## County Highways Due \$13,000 For Improvements

The Texas Highway Commission has approved expenditure of \$13,000 for highway safety and betterment in Tyler County during 1965, according to District Engineer W. E. Shinnaker of Beaumont.

He said a total of 629 highway miles in the county will be involved. Work will be under the supervision of A. J. Carter, Jr., District Engineer at Woodville. Commissioners okayed 432 projects in 1964 Texas county highway safety and betterment program.

The Texas Highway Department, carrying \$10,930,400 for construction and \$20,000 for right-of-way under the annual program.

The district said that in addition to its benefits to safety on the 66,000-mile Texas highway network, the 1965 safety and betterment program will perpetuate and protect the taxpayer's investment of well over \$4 billion in the highway system.

Improvements such as surface widening, bridge widening and replacement, base strengthening, seal coating, resurfacing, and building of shoulders will be made by the Texas Highway Department under the program, Petty said.

District Engineer Shinnaker said a total of 82.6 miles in this highway district would be involved under the safety and betterment program. He placed total cost for the district at \$660,000.

The following improvements projects will take place in Tyler County: U.S. 69, from North City limits of Woodville, South to U.S. 190; 6.8 miles of additional surface at \$18,000.

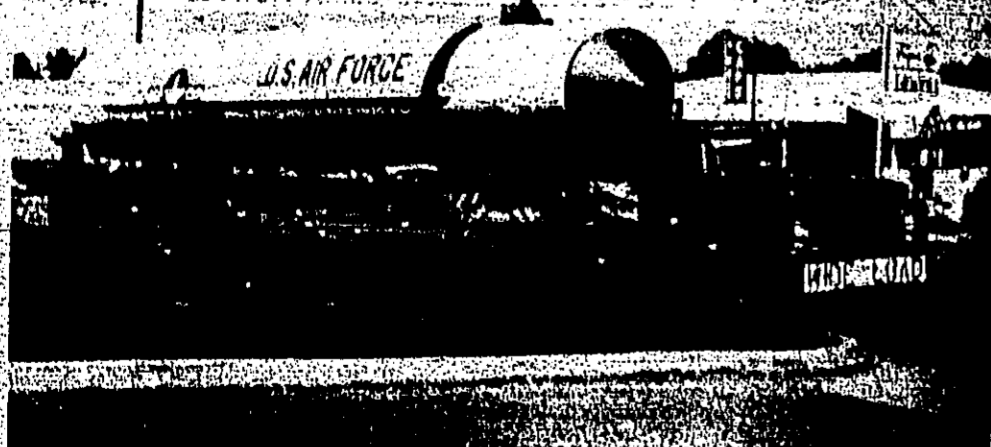

It weighs 110,000 pounds when loaded. The sergeant remarked that the World Series baseball game being televised that day was being beamed over news via a syncom satellite launched by such a missile which also orbited the Teletar and Thor satellites.

### Funeral Services For Jessie Rhodes Are Held Wednesday

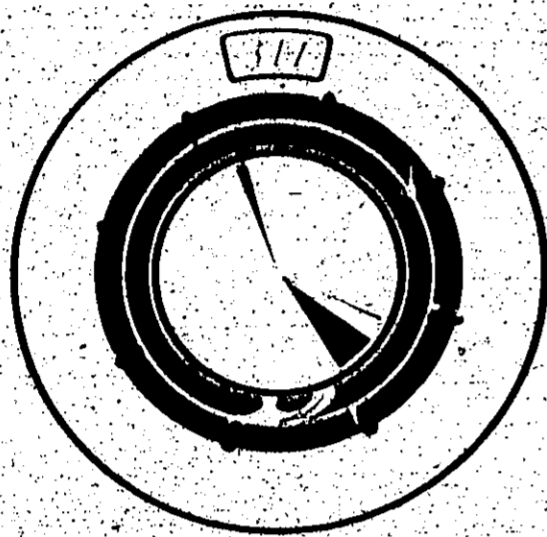
