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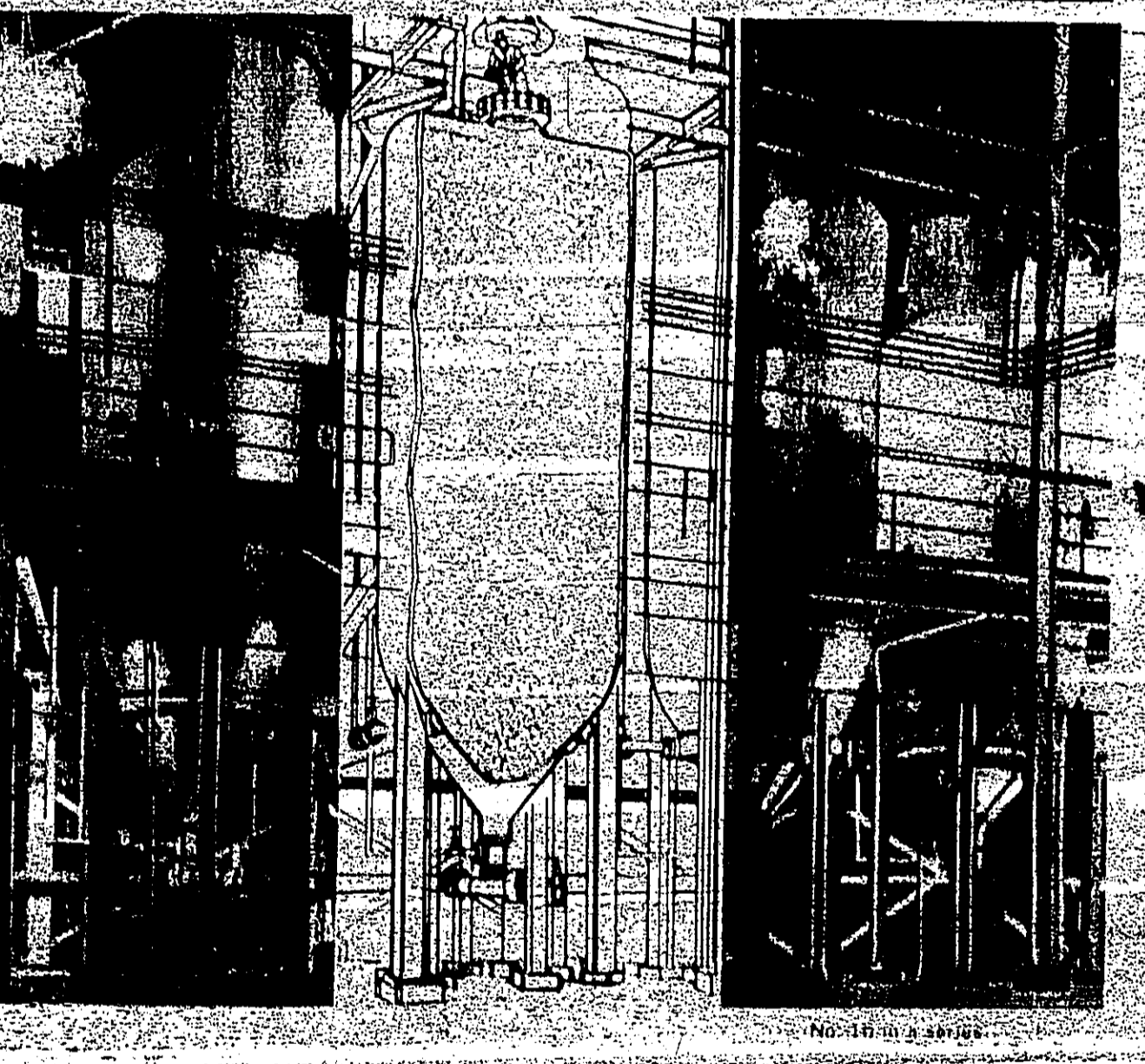
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The Chemical Pulp Mill: where wood is cooked to a pulp

Wood is composed of threadlike fibers, smaller than an eyelash, and the hard glue-like substance which binds the fibers together.

After each cooking operation, the chemicals are separated from the pulp and pumped to the nearby recovery plant where they are made reusable over and over again.

The pulp is then used in making white newsprint, pumped to the nearby bleach plant where it is bleached from brown to white. The pulp to be used in making brown kraft paper remains unbleached.

Bleached and unbleached chemical pulp are then thickened and pumped into storage tanks to await the next paper-making operation.

