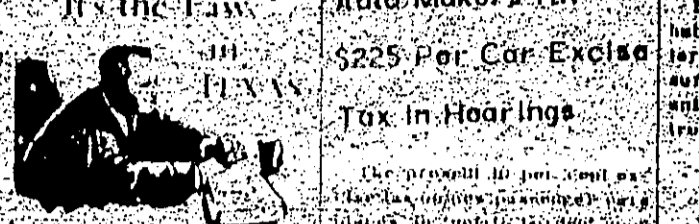

But now that the half-century-old Steamboat Uncle's train has rounded the 50th anniversary for the town's school children from a ledge on the second floor of an elementary school last year, when the school was razed and a brand-new building completed, the old train was donated to a pediatric hospital as part of a monument to the town's school children. The train, which is now in the hands of the hospital, is a fine example of the town's history. The train was built in 1914 and has been in the hands of the hospital since 1964.



U.S. Army helicopters aiding government forces in the Viet Nam jungle conflict are also armed with new advanced machine guns for defense against Communist ground fire. Editor, Pineywoods Press:

On July 29, a school bus belonging to Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church, Vidor, driven by me, carrying forty-seven children and three adults besides myself, turned over in front of the Texaco Truck Center, 2.3 miles south of your town of Woodville.

The accident ended happily without anybody badly hurt. Two girls had broken collar bones, another girl a ruptured spleen, one of the chaperones a bad bruise on the back, and myself a broken arm and broken hand; we are all doing very well but this list could have been worse and even gone up the category of a tragedy had it not been for the wonderful people of your community that helped us and took care of us.

I wish I could mention the names of all those involved in the rescue and care of all us; but since I was taken to the hospital minutes after being taken out of the bus it was impossible for me to find out those names. That is why I am writing this letter. I want to publicly thank all those that in any way helped us. The people at the Texaco Truck Center who helped all of us to come out of the bus and tried to calm down the children. The officers from the Sheriff's Department, the Highway Patrolmen, especially Patrolman J. L. Willmon, the owners of all the vehicles who transported all fifty-one passengers to the Tyler County Hospital, the Baptist Minister who visited us at the hospital,

