## Postmaster Urges Patrons To Use Street Addresses

Postmaster H. M. Durham this week urged all patrons on the house-to-house mail routes to begin putting their house number and street on their return addresses on all mail which goes out.

In this way, incoming mail will have the proper house number and street address

when the home delivery starts July 18.

Mr. Durham said that although mail will begin to come in with street addresses before July 18 if the address is given to correspondents now, such mail will be put in the proper box until July 18.

"The important point now is

to get people who write you to start using your street address so that when home delivery starts incoming mail will have the proper address on it," he said.

Persons who do not have their correct house number and street address may obtain it at the post office or may call Frank Robinson, chamber of commerce president, for it, Mr. Durham said.

He also reminded those who are going to receive mail by home delivery to erect the proper box at their residences to receive mail. Those on the foot route may put a box near the front door on the wall of the house, and those on the mounted route must have a box at the curb line.

Many of the homes and most business places have numbers already up for the start of the house-to-house delivery. A good many do not, and these are the residences which need to be numbered in the next week or so.

Streets and numbers on the two routes have been released by H. M. Durham, postmaster. Route One is the foot route on which mail will be delivered to the door, and route two is the mounted route on which mail will be delivered to a box at the curb.

## VOTERS APPROVE HOSPITAL DISTRICT

Voters in the special election Saturday approved the creation of the Tyler County Hospital District 522 to 183. This unofficial tally may be changed by a few votes, since the totals were called in Saturday night to the county judge.

Only three boxes in the county

went against the district. They are Doucette, Spurger and Fred. At Emilee, the vote ended in a 10-10 tie.

All other boxes in the county favored the creation of the district.

The creation of the district had been asked by the com-

missioners court because of the need for funds to retire the hospital's bonded indebtedness. The hospital is paying its own way in day-to-day expenses. With the creation of the district, a special hospital tax will be levied on the present county evaluations. This tax is expected to be about 30 cents per hundred dollars evaluation.

Without the district, the commissioners court would have been forced to raise evaluations by several million dollars and the state would have received 42 cents per \$100 evaluation out of the 80 cents the county collects. Thus the commissioners court decided that the hospital district is the most economical way to operate the hospital in order to retire the bonded indebtedness at less cost to the county's taxpayers.

The county, following the approval of the voters, is expected to organize the hospital district within 30 days.

Credit Bureau Expands Services in Second Year

The Credit Bureau of Woodville has added personnel and added to their services, according to Mr. and Mrs. George Reynolds, owners.

In addition to the established credit reporting service, they now offer a collection service. As a department of the Credit Bureau, all items turned in for collection automatically become part of the credit records, according to Mrs. Reynolds, office manager. This will bring such information directly into the hands of merchants who regularly use the Bureau.

The Credit Bureau has just completed its second year of service to this area and is now handling three times as many calls for credit reports as it did in June of 1963. It is a member of Associated Credit Bureau of Texas, Retail Merchants Association and Credit Reports, Inc. Affiliation with Associated Credit Bureau of America is now pending, Mrs. Reynolds reports.

The local Bureau is qualified to render FHA and VA reports for home loans, credit card reports, personnel reports, as well as the standard consumer reports needed by merchants, bank and professional men, she said.

The collection service operates on a percentage basis. Therefore, the merchant pays for this service only if a collection is made, she said.

With the hiring of Miss Cecilia LeVins of Spurger as a full-time employee, the Reynolds now offer complete secretarial and telephone answering service. They will take, and make phone calls, and an experienced operator will handle telephone detail and keep permanent records. Typing, and other secretarial services, is available by the page or by the job.

In addition to these new services, the office hours have been lengthened. Beginning this week all services will be available from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m. Monday thru Saturday. The Saturday afternoon opening will be of particular benefit to local merchants, who receive many applications for credit during Saturday afternoon.

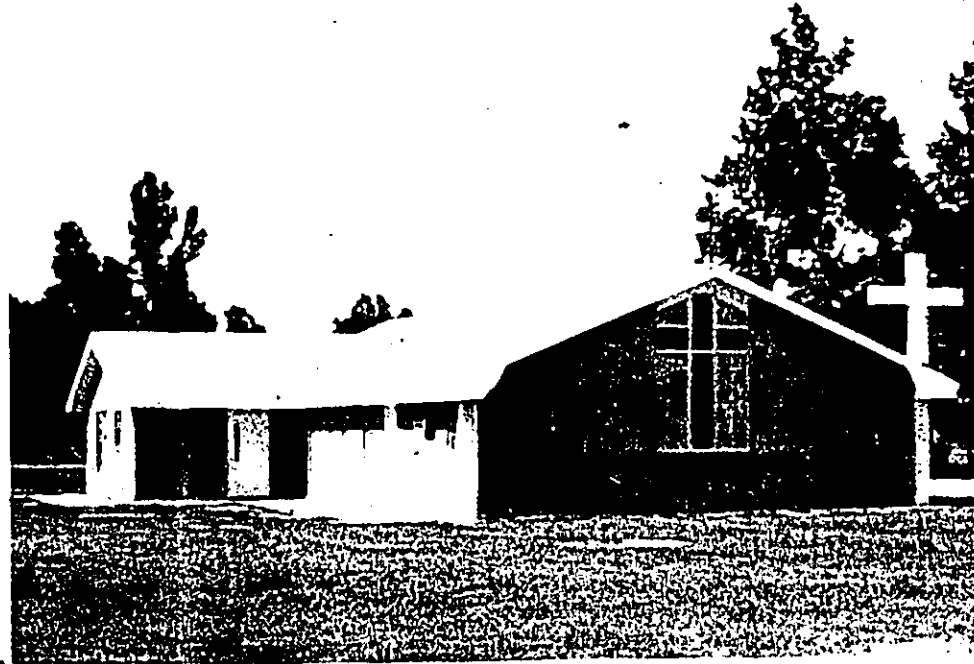

During the past three years under the vastly expanded program the Federal Housing Administration has advanced \$2 billion for the strengthening of family farms and rural communities. The \$613 million loaned in the first 10 months of fiscal 1964 was nearly 100 percent greater than the amount loaned during fiscal 1960.
