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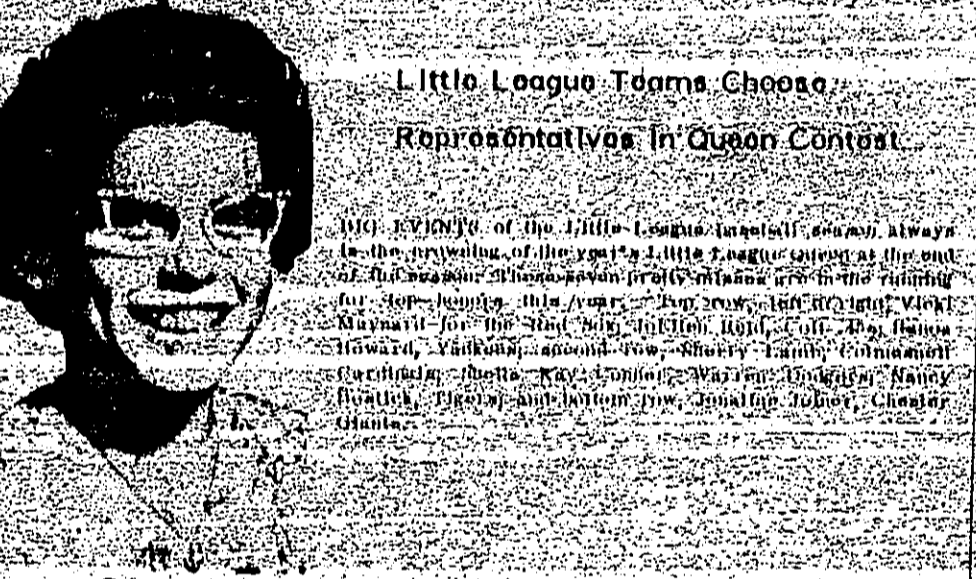

Whether it's a pig show or a fashion show, you'll find it among the 24 major events that Texas rural youth will stage at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas, October 10 through 20.

The youngsters will present their most spectacular event on Saturday, Oct. 17, when 50,000 Texas 4-H Club boys and girls, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers observe Rural Youth Day.

Arriving by school bus, truck and private car from more than half of the state's 204 counties, they'll have all Fair Park objects under control by 7 a.m. They will hold a fashion show, take part in a grass judging contest and show their talents in other ways.

At 10 a.m. they'll parade in their own parade floats in a parade down the parade grounds. They will have a picnic lunch and then go to the State Fair's big parking lot.

The fashion show will be the annual State 4-H Fashion Show, where club girls from all agricultural extension service districts in the state will model the latest in fashion. The show will be presented at 10 a.m. and 11 a.m. in the Women's Building.

The Junior Orator Contest starts at 10:30 a.m. in the Junior Orator Contest room. The 100 Future Farmers and 4-H boys who'll be judged upon the same different classes and events.

Other boys and girls will display their talents in the Junior Market Show in the Junior Market Building where judging will begin at 10 a.m. The judges will sell the produce at auction at 11 a.m. on October 17.

Actually, the future will begin their show before Rural Youth Day, with a Junior Market Turkey Show on Saturday opening Saturday, October 10. They will sell the turkeys at an auction at 10 a.m. on October 14. After all the opening day sales, they will hold their Junior Market Show on Sunday, October 15, in the Junior Market Building.

