## Eagles Draw Week Of Rest, Lose See-Saw Contest 38-27

The Kirby High Eagles are taking a week off from the football game this Friday, to spend their time and to prepare for the Houston next week of Little-Cyprus.

The Eagles dropped a heart breaker last week by Port Aransas in a 38-27 decision in Port Aransas but the game falls far short of telling the story of the game.

Plagued by poor officiating all season, the Eagles drew more than their fair share of it Friday.

It was a wild woolly affair in which the lead changed hands more rapidly than the football a total of six times in all, as the Kirby Eagles, suddenly came from behind to win after this in a domed attempt to keep their district record spotless.

But fate and other causes, decided otherwise.

Port Aransas got on the score board in a hurry when Kenneth Walker of Woodville finished the kickoff at the 20.

Walker, this one named "Doug," and perhaps the most potent running back this season, scored from the three yard line just five plays later.

But the Eagles soon proved they had come to play. Guided by Walker, the Eagles set up shop on their own 20.

An exchange of punts stifled the first quarter with Woodville knocking at the goal.

Working from the Port Aransas 19 at the quarter end, Woodville took four plays to score after a walk by George Jarrett pass completion gave the Eagles first and goal at the Port Aransas six. Walker ran over for the score and Ronnie Weeks, who has been consistently sure of foot this season, took the ball between the uprights to put Woodville (Chief, Chief) in the lead.

Bobby Boat kicked off for the locals and Port Aransas drew a five yard penalty, Boat kicked again. It was a mistake. The ball went to Doug Walker of Port Aransas. Walker went to down. He was driven toward the end zone and apparently trapped near the Port Aransas 10 field, he suddenly reversed his field, raced across field, then out to his right and dashed all the way.

But one step in Woodville was to the occasion.

Larry Malin took up for Aransas but when he in-  
tercepted a pass, however, the Eagles were forced to punt. Bobby Crain got off the kick of the night when he pointed to the hole where the ball was kicked by a Woodville lad.

This time Woodville scored first in the front and the Port Aransas punter barely managed to get a kick off and it went out at the Aransas 14. Larry Kelly moved it to the seven on two successive carries and Walker slipped over from there.

Later in the second period, Walker hit Charles Blanks for 12 yards and six points to stretch the lead to 14-14.

This score was set up on a faulty Port Aransas kick attempt which was good for a thirty four yards.

Port Aransas punted back for two third quarter downs to regain the elusive lead.

Their first score was by end Mike Blankenship on a 33 yard pass. Halfback Isabel Morrison ran over the two-point conversion.

Second score for the host team in the third period was pass from Quarterback Clifford Cahill to Doug Walker after it appeared that the big rush by Woodville defensemen had Gary Lynn trapped far behind the line of scrimmage.

The play covered 80 yards and Port Aransas now enjoyed a 20-14 lead.

This ended the third quarter. Enter the fourth and final. A wilder yet 18 minutes that saw Coach Charles McOthy of Woodville find 16 yards for a voluble protest against the referee's action.

It was sweet the referee put Woodville in the middle field and still long goalward.

## Antlerless Deer Permits Will Be Issued Here Nov. 3

Antlerless deer permits will be issued in landowners of the County on November 3 at the Tyler County Courthouse, W. F. Wright, Parks and Wildlife biologist of Dallas, said this week.

All landowners of holders of wildlife licenses within the area bounded by Hwy. 287 on the south, FM 306 and Hillshire on the east, the Parks and Wildlife Department will be eligible to receive permits. Permits will be issued on an exchange basis and landowners should be prepared to show proof of ownership. Wildlife license holders should have a copy of their license or a letter of authorization from the landowner.

Permits from the Parks and Wildlife Department have recently completed a deer census of this area. The census showed one deer for each 10 acres in the most populated areas and one deer to each 40 acres in the least populated areas.

Biologists estimate that 25 to 30 percent of these deer could be harvested each year and the population would remain stable. This harvest is possible because deer have the reproductive potential to more than double their population each year, he said.

Congressman Jack H. Brooks will visit in Woodville today in behalf of his candidacy for reelection as second district congressman.

