

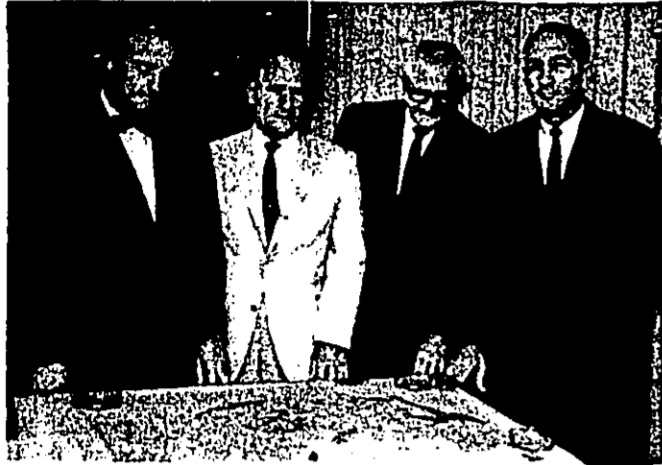

Fishing Rodeo At Hatchery

Ladies and girls, if you think you can beat your husband, father, brother or boy friend at fishing, you'll have a chance to compete with him Saturday, July 11.

Residents from 14 East Texas counties will have a chance to prove or disprove their fishing prowess in competition at the First Annual Jasper Fishing Rodeo to be held at the State Parks and Wildlife Commission's Fish Hatchery, just west of Jasper off St. Hwy. 63 during the 7 a. m. to 5 p. m. contest period.

Prizes will be awarded adult winners and trophies will be presented to winning children.

The event is being co-sponsored by the Jasper Chamber of Commerce, Tourism Committee and the State Fish Hatchery.

Hatchery Superintendent Warren Cooper of Jasper, Parks and Wildlife Commission's Regional Director John Carlisle of Tyler and State Director J. W. Watson of Austin are in charge of the Jasper hatchery.

There will be four divisions of competition in the event: Pre-school age; boys and girls, ages 6-12; ages 13-18; and all adults in the fourth category.

There will be only live bait fishing in the canals, and artificial bait (fly, spin and casting) in the Hatchery ponds.

Children under 12 must be accompanied by parents or adults, and neither the Chamber of Commerce nor Parks and Wildlife Commission can be responsible for accidents. No alcoholic beverages will be permitted on the premises.

Jasper Boy Scout Troop No. 32 members will be guides and the Jasper Youth Baseball Association will have a snack bar.

