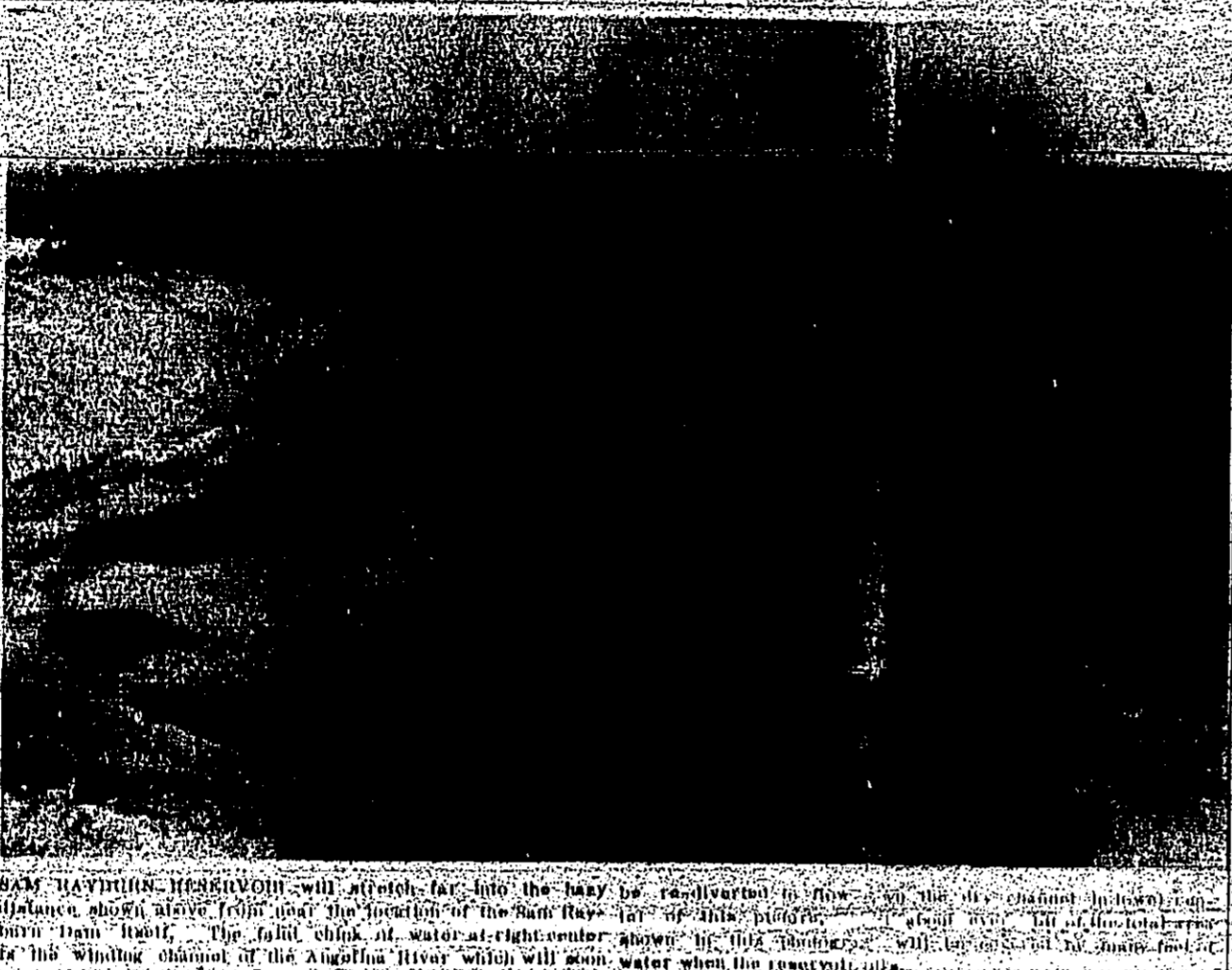
All members of the athletic squad, football coaches, and their families are invited to the event.

