Atlas Missile Due Here Tuesday Eve

Just A Few Words

In the past seven months there has been an increased number of automobile wrecks at the curve of Highway 40 two miles south from a point near the Dorwood Drive and on past Hoyt's Lumber. Most of the accidents have been fatal or serious.

The last Wednesday a school bus accident did not result in a fatality, largely due to the quick action of one good citizen's part and the driver's alertness.

Some there will be school buses on the road daily, twice daily, carrying Tyler county youngsters.

Something was said last week about getting a "black" sign or signs in the dangerous section. However, as of Tuesday, no such signs were in evidence.

The highway needs to be re-evaluated along that particular stretch. Business people in the area have witnessed as many as six accidents in a single rain shower.

Now is the time for the State Highway Department to determine someone is killed.

It takes a combination of circumstances, such as a light shower, and perhaps another vehicle and Woodville and Tyler county will know what a "black" sign is.

A one hundred per cent Atlas missile, the same vehicle that was propelled into the ground on all of America's manned space flights to date, will be in Woodville next Tuesday.

The Atlas weighs 47,000 lbs., fully loaded and travels at a speed of 30,000 m.p.h. and has a range in excess of 6,000 miles.

This Atlas is 76 feet long and 10 feet in diameter. It is loaded on the trailer, it takes up approximately 90' of 12 feet of highway space. All larger cities along the route were alerted because of traffic problems created by an object of this size.

The warden, Jack Tindale of Ruston, is optimistic about membership, and expects booming interest in more sportmen in the area realize and appreciate the value of such a group.

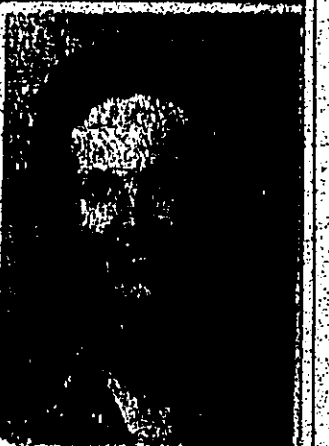

Schools Set Dates For Registration

The first day of school in the Woodville district for the 1964-1965 term is set for August 31, according to B. H. McGuire, superintendent.

Senior high school pupils will register Friday, August 28, according to a schedule to be announced later. All other pupils in the junior high school grades and in the elementary grades will register Monday, August 31.

A pre-school clinic for First Grade pupils of the Woodville Elementary School will begin Monday, August 17, and will end August 21. The clinic will be conducted each morning from 8:30 to 11:00, according to J. W. Shields, principal. First Grade teachers and the home-making department of Kirby High School will conduct the pre-school clinic.

Each first grade pupil must present a birth certificate at the time of registration. Children born on or before September 1, 1958 are eligible to register in the first grade. Each first grade pupil will also be required to present medical certificates showing vaccination for small pox, polio, and the D. R. T. series of injections. School buses will begin operation August 31. Routes will begin the same as during the last school term. Minor adjustments on routes will be made according to need after the school term begins.

School lunchrooms will begin operation on August 31.

During the 1964-1965 school term, the school day will begin at 8:10 a. m. and will end at 3:30 p. m.

The school calendar provides holidays on September 7 (Labor Day), November 26-27 (Thanksgiving), March 26 (Dogwood), and April 16 (Easter). The Christmas season will begin at the conclusion of the school day on Tuesday December 22, and classes will resume

TWO WOODVILLE BOYS DIE IN HIGHWAY ACCIDENT

John Graham and Ronald Cards were killed Friday when the pickup truck in which they were riding struck a concrete traffic-count installation four miles south of town, skidded about 25 yards and came to rest upside down on the right side of the highway. It caught fire and the men were trapped in the cab.

The truck was traveling south on the highway when it veered onto the shoulder and struck wooden posts surrounding the traffic-count installation. The posts were nearly leveled and the concrete post was knocked

or carried by the truck for several yards down the shoulder of the highway.

It was thought that Graham was driving. The Woodville Volunteer Fire Department answered the alarm and extinguished the fire before the bodies could be moved. Edwards Funeral Home ambulances answered the accident call.