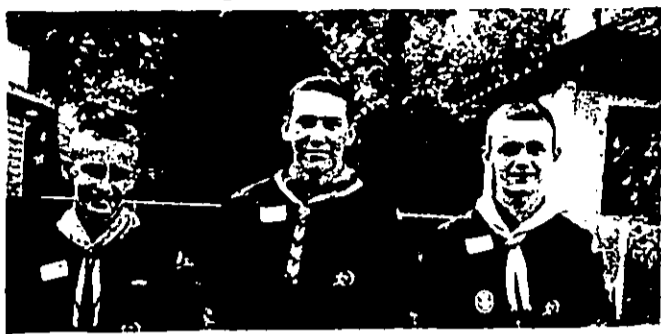

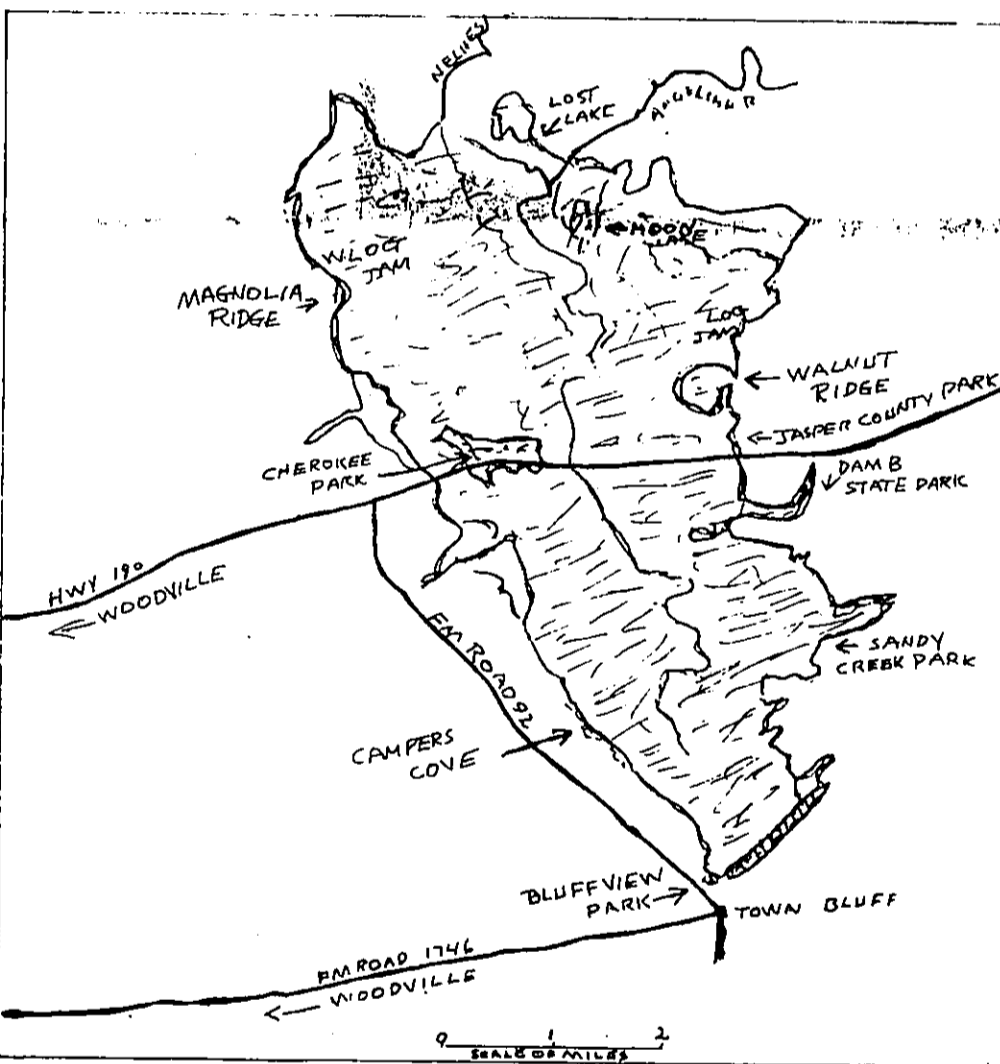

A total of 448,300 persons visited Dam B Reservoir and the various parks during the first six months of the year, according to records in the office of Batt Verneti, resident engineer for the United States Corps of Engineers.

Cherokee Park, located on both sides of Highway 190 on the Tyler County side of the river, was the most popular with a total of 45,404 vehicles and a total of 134,300 persons making use of the various facilities. This includes boaters, campers, picnickers, skiers, fishermen and just plain sightseers.

Next most popular spot was Jasper County Park just across the river. Here 36,571 vehicles

and 108,300 persons were counted for the first part of the year.

In the month of June, Cherokee Park continued to lead with a monthly total of 15,777 vehicles and 52,100 persons being counted by Corps of Engineers rangers. Jasper County Park had 12,041 vehicles and 39,700 persons during the month.

Vehicles and persons visiting the other parks for the first six months of the year were: Bluff View 11,867 and 34,200; Campers Cove 19,081 and 57,000; Magnolia Ridge 11,498 and 33,600; Walnut Ridge 10,368 and 30,100; Sandy Creek 12,056, and 35,300; and East End Park 5373 and 15,500.

During June Bluff View had 2657 vehicles and 8800 persons; Campers Cove 7798 and 25,700; Magnolia Ridge 2738 and 9,000; Walnut Ridge 2450 and 8100; Sandy Creek 3507 and 11,600; and East End Park 1346 and 4400.

From these figures it can be seen that of the 448,300 persons visiting the Dam B parks in the first six months, roughly one third, or around 159,400 visitors were at the park in June. If the number of visitors hold up during the rest of the year, the total number in 1964 could reach one million visitors.

Dam B is popular because there is something there for everyone. There is ample room for launching boats along Highway 190, on along the reservoir on one of the park roads. There is camping space. There is picnic facilities, skiing and swimming areas along Highway 190 and up and down the river.