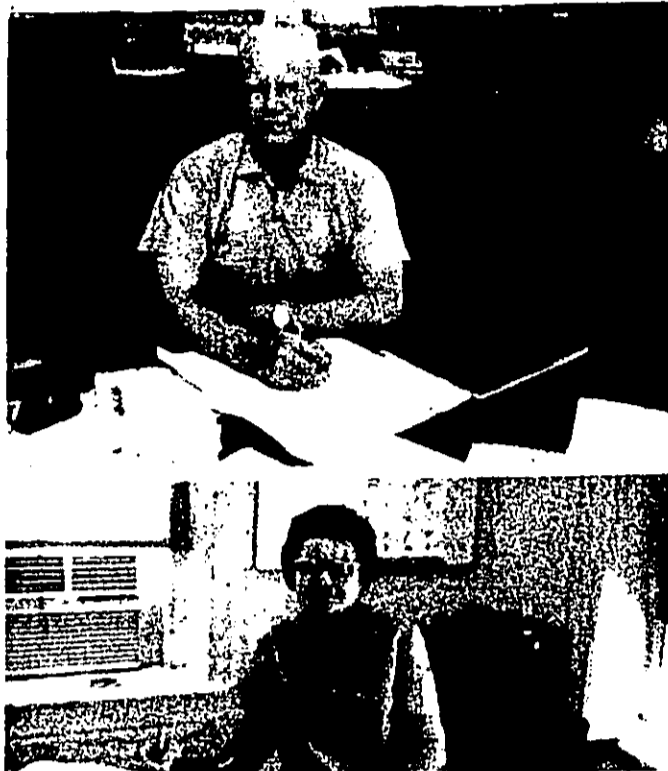

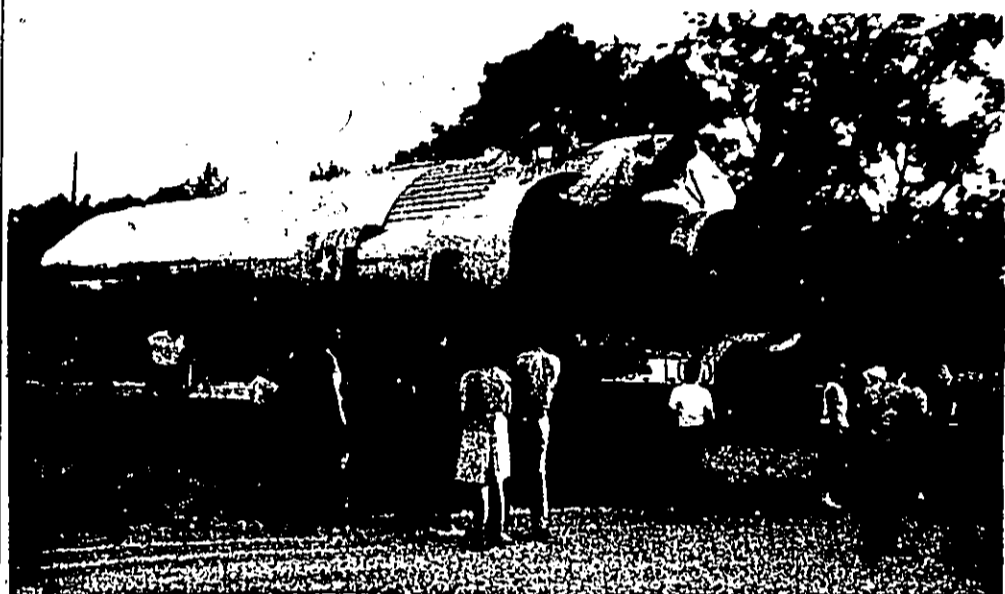
The commissioners also authorized Tax Assessor-Collector

charge of moving the missile, said that his children who live with him near Cape Kennedy in Florida, have never seen one at close range.

