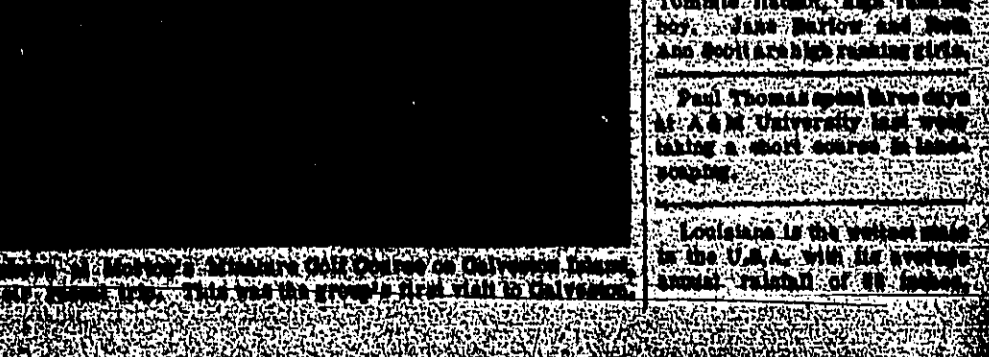

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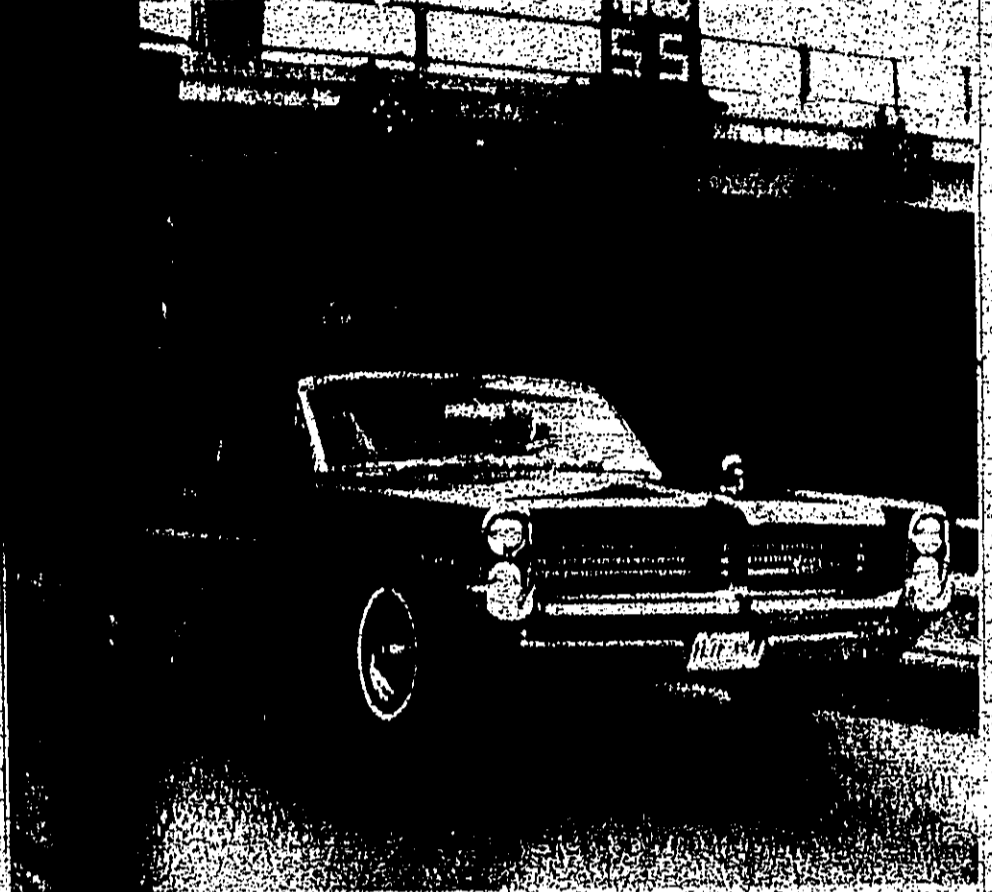

## Currie's Ag Notes

Summer temporary pastures for good grass-crazing in July and August requires planning in May and June. Good temporary pastures can help maintain good production in dairy herds and increase weights of beef cattle even when permanent pastures mature and become less palatable and lower in nutrients.