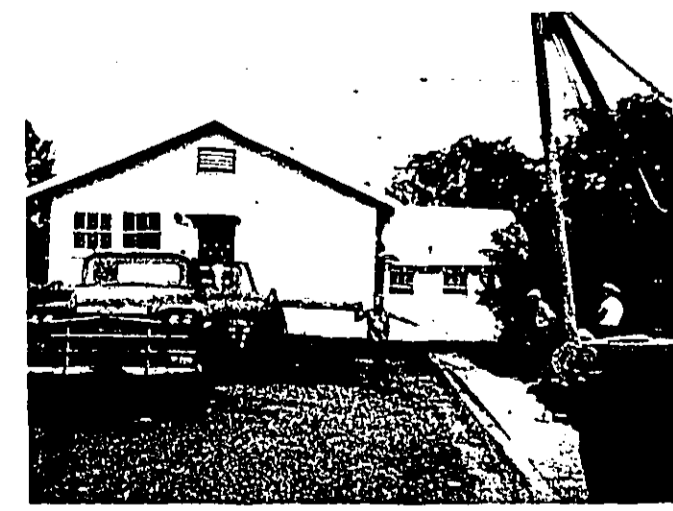

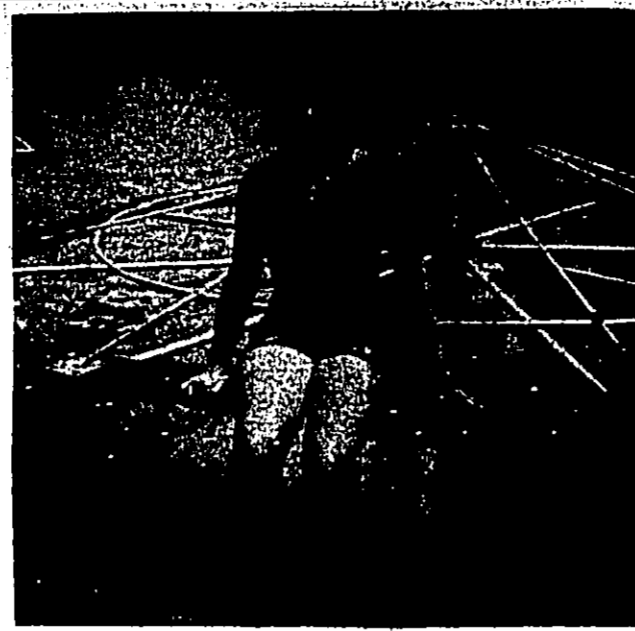

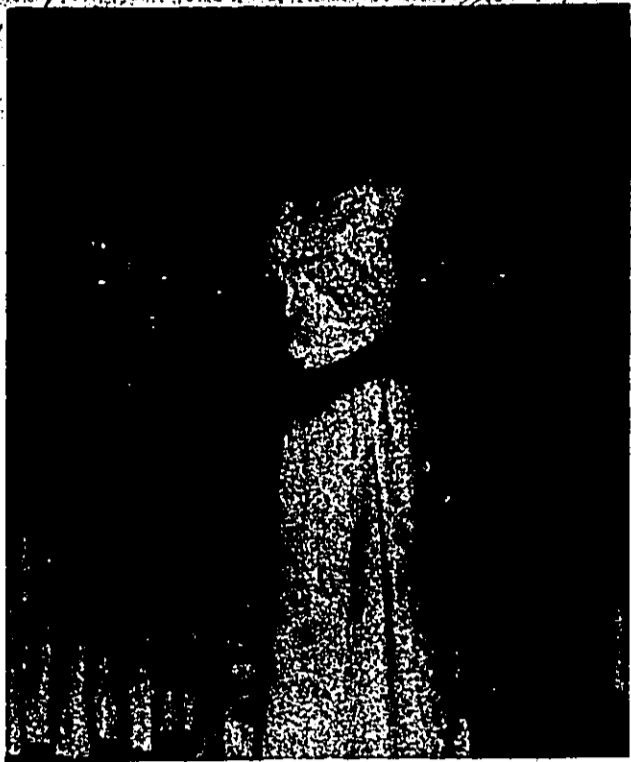

"BE COURAGEOUS"
by Barbara Pickett

Joshua 1:9

"Have I not commanded you? Be strong and of good courage; be not frightened neither be dismayed; as I was with Moses, so I will be with you. I will not fail you or forsake you."

For several days I have been thinking deeply on the word, "courage". I looked up the definition in Webster. I read many verses of scripture pertaining to it. I have thought of many people who were faced with problems that loomed great in their lives; they "screwed up courage" with God's help and went forward to solve the problems and solve them they did. People have faced death without flinching. Read again that noble and enduring story of Joan D'Arc. Such a young girl, so tremulous when alone, but when faced with the task of saving her beloved France, so full of courage and valor that the bravest soldiers were amazed. How did she face death? With strength and hope and the quietness that immense courage gives.

We could travel the annals of history both sacred and secular and find magnificent examples of courage. Noah, Abraham, Moses, Joshua, Samuel, David, Elijah, Jeremiah and our modern day Billy Graham and so on. Julius Caesar, Alexander, Octavian, Columbus, Washington, Napoleon, Lincoln, Kennedy, Coldwater and again we could go on and on. Each man had and has courage to meet his crisis, his problem, the criticism and the failures and successes of his life.

How can an ordinary man and woman find courage when they need it? Where does one find it? It is an intangible substance? Or can we really see courage and its effects and results?

Courage is a firmness of spirit. A firmness of mind. A firmness of disposition. With it we cast aside fear, danger, stress, and strain. We are able to hold our own against adversity. Courage involves persistence and an unwillingness to recognize or acknowledge defeat.

Christians cannot be defeated no matter what the test if they realize courage comes from God our Creator, God our Redeemer, God our Saviour, God our constant companion, God gave Christ to the sinful world to take away fear. Christ is the supreme example of courage.

In his first Epistle, John, the beloved disciple wrote, "Perfect love casts our fear." This is the fact many of us forget. We become so involved with ourselves we leave Christ out of the picture entirely. We do not really wish to leave him out but we want him in our lives only on our terms. There cannot be perfect love when we are dictating terms to our Lord. We will be afraid of everything if we do not learn to love perfectly. How are we to do this impossible sounding thing? With Christ Jesus' help. There is no other way. Our firmness of spirit comes from him. Not from any other source.

Of course Alexander the Great and thousands of other valiant men had never heard of Jesus because Jesus had not these men of mighty and brave deeds often led lives filled with dissolute ways and many of them ended their lives in degradation and deep sin. If they had recognized God as being their supplier of courage, strength and bravery, they would have truly been wonderful examples for us.