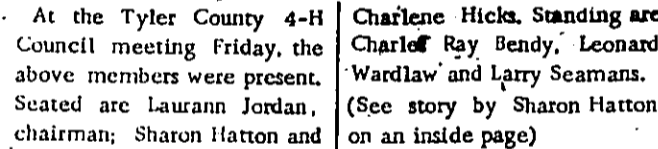

### WHEN RAYBURN IS COMPLETED

## Dam B Level To Be Lower

The Corps of Engineers plans to reduce the water level of the Dam B Reservoir two feet when Rayburn Dam is completed.

This will put a big crimp in the recreational value of the reservoir, since a drop of two feet in the water level isolates the boat launching ramps, makes skiing a hazard and swimming undesirable in most places.

Since the lake was completed, the water level has been kept at about 83 feet because the water was needed for downstream use in industry and rice-growing. But when Rayburn is completed, a high reservoir of water will be available and the reservoir at Dam B can be

dropped back to its planned depth of 81 feet.

The plans for Dam B, McGee Bend and the Rockland Dam were first drawn by the Corps as flood control projects. Thus the levels in each reservoir were set with that result in mind. Recreational use of Dam B came later and was not a planned feature.

The 81-foot level of the original plans still hold when Rayburn is completed and a ready supply of water for downstream use is available. This two-foot drop in Dam B will make it less desirable for boating, skiing and camping. Two feet less in the water level will make it almost impossible to get to many of the popular fishing lakes which jut out of the reservoir at 83 feet.

Unless the Corps can change its specifications for the reservoir, it can lose many of its most ardent sking and swimming visitors who flock there by the thousands each week when the reservoir is at full level. Visitors now have come to recognize full level as 83 feet because the Corps has kept the water at the level during most of the time the lake has been in existence.

## Newspaper Gives Insight To Tyler County In 1913

What was life like in Tyler County a half century ago?

A copy of the Tyler County Messenger dated May 2, 1913, shows that it wasn't too different in some ways but quite a contrast in others.

Published by S. E. Baker, the 51-year-old newspaper reported that the heavy rains had dumped more water on the county than at any time in 40 years. Bridges on Beech Creek, Hickory Creek and Theuvenin Creek were "demolished".

The paper reported that Dr. J. H. Sheffield came near losing his life the previous Thursday. He was at Ed Nolen's in the Fred area Wednesday, and started home in the rain which became so hard he stayed that night at Lloyd Reid's. He went to the creek the next morning but was unable to cross. Lloyd and John Baker went with him to the Tram bridge, where he tried to swim to the trestle so he could walk to the other side. He became numb in the cold water and could not swim to the trestle, but got hold of a sapling and managed to get to the trestle where he remained for several hours until some parties reached him in a boat. They started for land but the boat overturned. Dr. Sheffield managed to catch a log and reach land safely.

Familiar names pop up in the personal columns. Visitors to Woodville the previous week were L. M. Feagin of Colmesneil, S. E. Collier, Jr. and folks, J. F. Wooley of Warren, W. C.

Bostick of Doucette, and Mrs. Mercier Swearingen, her sister and Mrs. Wiggins of Honey Island who visited the C. W. Swearingen family and attended the graduation exercises at Tyler County High School.

At the graduation exercises at Tyler County High School Monday night, the 1912-1913 term was brought to a successful close with the graduation of Neil Gelsendorf, Miss Nanette Crow, Miss Charley Young and Joe C. Feagin. All were present for the exercises except Joe Feagin, who was called home by telegram before the exercises. He lived at Chester. Thirteen undergraduates received promotion certificates. Hon. V. A. Collins of Beaumont was speaker at the graduation ceremonies. Teachers mentioned were Prof. Brown and Miss Anna Wickline.

Advertising in the 51-year-old paper listed the Guaranty State Bank in Colmesneil, Minter's Drug Store, Tyler County Bank and J. Dallas Collier and Son, watchmakers and jewelers. Professional cards listed J. B. Cruse, M.D., L. M. Wheat, registered pharmacist, Dr. R. E. Dicken, Dr. W. H. Pope and Harper and Shivers, attorneys at law.

