomatoes. The first symptom is a slightly sunken, water-soaked spot.

Although nothing can be done for affected tomatoes, an application of calcium chloride will usually stop the problem in later-developing fruit.

Home gardeners growing tomatoes on sandy soil can stop blossom-end-rot by applying one heaping tablespoon of calcium chloride in a two-foot diameter area around each plant and then by wetting this with about one gallon of water to leach the material into the root zone.

To curb the problem on heavy soils, calcium chloride should be put in a slight trench around the plant. Pour a gallon or more of water into the trench; then cover it with soil.

Blossom-end-rot usually occurs on plants that are about one-third to one-half grown. The problem often shows up after periods of dry weather or prolonged dry winds, or after excessive rainfall, and following heavy sidedressings of nitrogen. However lack of calcium that is usable to the plant is the cause of the trouble.

Commercial tomato producers who are plagued with blossom-end-rot because of an inadequate supply of calcium, should sidedress 300 to 400 pounds of calcium nitrate per acre. This should only be used when all of the nitrogen needs of the crop have not been supplied. Calcium nitrate should be applied deep in moist soil or followed by irrigation.

Treatment to avoid blossom-end-rot can help commercial growers to attain the Built East Texas program objective of increasing the quality, uniformity and production of tomatoes.

Don't look for it just yet, but some day soon there may be frozen tomatoes on the market. A new freezing method of exceedingly low temperatures of 320 degrees below zero, obtained by using liquid nitrogen, is being tried rather successfully.

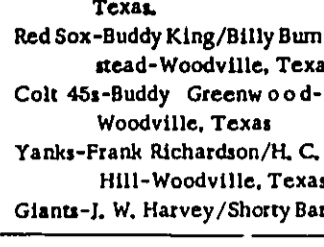

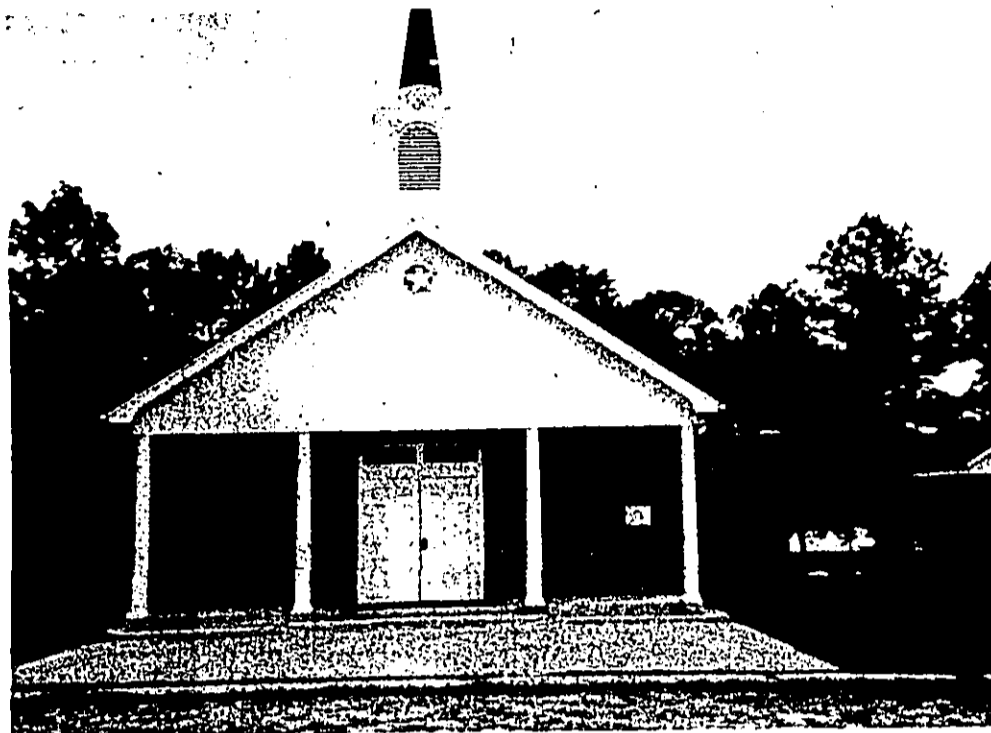
