A WORD FROM GRADY TRIMBLE

Jasper, June 1, 1964--The Grady Trimble family has become more or less accustomed to a new way of life--but still looks forward to June 6.

That's the Second Primary Election day, when Grady closes out his race for State Representative, Dist. 7.

"Politics" is a new word for Carlton, 11, and Robin 6, but they are greatly interested--at least in Daddy's part of it.

Robin, with solemn little-girl determination, does her full share of envelope-stuffing and stamp-licking when there's some mail to get out.

Carlton crawls in the family's 1961 Comet, hammer in hand, and goes with him to tack up posters all over the four-county Seventh District (Jasper, Newton, Sabine and Tyler Counties).

Mrs. Trimble (Joann to everyone who knows her) keeps up a brave home front--if she is getting a bit tired of irregular hours, missed meals and a missing husband, she keeps it to herself. Whenever she can, she goes with the candidate to rallies, meetings and the like.

A typical day in Grady Trimble's life since mid-March starts like everyone else's--with getting out of bed. But his alarm goes off earlier than most, around 6 a. m. He will be at his law

office early, to check the day's work and see if there's anything of an imperative nature.

"Like most other people, I have to do my work or I don't get paid," grins the young attorney. "I don't have any retainers to tide me over, so I can't let the campaign take me away from the office entirely."

Grady admits, though, that he has been putting off many things that are not emergencies. As early as he can he takes off in his '61 Comet for a pre-selected town or community in one of his four counties. There he will visit in stores and offices, as well as on the street, shaking hands and handing out a little campaign literature. He calls this "seeking out the voters."

"This has been a great experience--this race for my first elective office," Trimble reports. "I have met a great many nice people I might not ever have met any other way."

"There are 3,350 square miles of area in these four counties, and they are all there--I've pretty near counted them," says Grady. "And I think I've shaken hands with a majority of the 60,000 people."

At least it seems that way to the energetic Korean War veteran and Baylor University law graduate, who estimates he has traveled between seven and eight thousand miles during the campaign.

His person-to-person type of campaigning paid off with a 900-vote lead over six opponents in the First Primary. Trimble

says he is confident that he'll win the runoff, provided only that his supporters don't figure the race is won and fall to go to the polls.

He is almost--although not quite--as confident as Tim Berryman, a neighboring pal of young Carlton. The two boys spent the first Election Day handing out Trimble cards near the Jasper voting box. When Grady picked them up late in the afternoon, they were tired but excited.

"You've got nothing to worry about Mr. Trimble," Tim assured him. "Everybody I talked to today was for you."

