## Open House At Heritage Garden Sun.

Have you ever eaten at the Robert Tolar's in Tyler County? If so, you are extended a special invitation to attend ceremonies Sunday, September 27, when the original three-room dwelling, now known as the Tolar Kitchen, will be recognized by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee as "worthy of preservation for its architectural, cultural and historical significance to the community."

The Society's medallion and plaque will be formally presented at 3 p. m. at Heritage Garden, 1 mile west of Woodville on Highway 190, where the Tolar Kitchen is now "at home."

Associate Justice Clyde E. Smith of Texas' Supreme Court will be the main speaker. The Rev. Wayne Odum, pastor of the Woodville Methodist church, will pronounce the dedication and Frank Robinson, head of the Woodville Chamber of Commerce, will serve as master of ceremonies.

"Black-eyed peas and cornbread will be served from the fireplace following ceremonies. The meal for the cornbread will be stone ground right at the Heritage Garden Grist Mill. The Beaumont Coca Cola Bottling company will also be on hand with free drinks and both the Garden and Art Gallery will be open at no charge. All interested persons are invited through the press to attend.

The Kitchen is distinguished primarily as the site where countless meals have been prepared for thousands of people who are now scattered over the United States. It has been in continuous use, three meals a day, since its construction until around 1960, when the two remaining Tolar sisters who live on the home site gave up their fireplace cooking—for more modern facilities.

The three-room dwelling was constructed by Robert Jackson Tolar, who came to Texas from Mississippi. He met and married Mary Versie Durham and the building now known as the Tolar Kitchen was built by him as their home in 1866. As the family grew, more space was needed and another dwelling was constructed with the original building becoming a disconnected kitchen.

The Tolar property is located about seven miles south of Woodville on what was the original "Beaumont-Rockland road." Because of its location, it was a perfect stopping place for any traveler through East Texas. The Tolars, however, did not use their home as an inn but offered the generous hospitality of East Texas to all comers.

The two sisters who still live at the homestead are Miss Betty, the oldest of nine and in her 90's, and Miss Sarah, now in her 80's. Also living is their brother, John, who makes his home in Hillister. Neither of the sisters married and early in their lives became the chief cooks of the Tolars, taking care of their multitudinous guests.

When Heritage Garden became a reality, the Tolars offered the kitchen to the museum as a typical pioneer East Texas home. When the building was moved, the porches were carefully removed to allow for highway travel. Boards, logs and foundation blocks were numbered and were replaced in their exact original position.

## C-C Votes To Ask For 83 Ft. Level

The Woodville Chamber of Commerce unanimously passed a resolution Monday night at its September meeting asking the U. S. Corps of Engineers to maintain the water level of Dam B reservoir at 83 feet when Rayburn Dam is completed. The chamber's resolution stated that the lower water level of 81 feet will seriously diminish the size and usefulness of the reservoir and will strike a serious blow at the Tyler and Jasper County businesses which have been established in the last 10 years around the reservoir.

The chamber's resolution also stated that the 83 feet level would not interfere with the full use and development of the Anglinia-Neches watershed.

## LNVA TAKES ACTION

The board of directors of the Lower Neches Valley Authority voted at the recent meeting to call on the U. S. Corps of Engineers to re-examine and restudy the original plans to maintain Dam B Reservoir at 81 feet instead of 83 feet. They authorized the president, W. F. Weed, to confer with the Corps of Engineers regarding the proposed water level. The subject was introduced by Josiah Wheat of Woodville, member of the LNVA board.

## DETTA ON RECORD

The Deep East Texas Development Association went on record at its last regular meeting opposing the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers' proposal to lower the permanent water level in Dam B by two feet and resolved to seek help in blocking the Engineers move from U. S. Senators and Congressmen.

Petitions asking for the annexation of areas west of Highway 69 near the north city limits and on the south part of the city were presented to the city council at its meeting Monday night.
