Triple D Dude Ranch Tourist Attraction

Guests from as far away as New Jersey, New York, Missouri and Georgia have discovered the fun and charm of the Triple D Guest Ranch of Tyler County near Warren. The ranch opened in March and is one of the county's newest tourist attractions.

The three "D's" of the ranch—Mrs. Jessie E. Dixon and daughters Betty and Donna—bought the Collier place in the Hyatt community and started work on improvements June 12, 1963. They planned to have the ranch open for guests in two years, but in March of this year they were ready to welcome their first guests—15 months ahead of schedule.

The ranch personnel participated in the Salt Grass trail ride to the Houston Fat Stock Show in February, and the ranch booth at the show passed out mountains of literature. They also gave a weekend at the ranch as a prize. This is, perhaps, why Houston and that area has supplied the bulk of guests since the opening in March. However, the Beaumont, Port Arthur and Orange areas have also been well represented at the ranch.

This past weekend a group of 23 members of the Santa Fe, Texas, 4-H Clubs under supervision of County Agent Joe Singleton were guests. Recently a similar group from Georgia was at the ranch.

The Triple D offers a variety of entertainment for its guests. This includes trail rides, break-

fast cook-outs on Turkey or Hickory Creek, campfires enhanced with guitar music and singing, and meals served on the trail from a chuck wagon. There are trail rides for both adults and children, and family groups also enjoy the guest rodeos with barrel racing, pole bending, egg races, wild calf ribbon tying, and cutting horse contests. Youngsters also enjoy the moonlight hayrides.

The Triple D's big recreation room, a 40 x 100 foot building, is used for square dances, hootenannies, old fiddlers contests, shuffleboard, and other inside activities. With the many planned activities at the ranch, relaxation for guests who just want to "loaf" is available in rocking chairs on the long ranch-house porch, in chairs by the horse-shoe shaped pool, and chairs and tables in the lodge room of the ranch house may be used for reading, writing letters, or games such as dominoes or checkers.

In the lodge room is the pride of the ranch's owners, the huge fireplace with stones from each of the 50 states and 11 foreign countries. These stones were sent by friends and acquaintances and the Dixons have a record of the location of each stone in the fireplace.

For the youngsters who visit the ranch, a ride in the authentic stagecoach of the surrey "with the fringe on top" is one of the top thrills.

Family style meals are served from an all-electric kitchen.

Guest cabins are electrically air conditioned in summer and heated in winter. The boys and girls bunkhouses are favorites of the children visiting the ranch with their parents.

A novel idea for newlyweds—a western honeymoon cottage—has just been completed on the ranch.

Foreman of the ranch is Dallas B. Chandler, and he is assisted by Mrs. Chandler, stagecoach driver and trail boss is Ike Nelson, and other hands are Joe Hoffman, Darryl Stanley and Barry Stanley. Mrs. Ike Nelson, mother of Ike, is head chef.

The ranch is about 19 miles south of Woodville, and seven miles from Warren. It is 3.5 miles off of Highway 69. The county road to the ranch from Highway 69 is being improved, although it is sandy and easily traveled in most weather conditions. A new road through Lake Hyatt Estates is all-weather most of the way to the ranch.

The Dixons are constantly improving the Triple D, and guests so far have been one source of spreading word of its accommodations. Several guests have come to the ranch on recommendation of former guests. The ranch has already made an impact on the area's tourist business and as time goes on it will be one of the bigger tourism attractions in the Southeast Texas recreational complex.

Deer Season Here To Open Nov. 14

The deer season in Southeast Texas, including Tyler County, will open two days earlier this year—on Saturday, November 14, according to an announcement by J. Weidon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The Commission authorized the opening of the season in counties under its regulatory authority on the second Saturday in November, thus giving hunters benefit of the weekend for hunting. The regular opening date has been November 16.

The Commission has barred the .22 rimfire cartridge in the taking of deer, antelope, elk, etc. The only affected game in this area is deer.

The deer season will run through December 31. The limit remains at two buck deer.

The Commission also set the squirrel season in the area. It will open on October 15 and run through January 15. Bag limit is 10 with possession limit set at 20.

The quail season will open November 14 and last through January 31. Bag limit is 12 per day with possession limit 36.