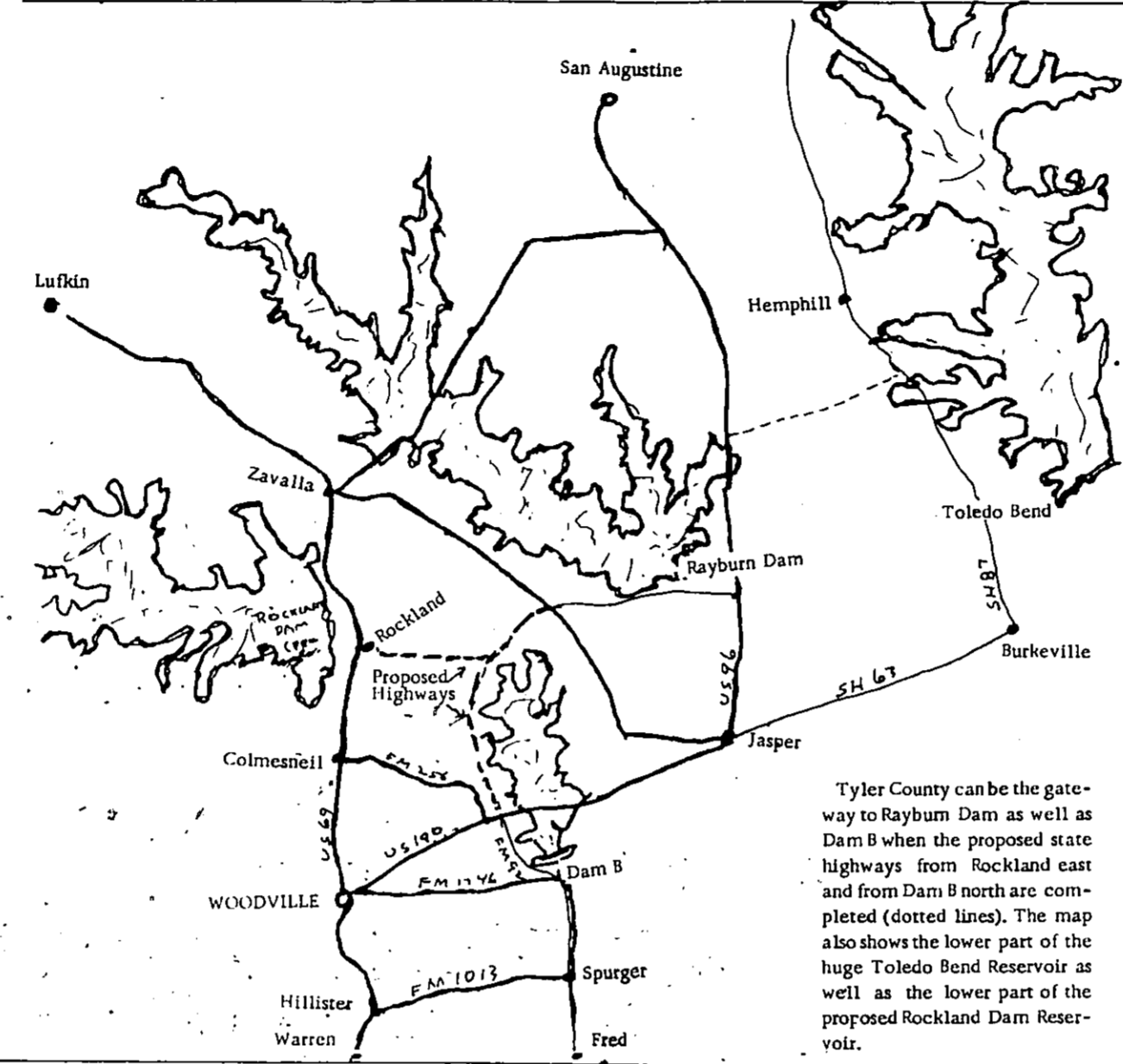
Cartwright Buys Blohm's Food Store

East Texas Tourism Faces Bright Future



Mail Delivery Starts In Two Weeks

Woodville postal patrons are reminded this week that home mail delivery in the city will begin two weeks from this coming Saturday.

Postmaster H. M. Durham this

week again reminded patrons of the post office that houses should get numbers up at once, mail boxes should be put up and on the mounted route mail boxes should have the patron's name painted or stenciled on it.

Mr. Durham said that patrons on the mounted route who live on any of the highways passing through town can get their box put up for them by contacting

Webster defines "tourism" as "The practice of touring; traveling for recreation; Tourists collectively; touring parties; The guidance or management of tourists, as a business."

The word is now being used more and more often as a "new industry for East Texas." Not that the area hasn't had some tourists in the years past, but just a trickle compared to other areas.

With the development of the many lakes in East Texas, the word is beginning to take on new significance. In this immediate vicinity, the growth of the Dam B Reservoir as a recreation center for fishing, boating, water skiing and camping has had a significant impact on the economy of the surrounding communities as well as the reservoir area itself.

Since the State of Texas has taken over the park areas around the reservoir, and will spend a half million dollars in improvement in the next year, a large increase in the number of visitors to the park and reservoir can be expected.

In the last decade and a half, the area from Town Bluff north to the intersection of Farm Road 92 with Highway 190 has developed from weed patches to thriving communities. Restaurants featuring fish dinners, grocery stores, gasoline stations, bait houses and other business places at the Dam B reservoir are the direct result of tourism—people traveling to the area for recreation.

Many of these come from the immediate area, but hundreds drive many miles to use the camping and boating facilities of the lake. Others have built cabins in which they can spend a weekend, or an entire summer.

With the influx of more and more out-of-state tourists into Texas, the Dam B area will attract a share of these travelers.

Warren Tax Suits To Start

Carter & Bro.; Warren ISD vs. Southern Neches Corporation; Warren ISD vs. Kirby Lumber Corporation; Warren ISD vs. Champion Papers, Inc.; and Southern Neches Corporation vs. Warren Independent School District.

Article Cites Woodville As Thriving Town Before ARA

The Houston Chronicle, which has just completed a series of articles by Stan Redding on the operation of the Area Redevelopment Administration in East Texas, had a story on the Woodville Community Inn last week as the fifth in the series.

The article touched on the part ARA played in building the Community Inn here, and referred to the Reader's Digest article which concluded that

there "wasn't much reason for Woodville except the old courthouse and some lumber mills."

Redding in his article stated that Woodville was a thriving city even before the motel was built, and that local business leaders feel that the Inn has stimulated business.

