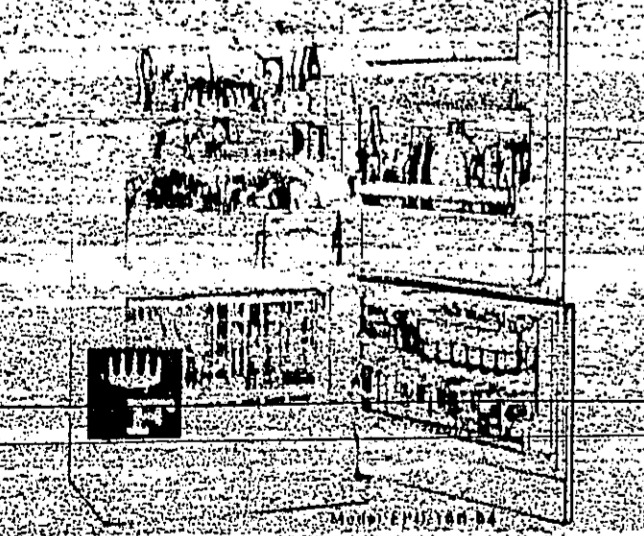

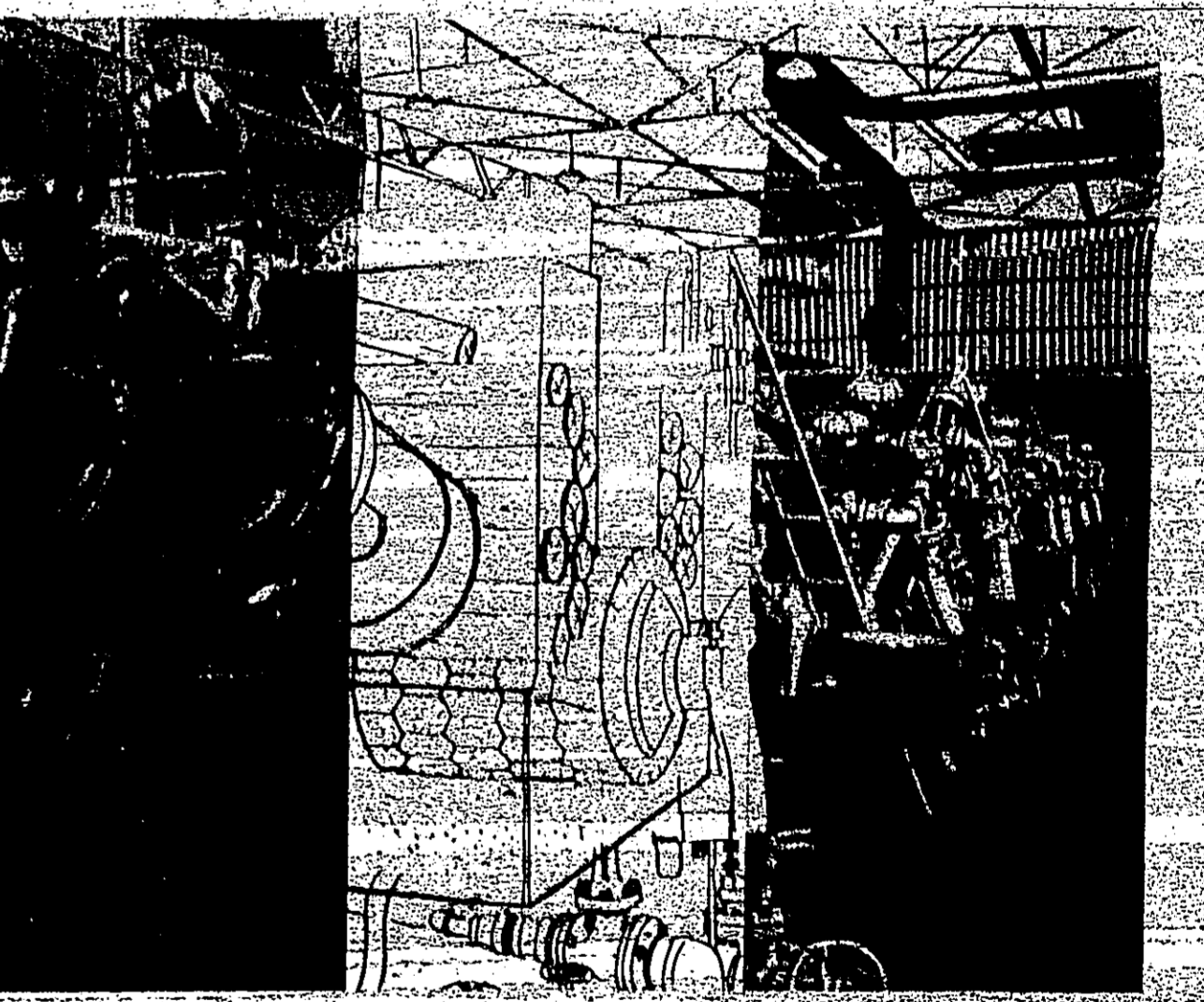

## PENDING HOSPITAL DISTRICT ELECTION DISCUSSED AT MEETING

At a meeting sponsored by the Colmesneil Community Service Club, the proposed hospital district which will be voted on June 20 was explained by Eldon Easley, administrator of the Tyler County Hospital, and County Judge Jeff Mooney.

Mr. Easley explained why the county will save money by voting in the hospital district, and gave details on how a hospital district operated. (See hospital questions and answers on inside page).

Judge Mooney explained the manner in which the improvements at the hospital have been financed, and pointed out that bonds for the payment of the improvements have been issued and must be paid by the county.

Mooney explained that the coming election is not a bond election, since the bonds have already been issued, but is for the creation of a hospital district through which the commissioners court and the hospital board of trustees will operate the hospital.

He declared that the creation of a hospital district is the only possible solution to the hospital indebtedness. If the district is not created, the county will have to raise evaluations of property to pay off the bonds, and as with all county taxes the state will receive 42 cents on each \$100 valuation. With a hospital district, the state does not get this additional tax money, since a hospital district can, through the county tax collector, assess and collect on the same evaluation at a lower cost to the taxpayers.

Others making brief remarks at the meeting included H. G. Sutton and Brad Smith.

### JOE I. BEST DEFEATS HOWARD L. RILEY IN COMMISSIONER RACE

Joe I. Best defeated Howard L. Riley, incumbent, in the run-off primary Saturday for county commissioner in precinct one, 642 to 522. Best carried the Woodville box by 120 votes, and that turned out to be his margin of victory in the four boxes in the precinct.

Riley carried Hillister 36 to 29 and Warren 126 to 121. Best carried Doucette 50 to 30 and Woodville 417 to 297.

In the run-off for state representative in District 7, J. E. Miller, Jr. of Burkeville carried Tyler County over Grady Trimble by 1050 to 637. Miller carried all four counties in the district.

Joe Pool carried the county over Robert W. Baker for congressman-at-large, 939 to 644. Only about 1700 votes were cast in the second primary. In the first primary, Tyler County went to the polls in record numbers with over 3000 votes being tallied.