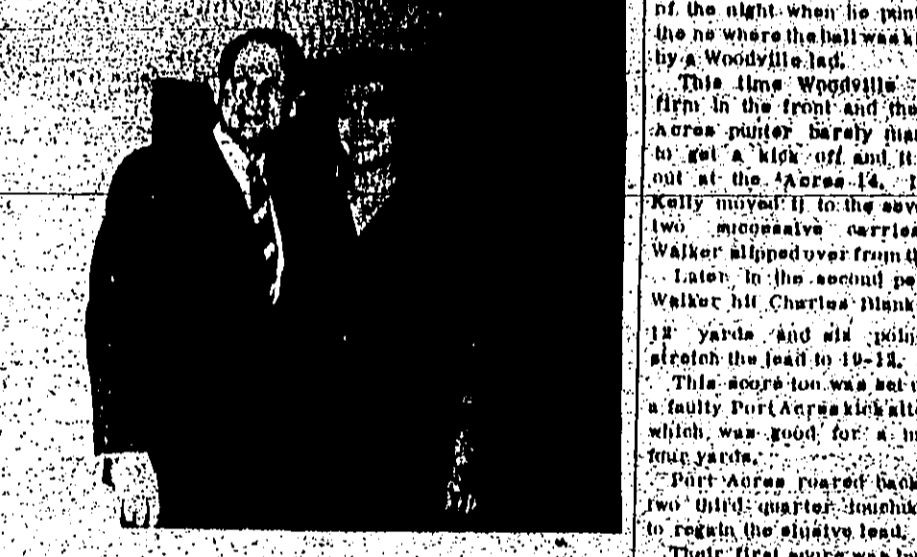

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

The Air Control manufacturing facilities at Woodville are pleased to announce that their new water system is now in service and, as a public service to the residents and businesses of this area, they also wish to announce that they are making this system available to the fire department in time of fire emergency.

This new system is completely automatic and consists of a deep four inch casing well equipped with a 5hp submersible pump discharging into a 12,000 gal. storage tank. The base of this tank contains a six inch gate valve to which is attached a brass fire plug containing two 2-1/2 inch fire hose fittings. These fittings accept the hoses of both the pumper and the tanker trucks of the Woodville fire department. The well location is on high ground less than 100 ft. off US 69 and easily accessible to the fire truck. Street lights illuminate the area at night.

The Woodville Volunteer Fire Department headed by Fire Chief A. L. Ferrell has scheduled a fire drill to familiarize all members of the volunteers with the facilities.

The additional equipment of this new water system consists of a 1000 gallon pressure tank supplied by a 5hp booster pump and a small air compressor. This maintains a pressure of 60 lbs. per square inch on the plant water supply.

Recent additions to the production facilities of Air Control's manufacturing plant at Woodville made the old water system inadequate due to its limited volume. The new system has a higher yield backed up by a 12,000 gallon reserve.

The new system is completely sealed and samples of the water have been tested by the Texas State Department of Health who issued a water analysis certificate indicating the water passes their requirements for human consumption.

The management of Air Control feels that this new system offers a better control of potential fire losses both to their heavy investment at Woodville as well as to the other property holders of the area. These things tend to establish lower insurance rates for all.

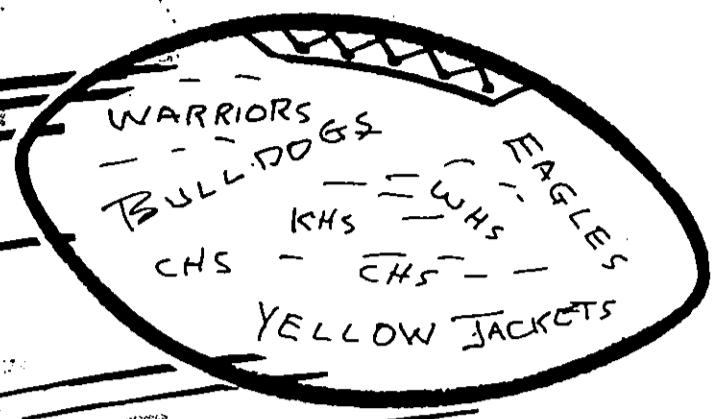

Home Demo News

GIVE WOOD FURNITURE PROPER CARE

Too much wax, oil and polish can actually dim the beauty of wood finishes, says Mrs. Wanda Meyer, Extension Service home management specialist at Texas A & M University.