H. C. Keith of Trinity was advertising his place south of court house in Woodville. Good 5 room house, smoke house, cow lot and good well of water, one acre of land fenced including garden, for \$300. There was correspondence

from towns in the country. From Fort Lindsay, the correspondent reported that Miss Ollie Risinger spent Saturday and Sunday with home folks. J. L. Gardner made a business trip to Woodville and Warren. Miss Nellie Gardner of Warren visited Miss Edith Gardner. In the Smith Ferry news, it was reported that J. T. Rawls and son Robert had just returned from Beaumont and reported that Beaumont was on the boom. Also at Smith Ferry, a big Sunday School rally had been held at Mt. Carmel church. Speakers included Brother Tom Willie Minyard of Beech Grove. Also a present was presented to the Mt. Carmel Sunday School superintendent, G. W. Holton, who was 61 on the day of the rally.

From Fred, the correspondent wrote that Rev. J. G. Ratcliff filed his regular appointment. The correspondent also reported that much damage to roads had been done by the recent rains, bridge on Beech Creek washed out, and the water highest in 40 years. Mail delayed several days. Other bridges washed out were on Hickory, Theuvenin and Drake's creeks.

County Agent's Column

by CLINTON CURRIE

It is once again time for the RAT CONTROL CAMPAIGN in Tyler County. Rats are one of the most destructive and dangerous pests to have around a farm or ranch. They contaminate stored grain and expose food and feed, they kill poultry and young livestock, and they start fires. Diseases such as leptospirosis, contagious abortion, trichinosis, distemper, atrophic rhinitis, plague, typhus, salmonella, food poisoning and rat-bite fever are carried from place to place by these pests.

The rat population on your place can be controlled, however, if you will put forth a little time and effort. An extensive sanitation program, coupled with the use of anticoagulant baits, will effectively control the rat population. Once the rats have been eliminated, a small number of permanent bait stations and continued sanitation will help prevent reinfestation.

As long as there are rats in the area, however, your farm or ranch is in constant danger of becoming infested.

A county wide rat campaign is being conducted by the Extension Service. Orders must be turned in at one of the following stations listed below by August 28, 1964. The orders will be 3 pounds for \$1.00.

A rat must eat this bait 3-5 days before it will kill the rat. The bait is not harmful to pets. The stations for turning your order in are: Hutto's Grocery, Warren; Fred Grocery, Fred; J. W. Foxworth, Grocery, Hillister; Spurger Mercantile Co., Spurger; Dean's General Merchandise, Colmesneil; H. W. Lewis Grocery, Chester; Townsend Grocery, Doucette; Farmers Feed and Supply Co., Woodville; C. A. Williams Sporting Goods, Dam B.

You can pick up your rat bait at the stations where orders were turned in, during the first two weeks of September.

We would like to urge everyone in the county to participate in the rat control campaign, and help control the rats in Tyler County. Turn orders in by August 28, 1964.

We have held the Rat Control Campaign each year in Tyler County since 1956. Today there are very few rats, due to the united effort of the people of the county. We would like to say thanks to the business people who help carry on the campaign.

The first annual Hay Show to be held in Tyler County is scheduled for September 8, at 7:00 p. m. The place for the show is the Citizens State Bank property (previously occupied by Stryker Drug), in downtown Woodville.

Albert Novosad and Wayne Taylor, pasture and economic specialists from Texas A&M University, and Dr. J. L. Sullivan from SFA State College will be the judges for the hay show.

The Tyler County Hay Show is sponsored by the Beef Cattle and Pasture Sub-Committee of the Tyler County Program Building Committee. Members of the committee are: Elton Spurlock-Chairman, Lou Cruse, Bill Mahan, Willis Read, Joe Glasscock, Herbert Caraway, Roy Clarmon and O. L. Marsh.

The purpose of the Tyler County Hay Show is to provide educational information on forage quality for producers and buyers. The following rules and regulations shall apply with no intended discrimination against any individual or group.

Any hay producer or buyer who has hay in his possession at the time of the show may exhibit hay which he owns.