She continued: "Now we have a boat and skis, but like most others we go out in the river to boat or ski. Why can't these few? Is it because they come from Louisiana, or other parts of Texas, that they do not have to obey those five mile speed limits?"

"Down at the park the lake has a sandy bottom and the gradual drop-off makes an excellent place for the small fry to have a wonderful time. Now let's all in Tyler, Jasper, Newton, and other counties get together and try to keep a place for the small children to wade and swim and have fun without the danger of being run over by a boat."

**WOODVILLE WINS HEARTS OF CALIFORNIA COUPLE VIA PINEYWOODS PRESS**

Mr. and Mrs. Benton R. Schuster, formerly of Los Angeles, California, arrived in Woodville for the first time Friday, bought a home in Cheswood addition, and are all set to become permanent residents of Tyler County.

On the way, they stopped in Ozona and gave the folks there the sad news that they had changed their minds and were coming to Woodville, deep in the pine and ponds country of East Texas.

The Schusters had tentatively decided to move to Ozona when he retired after 37 years on the Los Angeles Herald-Examiner. They had subscribed to the Ozona paper to acquaint themselves with their proposed new home.

However, a combination of circumstances brought the attention of the Schusters to Woodville. A cousin of Mrs. Schuster, Paul Cook of Beaumont, a long-time editorial writer on the Beaumont Enterprise until he retired several years ago, came to Woodville, (for the first time) a few months ago to attend the funeral of a friend, Leo Singleton. The beauty of the countryside impressed Mr. Cook, who is alert at 82. He wrote the Schusters a glowing letter about the Woodville area.

The Schusters were intrigued, and decided to find out more about the area. They wrote the Chamber of Commerce, and Secretary Morris Clemmons sent them all the information he had about the area, and also acquainted them with The Pineywoods Press.

The Pineywoods Press became their adopted paper, through a subscription, and they fell in love with Woodville through the Press before they ever saw the town.

The Schusters wrote Woodville realtors, including T. E. Phillips, and when they arrived in Woodville they stopped at Mr. Phillips office. He had written them about the Edmund H. Miller home in Cheswood, but the Schusters had already decided it was more elaborate than they needed as a retirement home. But when they finally saw it, they could no more resist the charm of the home than they could the attraction Woodville had on them.