Band Practice To Start August 3

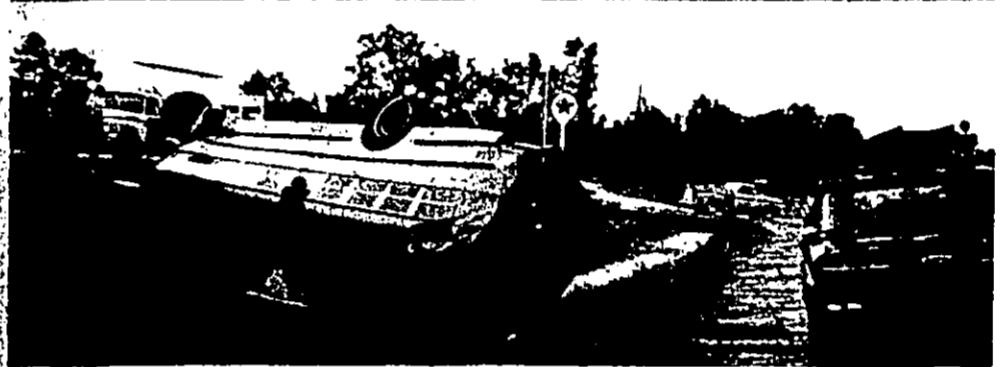
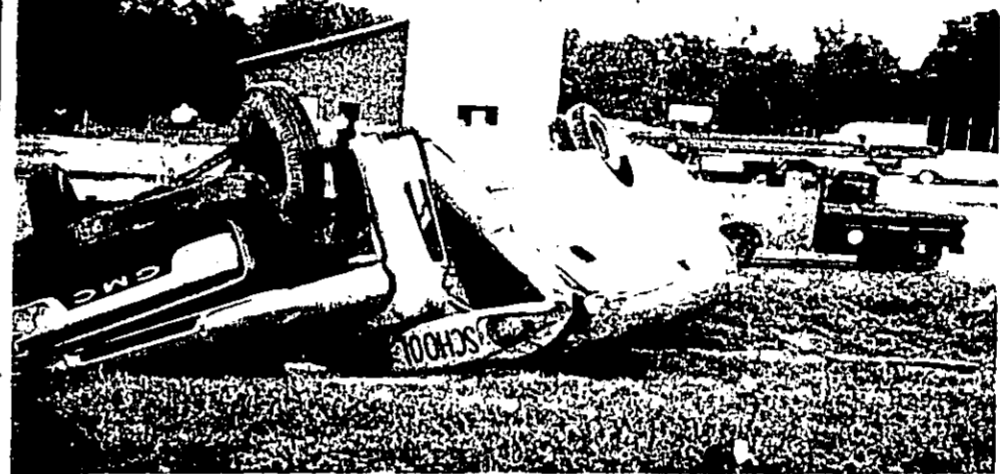

Record Keeping Main Task of County Clerk

The duties of the county clerk are varied and essential to the citizens of the county.

Besides being clerk for the commissioners court and the county court, the county clerk is the record keeper of the county. It is here that records of the utmost importance to the people, from births to deeds, are kept permanent and easily accessible bound books.

Some idea of the magnitude of the recording task of the clerk's office is shown by the fact that 1982 different instruments have been put on record in the office so far this year. Last year during the entire 12 months 1596 instruments were recorded.

Besides current records, the county clerk is custodian of all instruments filed for record since the year 1846. These old records must be kept in good condition and the bound books renewed when necessary to insure the permanency of the records.

The county clerk attends and keeps minutes of the meetings of the commissioners court, keeps a transcript of county court trials and also records all probate minutes. He also

keeps up with the county payroll and writes the checks for the same.

During regular and special elections, the county clerk is the official in charge of absentee voting. He must issue absentee ballots and keep them in a safe place until the day of the election, when they are opened and counted by election officials appointed for that purpose.

Nearly every record having to do with personal and business affairs are recorded by the county clerk. When you are born, he records your birth.

When you are married, he issues your license and later records your marriage. During your lifetime he may record for you deeds, deeds of trust, mechanic's liens, releases, assignments, affidavits, oil, gas and mineral leases, transfers, bills of sale, contracts, federal tax liens, abstracts of judgement, assumed business names, extension of liens, chattel mortgages, plat records, a r e d service discharges, etc. He also records nurse's, doctor's and dentist's certificates for you if you happen to be in one of these pro-

JUDGE SETS ASIDE WARREN EVALUATIONS

Judge W.R. Blalock of Mission, presiding over the consolidated suits of Warren Independent School District and several large land and timber companies, ruled Friday afternoon that the evaluations for the companies in 1962 and 1963 were improperly arrived at and should be sent back to the district for reassessment.