Dairy specialist, R.C. Carpenter, who's stationed at Tyler, believes good temporary pastures for supplemental grazing can help East Texas Dairy herds produce up to the 1950 level of 18,000 pounds per cow per year.

To stretch the summer grazing season in Tyler county the following five steps are suggested:

1. Plant a winter sorghum crop. They give higher yields and are more disease resistant.
2. Plant a winter wheat crop. It has greater disease resistance.
3. Make different plantings to spread the availability of good grazing.
4. Plant at least 30 pounds per acre if seed is broadcast.
5. Following each harvest, whether by grazing or mowing, apply at least 20 pounds of nitrogen per acre in early growth.

If you're not going to secure winter sorghum, hybrid, you might consider planting in rows. Cattle will work down the middle, trampling less sorghum than when grazing a broadcast crop. However, if you're going to surplus sorghum in a row, the thick stand will be difficult to feed for hay-making.

The half-acre per cow is adequate when grazing late in the season. Continuous grazing requires more land per cow for maximum results.

**RECORD ANNUAL 4-H HORSE SHOW AUGUST 20-21**

The annual annual 4-H horse show will be held August 20-21 at Texas A&M University.

Title year, each horse must have won at least one point during county competition in the same class they participate in at the state show, according to L.D. Wylie, Animal Husbandry Department and chairman of the show.

However, other rules from last year will still apply. Horses, owners and exhibitors must enter the show under a 4-H membership in the exhibitor's immediate family. Collections must be at least one year old and not older than 21 before January 31, 1964. Each member may enter only one horse and the 4-H Club of each county may enter only one participant for each two members enrolled in the horse division. Also, the county agricultural agent must certify each 4-H Club member and the horse. Horses are not allowed in the show regardless of their age, Wylie says.

Classes of the halter division include: (a) registered Quarter horse mare and geldings; (b) registered mare and geldings of any other breed; (c) grade mares and geldings of two breeds; and a showmanship competition between the top ten showman in the other halter classes.

Performance classes will be: western pleasure, reining, hack racing, polo breaking, barrel racing, and keyhole racing. Collections are required for entries and entry fee must be at Texas A&M by August 9, says Wylie.

**CATTLE NUMBERS IN TEXAS MAY BE AT PEAK**

Texas cattle numbers are the highest in history. More than 10 million head were in hand on January 1. However, Texas A & M University's livestock marketing specialist, Ed Uvack, believes the state has reached its high peak in the current cattle cycle.

Uvack said cattle numbers in the 1950s were also at a record high. The total on January 1 was in excess of 100 million head. The record high cattle population equaled the 1950s level of a billion to 1.1 billion.

A national downturn in cattle numbers will begin late next year or in 1965 and should continue through 1967, Uvack expects. Three years' herd replacement inventory will be required.

Marketing from Texas herds in the January - March period this year totaled 202 thousand head up from 195 million head in 1963, he says.

Prices of choice beef carcasses are expected to gradually improve after May, he says, probably reaching their lowest level in the September-October period. Uvack predicts that good carcasses will be in short supply in July-August and that the price of beef will be high. It will be a rocky year, he added.

The national pork problem will also persist in 1964 and many East Texas commercial producers in late low prices for their product. This, by planning ahead, they can be somewhat ahead of the market. Commercial and retail pork growers are planting certified pork-type plants in plots where they will harvest next year's seed stock. This seed stock can be selected to produce pork-type pigs that are reasonably free of pork and desired by the buyer.

### School Dropouts Most in Ninth And Tenth Grades

Sixty-four per cent of all school dropouts occur in grades 9 and 10, says Ray Reynolds, Extension Services District 114 education specialist at Texas A&M University.

Another 24 per cent of school dropouts take place in grades 11 and 12, she says. This is the age when young people want to be free of authority and earn their own money.

Dropouts aren't necessarily less intelligent than their classmates. Many dropouts enter into their leaving school, a major one to parents who place little value on education.

What happens when the dropout looks for a job? The unemployment rate for those 16 to 19 years of age is 24 per cent compared with 19 per cent for all age groups.

At least 11 Texas dropouts are shown as Hill County.

## Stock Law to Be Enforced

At a meeting of the Commissioners' Court on May 15, 1964 it was decided that the people had had ample time to gather their stock and that enforcement of the Stock Law should be carried out, as afforded by law.