Furniture manufacturers themselves point this out. The best cleaning care, according to the American Walnut Manufacturers Association, is to wash furniture with suds and water.

Wash it once or twice with a cloth wrung out of warm soap or detergent suds, then wipe all surfaces with a clean damp cloth and rub dry. All wood pieces - modern or antique - thrive on this basic cleaning, as the suds remove various types of soil which are not affected by simply applying another coat of oil, polish or wax.

When all surfaces are thoroughly clean, use any preferred type of finishing touch. Polishes or waxes applied too often tend to build up a film which reduces the beauty of the original finish. Authorities recommend that most furniture be waxed only once or twice a year.

NEED SOME HELP WITH TRICOT BONDED FABRICS?

The "pros" and "cons" of tricot bonded fabrics are of concern to many consumers today. "No lining and easier construction" are echoes of manufacturers of this fabric. Yet consumers want to know if it will serve the purpose for which they purchase it.

Some important facts are gleaned from research and observation of fabrics on the local market. The greatest majority of these fabrics are wool flannel or mohair, cotton and nylon looped knit bonded with acetate tricot. Other implications from research are:

With bonded fabrics, because of the chemicals in the bonding, some stains cannot be removed.

The acetate tricot has much poorer strength and abrasion resistance qualities than the wool, and will probably wear out much quicker than the wool flannel.

A regular woven fabric, as a lining, is used to eliminate this give and prevent sagging. The tricot, being a knit, will give and allow the wool to stretch.

Acetate is a heat-sensitive fiber and cannot be pressed at the steam setting on the iron, which is used for wool.

The backing does give more body to sheer fabrics and would be quite good on those such as knit mohair to prevent sagging. Acetate has poor color fastness and it should be observed whether change of color in this backing will effect the outward appearance of the garment. The wool will hold its color well.

Acetate could not be washed without damage, therefore, it would be a poor choice to select it bonded to a washable fabric.

The bonded fabrics are easy to handle and would be especially good for an experienced person.

There is a problem of bulkiness at corners and where seams are joined over seams. Ordinarily, an underlining could be cut out at the corners, but this is not possible with this fabric.

Difficulty arises in getting a flat seam, crisp edge, and pointing the corners, so the design of the garment should not call for this. The same situation exists with stretch.

The Texas Safety Association urges parents to think twice before leaving small children alone in the home. In case of fire, small children are usually helpless to escape without adult aid. They need your attention all the time, but especially in case of fire. Fire can and does strike, spread and kill in a matter of seconds.

The Texas Safety Association advises homeowners to use extreme caution when burning leaves. Do not set fires close to a house or other buildings. Make sure you burn leaves in an incinerator which will not let sparks fly through the air. But, before you do any burning, see if your city allows it. Many do not, but, often they do have special trucks available for hauling such trash away.

HIGHWAY 190 OFFERS SCENIC VIEW

The forest of East Texas will soon reach its fall coloration peak, according to Ernest N. Long, assistant forester for the Texas Forest Service at Woodville.

During the fall the leaves of our hardwoods change color and drop to the forest floor. Though it is commonly supposed that the frost is the cause of the color change, such is not always the case. Many leaves change color before frost.

The reasons for the color change of leaves are, in essence, a completion of an assigned job. The leaves manufacture food for the tree all during the spring and hot summer months, but with the fall season and the approach of cold weather the tree prepares to become inactive, or dormant, for the winter.

With the cessation of plant growth there is no need for the food which the leaves are preparing. The available food in the leaves is transferred to the tree. Remaining in the leaves are chemical substances which are highly refractive and sugars which were not completely removed into the tree. The refractive substances give the leaves a yellow coloring; however, the sugars combine with other substances and give a reddish color which varies from the current brilliant red of the red maples to the less flamboyantly colored oaks and dogwood.

A scenic drive to observe this beauty may be taken on highway 59 between Livingston and Corrigan and on highway 90 between Woodville and Livingston.

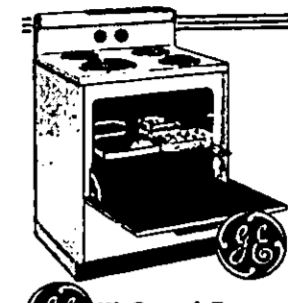