For those who do not want to camp out, there are cabins along Highway 190 and at Campers Cove which are near the reservoir. Bait and boats as well as other supplies are handled by several business places adjacent to the reservoir on Highway 190, Farm Road 92 and at Campers Cove.

The Corps of Engineers are constantly building roads and clearing park sites along the reservoir for Dam B State Park, and additional picnic facilities are being added and more areas cleared. The Parks and Wildlife Commission has charge of the park, and an appropriation of \$500,000 has been allocated to improvements by the state.

Cherokee Park along Highway 190 is the only park facility under this program on the Tyler County side of the river. Since the Corps of Engineers have Cherokee Park developed fairly well, most of the Dam B State Park appropriation will likely be spent on the Jasper County side of the river.

Fishing is probably Dam B's biggest attraction for visitors. It has been one of the hottest fishing lakes in Texas for several years. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission keeps it well stocked and fishing is expected to continue to be good at the lake when fishing is good anywhere.

Camping, pleasure boating, skiing and swimming attract a large share of the visitors. Most of those who camp along the reservoir do so to fish and enjoy the boating facilities.

While a big part of the visitors at the Dam are from surrounding counties and the metropolitan areas to the south, a sizable number are from out of the state. As facilities are improved at the reservoir, the number of visitors is expected to increase each year.

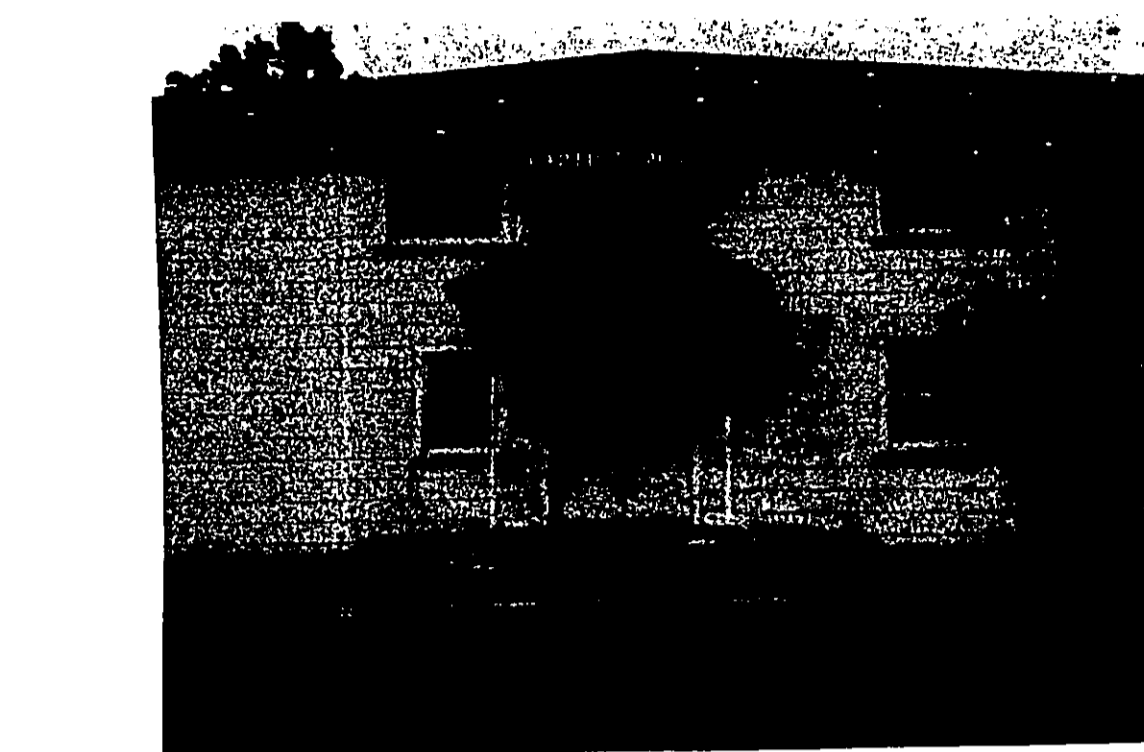

JASPER FISHING ROVEE IS SATURDAY

A bunch of surprisingly valuable prizes will be won by lucky anglers at the big open house celebration to be held Saturday, July 11, 7 a. m. to 5 p. m. at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission's Jasper Fish Hatchery.

As a part of the open-house, to be co-hosted by the Jasper Chamber of Commerce, a fishing contest will be held for pre-schoolers up through adults.

Prizes donated by Jasper merchants will be awarded the adults (19 and up) who catch the biggest fish (by weight), and five trophies will be awarded to children catching the biggest fish.