The Schusters, who are staying at the Willis Motel until the Millers are able to move (he was transferred to Palestine several months ago) have not been disappointed.

**SOCIAL SECURITY FOR DISABLED CHILDREN IS RARE BUT IMPORTANT**

On an average of once each week the Lufkin District Office of the Social Security Administration receives an application for benefits under a little-known part of the social security program. This is the provision for payment of monthly benefits to disabled children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers.

"Ordinarily, cash benefits are not paid to the children of social security beneficiaries after they reach age 18," James explained. "However, if the unmarried child of a beneficiary was disabled before age 18 and is still disabled, social security will pay monthly benefits for that son or daughter."

According to James, more than 153,000 adults whose disabilities began in childhood are receiving social security benefits amounting to about \$7 million each month.

He said, "The knowledge that these payments can be made should be reassuring to parents who have been worrying about how their disabled children would be taken care of when the parents' income is reduced by retirement, death, or disability."

**TEACH YOUR CHILD TO DIAL ZERO FOR HELP**

Small children should know and trust the telephone operator as much as they do the corner policeman, and should turn to the operator in the event of an emergency.

Extension Service specialists at Texas A&M University say that although preschool youngsters can't be expected to memorize long telephone numbers, they can be taught one rule: if an accident happens dial zero, tell the operator what is wrong, and she will help you.

A child should be taught, however, that he is to dial zero only in emergencies, says Bobye Riney, Extension rural civil defense specialist, and Patsy Reynolds, family life education specialist. One five-year-old's plaintive message to the operator was "My Mommie's asleep and won't

wake up--and there's a fire in our house." After a little prodding, the operator learned the boy's name and address and called the fire department. Firemen rushed to the address, found the house on fire, and the mother knocked out by sleeping pills. Both survived, thanks to the child's action and the operator's help.

Another youngster whose mother fell through a floor and was trapped, went directly to the telephone and dialed zero. He couldn't remember his daddy's name or where he lived, but he rattled off the name and address of his grandparents. The operator called them, got the child's address and had a doctor on the way in minutes.

Although operators are ingenious in tracing calls from small fry, such procedure is a waste of precious time. Encourage your child to memorize his name, his father's name and address, the specialists recommend.

### QUESTIONS ON HOSPITAL DISTRICT ANSWERED FOR COUNTY VOTERS.

Some of the more commonly asked questions concerning the Hospital District which will be voted upon on June 20 are answered below by Eldon Easley, administrator of Tyler County Hospital.

Q. What is a Hospital District?  
A. A Hospital District is a certain geographical area established to maintain the hospital and health care for the citizens of that particular area.

Q. How is a Hospital District formed?  
A. First by proposing the Hospital District to the legislature and the legislature taking favorable action and actually creating the Hospital District subject to the voters approval. Second, an election called by the county or the persons within the area, and the qualified voters therein approving the Hospital District as established by the legislature.

Q. Will the creation of a Hospital District effect the manner in which our hospital is now operated?  
A. No.

Q. Who controls the operation of a Hospital District?  
A. A Hospital Board of Trustees appointed by the Commissioners Court?

Q. What salary do the Trustees receive?  
A. None.

Q. What other function does the Commissioners Court have in regard to the Hospital District?  
A. The Commissioners Court is responsible for approving the hospital budget and tax rate for the citizens of the Hospital District. This budget is submitted by the hospital Board of Trustees to the Commissioners Court each year based upon their anticipated revenue and expenditures.

Q. Why create a Hospital district?  
A. It is the most economical manner in which to pay off the bonded indebtedness of the Tyler County Hospital for the residents of Tyler County.

Q. Why would it be more economical to pay off the bonded indebtedness through a Hospital District?  
A. Because of the Tax structure as set up in the law regarding the same in the state. All taxes collected by the county are considered County and State taxes and consequently, forty-two cents out of each dollar is forwarded to the State, as their share of the taxes collected. If a Hospital District is formed and the property owners are taxed directly, then each dollar of the tax-payer's taxes will be paid direct to the Hospital District and the Hospital District in turn will liquidate the bonded indebtedness of the hospital.

Q. Why have we not had a Hospital District before since we have been paying off bonded indebtedness?  
A. Before the last session of our State Legislature a county could not, if it had a population of less than some 50,000, form a Hospital District. During the last session of the legislature, there was a change in the Constitution of the State to permit counties or subdivisions to form Hospital Districts.