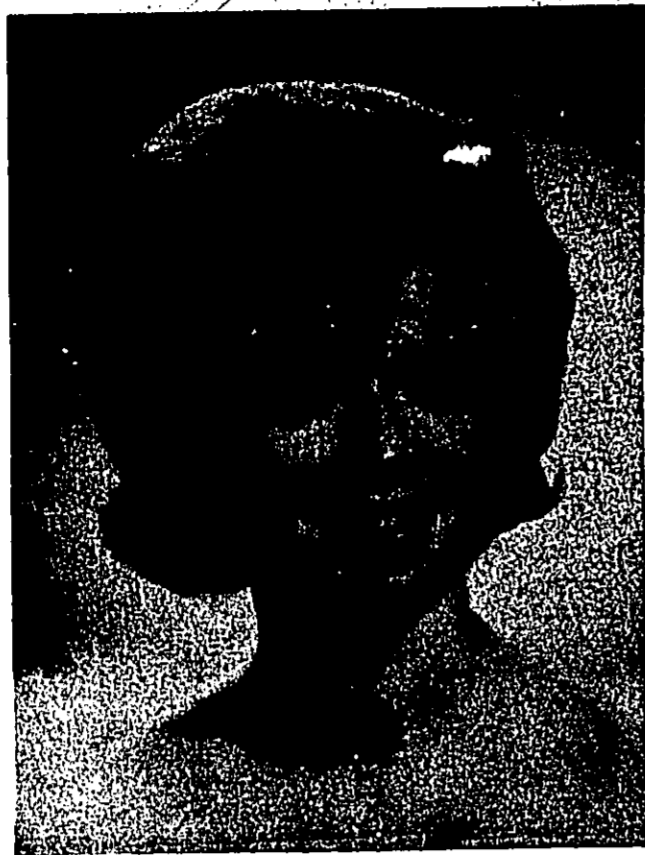

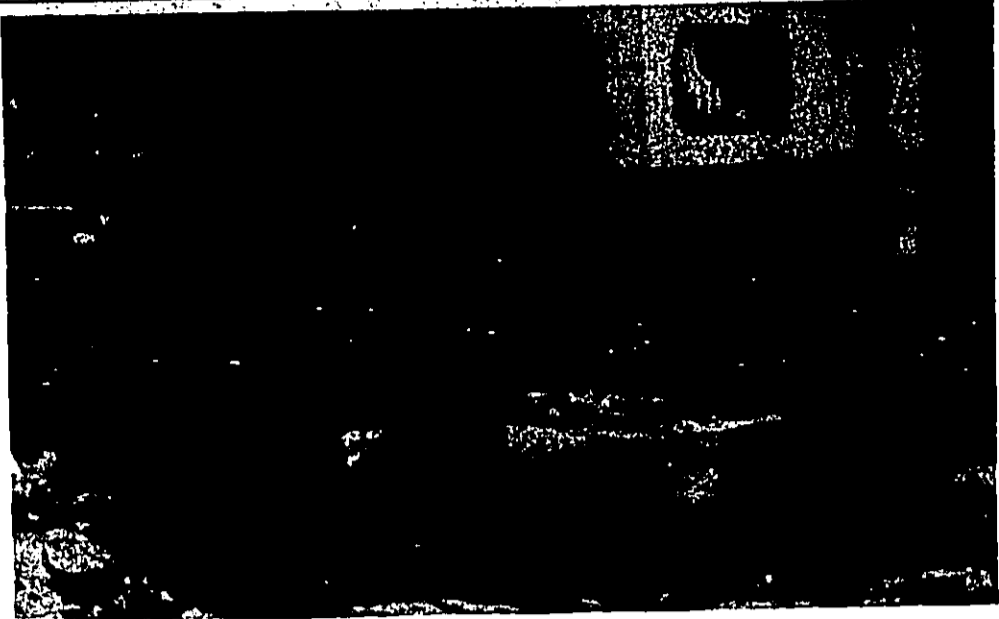

Switzerland had its William Tell, Tennessee and Kentucky boast of Davy Crockett and Dan'l Boone. But Hardin County especially Honey Island, can boast of W. J. (Billy) Bracken, son of Mrs. D. C. Bracken of Woodville.

Billy, owner-operator of the well known Honey Island Recreation Center, now can boast that he has been cited by the world-renowned Boone and Crockett Club, sponsor of the 1963 North American Big Game Competition in which hunters from all over the North American continent vie for its coveted honors.

The Hardin County hunter took first award in the Wapiti competition, Wapiti, commonly called elk, according to the dictionary, "a North American species of deer with long slender antlers. The Indians, so the dictionary continues, called them 'algonquian'."

The story of Billy's taking the top honors started in October last year when he and the wife, Lillian and several other East Texas couples decided to go to the Colorado Rockies for a bit of big game hunting. Billy is always looking for "the big one."

"They found what they thought would be the perfect spot for elk hunting. It was in Routt National Park, some 60 miles north of Steamboat Springs, near Slater. The country here appears untouched by civilization, making it an ideal spot for big game hunting."

Under the 1963 Agricultural Conservation Program, conservation measures on Tyler County farms represented a total investment of around \$61,000. ACP cost-sharing amounted to about half this much.