Under Article 1369 of Vernon's Penal Code, the owner permitting his stock to run at large and trespass on the property of others could be fined \$5.00 to \$50.00. A person who has been damaged by one's stock running at large, may file a complaint

charging a penal offense under the Statutes.

Under Article 6966 of Vernon's Civil Statutes, the owner of land bothered with hogs, or other stock, can impound the animals and charge so much a day for each day, and he may charge the owner of the stock for any damages.

Under Article 6965 of Vernon's Civil Statutes, law enforcement officers may impound all stock running at large, and the owners of the stock so impounded shall be charged so much a day while impounded.

The Stock Law Officer has been heretofore deputized to

enforce the Stock Law and will be making full use of the procedures allowed by law in carrying out the Tyler County Stock Law program. Enforcement has been turned over to the Sheriff's Department and the Stock Law Officer is under his supervision.

Full enforcement of the Stock Law is effective immediately, so you, as a citizen, who has stock running at large which is prohibited by the Stock Law in this County, are called upon to please get such stock penned up on your own property, immediately.

Coats will be graduated June 1 at 3 p.m. The exercises will be held at St. Luke's Methodist Church in Houston.

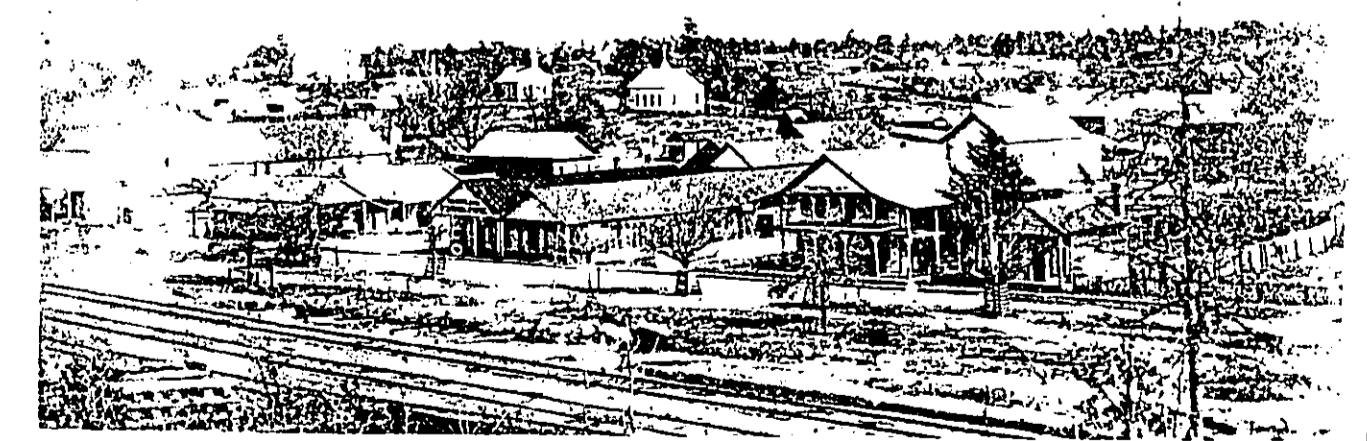
Coats, who will have the rank of captain, will be at Travis Air Force Base, California, for two years following his graduation.