Q. How will it cost me as a taxpayer in dollars and cents?  
A. A specific instance would have to be the known value and the evaluation of the property owner's real property. Here is an example of the cost to the property owner's of the county: If you own property of the actual value of \$20,000.00, the Tax Assessor values this property at ten per cent or it would be valued at \$2,000.00. It is anticipated at this time that possibly the bonded indebtedness of the hospital can be liquidated at thirty cents per \$100.00 valuation. So based upon this hypothetical situation to liquidate the bonded indebtedness would cost the taxpayer six (\$6.00) Dollars per year or fifty cents a month.

Q. What is the bonded indebtedness of the hospital at the present time?  
A. On the original building there

Q. If we do not create the Hospital District, how much would it cost me as a taxpayer to liquidate this bonded indebtedness?  
A. Based upon the information that I gave you previously, recognizing that forty-two cents out of each dollar collected by the county would have to go to the state, it would cost you a property owner with \$20,000.00 worth of property, \$10.20 per year or approximately \$4.20 more than it would if the Hospital District was created.

Q. How would the future expansion and building program of the hospital be affected?  
A. Should the need exist for future expansion and improvement of the hospital that would cost money over and above the revenues collected by the hospital and by taxes, then a bond issue would have to go before the people of the county and again the majority qualified voters would have to approve of such a program.

Q. What is the maximum amount of taxes that could be levied against my property? From the Hospital District?  
A. The Constitution provides for a maximum of seventy-five cents per \$100.00 evaluation, however, remember this, the Hospital Board of Trustees must prepare a budget based upon expected income and expenditures to take care of all of the business of the hospital and then based upon this budget, submitted to the Commissioners Court, with a recommended tax rate and the Commissioners Court actually approve of the tax rate for the Hospital District.

Q. Who collects the taxes for the Hospital District?  
A. The County Tax Assessor--Collector. The County Tax Assessor--Collector will collect all of the funds for the Hospital District and they will be deposited to the Hospital District Account.

Q. Who disbursed the funds for the Hospital District?  
A. The funds are disbursed by the Hospital Board of Trustees from their separate fund account. will act as a check and

Q. Are there any other advantages other than saving money for me by having a Hospital District?  
A. Yes.

Q. What?   
A. There is no other agency or group can tax the individual for the health care of the county other than the Hospital District. Q. What other advantages?

A. To answer this question we must understand the method under which our hospital is set up and operating at the present time. Presently the Commissioners Court is responsible for the building program, outside maintenance, upkeep and equipping the hospital. The Hospital Board of Trustees are responsible solely for the operation of the hospital. As can be very readily seen, this can be a very cumbersome situation where we have one body of people responsible for the maintenance, upkeep and building and another for the operation. If a Hospital District is created, the maintenance, upkeep, equipment, and future building programs will all be handled by the one Hospital Board of Trustees. This will provide a more streamlined operation and will let the group that is interested in the hospital only plan for the future of the hospital.

Q. What is the bonded indebtedness of the hospital at the present time?  
A. On the original building there

is still outstanding some \$78,000.00 of bonds. On the heating and air-conditioning some two or two and one-half years ago, there is still outstanding some \$40,000.00 in bonds. On the recent building and renovation program, there are presently outstanding some \$135,000.00 in bonds.

Q. Is it foreseeable that the tax rate for the Hospital District will go down?  
A. Yes, unless further building programs must be initiated to take care of the number of people in our county who require hospitalization. Remember this, each year we will have to take another look at the budget and the expected expenditure along with the bonded indebtedness and the anticipated income and upon that formulate our budget and set the tax rate.

TOURING EAST TEXAS BY BOB BOWMAN

East Texas' best fiddlers will be "boiling them cabbages down this week at the 28th annual World's Championship Fiddlers Festival in Crockett.

The festivities begin at 9:30 a. m. Friday in the big open air pavilion at Davy Crockett Memorial Park.

The competition will bring back Louis Franklin of White-wright, Texas, the 1963 champion, to defend his title. There are no age restrictions on the fiddlers. Some are in their 80s, others in their teens.

A colorful steam engine used since 1937 in the piney woods near Lufkin has turned up as a principal attraction in a Weatherford museum.

No. 208-which once pulled its mail, passenger and log cars over the Angelina and Neches River Railroad tracks-was bought for \$3300 last year by the Trinity Valley Railfans Club of Fort Worth.

It since has been repainted and spruced up for the club's museum. The old engine was one of two steamers used on the A. and N. R. line. The other, a 39-year-old puffler, still sees occasional service.

Few of its visitors realize it, but Lake Texas-tucked away in the colorful Tyler County hillside country near Colmesneil-was begun as a depression year project.