Heritage Garden Is Tourism Asset

Heritage Garden, Clyde Gray's new project west of Woodville, has become a prime tourist attraction in the few months which it has been in operation. According to a visitor's register which all callers are asked to sign, a total of 5618 persons have been through the garden since it opened March 26 through June 30.

Mr. Gray said that the place opened during Dogwood Festival weekend and with the huge crowds at that time a count of 2000 visitors that weekend was probably low.

Ninety percent of the visitors are from Texas, and the other ten percent are scattered among 22 states. Louisiana leads with out of state visitors, with New York state second. Three persons from Heidelberg, Germany have visited the garden.

on Dogwood weekend, although it was not completely ready, and the visitors have been fairly steady ever since. Tourists from other parts of Texas, as well as those from other states, are appreciative of the efforts of Gray to preserve heritage articles from pioneer days and the gallery of old photographs reproduced in ceramic, from pioneer day scenes and persons through the roaring twenties, create much interest from those going through the garden.

The five major attractions of Heritage Garden, in fact, would have to be headed by the collection of old photographs, which is the largest display of early historical photos in the state. Reproduced by a secret Gray process in ceramic, they are displayed outdoors in the Garden where visitors may view them leisurely.

Heritage Garden was opened on the growing collection of antiques that depict the way of life in early Texas, many of them loaned by interested families, is probably the second greatest attraction. Children (and adults) are spell-bound by a collection of early mechanical banks, which perform various feats when fed a penny. These are reproductions from original molds.

A third attraction, which Mr. Gray actually puts at the head of the list, is the old Tolar Kitchen, moved intact from near Hillister to a site in the Garden. The Tolar kitchen is remembered by many area folk who have stopped there for food as late as 1960. The log kitchen was built in 1866 and was in continuous operation for about 90 years. The old fireplace and the iron cooking vessels are all on display.

Another attraction, and one that visitors may see in actual operation, is the old grist mill on which corn meal is ground on two 26-inch stones just as they operated near the turn of the century. This particular mill is about 60 years old, and has a capacity of about 2000 pounds a day. Mr. Gray is grinding and selling corn meal daily, although he does not operate mill all day. However, he will grind corn meal for a visitor who wants to see the mill operate.

The grist mill, installed as an item of historical interest, has turned out to be a revenue source as well. Mr. Gray sells the meal in two and five pound bags, and also has a calico bag which can be used to mail the two pound bag. The meal sells for 20 cents a pound, and the receipts above expenses is used to help maintain the Garden and add improvements.

The fifth attraction, everyone will agree but perhaps Mr. Gray, is Mr. Gray himself. He is the only professional miniature landscape painter in the country, and the only painter to use ceramics as a base for his

artifacts. Below the suit in showcase are some high-button shoes, a tattered petticoat and blouse. See on top of the showcase (center) is a stereoscopic viewer and pictures, and the dark objects at right are glass photographic negatives loaned by Lance Roster of Saratoga.

Home Mail Delivery Set To Start Here Saturday

The Woodville post office will begin house-to-house mail delivery in the city limits Saturdays.

Postmaster H. M. Durham said Wednesday that he wanted to

urge all postal patrons to get ready for the new service by Saturday so that the post office could give the best possible service to its patrons during the changeover.

Those who will receive their mail by the new delivery service need to get boxes installed, their houses numbered, and change of address card filled out and on file at the post office.

The change of address card is necessary to change the delivery of mail from a post office box or general delivery to home or business.

Persons living on those street addresses which will receive house-to-house delivery to the door need to have a proper mail receptacle on the house next to the door. Those on the mounted route need to have a box (rural-type is acceptable) mounted at the curb so that the truck driver can deliver the mail in the box from his vehicle.

Persons who will receive their mail on the mounted route and do not as yet have their boxes mounted at the curb had an offer of help this week. City Secretary Rols Brockman said that a city crew will furnish a pole and mount the householder's box on it for the cost of the pole, which is \$2. The householder must furnish the box, which can be a rural type box. To get this service, the householder can call the city office, give his or her name, and address, and a city crew will install the box.

Postmaster Durham reminded persons who are expecting delivery of mail to the door that a box must be provided in which the carrier can leave the mail, or delivery cannot be made. The only exception is business places in which someone is present to receive the mail during delivery hours.

Those who do not know their house number may get it from Chamber president Frank Robinson at Gulf States Utilities.

Postmaster Durham said that the post office will have a tremendous job during the changeover from post office box to door-to-door delivery, but that they can give good service with the cooperation of the mail patrons. Those who want home delivery and have not filled out a pink change of address card need to do so at once, he said, and those who do not have boxes installed must do so by Saturday in order to get their mail delivered at home.