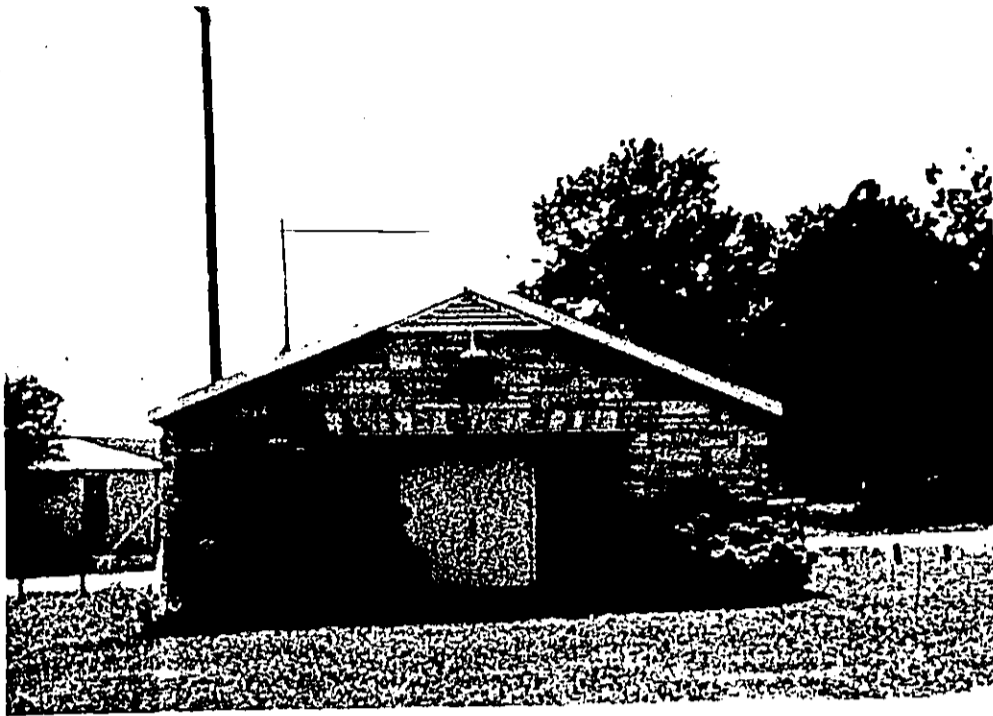



S.) authorizing the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of a Hospital District to be known as TYLER COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT and to be coextensive with the boundaries of Tyler County, Texas; and WHEREAS, said Act provided that said Hospital District would not be created unless and until an election is duly held in the County for such purpose; and WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Tyler County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of Tyler County and its inhabitants that the question of the creation of such Hospital District be submitted to a vote of the qualified property taxpaying electors of said County:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF TYLER COUNTY, TEXAS: That an election be held throughout Tyler County, Texas, on the 20th day of June, 1964, which date is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

AGAINST THE CREATION OF A HOSPITAL DISTRICT; PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF A TAX NOT TO EXCEED SEV-

ENTY-FIVE CENTS (75¢) ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLAR VALUATION; AND PROVIDING FOR THE ASSUMPTION BY SUCH DISTRICT OF ALL OUTSTANDING BONDS HERETOFORE ISSUED BY TYLER COUNTY FOR HOSPITAL PURPOSES. COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

by Clinton Currie SLIME MOLDS DO LITTLE DAMAGE Slime molds often cause concern to many home gardeners. They occur suddenly in warm weather after heavy rains or prolonged periods of high humidity and may be found on lawn grasses, bedded flowers, mulches, ground cover, around the bases of trees and other plants. Slime mold is caused by a low form of fungus which lives on and obtains its food from decaying organic matter in the soil. This organic matter is usually an accumulation of grass clippings and leaf mulch. During favorable periods, the slime mold grows up onto the grass leaves or other garden plants, orulates, and the result is a coloration of the turf. The discoloring is due to the spore-forming masses of the organism. At first, these masses are gray in color but later become black. At this stage, the grass has the appearance of having been dusted with soot or carbon-black. Some molds appear as thin, white yellow or gray layers of slimy paste-like material that covers the grass blades. These masses later dry to form a bluish-gray black or white powdery growth on the leaves. Slime molds are non-parasitic and technically do not cause disease. They use the plant leaves and stems as means of support for their reproductive structures. Slime molds can be removed from the turf or other plants by

washing with a stream of water from a hose under pressure. Slight damage to the affected plants may occur when the leaves are smothered or shaded for several days by the slime. The hoing-off process is usually sufficient to prevent damage.

Sid dressing corn with 50 to 60 pounds of nitrogen can increase corn yields as much as 35 bushels per acre in Tyler County if there is enough moisture to make a crop. The Tyler substation of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station consistently gets an increase of 30 to 35 bushels per acre by applying 50 to 60 pounds of nitrogen on corn crops treated with proper amounts of fertilizer, according to soil test, at planting time.

Tests on Nacogdoches sandy clay loam also indicate 60 pounds of nitrogen is the most profitable application for corn, although some tests there have shown a combination of nitrogen and 30 pounds of phosphate was most profitable.

The production and management guidelines for reaching the Build East Texas goal of 100 bushel per acre corn crops, include suggestion for sidedressing.