It was started in 1939, reportedly as the first National Youth Administration project in Texas with about 150 teenage workers. It later was acquired by the Colmesneil Independent School District and is starting its 21st year as a recreational haven. It attracted a monumental 100,000 persons during a five-month season last year.

The lake's Texas shape was an accident, but has proved to be its biggest drawing card. Visitors enjoy pinpointing "where we live" on the 65-acre lake.

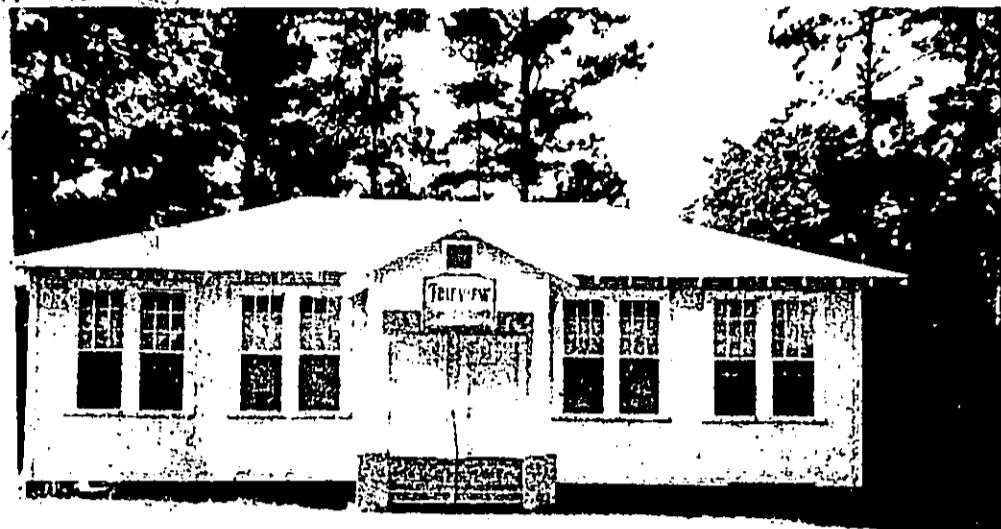

# The True Story of Old Fort Teran

This story of Fort Teran was delivered by Mr. Wheat before the Woodville Rotary Club on April 16. It is of special interest because of the recent efforts of groups in Angelina County to locate the old Spanish fort in that county. This article, and the old deed recorded in 1846 which was published recently, firmly establish the location of the Fort on the Tyler County side of the Neches River.

Fort Teran was located on the Neches River at the crossing of the old road from Nacogdoches to Liberty and at the intersection of the "Opelousas by-Pass" or "Coushatta Trace". It was named for Mier y Teran, a patriotic, sincere and loyal Mexican who made an inspection of the Texas colonies for the Mexican government in 1828.

Mier y Teran learned to his great disappointment that many settlers were coming to Texas routes other than the King's Highway through Nacogdoches and by methods other than those provided by the Mexican colonization laws. In fact, this loyal Mexican learned that Texas was already lost to Mexico and reported to his government that it was urgent that immediate steps be taken to stop this illegal immigration.

His investigation and report resulted in the Decree of April 5, 1830, known as Bustamante's Decree, and to enforce this edict four forts were established in Texas, one of which was Fort Teran, located at Belt's Ferry on the Neches River.

The very fact that one of the four forts was established at this point when Mexican troops were already stationed at Nacogdoches and at Anahuac, indicates the seriousness of the situation with reference to the illegal entries being made into Texas through another route. American citizens of the United States and French inhabitants of Louisiana had been using the route from Opelousas through what is now Newton, Tyler and Polk Counties for many years to carry on illicit trade with the Indians and the settlers of East Texas, and especially to capture wild horses and take them back to the State for sale. In fact, it is very probable that Philip Nolan, who lived in Opelousas, came over this route many times before he was finally killed near Waco, and his companions, including Peter Ellis Bean were captured by the Spanish troops.

Peter Ellis Bean with some other prisoners was carried to Mexico City where he remained in jail until the Mexico Revolution in which Mexico declared its independence from Spain. Then he declared his loyalty to Mexico and changed the spelling of his name to Pedro Elias Bean and became an officer in the Mexican Army.

The route from Nacogdoches to the mouth of the Trinity was well known and had been used for many years, but there is no record that the Mexican authorities knew anything about the route from Opelousas, Louisiana, through East Texas until Mier y Teran discovered it in 1828; at least, it was not guarded, and the adventurous citizens of the United States took advantage of the opening.