Eight suits were originally involved, and a hearing in the spring Judge Blalock ruled that the suits be consolidated since they were more or less identical in nature. The suits resulted from a dispute over tax evaluations by the school district for land and timber owned by the companies.

A school bus loaded with 45 children and six adults skidded on wet pavement, plunged into a ditch and flipped over on its top Wednesday morning two miles south of Woodville.

Two persons, both adults, are in Tyler County Hospital and about 40 of the other passengers on the bus were treated for fractures, lacerations, bruises and abrasions and released. Ten of the children and adults aboard were uninjured. The bus was from Our Lady of the Lourdes Catholic School in Vidor.

The accident happened in front of the Texaco Truck Center on a hill where the asphalt paving is extremely slick when wet. A light rain was falling at the time. The scene is the location of a rash of accidents in the past few months.

Still in the hospital Wednesday afternoon were Father Rodriguez, driver of the bus, and Eric Zuber, one of the adults accompanying the young people on a picnic. The young people ranged in age from 8 to 16.

A witness to the accident said that a car in front of the bus suddenly slowed, and when Father Rodriguez applied the brakes the bus went into a spin. It flipped over in the low ditch just in front of the truck center.

Ambulances from Edwards Funeral Home, sheriff's cars and private vehicles took the injured to Tyler County Hospital.

Five were treated for fractures and five others for possible fractures. Seven had deep lacerations, and 27 were given emergency treatment for abrasions, bruises and contusions.

Edon Eastley, administrator of the hospital, said that the hospital staff wished to thank the Gray Ladies, Candy Stripes and other volunteers for assistance in the emergency. He also expressed appreciation to the public for their cooperation in remaining away from the hospital during the emergency.

GRAND JURY RETURNS SIX INDICTMENTS

The Tyler County grand jury at its regular monthly meeting Monday returned six indictments.

Willie Bell Coleman, negro, is in Tyler County jail charged with two counts of burglary. The indictments charge him with burglarizing Foxworth's Store and B. J. Smith Service Station, both in Hillister.

One driving while intoxicated indictment and three theft indictments were returned by the jury, but names of those involved were not released since they had not been arrested Tuesday.

Home Demonstration Agent's Column

BY MAURINE MOONEY

Every homemaker wants a spotless, shining home, but no one wants to be a slave to it. Experienced homemakers have learned short cuts which make the job of house-cleaning easier. Here are tips and tricks from these experienced homemakers which will simplify household chores:

Copper shines when cleaned by sprinkling it with salt, then wiping with a cloth or paper towel dipped in vinegar. Or in place of vinegar, use lemon juice. Rinse the copper immediately and dry. A good homemade copper polish consists of a paste made by mixing equal parts of salt, vinegar, and flour. Rub copper with this mixture until it is clean, then wash in hot suds, rinse, dry and polish. Whether a commercial copper polish or a homemade mixture is used, always wash copper thoroughly with soap suds or it will tarnish again rapidly. Do not polish lacquered ornamental copper, but wash in warm soapy water, rinse and dry.

Glass vases, Carafes, Cruets will be sparkling clear if filled with water containing a teaspoon or two of ammonia. Let stand for several hours or overnight. Wash and rinse and let dry upside down. In cleaning cut glass, rub the outside and inside of the cut glass with half a lemon and rinse gently under the faucet in lukewarm water.

Baths and Kitchen Sinks can be easily polished with a cleanser-soaked paper towel. Stubborn stains from dripping water in sink or bath tub may be removed by applying a paper towel dipped in a 5 per cent solution of oxalic acid. Rinse thoroughly in a few seconds.

County Agent's Column

The Beef Cattle and Pasture Sub-Committee of the Tyler County Program Building Committee meet Monday night July 27 in the Woodville Community Inn at 7:00 p. m.

The simplest stump-riding method is to cut the trunk off at or near the ground line, cover it with soil and sod, and keep the area moist. Keeping the grass alive during dry periods.

Ornamental plants frequently suffer damage or die as a result of various diseases. Certain viruses, bacteria, fungi, and nematodes caused by parasitic plant diseases. One of these, powdery mildew, is caused by several fungi.

Powdery mildew is common on roses, euonymus, Zinnias, and similar plants. It appears on leaves as a powdery white coating. The disease thrives readily in warm, humid weather.

As a preventive against powdery mildew, protective fungicides such as acti-dione PM, phaltan, karathane, and sulfur should be used.

This may be bad news for homeowners, but there is no miraculous way to get rid of tree stumps.