Here is the gist of the Chronicle article: "The report of Woodville's 'death' is premature, its citizens indignantly contend. And with ample justification."

Woodville is small—2000 population—but not sleepy. And most of the townfolk still are sizzling over last month's Reader's Digest article—blasting the Area Redevelopment Administration—which, touching on an ARA project here, stated: "There is not much reason for Woodville except the old courthouse and some lumber mills."

The article condemned an ARA loan of \$455,000 to partially finance the \$800,000 Woodville Community Inn, now in operation. The article stated the new inn had severely damaged the business of a widow, Mrs. James R. Willis, who operates Woodville's only other motel.

Critics of ARA—the federal agency designed to stimulate the creation of new businesses and industry in underdeveloped and depressed areas—say the Community Inn wasn't needed. Woodville's leading citizens say it was and is needed, and that it's already boosting the community's economy.

Frank J. Robinson, president of the Woodville Chamber of Commerce, said: "Because we live at the junction of three highways and can anticipate a large volume of tourists visiting the Sam Rayburn Reservoir now being completed (as the largest fresh water lake in Texas), Woodville seemed to us

When Toledo Bend Dam and Rayburn Dam begin to fill with water (Rayburn should have water in it in 1965) the area will be a tourist attraction to rival Texoma and other established tourist complexes. Plans are underway to build resorts on Rayburn Reservoir.

In its annual tourist industry survey, the Texas Highway Department reported that the number of out-of-state visitors in 1963 increased to 11,7 million, a 20 percent gain over 1962. These tourists are estimated to have spent over 500 million dollars.

Until recently, Texas could not spend money advertising its tourist attractions because of a constitutional ban. Since its repeal, and the creation of the Texas Tourist Development Agency, advertising is being placed in northern publications. The large increase in tourist in 1963 is attributed in a large part to this advertising.

Tourist dollars, it is true, are spent largely with motel, gas stations and restaurants—but the Texas Tourist Agency points out that these dollars soon flow through the entire economy in the form of more jobs, bigger payrolls, increased use of supplies, demand for more services and even additional taxes.

The Agency says that an average of only two dozen tourists per day in an area will have the same effect as a permanent industry with a payroll of over \$100,000 a year.

The City of Jasper recently held a training session for attendants, waitresses and others who will come into contact with tourists. The training is designed to enable these people, the first contacts many tourists have with a town, to make the tourists feel welcome and to be able to direct them to attractions and answer questions they might ask.

Jasper has also erected signs at highway intersections as far away as below Kountze directing tourists to Jasper—the city with "Three Great Lakes—Rayburn, Dam B and Toledo Bend."

The Tyler County Commissioners Court appointed a highway and parks committee to study the needs for new roads and other facilities. The committee has recommended two state highways for access to the Rayburn Dam through Tyler County. One would be an extension of Farm Road 92 from Dam B north along the Dam B reservoir to the northern part of Tyler County where it would intersect with another recommended road from Rockland east to Jasper County. The building of these two highways would give tourists and just plain fishermen coming to Rayburn Dam from either the north or south a direct route to Rayburn Dam through Tyler County.

The committees recommendations were endorsed by the Deep East Texas Development Association, and have been presented to the State Highway Department, where they were received favorably. It is expected that the highways will be put in the State Highway program soon.

This committee is composed of Carl Fairchild, chairman; H. G. Sutton, J. C. Barlow, and Billy Mitchell. They made several trips to Austin in the interest of the proposed new roads.

INFORMATION ON HAY SAMPLES GIVEN Instructions for taking hay samples to send to the soil and plant testing laboratory at Stephen F. Austin State College in Nacogdoches are given below:

All samples of hay tested should be obtained by using a forage sampler. This piece of equipment can be borrowed from your County Agent.

Sample at least 12 bales from the same lot of hay by taking core samples from the end of the bales. Each lot or type of hay should be sampled separately or samples should be collected from different lots in the same proportions in which they will be fed. In loosely baled hay, use the sampler to its full depth; while in tightly baled hay, use the sampler to only one-half its full depth. Send all of the material collected to the laboratory for analysis. Pasture

grasses and legumes samples be taken as follows:

If samples are collected from pasture for analysis, clip or pull the plants from a square foot area in about ten different spots in the pasture. Dry in the shade and send about one quart of material to the laboratory for analysis.

Cost of complete analysis is \$5, or \$2 for a protein analysis only.

Forage sample forms to be sent in with the sample may be obtained at the local Soil Conservation office or from county agent.

