Southland Paper Sales: how paper gets to customers

When a roll of paper is finished at Southland, it is wrapped with heavy protective paper and loaded into box cars for shipment to customers. All shipments are made in sealed lots. When Southland started operating in 1940, the company was a new and independent business. It had no affiliation with other paper mills and needed some form of access to paper buyers. Instead of developing a sales force of its own, Southland chose to employ an established sales agency. The Perkins-Goodwin Company was selected. This was a logical choice. It had ready access to the paper markets through its New York headquarters and several branch offices. Moreover, it was one of the principal founders of Southland. Under the able supervision of its sales and service personnel, Perkins-Goodwin represents Southland in establishing contact with paper buyers. Orders for paper are forwarded to Southland. Most of Southland's newspaper is sold to newspaper publishers in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico. All of Southland's brown kraft paper is sold for the company, which in turn uses it as raw material for such things as paper sacks and industrial papers.

Construction of a coin-operated automatic car wash the first of its kind in Woodville, will begin soon at 1407 West Bluff Street (Highway 190) by A. L. Grammer, who also operated Grammer's Grocery in the same block.

Shillings Suit Against Bank Settled

The suit of Joe B. Shillings against the Citizens State Bank, Robert Allen Mann and Emory Mahan was settled Tuesday when Shillings dropped his suit for libel and slander and reduced his demand to a claim for bank accounts held to his credit in the Citizens State Bank and for retirement benefits which accrued to his credit while an employee of the bank.

The case, which was set for Monday, was first continued until 1:00 p. m. and later until 9 a. m. Tuesday while lawyers

for the parties involved prepared the necessary documents for the change in the suit.

Following the change in the suit, District Judge H. A. Coe determined that Shillings was entitled to the sum of \$7,425.03, which represented his bank accounts plus interest, and the sum of \$4,574.97 which represented his retirement benefits.

In the new suit, Shillings eliminated Mann and Mahan from the suit, leaving only his claim against the bank for his bank accounts and retirement benefits. The case was submitted to Judge Coe for his determination without a jury.

Accordingly, plaintiff now moves the court that his alleged cause of action for slander, libel and defamation be in all things dismissed and that, accordingly, Robert Allen Mann and Emory Mahan be removed from this suit as parties thereto."

SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTION AND ANS.

Q. I am ready to apply for social security benefits. My wife is still too young to receive hers and she is working and earning \$3600 a year. Do her earnings affect my benefits?
A. No. Only your own earnings can affect your benefits. You may earn up to \$1200 yearly and still receive all of your social security checks.
Q. I am completely retired and receive social security. I also get a V. A. pension, and interest from my savings in the bank. Do my V. A. payments and interest income count as earnings?
A. No. Your V. A. pension and interest income from savings do not count as earnings in figuring your total yearly earnings to determine whether social security benefits can be paid. You count wages you earn from work as an employee and any earnings from self-employment. For specific information about what is considered wages and self-employment earnings, get in touch with your social security office.
Q. My wife and I both receive social security benefits on my account. She doesn't work but I do. I understand that each of us is entitled to earn up to \$1200 a year and still get all our social security benefits. Since she doesn't work, does that mean that I can take the \$1200 she is allowed to earn and add it to mine so that I can earn \$2400 a year and still get all our benefits?
A. No. Each beneficiary can earn up to \$1200 a year while receiving social security benefits but the \$1200 allowance cannot be combined.
Q. I receive social security benefits. I work for a church and the wages of employees there are not covered by social security. Since these wages are not covered, do I have to count them as earnings in figuring whether I earn more than \$1200 this year?
A. Yes, all wages and income from self-employment must be counted even when the work is not covered. Get in touch with your social security office if you have any questions about how your work affects your benefits.
Q. What should I do if I go to work and expect to earn over \$1200 this year? I am receiving old-age benefits under social security. My wife and my children also receive benefits. What happens if they go to work?
A. You should report this information to your social security office either in person or on the card (Form OA-C669), which was given to you when you applied for social security benefits. Be sure to give the name of the person about whom the report is made and his social security claim number.