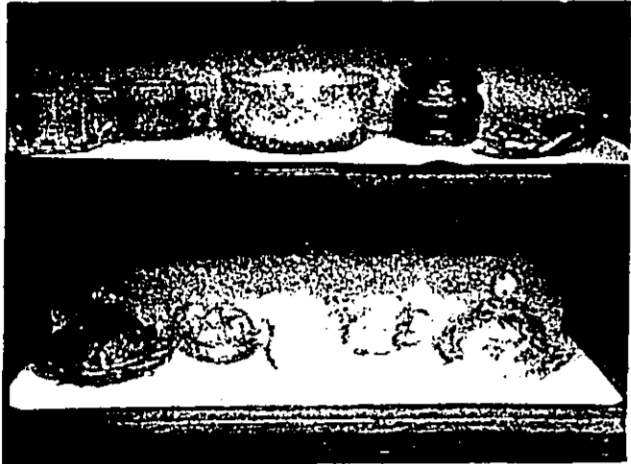

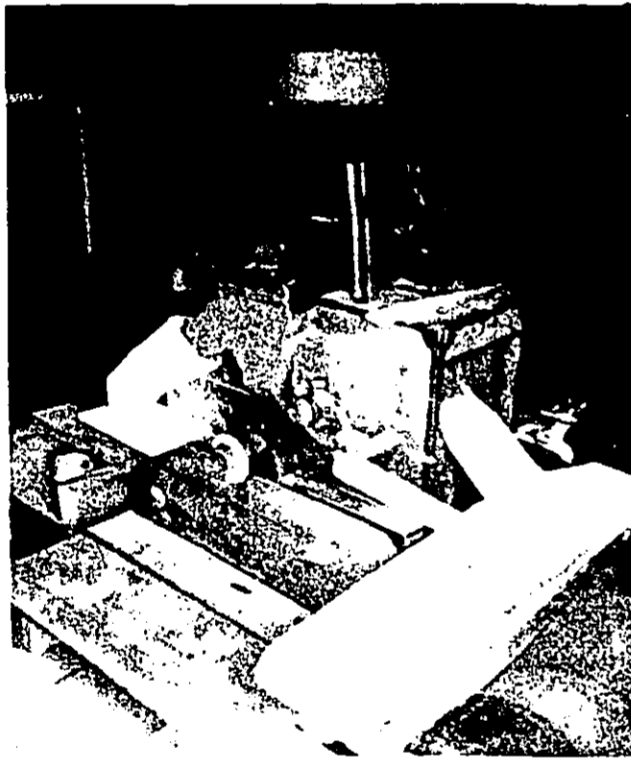


The glassware above was loaned by the W. L. Clay family of Kountze, formerly of Woodville. The top shelf is cut glass, and the lower shelf is pressed glass.