On sandy soils it may be desirable to sidedress part of the crop's potassium requirements along with the nitrogen. This helps avoid leaching loss. When sidedressing, fertilizer should be placed at the outer edge of the corn roots to avoid damage to them.

Weather plays an important role in determining the benefits of sidedressing. If it is dry and long-range forecasts call for dry weather, sidedressing only 30 pounds of nitrogen may be the most profitable. The lower level of sidedressing may also be the most profitable on crops that have not received proper amounts of the other fertilizer elements.

Broiler chicks placed in Texas during the week ending May 9, numbered 3,054,000 according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Compared with a week ago this was drop of 4 per cent and fell below a year ago at this time by 7 per cent.

Eggs set totaled 4,132,000 down 3 per cent from the preceding week and 10 percent below the corresponding week of 1963. Total hatch for the week at 3,257,000 decreased 1 per cent from the preceding week and was 6 per cent below last year at this time.

Broiler chicks shipped to Texas totaled 84,000 while 232,000 were shipped to neighboring States. Finished broilers averaged 13.1 cents per pound—0.1 cent below the 13.2 cents reported a week ago and compares with 14.8 cents for the same week last year.

EARLY HISTORY OF COLMESNEIL

Colmesneil had its beginning with the coming of the railroads about 1882. At this point, the Trinity and Sabine railroads, extending from Trinity to Colmesneil, formed a junction with the Texas and New Orleans which ran from Beaumont to Dallas. The land around this junction was owned by Mr. William Neyland. It was divided into lots and a town was planned and named for the conductor on the first passenger train which came through it, W. T. Colmesneil. Mr. Colmesneil bought lot number 11, block 3 on May 16, 1883. In the eighties Colmesneil was the largest town of Tyler County due to the South's largest saw mill here. This mill was owned by the Yellow Pine Train and Lumber Company and it gave employment to the majority of the 3,000 inhabitants of the town. At this time Colmesneil competed with Woodville for the county seat. A plaza was laid out and the location of the court house was designated. This remained county property until 1925 when it was purchased by J. P. Mann.

Ogden The northern part of the town, around and beyond the Trinity and Sabine depot, was known as Ogden. Here the mill, most of the homes and the principal businesses were first located. The mill was located to the east of the depot and the home of the manager, a Mr. Eliot, is still standing in a grove of trees to the southeast of the mill. Although Mr. Eliot was said to have been very stern in dealing with his employees, underneath there was a love for people, flowers and pets. A pet deer roamed the spacious grounds and a parrot swung from a hoop in the neighboring commissary. This bird lived in a state of delight that her numerous antics so well entertained the customers who came to the store.

In Ogden Jess Collier's big store was the outstanding business and Eli Jackson was his principal salesman. It, too, was near the depot, and his brother, Jackson Collier, had a business where the Spence home now stands. Unlike his brother, Jackson was a large, rough man who cared little for his appearance or action. Other businesses included a drug store, operated in its later years by Charley Holland, a millinery or hat shop where a Mrs. Tucker made and sold hats, saloons in which Bill Martin and Charley Jardine sold liquor and a caboose used for locking up the intoxicated and incorrigibles. There were also a number of hotels for the mill workers and for the business men who might come that way. Among these were the Ogden, the Yellow Pine, the Tucker and