The accident was investigated by Highway Patrolman Joe Wilmon. An inquest was held at the scene by Justice of the Peace Joe Loggins, who ruled accidental death.

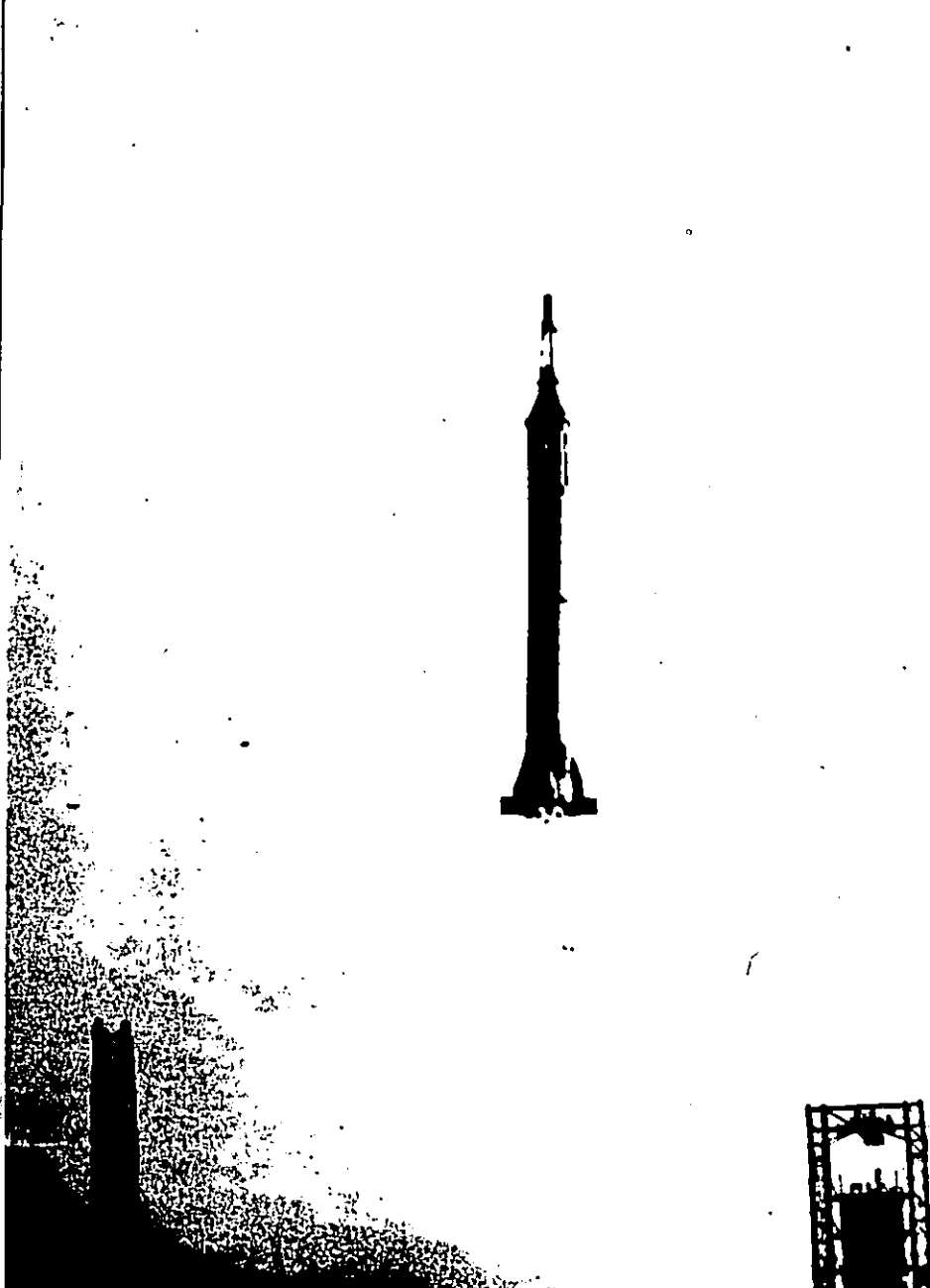

On March 12 there will be no school to allow teachers to attend the Texas State Teachers Association convention. Easter holidays will be April 16-19.