First prize will be an electric trolling boat motor, valued at \$125.00, and donated by S & S Outboard Sales and service Co. of Jasper. Second prize will be a rod and reel, given by Henderson Appliances; and third prize will be a big ice chest, donated by East Texas Surplus Sales.

Other prizes and their donors include two life jackets, a ski belt and two boat cushions, Myerly-Coker Motor Co.; tackle box, Myerly Tackle & Bait Shop; life jacket, White Auto

Supply a spin fishing reel, Winton-Sims & Co.; an ice chest, Powell's Hardware; and fishing tackle, A. R. Jones Grocery.

There will be four divisions of competition in the event: Pre-school age; boys and girls, ages 6-12; ages 13-18; and adults.

One trophy will be given the child 6 or under who catches the biggest fish; and a trophy each to the boy and girl in each of the two older children's brackets who catch the biggest fish.

Children under 12 must be accompanied by parents or adults and neither the Chamber of Commerce nor the Parks and Wildlife Commission can be responsible for accidents. No alcoholic beverages will be permitted on the premises.

During the open house guided tours of the facilities will be made and information about the Parks and Wildlife Commission's program, for stocking Texas' private and public waters with fish, will be given out.

Several game wardens will be on hand to assist visitors in seeing the Hatchery, located a few miles west of Jasper, off Hwy 69.

Fishing is normally not allowed in a state fish hatchery, so the contest will be controlled with fishing allowed only in certain marked off areas. Contest rules and blanks will be distributed at the site.

Jasper Boy Scout Troop No. 32 will act as guides, and the Jasper Youth Baseball Assoc. will have a snack bar and live bait stand at the site.

Residents of all 14 East Texas counties (Angelina, Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, Nacogdoches, Newton, Orange, Polk, Chambers, Sabine, San Augustine, Shelby, Liberty and Tyler) being served by this Hatchery, as well as other citizens are invited to attend the open house.

LETTER TO EDITOR

The following letter to the editor in the Port Arthur News might also be of interest to your readers:

As you probably know from the news items in The Port Arthur News, Southern Baptists have recently returned from attending the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlantic City, N. J.

I have here a clipping from a New Jersey Newspaper in which a reporter interviewed a bartender in one of the big hotels in Atlantic City. The tribute he gave Southern Baptists for their behaviour there is certainly worth publishing. Here, then, is the interview with the bartender, Bob Bonello:

"BAPTIST WEEK EMPTIES BAR"

Atlantic City—"Bob Bonello's life is returning to normal after a most unusual week.

"Bonello is a bartender at the Ambassador Hotel on Atlantic City's Boardwalk and though 1,400 conventioners packed the hotel last week none stopped in for a drink."

"I never thought I'd live to see this," Bonello said in a Saturday midnight interview, his voice echoing through the

lounge's dimly-lighted emptiness.

"He knew, of course, that Baptists preach against liquor but figured that some would sample his wares before the week-long Southern Baptist convention ended.

"They looked like jovial people," he wanted a chance to tell me of them, but they kept walking right on by," he related. "I waited all week for a break-through, but none came, either here or through room service. At first it made me mad but when I discovered none of them was even sneaking a toddy, well, it heightened my respect for them, no kidding."

"Bonello said his receipts last week, mostly from newspaper reporters covering the Convention, ran about \$25 per day compared to the \$800 daily average during most conventions of similar size. He spent most of the week watching a television set above the bar.

"Next door at the Ritz-Carlton's Gay Nineties room, bartender Frank Borak said, "Only two Baptists came in here all week. They bought Cokes, complaining about the 50 cents cost. They said Cokes cost a nickel where they come from."

"I respect their views," Borak added. "I'm a teetotaler myself."

"Conventions held by the Knights of Columbus, certified public accountants and other groups kept bars fairly busy down the Boardwalk around the headquarters hotel for the American Baptist Convention. But all the bars, including one with a 'Welcome Baptists' banner in the window, reported no Baptist business.

"Cigarette sales were off, too, but otherwise the Boardwalk was booming. The Baptists invaded hotels, motels, restaurants and other establishments in droves, and seem to have made friends in the process.

"We couldn't have had a nicer group of people," said Ambassador manager L. C.

Mintzer, Jr. "They went to bed early and were always quiet and orderly, and they didn't dirty up the ash trays."

Mintzer said he offered to close the bar out of respect to their beliefs, but a Baptist leader said this would not be necessary.

"Ron Pierce, a Negro painter in a Boardwalk art studio, said he 'never encountered a more beautiful group of people' than the Southern Baptists. Robert Jackson, the studio's manager, agreed and credited them with bringing him "almost a wind-fall" in portrait trade."

I would appreciate your publishing this as it is a worthwhile piece of praise, and too, will help people.