Any individual may exhibit only one sample per class, but he may have entries in as many different classes as he chooses. An entry will consist of one

bale of hay. Each entry, in the officially established classes, will be awarded a blue, a red, or a white ribbon, if it is scored 60 points or better by the judges. Entries scored below 60 points will receive no ribbon.

An entry will be disqualified when it contains more than a trace of injurious foreign material. This includes injurious plants such as bullnettle, briar, headed sandbush, mature Texas wintergrass or Aristida species (needlegrass) with needles attached, and poisonous plants. Presence of hardware, such as nails, wire, and other matter, which is injurious when fed to livestock will disqualify an entry.

An entry will be disqualified when it has any objectionable odor; or when it is undercured, heating, hot, wet, musty, moldy, caked, badly shattered or broken, badly weathered, badly frosted or very dusty.

All entries must be registered and in place for judging not later than August 22, at 2:00 p. m.

All entries must have a protein count run on the hay. It costs \$2.00 to have a protein count run on a hay sample. The hay sample can be taken at the time of entry in the show, August 22.

Ribbons will be awarded on classification basis. In classification each entry is judged against the ideal for its particular class, rather than against other entries.

The committee would like to urge everyone having hay, to place an entry in the Tyler County Hay Show.

The dead line for entry is August 22, at 2:00 p. m.

Any questions pertaining to the hay show will be answered by the Beef Cattle and Pasture Sub-Committee. Office personnel, Soil Conservation Service personnel, or County Agricultural Agent.

PRE-SCHOOL WILL BEGIN AUGUST 17

A pre-school clinic for First Grade pupils of the Woodville Elementary School will begin Monday, August 17, and will end August 21. The clinic will be conducted each morning from 8:30 to 11:00, according to J. W. Shields, principal. First Grade teachers and the home-making department of Kirby High School will conduct the pre-school clinic.

Each first grade pupil must present a birth certificate at the time of registration. Children born on or before September 1, 1958 are eligible to register in the first grade. Each first grade pupil will also be required to present medical certificates showing vaccination for small pox, polio, and the D. R. T. series of injections.

RETIREMENT CLAIMS DUE THIS MONTH

One hundred East Texans will stop or reduce work and apply for social security benefits during August, according to L. R. James, social security District Manager at Lufkin. James explained that the average rate for new retirement claims in the Lufkin office is about 25 per week, so that approximately 100 applications are expected this month.

If you are one of these 100, or if you are planning to retire a little later, the District Manager has a word of advice for you--inquire ahead of time. Claims may be filed as much as three months before payments are due, he said, which gives time to work up the proofs needed to support your claim.

You will need proof of age for yourself and for any dependents who are eligible for benefits. While a birth certificate or baptismal certificate made at

"Do not delay filing, however, if you do not have some of these papers available," James said. "We can help you locate other proofs. The important point is to inquire before you retire." One final bit of advice--bring your social security card with you!

East Texas' oldest inhabitants are slowly vanishing from the forests they once dominated.

These are the giant virgin pine trees left standing by timber cutters after the forests were cut almost bare during the 1920s.

Victimized by age and disease, only a few stands of the old monarchs remain today.

Some of the most accessible are in a roadside park between Memphis and Bronson, in Sabine County, on the campus of Stephen F. Austin State College, at Nacogdoches; on the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation, west of Woodville; and in a plot known as "Langston Woods" on Farm Road 95, northwest of Garrison.

Some of the old pines are believed to be centuries old. They were young when the first settlers came to Texas.

It's no joke. Mrs. Layfield has been making the jelly for years and swears by its taste.

Her recipe:

Ingredients: One dozen average-size red corn cobs. Four pints of water. One box (one and a fourth ounces) of powdered pectin or Sure-Jel. Three

cups sugar. Wash cobs, break into pieces four inches long, and place into a large pot with the water. Boil, cover, and reduce heat to minimum. Let boil about 40 minutes.

Strain juice through thin cloth. Place three cups of juice in large pot. Stir in pectin or Sure-Jel and bring to boil. Add sugar and stir until dissolved. Bring to rolling boil for five minutes. Remove from flame, and pour into hot jelly glasses.