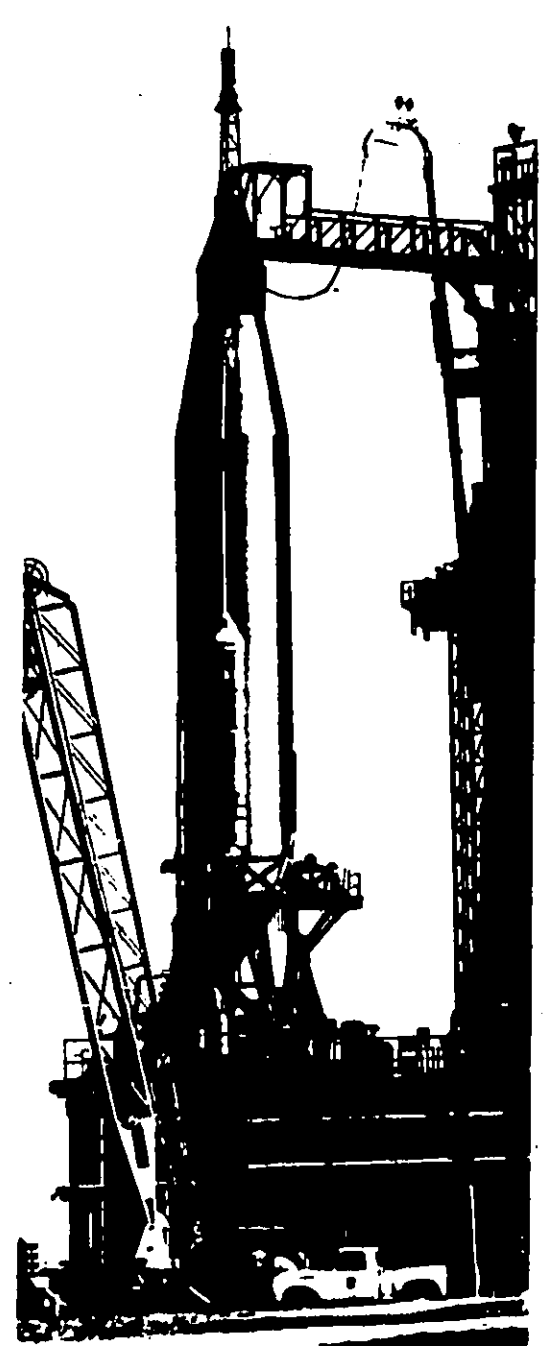
Final exams will be held May 25 and 26. Graduation exercises are scheduled for May 28.

An Atlas Missile will be on display in Woodville Tuesday night on the A & M Motor Company lot on South Magnolia street. The caravan is expected to arrive here sometime between 3:00 and 6:00 p. m. and will remain overnight.

The missile is enroute by caravan from Shepherd Airforce Base in Texas to Patrick Airforce Base in Florida and Woodville is one of the stops on the way to Florida. The missile is shown only at overnight stops, and the showing in Woodville will be the only one in Southeast Texas.

Formerly when these missiles were being moved, they were kept covered and were not shown to the public. The Air Force is making an exception in this move and letting the public get a close-up view of the missile.

The Atlas is the missile that has been used to launch all of the manned space flights of the United States. The missile is 75 feet long, ten feet in diameter and weighs 243,000 pounds. Length of the missile and truck which is transporting it totals 90 feet.

When in flight, the Atlas travels at a speed of near 10,000 miles per hour. It has successfully powered the launching of three space flights.

The missile is being escorted on its route by Air Police. Information that the missile may be seen by the public here is being given to all area news media, and hundreds of people from throughout this area are expected to come here to see it.

Captain Moody, officer in charge of the caravan moving the Atlas missile from Texas, to Florida, will be here Tuesday at a noon luncheon to explain the workings of the missile to the public.

Attitudes

Phillipians 4:8
 "Finally, brethren, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is gracious, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. There is much talk among church members these days about the failure of the church to draw members. About losing ground, about not growing.

This, of course, can or cannot be true. It all depends on the attitude of the so-called faithful.