(Continued from page 1) East Texas Development Association was for the study of the feasibility of connecting the Toledo Bend, Rayburn and Rockland reservoirs (when Rockland Dam is built) with canals so that a boat could be launched in Rayburn and make a swing through the other lakes, or vice versa. If this is accomplished, it is possible that Dam B Reservoir could be included. This proposal, if carried out, could make an immense area of water available by boat from launching sites on any of the reservoirs.

However, even after the new reservoirs are filled with water, the problem will exist of attracting more tourists to the area. The Texas Tourist Development Agency is concerned with bringing more tourists to Texas. The State Highway Department's tourist survey indicates that most out-of-state tourists are destined for an area from about San Antonio on the south through a belt northward to the Red River. This area gets about 30.7 percent of the travelers. From San Antonio west to El Paso gets the second biggest number, or 27 percent. The Gulf Coast is third with 22.3 percent. The Pineywoods of East Texas, with its beautiful scenery, plentiful streams and man-made lakes, rates well down the list.

While the East Texas area can depend on many tourist and visitors from the nearby metropolitan areas and neighboring counties, the attraction of more out-of-state tourist should not be overlooked. Motel accommodations near the lake areas are becoming more plentiful, and boats and fishing gear as well as camping facilities are increasingly available.

In Tyler County, the Dam B Reservoir is the one big tourist attraction. The Indian Reservation, while in Polk County, is another tourist point of interest. Then in the southern part of the county is a fine dude ranch just opened this year, the Triple D. Heritage Garden west of town can be counted on to stop tourists here.

Clyde E. Gray, Heritage Garden developer, said this week

(Continued from page 1) a most logical place for a first-class motor hotel.

Civic leaders in Woodville conceived, planned and built the Community Inn with the broadest local support any such project has received. More than 100 citizens bought stock in the motor inn. . . .

Woodville is a busy little city. Even before ARA was born in 1961, the community was hustling to lure industry. A booming aluminum plant—now undergoing a \$500,000 expansion program—and a private airport attest to this.

"Other industries might have located here, but for lack of adequate lodging facilities for businessmen," said Morris Clemmons, an insurance man. "We were trying to get a new motel even before we found we were eligible for ARA aid."

When ARA approved the motel project, Woodville citizens raised \$163,000 through stock subscriptions ranging from \$25 to \$25,000. The latter block of stock was bought by E. W. Tubbs, a rancher, who said he "has faith in this area."

Clemmons and Billy Mitchell, chairman of the Tyler County Development Organization, say Mrs. Willis was offered stock. "I was not," said Mrs. Willis. Robert Mann, president of the Woodville State Bank, arranged the financing of the remainder of the cost, through his bank and banks in Jasper, Beaumont, Port Arthur and Colmesneil.

"Such a motel for us would have been years in the future, except for ARA," said Mann. "There is no financing at all for any such project as this, in small communities such as this, except through ARA."

Leo Nelson, manager of the attractive inn, said the motel has enjoyed a "40 percent occupancy rate" since its opening last November.

"We're not happy about the rate, but we're not unhappy, either," he said. "Even though we're losing \$4000 a month right now, we feel we're doing good. Few large motels, especially those in small communities, have a similar occupancy rate during the first year."

Mrs. Willis is bitter. She said her motel, which she took over and improved after her husband's death 12 years ago, lost over \$1000 the first month the Community Inn was in operation. Receipts for the first five months of this year are also down, compared to 1963, she said.

"If the new inn doesn't make money, I and the rest of the taxpayers, including you, will have to pay for it," she said. "If it does succeed, I'll be run out of business."

Nelson feels sure she won't be hurt in the long run. "We're sorry Mrs. Willis' outness is hurt, but we are not competing with just her," he said.

"We are competing with motels in Houston, Beaumont, Port Arthur and others in this area, which is a burgeoning recreation area. "Our payroll is \$5000 a month, and every dime is spent in Woodville."

Business has increased, say Woodville merchants, as a result of the inn. "My business is 20 percent better, over last year," said J. D. Vinson, a service station operator. "And it's still increasing, because of the inn, and I'm not even on their list of suggested service stations."

Woodville Mayor E. W. Gastcott, a dry goods merchant, said: "There is no doubt in my mind that the inn has already effected our economy for the better, and is drawing more and more visitors to Woodville."