The men of valor and humility such as Joshua and St. Paul found the key to their lives knowing they would forever be with the source of life. We, in searching for courage, look all to often with ourselves. We will be disillusioned. We look to a friend, we will be disappointed. We look to

secular examples such as I have discussed already. They fall us. We turn here, we turn there, but it is not until we turn to the only source and giver of courage that we find it. Then it is no longer intangible. It is reality and we find ourselves eager and ready to overcome the ills and troubles; the strife, the anger, the tasks which tower so high, the difficulties which threaten to engulf us, the problems which seem to over shadow us.

The words of a grand old hymn express what I try to say far more eloquently than I ever could.

"Sometimes the shadows are deep.

And rough seems the path to the goal.

And sorrows, sometimes how they sweep

Like tempests down over the soul!

O sometimes how long seems the day.

And sometimes how weary my feet.

But toiling in life's dusty way.

The Rock's blessed shadow, how sweet!

Courage that comes from God is courage that will not fail us when the battle is at its height. It will not fail us no matter how steep the road becomes. It will not fail us because God will not fail us. Remember, when your own stamina is low, God's is overflowing. "Ask and you shall receive."

The landing of the pilgrim fathers took courage. Courage against the mighty sea. Against the storms that so suddenly sprang upon them. Against their self made exile from their native land. But their song did not cease to sound over the noisy noise of the sea. It did not dim during the fierce winds. It sounded ever clearer and louder when they landed on the unknown shore of New England. They sought freedom and freedom could only be found with courage. God's gift to them.

Be strong! God said this to Joshua. He says it to you and me. Be strong and of good courage!

Life is not a play with all of us acting out our parts. Life is not a stream with all of us drifting aimlessly along with the current whether strong or weak. Life is not a dream with all of us vaguely stirring now and then.

No! We have hard toil, much strain. We must remember others with their burdens. We must face life's struggle gladly and if we falter along the way, remember we must seek God's gift of courage. Of strength.

"Stand up, stand up for Jesus you soldiers of the cross." James Russell Lowell expressed it this way in his poem "Slaves"

"They are slaves who fear to speak

For the fallen and the weak

They are slaves who will not choose

Hatred, scoffing and abuse;

Rather than in silence shrink.

From the truth they needs must think

They are slaves who dare not be.

In the right with two or three.

I have not said this is an easy task. It is not! It is exceedingly difficult to gather the courage one needs at certain times but it is possible with our Lord's help. Nothing will overtake us when he is by our side.

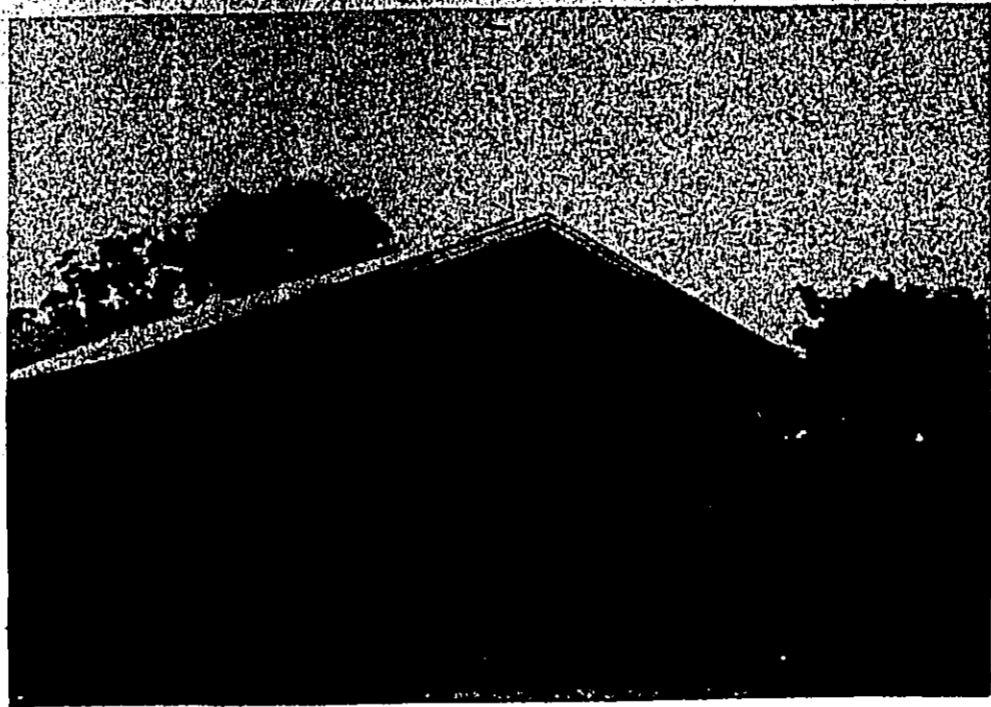