**MANN IN TYLER COUNTY DATE BACK TO MEXICAN WAR**

(With the passing of John Mann last week, this brief account of the family history will be of interest.)

According to family tradition, the first of the Mann family to make his appearance in Tyler County was Levi Mann, son of Rafe (Ralph) and Eleanor Baker Mann of Fort Lauderdale, Miss. He had a severe lung condition and hoped the rugged life to be found in Texas would restore his health. He joined the Bowie brothers, James and Reinzl, and traveled to San Antonio where they engaged in several skirmishes against the Mexicans and Indians in that vicinity.

One day, while on a visit to the old San Saba silver mines, Levi, the Bowie boys and other adventurers who had joined them, suddenly found themselves attacked by a large group of Indians. Fierce fighting continued all day until the Indians, with eighty-two men dead on the

ground, ran away, howling and shrieking like wild animals. The battle was too strenuous for poor Levi so he began his return to Mississippi. In traveling down the old Nacogdoches and Liberty road, he was found by another traveler on the road west of Fort Teran near Billums Creek, unable to continue his journey. Sam Belt, the ferryman at Fort Teran, upon learning of Levi's plight, sent a wagon and team to bring him to the Belt home where he was cared for until he could resume his journey.

Levi's brother, William, was said to have been in mercantile business in Mississippi when his partner stole the company profits and made good his escape. William came to Texas in an effort to find the thief, going first to Peach Tree Village where he spent some time with the Indians of this village. After exploring what later became Tyler County, he returned to Mississippi and brought his family to Wolf Creek in 1838. After making two crops here, he moved to Billums Creek in 1841 where he built a large two-story house on a high hill beside the old road leading to Fort Teran. This old home was the center of Community life for many years. Here a large family of children grew up, small carriers on two routes stopped at Billums Creek Post Office, which was in one corner of the house. Sam Houston spent the night and was said to have sat up all night discussing the affairs of the state, and deserters from the Confederate army were permitted to escape by the guards, the Mann boys who were too young to serve in the army. These stories and others concerning the old home and William Mann and his large family are still often recalled and discussed by his descendants and the lovers of history in this vicinity.

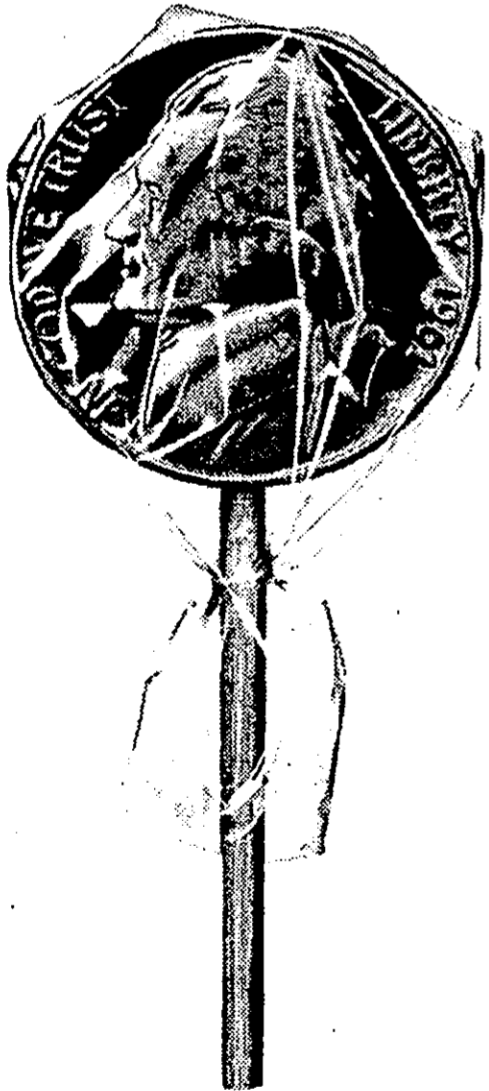