The first recorded use of the exact route followed by Teran was in 1767, when Marques de Rubi made an inspection of the Missions and Presidios in Texas. He was accompanied by one De la For, who kept an accurate diary. La For reports the trip in detail, from Nacogdoches:

"October 1767  
"Second Day, We travelled five leagues in a southerly direction over terrain like the previous one; we crossed the Nana arroyo at a place about one-fourth of a league from the mission and

another without name, at an intermediate point of this and the Angelina river which runs southwest in whose left bank we camped, having forded this which as it did not have much water but it runs furiously on some of its courses and floods some low lands flanked by two distant hills, a fourth of a league away from each other and which is known as the Lakes (Lagunas).

"Third Day, We travelled 12 leagues south one-fourth southwest through lower hills and not so dense forests, and with more clearings than in the previous days, at ten leagues we crossed the small arroyo Vidals, (Shawnee Creek) in the middle of which there were some uninhabited cabins though in a good state of repair where a settlement had once existed, and two leagues further on we camped on the left bank of the Neches River, which at this point runs east, in a deep bed of the river with little water, having rained on us all this day and the following night with slight intervals", this is where Fort Teran was later located.

In 1830 to enforce Bustamante's Decree, a company of Mexicans under Gavino Araujo Second Adjutant of the 10th Battalion with Colonel Pedro Elias Bean were stationed at Fort Teran.

On March 14, 1831, the application of Gavino Araujo for 11 leagues of land was filed. It was granted on February 16, 1834, on that date Pedro Elias Bean, Colonel of the Mexican Army, presented himself as an attorney of Citizen Gavino Araujo Second Adjutant of the 10th Battalion of the line which garrisoned this frontier requested the "legal possession of eleven leagues of land which the Supreme Government of the State had granted to my principal" and this eleven leagues was located five in what was afterwards Tyler County and six in Nacogdoches County.

In 1832, while these Mexican troops were stationed at Fort Teran, the trouble arose with Blackburn at Anahuac, and troops were sent from Nacogdoches under Colonel Piedras to assist in quelling the disturbance. Colonel Piedras and his men stayed at Fort Teran for several days until the necessary reconnaissance could be made to determine what should be done. Later, the troops went over this route to near Anahuac, but not get colge enough to start a fight. The Turtle Bayou resolutions were passed and the troubles were patched up, and Colonel Piedras returned with his troops by Fort Teran to Nacogdoches.

While Colonel Piedras was quelling this disturbance the citizens from Aylsh Bayou, near Nacogdoches rose up and ousted him and his troops from Nacogdoches. Nothing is said about Gavino Araujo. His attorney Peter Ellis Bean remained on Nacogdoches and on March 20, 1837, conveyed the five leagues of land granted to Gavino Araujo to Forest Thorn and John T. Pickney. He and no Power of Attorney from Gavino Araujo but later his title was sustained by suits in the District Court of Tyler County.

Samuel T. Belt was operating a ferry and trading post at that point and claimed to have a Mexican Grant for a league of land in Tyler County adjoining the Neches River, but that the papers were lost in the skirmish hereinafter mentioned.

In an interview with Gale Belt, a son of Samuel T. Belt, in 1936 when he was 95 years of age and being reminded of incidents which he remembered he said:

"His father ran a trading post at the Teran crossing which he said was later designated as Castillos crossing, who was a Mexican then Boone's Ferry and Duncan's Ferry. That he remembers when his father kept a trading post at the Teran cross-

ing and that the boats came up the river. That they had no overland crossing of goods in those days, only by way of the river. That his father related to him the story of Fort Teran. His father told him that the fort was erected by the Spanish and that during those days many times they were attacked by Indians and that the story was told to him that one of the Spanish expeditionists passing that way being hotly pursued did then and there bury the gold within the vicinity of Fort Teran, and that today he is an old man but during those many years since that time many expeditions have come up there to seek that gold, and at the battle of San Jacinto, so his father tells him, there were only 18 people at Fort Teran and the news came that Santa Anna was approaching with his army (The Mexicans already having prepared boats for his crossing) arrangements were immediately made for the people to leave that vicinity and Josiah Wheat, Samuel T. Belt, his father, and others seized the rafts that had been prepared by the Mexicans and drifted down the river."

It will be noted that Mr. Belt said that the Mexicans prepared the boats for Santa Anna but I have a copy of a letter written by R. A. Irion, Secretary of State from Houston, Texas, on September 20, 1837.