There is no magic chemical for dissolving tree stumps in yards overnight. In fact, there is no easy, painless way to remove tree stumps from yards, especially the larger ones.

Several methods may be used to get rid of stumps. If the ground is being cleared for building and bulldozer is being used, this machine can be used to push out stumps quickly and easily.

Another method is the use of a portable stump chipping machine which literally chews up the stump into small particles. Availability of this device is usually restricted to large cities where local tree service concerns may have them.

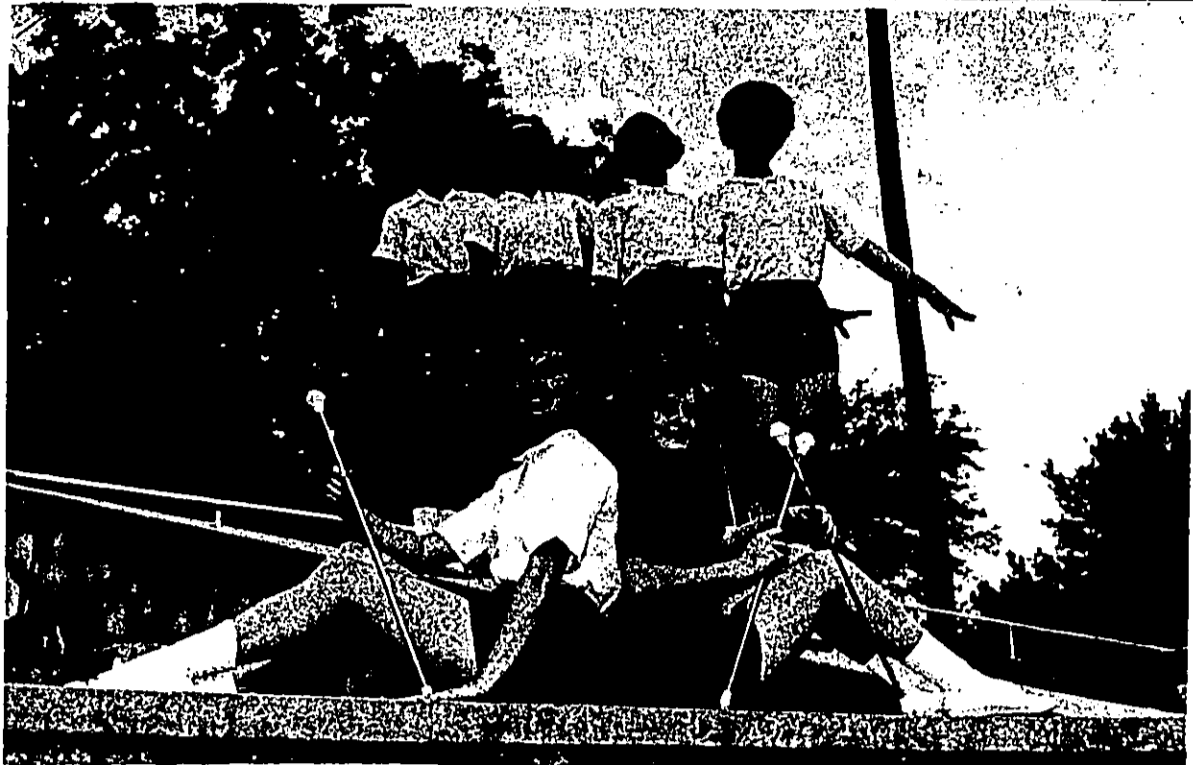

John Foster Attends Youth Forestry Shortcourse

Forty-four NFA and 4-11 Club youths registered Monday at Huntville for the 1964 Youth Forestry Shortcourse conducted jointly by the Texas Forestry Association and the Texas Forestry Service. They were welcomed by E. R. Wagoner, executive secretary of the Texas Forestry Association.

John Foster, Woodville, from Tyler County is at the Shortcourse. Each boy is sponsored by local civic clubs, garden clubs, chamber of commerce groups and businessmen. The local youth is sponsored by Howard Motor Co., Woodville.

The shortcourse curriculum is designed to provide the boys with first-hand knowledge of recommended methods of growing, improving and utilizing farm woodlands. They will study such subjects as marking and marketing, wood preservation and utilization, tree identification, fire prevention and suppression, timber measurement, felling and woods safety, and tree planting. The shortcourse activities also include well planned recreation and citizenship training programs.

Forestry equipment, such as axes, saws, compasses, etc. donated by manufacturers and conservation organizations will be awarded Friday afternoon to the campers making the highest scholastic grades.