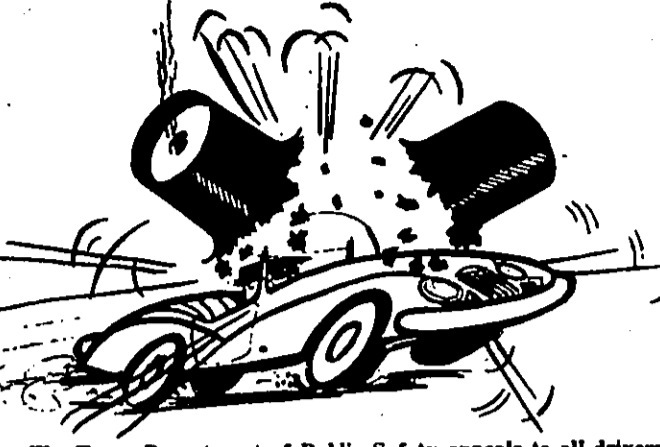

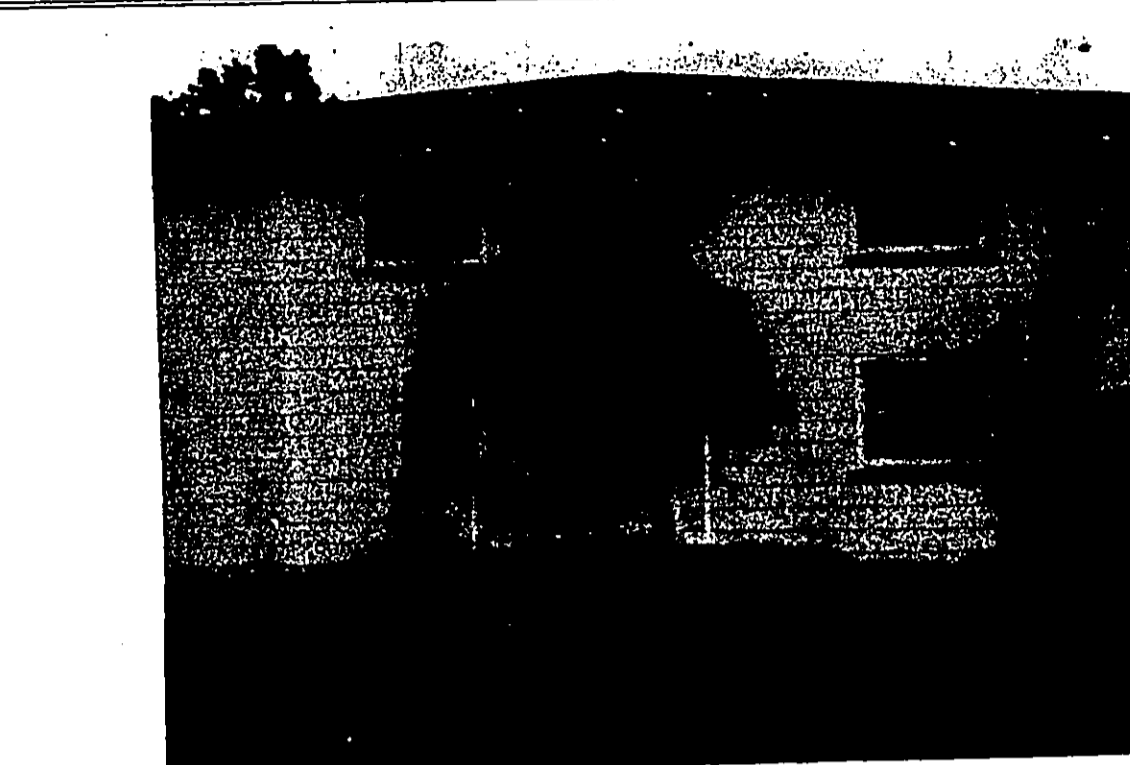

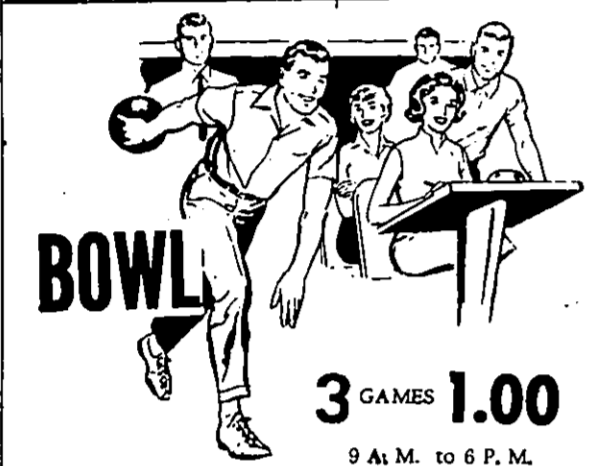