"With regard to the North American Indians, who have from time to time intruded themselves into Texas in violation of the 33rd article of the Treaty of Limits between Mexico and the U. States.

bands of the following Tribes may be enumerated, viz: "Cherokees, Cadoes, Kickapoos, Shawnees, Delawards, Creeks, Seminoles, Cuchatas, and Boluxus"

Many of them were embodied and already in the service of Santa Anna. A relic of that service still exists at Teran on the Neches where, at the time of the battle of San Jacinto, they were employed in constructing rafts to facilitate the crossing of the Mexican Army, which was but a few days march therefrom."

The rafts or boats were probably built by the Cherokees who lived at "Fenced In Village" at that time a few miles up Billums Creek from the crossing. The attacks mentioned by Mr. Belt were probably by the same tribe.

At any rate the boats were never needed by Santa Anna as he was stopped at the Battle of San Jacinto.

It is not known when the Mexican soldiers left Teran. The story told by the early settlers is that Josiah Wheat and a number of settlers drove the Mexicans away from the fort and captured the boats or rafts, to interrupt Santa Anna's march to Nacogdoches.

In March 1836 there were not very many settlers in this area. Of these Squire Cruse, William Mann, Samuel Willson, Adam Byerly, Horatio Hanks, Nathaniel Grigby, Enoch Grigby, Samuel G. Hanks, George Allen and John Nowlin, J. J. Pemberton, J. M. B. Hardin, Anderson Barclay, Joseph Conn, and Joseph Turner served in the army at different times, prior to the fall of the Alamo, and many of them may have been still in service.

After the fall of the Alamo James Chessher of Jasper County organized a company which marched to Nacogdoches and assisted in ousting the Mexicans from that point and then marched to San Jacinto arriving there the day after the battle. In this company were O. H. Delano, John Wheat, Hyram Wats and Michael Cody from Tyler County area.

The story "Early Texas" by L. M. Wheat, who was a son of John Wheat, reporting what he had learned from his father says

in reference to the "Run Away Scrape."  
"My Grandfather with his family and some others got in a big boat they had dug out of a big Cypress tree and went down the Neches River from Town Bluff into Sabine Lake and landed in the mouth of the Sabine River."

Hiram Willson born in 1877 and Matt Willson his brother in 1880 were born, raised and have lived practically all of their lives within 10 miles of the Fort, on the old Liberty-Nacogdoches road. Their Grandfather H. A. Willson who came to Tyler County in 1834 was 22 years old at that time and was very familiar with the events as they occurred. He was in his very active lifetime a prominent man at Peach Tree Village, merchant and farmer for many years and was a member of the constitutional convention in 1876. He started the accumulation of land by the purchase in 1857 of 20.7 acres that later became the Kirby Farm.

They say that they learned of their father, grandfather and other settlers of Fort Teran and from them they heard that the Fort was on the Tyler County side of the river and that the Mexicans remained there until they were ousted by the settlers under the leadership of Josiah Wheat. They do not know the names of any other settlers in the group. That they have visited the site and have seen signs of occupancy of the Fort.

Josiah Wheat had been in Texas less than 3 months when the Alamo fell and the "Run Away Scrape" began. His family consisting of his wife, and 8 children varying in ages from 22 to 7 years settled near Town Bluff.

L. M. Wheat in his story "Early Texas" said that several families came to Texas with Josiah Wheat. It is probably those newcomers joined with Josiah Wheat in capturing the fort and the boats and then returned to their homes and to the care of their families. Most of them drifting down the Neches River in the boats which were captured at Fort Teran.

Samuel T. Belt conveyed a part of his Grant to Forest Thorn on July 5, 1845, being the same man who bought the Gavino Araujo 5 Leagues.

This deed being the first deed recorded in Book A of the Tyler County Deed records describes that 2703 acres as follows:

"Being a part of the deadright of said Belt situated on the West bank of the Neches River including the old Camp Station or fort known and called by the name of Teran."

This would seem to settle the question as to the location as to the fort.

The Tyler County Historical Survey Committee has made an inspection trip to the site of Fort Teran and interviewed the descendants of the early settlers of that portion of Tyler County and that they have pointed out a site showing the foundation of the Fort. The Fort was evidently built of logs or other wooden material, placed on a rock foundation and has long since disappeared, except the foundation.

Bustamante's Decree of April 6, 1830, only appropriated 500,000 pesos, being about \$ 100,000.00 for the four forts. Therefore, it could not have been of a very substantial nature.

It is not known just how long Belt continued to operate his ferry but an interesting item is in the Act of Congress of the Republic. On December 24, 1839, a mail route was established from Houston to San Augustine by way of Captain Hiram's on the Trinity, Belt's on the Neches, B. W. Hawley's on the Angelina and Nathaniel Hunt's on the Aylsh Bayou. This route was along the old Nacogdoches road to Tyler and Polk Counties.