Program practices completed on participating farms included: A-2 Permanent Pasture-39 farms 454 acres-\$5089.00; A-4 Applying Limestone-41 farms-814 acres \$2982.00; A-7 Tree Planting-3 farms-52 acres-\$477.00; B-1 Pasture Improvement-75 farms-1876 acres-\$10,604.00; B-7-Stockwater Ponds-15 farms 15 structures-\$1387.00; B-9 Cross-fencing-23 farms-2239 rods-\$3144.00; D-1 Winter Cover-40

farms-547 acres-\$3964.00 and D-2 Summer Cover-1 farm; 9 acres-\$62.00.

The ACP for 1964--the 29th program year--is now well under way. In Tyler County, 116 farmers have already requested ACP cost-sharing to help expand soil, water, woodland, and wildlife conservation work need on their land.

The Chairman said that where the farmer intends carrying out such conservation measures as: Spreading Limestone and/or Rock Phosphate (A-4), Construction of Stockwater Ponds (B-7), Development of Springs or Seeps for Stockwater (B-6), Terracing (C-4)-(C-5), Construction Cross Fences (B-9) and Timber Stand Improvement (B-10) on his farm this year, the practices should be installed during the next few months. Applications for fall pasture practices should be made shortly after September 1st, 1964.

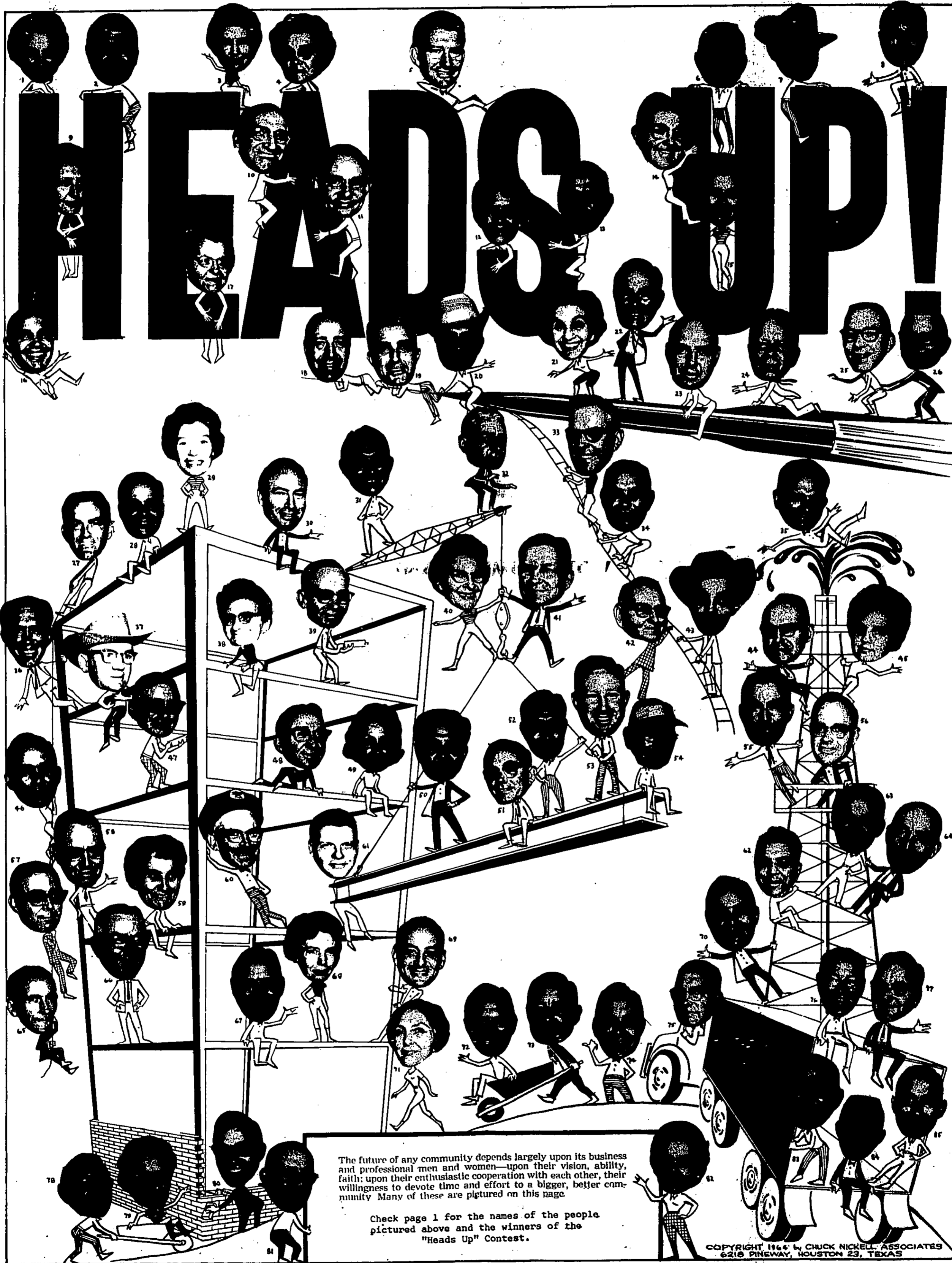

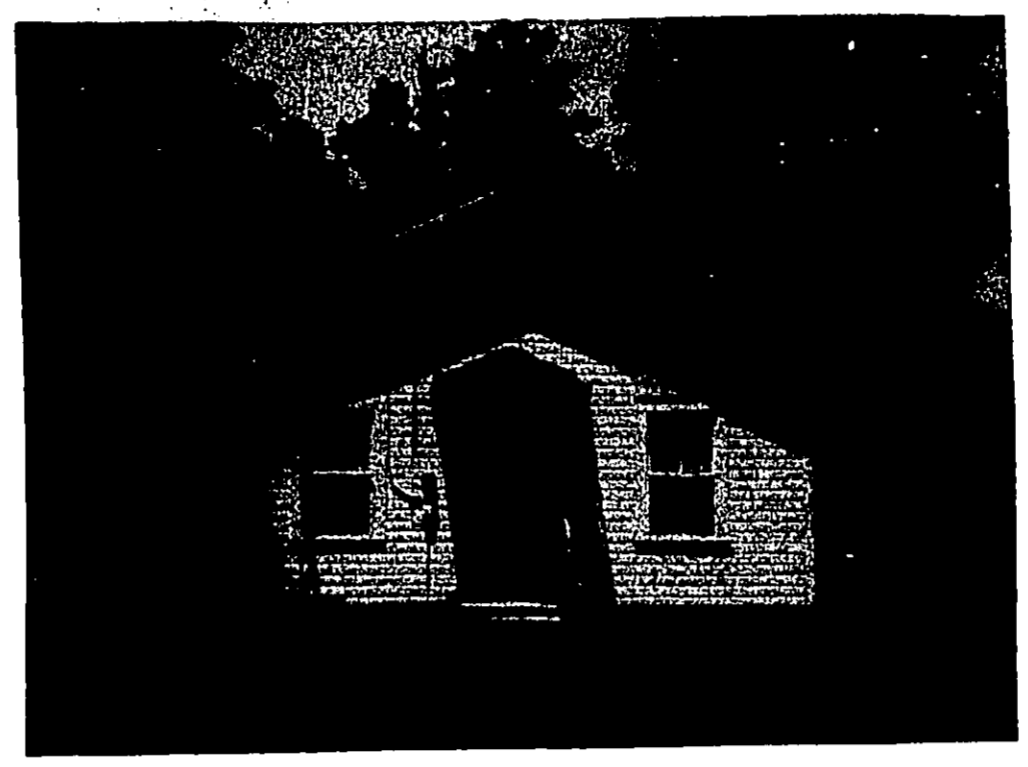