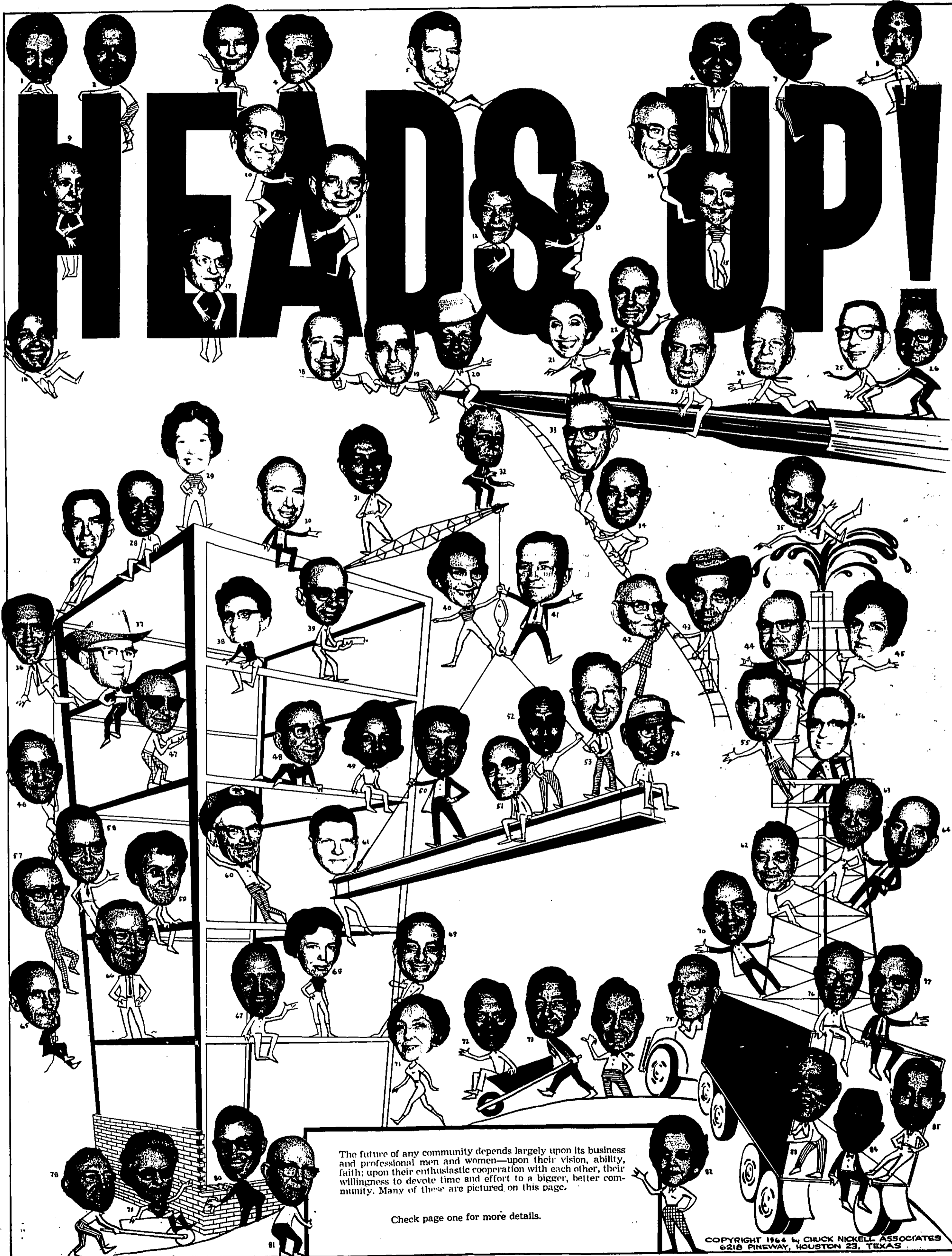
the Withers Hotel, which was the girlhood home of Mrs. Mollie Shillings, mother of Mrs. Fern Dean of Colmesneil. On the slope of the hill at the southern edge of Ogden was the old Masonic Hall, which is still standing. Here the Yellow Pine Lodge, no. 679, A. F. & A. M., was chartered December 12, 1889. So it was that Ogden, with its thriving businesses and hotels, nice homes built of good heart lumber and long board walks, sat snug among the timber lands of East Texas and boated a population which excelled not only that of Woodville but Beaumont as well until the burning of the Yellow Pine mill in 1933. An account of this fire in the Galveston News, April 20, 1883 pictures John Pollitt as leader of the force working furiously to save the main lumber yard and Ed Williams on top of the depot in Ogden howling with pain from blistered feet as he poured on the water which was passed up to him, thus saving the building from destruction. Benjamin Franklin and Wiley Parker were also on a hotel working furiously with water from a bucket brigade. Ed Hulsey, planer foreman, lost his coat containing twenty-five dollars in the burning of the planer, and a Mrs. Walker fainted in her efforts to spread the alarm and had to be carried home. Thus the mill became a smoldering heap of ashes. Ogden began to realize its gradual death and Colmesneil, as the addition to the south was called, began to grow into a thriving, cultured little town, the center of a progressive farming and lumbering area.

