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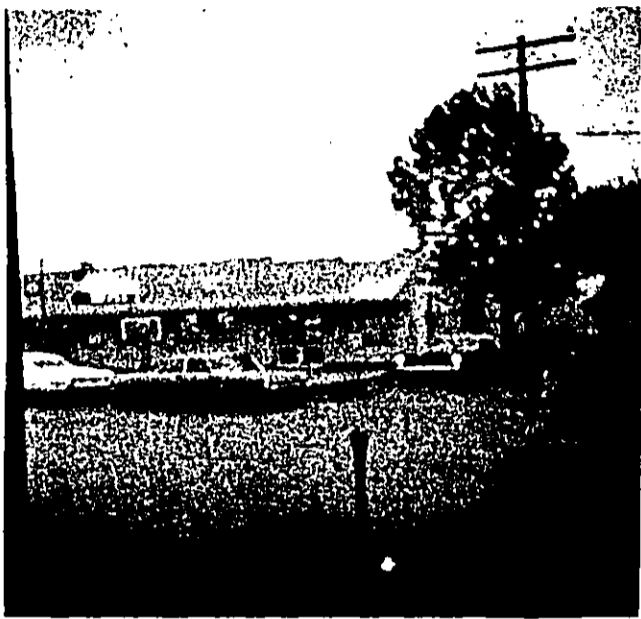

A record turnout of voters in Tyler County is expected next Tuesday when candidates from president to constable will be elected. There are no Republican candidates for county offices, as is the case in Tyler County elections, but starting with Congressman for the second district up through state offices, most positions are contested by Republicans. A probable vote of over 3000 is looked for in the general election in the county. Considerable interest has been aroused by an active Republican Party in the county, with both them and the Democrats setting up campaign headquarters here for the first time. In county races, where the Democratic nomination is tantamount to election, the general election is a token gesture to elect the Democrats nominated in the primaries. A close race in the county between the Democratic and Republican candidates for President is anticipated. Tyler County has voted Republican in the past three presidential elections. In the race for United States Senate, Republican George Bush is given a good chance of carrying the county over incumbent Senator Ralph Yarborough, who is having a tough fight over the entire state. Congressman Jack Brooks is expected to carry the county his Republican opponent, John Greco, although some feel that his margin will be small than in past years. Governor John Connally will likely carry the county easily although his vote will be smaller since some voters will vote a straight Republican ticket from president on down rather than try to split their vote. A sample ballot was printed in last week's Press.

### PTA, Students Hear Prison Inmates

Parents and teachers attended Monday night a program presented by the Texas Department of Corrections at the Woodville PTA meeting in Kirby High School auditorium. One hundred and ten adults were present to hear the personal stories of these inmates. The program was initiated by the inmates, themselves, in an attempt to repay society somewhat for their crimes by diverting other teenagers from the errors they had made. Parents heard from these men: "My father wanted to give me everything that he had never been able to have"; "I felt that no one loved me, so I didn't love anyone"; "I wanted to be a big shot and my own car helped me to be a big shot"; and from every one of them: "I began drinking." The spirit of this program is best expressed by a quotation from Luke 16:27-28 that appears on the back of their leaflet: "Father, I beseech you to send him to my father's house, for I have five brothers, so that he may give testimony and warn them, lest they too come to this place of torment." Rev. Charles Haynes, program chairman of the PTA, introduced the program director, Fred Pardue, who remarked that the Kirby High and Wheat Junior High School students had been very attentive when the program had been presented to them earlier in the day. The business portion of the meeting included a brief talk on citizenship by Clyde Cook, the adoption of the PTA budget for 1964-64, and a brief explanation of amendment No. 1 that appears on the Nov. 3 ballot, by Supt. E. H. McGuire. In closing the meeting, Mrs. A. T. Philen, PTA president, expressed genuine appreciation to the panel for "Operation Teenager."