TOURING EAST TEXAS

by BOB BOWMAN

T. O. Milner of Poynor, in Henderson County, dipped into the past to come up with an idea for a successful business. He operates a water-powered grist mill on U. S. Hwy. 175 that turns out old-fashioned stone-ground meal, whole wheat flour and grits. The little mill was opened in December of 1961 and powered then by a tractor. Milner later dammed up a stream by his cabin and harnessed the waters to drive the mill, as well as a small printing press on which he prints combread recipes. He grinds about 100 pounds of corn daily--and still as difficulties meeting the demands of tourists, who can buy a five-pound bag of meal for \$1. Milner estimates he has sold to residents of every state and a few foreign countries. He has implicit faith in the honesty of his customers. A large, hand-lettered sign advises them to place their money on his scales "or make your own change" if he isn't on the premises. An impressive relic from East Texas' colorful logging past stands on the campus of Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches. It is a rare high-wheel slip-tongues logging cart--probably one of the last of its type left in Texas. The cart, with wheels measuring more than eight feet high, was donated to the Texas Forestry Assn. a few years ago by W. T. Carter and Bro. Lumber Co. of Camden. Hitched to four mules, it once was used to haul logs from the piney woods. In recent years, its job has been turned over to tractors and other mechanized mules.

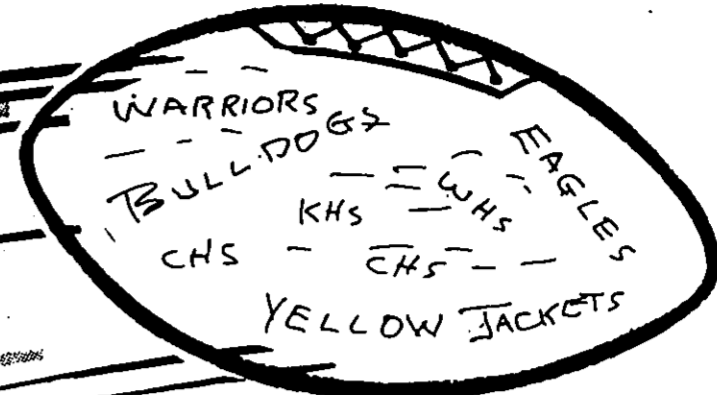

The sin, despair, unhappiness; the careless ways of life that millions of people were busy pursuing.

The young woman turned to the angel and asked him "Why do people live in such a manner?" The angel answered her "Because there is no one to tell them about Jesus." Oh, the remorse and regret she felt!

She begged to be allowed to return to earth and tell the story of Jesus. Her plea was granted and in her dream she returned to earth and immediately began witnessing for Christ.

When a young man named Nehemiah returned to Jerusalem from Babylonian captivity, he found the walls crumbled and almost destroyed in places. He set about the task of rebuilding these walls but the people were not willing to work because the task was too great. They complained about the rubbish and the lack of strength. The task was difficult but with God's help and strength, Nehemiah was able to lead most of the people out of their discouragement. And the walls of Jerusalem were rebuilt.

We fail in our lives so often because we think the job too hard—the journey too long, the burdens too heavy. Of course we must meet and overcome the difficult tasks. To quote someone "Life is not a bed of roses," but even if it was, wouldn't there be a few thorns among the petals? We must work and strive to build and rebuild throughout our entire life.

Fear is another very apparent reason we become discouraged. We are afraid of failing. We are afraid we will get hurt both physically and emotionally. We are afraid someone will laugh at our attempts, our ambitions, our desires. We are afraid we will have to spend too much money. We are afraid too much will be expected of us. We are

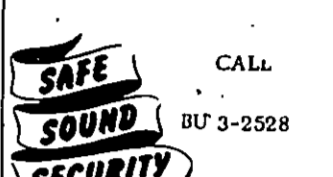