We fail to see that much fruit can be borne even among a few. We forget Jesus Christ's words "Where two or three are gathered together, there am I in the midst of them." We fail to look at the over-all program of the church over the years. We fail to accept our responsibilities to Christ and his church. We fail to realize our lack of genuine interest in the growth of the church. We count heads and feel the church is losing ground failing to expand. Yet, we do not see the vast structural improvements, the new members that have come in, the report many are making to live better lives for Christ.

All too often in churches of every creed we hear the cry "Somethings wrong!" "We're not getting the people!" We hear at the elder's meeting, the board meetings, the other meetings, the negative remark, "The people will never come!" We go to our services in any church and hear comments, "The preacher just isn't doing his part," or "The sermons are not appealing to people" or "We need a new leader to stir us up."

These very same people making these remarks fail to see what they are doing. They do not know that by being negative and showing lack of faith, they will discourage even those who do come. They are the ones who always offer criticism instead of encouragement, who think a new minister is necessary. But in two or three years these same few will be saying the same things all over again.

"Awake, O sleeper!" Church members are asleep. They look over the fact that half the membership decided to go visiting on the same day. That company came in just as some were getting ready for church so of course they could not come. That "It is such a beautiful day. We couldn't resist going to the beach or the river or the mountains or simply sitting in our own back yard."

"Church! Well, that can wait until I have nothing more important or interesting to do."

"Don't I give a few dollars when I do come? All this talk about church. I tell you I get tired of it."

"Now, sir, before you get started on me about my church attendance, let me tell you something. I watch a good service every Sunday morning and feel so clean and good. Besides, there are some people going to your church that I simply do not like. Now, if they ever move away, I'll be there."

"You know, our minister expects us to come not only to Sunday School, but to morning worship. Then, he asks us to come back that night-and to top it off-he throws a mid-week Bible Study at us. Doesn't he know how lucky he is to see me at Sunday School?"

"I do my part! I am so glad I am not like some of our members. They do not care like I do. We would be better off without them."

"I don't know how you feel, but I want my family in a larger church. After all it is important to have friends and I want my children to be popular and this small church has nothing to offer."

"My goodness! You can't expect me to go to that huge church! Why I wouldn't know anyone. Besides, I have always

heard small churches are better. These remarks could go on and on. We do not know where or when or if they would ever stop!

Attitudes make or break any organization-not just church. Let's take the Rotary Club for example. If a man joins Rotary, he is expected to fulfill certain responsibilities. He is expected to contribute his time and talents wherever they are needed. If the Rotarian does not meet these qualifications, then he is out and someone else will be there to take his place. If many members feel so lethargic about their club membership, then, no club.

Yet, how many of our churches would ask a member to relinquish his membership for any of the above reasons? Or for that matter, for any reason? Very few, if any, in this era. The minister calls and calls. He spends hours on the sermons. He spends hours in prayer for the church-for the Baptized in Christ. He is interested in community work, in youth work, in the work of the United Church reports. Very seldom do you find a disinterested minister. But, look about you-the disinterested church members are everywhere.

A church can ask a minister who does not care about the growth, spiritual and physical, of the church to leave. But how many members are ever asked to leave. "Why it just isn't done!"

God gives growth. He gives grace. He gives insight. He gives understanding. He gives patience. He gives kindness, gentleness, self-control. He clothes us in his great love. He forgives us our negative attitudes-our lack of faith, our lack of enthusiasm, our lack of interest. He forgives us when we say we will do something and yet, we never do. He hears our excuses and is grieved but forgives. He sees our motives, our ideals, our desires, our reasons and weeps as he did over Jerusalem. He sees our weaknesses, our faults, our evasions, our stubbornness, our hard-heartedness and says "I'll forgive them, for they know not what they do."

"God is not asleep! He is not dead! He is the same God that punished Moses for his stubborn attitude. That punished Samson for his wishy-washy beliefs and attitudes. That struck Peter in to remorse and grief for his evasion and denial. That caused Paul to go blind for his hard-heartedness.

Do we think our attitudes about Christ and the church go unnoticed? Do we think by staying away we can change the church around to our way of thinking-our standards?