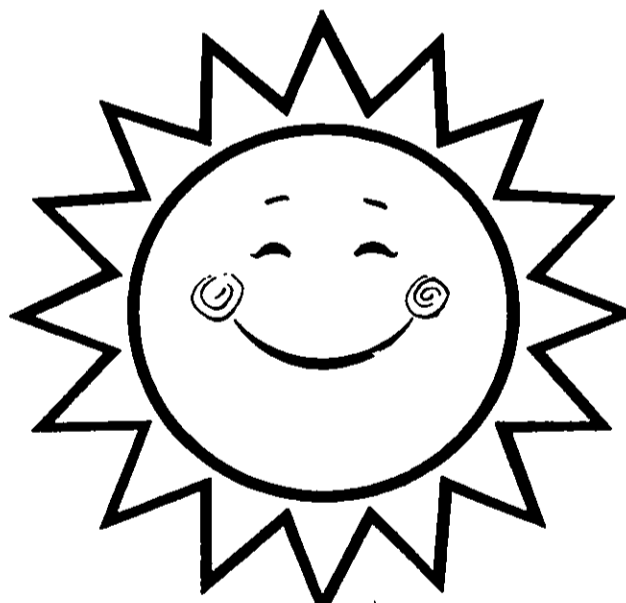

**FARM TRUCK LICENSE  
SOMETIMES ILLEGAL**

"The special farm truck license plates are for farmers and ranchers only and the vehicles which display such license plates cannot be used in connection with other gainful employment," warns R. W. Townsley, Director of the Texas Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division.

The law which allows farmers and ranchers to purchase their truck license plates for half price does permit such truck owners to make certain extra uses of the vehicles namely, to take members of the family to church or school, to visit doctors, for medical treatment or supplies and for other necessities of the home or family.

"However," Townsley continued, "that is the limit to the extra use which can be made of the vehicle bearing the farm truck plates. It definitely cannot be used by the owner to travel to and from his regular job in town."

The Division's Investigator for this District, Phil Brooks, has observed local citizens using pickup trucks registered with farm license plates for transportation to and from places of employment. He emphasized that unless these persons exchanged their license plates for regular truck plates immediately, it would be necessary to file charges against them. The procedure to make such an exchange is for the vehicle owner to take his farm license plates and the license receipt to the office of the County Tax Collector and pay the necessary fee.

Brooks stated that he expects to be working with the local enforcement officers within the next few weeks in an effort to reduce the misuse of farm truck license. Persons who are apprehended violating the Farm Truck License Law could be fined and also be required to purchase full years registration plus a 20 percent penalty.

COUNTY FARM AGENT'S NOTES

INTRODUCTION OF SOIL FERTILITY SHORT COURSE PROGRAM

According to the fertilizer report for the year ending on August 31, 1963, 3415 tons of fertilizer were used in Tyler County and shows an increase of 345.25 percent since 1959. This amount of fertilizer represents an investment of about \$256,125.00 in 1962-63. The amount used in 1963-64 was even higher. If profitable returns are to be realized from such an investment, fertilizer applications should be based on the plant food level in the soil and requirements of the crops to be planted. Your local committee felt that more information about soil fertility, fertilization and related subjects would help us make fertilizer and liming a better investment. This is the purpose of these three meetings scheduled for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights, November 3, 4, 5 at 7:00 p. m. in the Vocational Agricultural classroom in Woodville. One reason why some of you are finding that fertilization pays is related to low soil fertility levels. Most of our soils are low in organic matter and nitrogen. A summary of soil tests shows that 92 percent of the soils are low or very low in phosphorus. Fifty-one percent of the soil tests made during the period covered by this summary were low or very low in potassium. Limestone is also important on acid soils especially where legumes are to be planted. Sixty-eight percent of the soils tested had a pH below 6.5. The desirable pH range to maintain in the soil will depend on the cropping system followed.

Fertilization practices should be designed to maintain a balance among the plant foods in the soil. Liming should be considered to maintain a desirable pH range for the production of yields at a profitable level. Subjects discussed on this Short Course Program should help you better understand what practices are needed in your farming operation.

A Certificate of Completion will be presented on the third night to participants that have attended at least two of the three sessions. Handbooks containing the information discussed by the speakers will be given out the last night also. These handbooks are a valuable reference.

The Beef Cattle and Pasture Sub-Committee is sponsoring the Soil Fertility Short Course and would like to have a large attendance each night.

New Birmingham—probably East Texas' most famous ghost town—is no more, but a tattered hotel register is keeping alive some of its grand memories. Now on display in the Rusk Library, the old register—once rescued from a trash pile—recorded guests from 28 states, including at least one U. S. president and a host of millionaires who risked fortunes in the iron hills of Cherokee County.

They came to the Southern Hotel, the palace of social life in New Birmingham when an iron boom lifted it to the heights of prosperity in the late 1800s. President Grover Cleveland visited the hotel twice. A few lines above the signature of his last visit appears the signature, "Benj. Harrison, Washington, D. C." Some believe it to be that of Cleveland's successor.

Others who came to the hotel include Jay Gould of Railroad fame, New York financiers Robert A. Van Wyck and H. H. Wilbert, English lords, and Gov. Jim Hogg, who often spoke to crowds in the hotel's plush dining hall.