The population of Teran was given as 14 by Almonte in 1834 and as 18 by Belt in 1836.

It is not known how many of the settlers returned but it is known that Josiah Wheat, Samuel T. Belt and their families did return. In the 1850 census,

being the first census ever taken in Texas, all of Josiah Wheat's children except Josiah Jr. had left home and established homes of their own. There are probably a thousand of their

descendants now living mostly in Hardin and Tyler Counties. Belt and his wife, Helen with six children; John M., who was born in 1835, Elizabeth T., Spicy M., Maudon M., A. P. and Susan

M., were listed in 1850 and were probably still operating the Ferry and trading post although he was listed as a farmer. Many of their descendants are still living in the county.

The Ferry was continued in operation from the earliest dates and known as Belt's Ferry, Boone's Ferry and Duncan Ferry until the completion of the State Highway by Rockland in 1917.

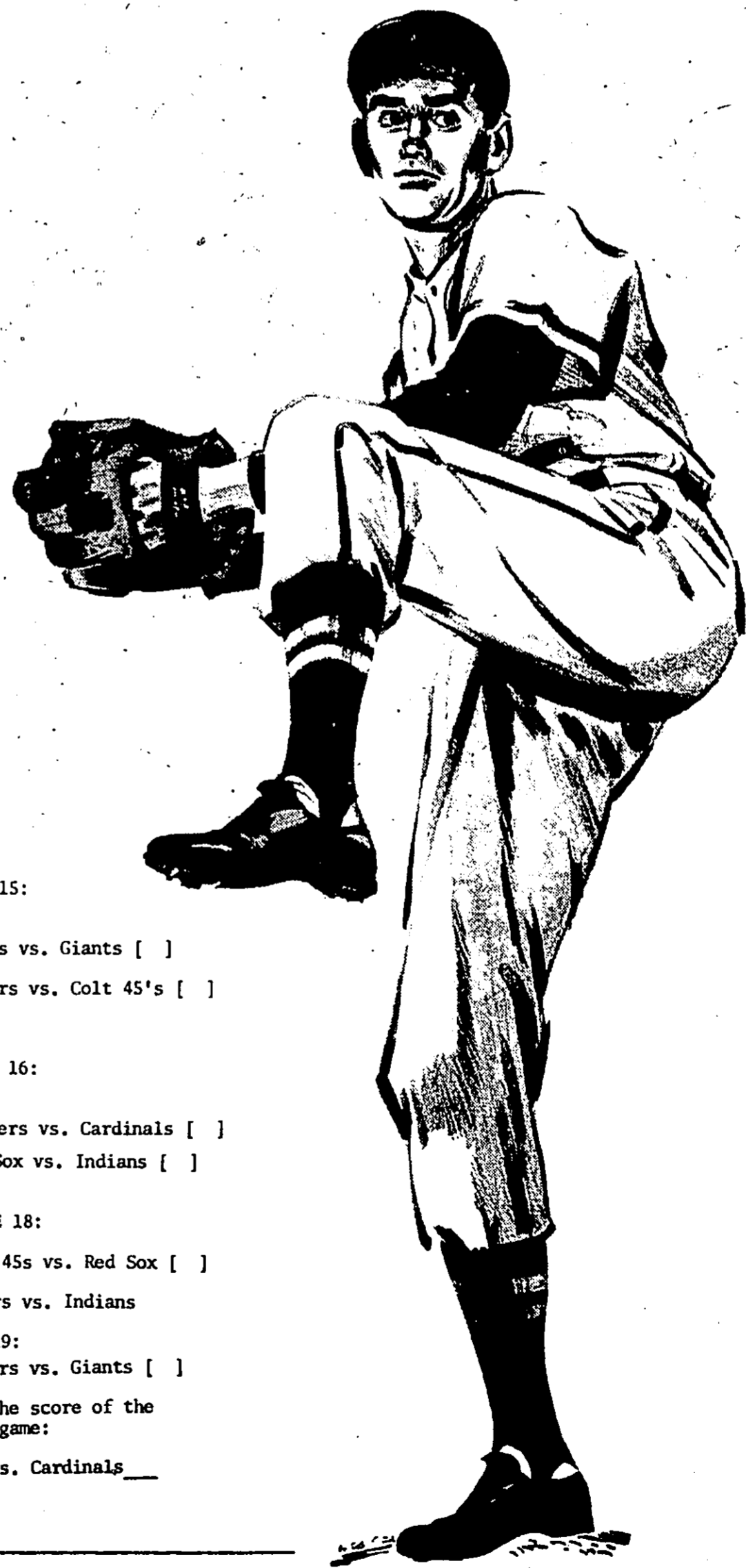