His original miniatures in ceramic of East Texas scenes have sold in the thousands during the past several years. Visitors, besides viewing the display of miniatures, also like to see the studio adjoining the Garden where Mr. Gray works. He also paints in oils. 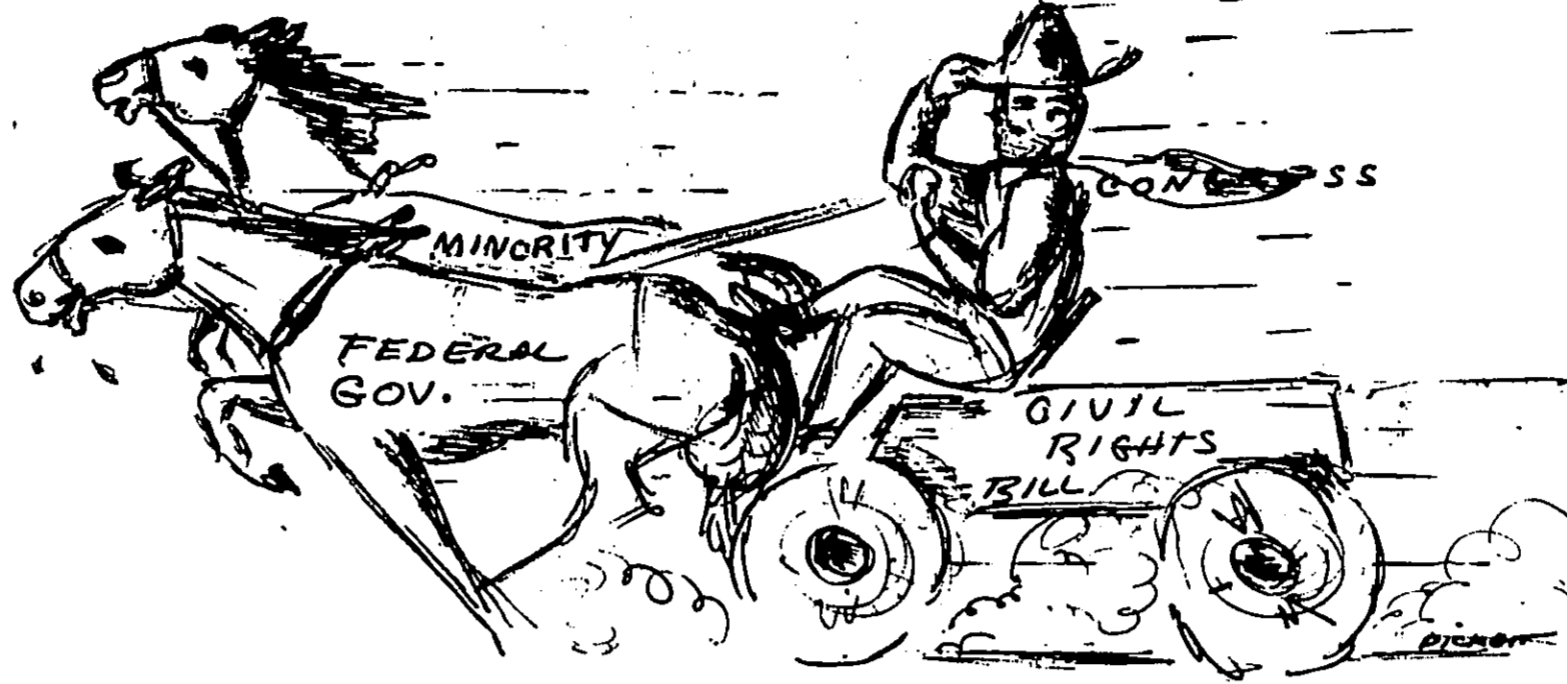

Authorities predict that Heritage Garden within the next three years will become one of the greatest tourist attractions in the state, and will be a boon to those trying to direct tourists into the East Texas area. It is now being visited by women's clubs in groups, and tours of school children find it of great historical interest.

What Mr. Gray is trying to do is assemble the largest possible collection of historical and heritage articles and old photographs to be found anywhere.

He has found that people from many other areas are greatly interested in the project, and has been loaned many articles for display by people from other areas as well as from local families.

If he succeeds--and that will depend on the cooperation of local people as well as area residents--Woodville can well become the center of attraction for the entire East Texas area. Add to Heritage Garden the Lakes, Indian Reservation, clay pit near Rockland, and other natural attractions and you have a selling point for tourists not only from nearby areas but from Eastern points as well.

TOURING EAST TEXAS

Nacogdoches County leaders are sizing up a historic ghost town for its tourist potential. Oil Springs, which boomed and burst long before the great East Texas oil field was tapped, lies in the forest greenery near Chireno, a few miles from the Angelina River.

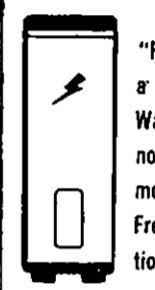
Nearby, at Melrose, stands the 140-year-old home of Capt. Lynes T. Barrett, who probably was Texas' first wildcatter. He drilled a producing well in 1866 near a spring where Indians skimmed a black, gooey substance from the surface.

But, like later wildcatter, he went broke and it wasn't until a decade later that oil was marketed with profit and Oil Springs boomed.

Today, Oil Springs visitors will find two rusting storage tanks, some inused casings, a few shallow pumps--and a spring of oily water.

254,550 SEEDLINGS PLANTED IN DISTRICT

There were 254,550 seedlings planted in District 4 during the planting season ending March 1964, according to Ernest Long, Assistant Forester, Texas Forest Service at Woodville. This would be an area of about 320 acres.

District 4 includes Hardin, Jefferson, Polk and Tyler Counties. These counties accounted for 6% of the total pines planted in East Texas during the past planting season. The small percentage of total planting is accounted for, in part, by the commercial forest acres of the counties; Hardin 88, 9, Jefferson 8, 8, Polk 87, 0 and Tyler 92, 1.

Most of the trees planted were southern pine, slash and loblolly with very few shortleaf and no longleaf being planted. The southern pines totaled 250,800 with Austrian pine, red cedar and an assortment of other species totaling 3,650. Southern pines were planted as forest or crop trees while the other species were used as wind-break plantings.