Businesses The main street of Colmesneil ran diagonally down from the Texas and New Orleans Railroad track and a clear branch, edged by waving green willows, also ran diagonally a short distance from the track. Marks of this stream are still to be seen. On the corner of the street next to the railroad was a drug store owned and operated by Dr. Van

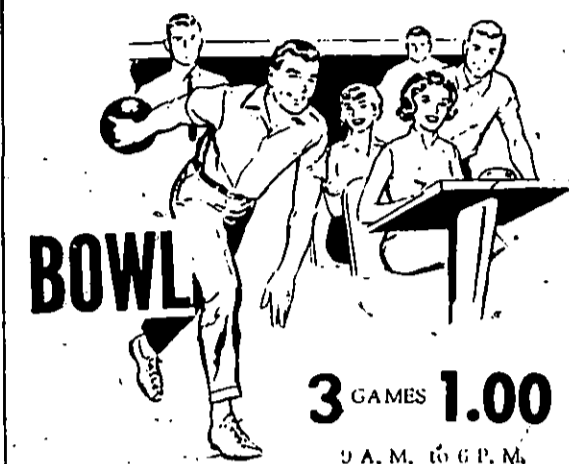

Stewart. Next door were saloons operated by a Mr. Gullihorn and Pete Doucette. In later years another drug store was added to this row of houses by Dr. McBride and Sam Fuller. There was also an Alliance or Granger store with Dick Cammack, Jack Riley and Preston Stewart as clerks. Across the track from this street, where Mrs. Lurley Bradshaw's old home stands, there was a big general mercantile store, the first business of the town, belonging to J. C. Shillings, grandfather of Mrs. Daisy Smith. Down the slope near the branch, where the old Wallace shop now stands, was a big gin built by John Shillings and John Butler. A few feet southwest of the gin was built later a large two-story building which became the S.H. Meadows General Merchandise business and which is still in operation. In front of this store, and on the end of the row of buildings leading down from the track was the big T.H. Neyland store and nearby was a grocery store operated at one time by Herbert Gleaves, Pat Gleaves' father. Between the Meadows and Neyland stores were a watering trough, hitching posts and a sycamore. Diagonally across from the Meadows store, on Marlin Fortenberry's lawn, were a hat shop and dental office. In this office Dr. Derrick and Dr. Kelley performed their drill by foot, caused the aching teeth with laudanum and extracted teeth with crude forceps. One of the most prosperous streets in appearance was the one which extended from the branch up the hill toward the Masonic Hall. Next to the branch, where the Munsell home now stands, there was a dress-making shop and also the post office. Up the street, where the home of Mrs. Minnie Sturrock is, two two-story buildings stood. Here was the doctor's office, occupied in turn by Dr. Seastrunk, Dr. Haynes and Dr. Ellison. Later doctors were Hamilton, Roberts, Turner, Trotti and the beloved Dr. Van Stewart. In this early day, these doctors were quite proficient in doling out calomel, quinine and blue mass. There were also presses for the news papers of the town. Frank Robinson had come to town from the New Orleans Times-Democrat and the Jasper Newboy to publish the first paper. The Times of Ogden and Colmesneil which later became The Tyler County Times, the forerunner of The Booster. The United States Republican was published weekly by J. Rich Hamlin and the Parsonage Record was edited monthly by J. M. Porter "in the interest of Christianity and the Methodist Church within the bounds of the new Colmesneil Circuit, East Texas Conference."

In one of these buildings Jess Unsworth operated a saloon. Here he killed a Negro woman, his dog and himself and left his money to a little girl, Jessie

Graig, who was named for him. There also lived in one of these houses a very queer old man who was considered insane. He was known as Rev. Woodward as he pretended to be a minister of the gospel and attempted to preach. Tradition has it that he that he located a sizeable sum of money which had been buried at the rear of the building, since there were no banks in Colmesneil. Digging up the little fortune, he disappeared mysteriously and no one ever heard of him again. Across the street, in front of a home now owned by Claude Crews, and in which a Mr. Votaw then lived, there was another hat shop, established by Mattie Votaw and Cora Stewart and later operated by Jennie Woods and Jennie Scott.

This is the first of two parts of the Early History of Colmesneil. Watch for part two.

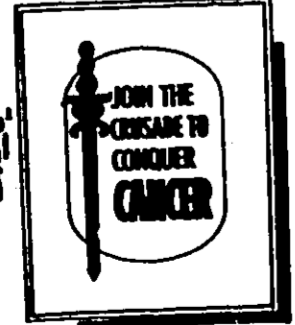
